













Snyder Golfers to Play Colorado in First Sand Belt Match There Sunday

Eight Snyder golfers will go to Colorado Sunday to play their first match in the Sand Belt Golf Association tournament.

The six clubs composing the association are Midland, Texon, Colorado, Lamesa, Big Spring and Snyder. Each club will meet the other five members twice, once at home and once away from home.

Rules and Regulations. Teams—A team shall be composed of eight members, selected from among the players of each club by selective methods and rated as Nos. 1 to 8, inclusive.

Score—Each member will score one point for being present at each match, whether opposing team be present or not. Each individual match won will count two points toward their team's total.

Pupils in County Make Fine Grades On English Tests

Following is a result of the county-wide achievement test given in English during the present school year in all the schools of the county.

This achievement test was given by County Superintendent A. A. Bullock to ascertain whether or not a standard grade of work was being done in the schools in this subject and also to see how the work in the smaller schools measured up to that done in the larger schools.

The county superintendent hopes to continue these tests from year to year in other subjects, and through them try to standardize the work of the entire county system so that the child going from one school to another will be able to fall right in line and not have to go through that period of adjustment so often necessary when the standards vary.

On the morning of March 31 a severe earthquake destroyed a large part of the city of Managua, which has a population of approximately 60,000.

Report indicates more than 1,000 persons were killed and that devastating fires caused by the earthquake have added materially to the destruction.

Upon receipt of the news of this disaster on the morning of March 31 President Hoover immediately designated the American Red Cross to coordinate all American relief efforts which are, of course, supplementary to the relief program of the Nicaraguan government and people.

The American Red Cross has met the needs during the emergency period of Scurry County through the expenditure of funds raised by Red Cross chapters outside the drought area. Farmers Are Warned Not to Misuse Government Feed and Seed Money

Scurry County officials in charge of government feed and seed loans have received the following communication from Washington, warning farmers that loan money must not be misused and that the loans will be collected without fail.

"A large number of specific cases have been brought to the attention of the farmers' seed loan office, United States Department of Agriculture, St. Louis, Missouri, where farmers have made application for seed, livestock and agricultural rehabilitation loans and, after having their applications approved by this office, have used a part or all of the money advanced to them for expenditures other than that for which they were authorized by law.

"It has also been reported to this office from some sections of the official seed loan territory attached to the St. Louis office, that the U. S. government does not seriously contemplate the collection of these loans when they are due this fall. Such reports should be corrected at once, since this office is already making extensive plans for collection of these loans.

"Loans made by the U. S. government from the \$45,000,000 appropriation, as well as the \$20,000,000 fund, are secured by a first mortgage on the 1931 crop and it will be unlawful for any mortgagor to sell any part of this crop without without applying the proceeds of such sales to the note held by the federal government. Payment of these loans must be made from the proceeds of the first crops sold. Any violation of the foregoing will be severely prosecuted."
