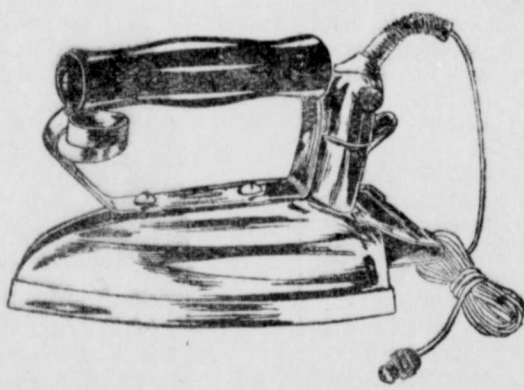

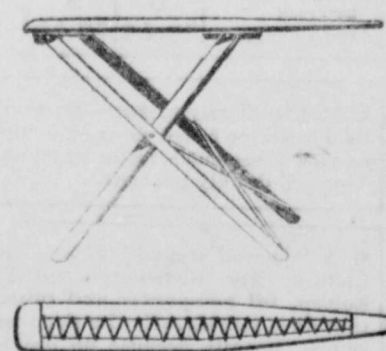

### WTCC MEETING SCHEDULED TO OPEN AT 9:00

Three-Day Program for Regional Body Will Hold Interest for All of West Texas.

Although the formal opening of the thirteenth annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce at Lubbock was scheduled until 9:00 o'clock this morning, in reality the affair got under way at 2:00 p. m. May 13, and from that time until 12:30 p. m. May 16, there is a variety of places for convention attendants to go and a wide diversity of programs and entertainment affairs for them to attend.

The convention badge secured by those who register will admit to the "Spirit of Progress" pageant at Texas Tech College stadium on the evening of May 15, and to various other entertainments offered.

Preliminaries in the "My Home Town" speaking contest will start at 8:00 p. m. May 15, under direction of C. M. Caldwell, Abilene. Other eliminations in this affair will be at the same hour on May 14 and May 15, with the finals before the general convention meeting on the morning of May 16.

At 9:00 o'clock on the morning of May 14 the first session of the general convention was to have opened with Spencer Wells, Lubbock director in the WTCC, presiding. The feature of this program was the address of Judge Charles E. Coombes of Stamford, president of the West Texas chamber. The period between 11:15 a. m. and 12:00 noon will be given over to the meetings of the representatives from the 10 districts in the territory of the regional organization. At these meetings the district directors and district secretaries will be selected and any matter affiliations in the bounds of the respective districts will be considered and passed on.

At noon all visiting Chamber of Commerce managers, secretaries and employees will meet at a luncheon in the Hilton Hotel for a combined session of business and pleasure. The afternoon will be given over to three group conferences—the Bredger-Feder Association conference, industrial development conference, and the highway and tourists' conference. The engineering and science shows at Texas Tech will be started formally at 5:30 p. m., and all departments of the college will be open for inspection. The program for the day will be rounded out with dances at both the Hilton Hotel and the Lubbock Hotel for all registered convention visitors.

On May 15, the morning period of the general business session of the convention will be devoted to reports from the convention work committee and from the three group conferences held on the preceding day. President Charles E. Coombes will preside at this meeting, which will continue from 9:00 a. m. to 11:00 a. m. when there will be an address of general interest by one of the prominent speakers at the convention.

During the afternoon three other group conferences—the production loan conference, agricultural development conference and the oil and gas conference—will be held. The "Spirit of Progress" pageant, in which over 75 West Texas stowns will be represented, and which will depict the history of West Texas from the beginning of settlement in the area to the present, and then give symbolic visualization of the future, will be presented at the Texas Tech stadium. Dances at the two above-mentioned hotels will follow.

All directors of the West Texas chamber are to meet at a breakfast at 7:30 a. m. on May 15 to elect a president and other officers for the ensuing year.

At 9:00 a. m. the final business session of the convention will open. Reports will be laid from the group conferences held on the day before.

### John Brook Dies at His Home Following Stroke of Apoplexy

John Brook, 46 years old, died suddenly as a result of apoplexy Wednesday morning, May 6, at the Brook residence, 205 Twenty-Fifth Street.

Funeral services were conducted Thursday afternoon, 5:30 o'clock, at the First Baptist Church, with Rev. Philip C. McGahey, pastor, officiating. Interment took place in the Snyder cemetery.

Mr. Brook was born in Brookshire, England, and came to America at the age of 16. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Brook of Brigham, Utah.

After teaching music in several colleges in Utah, Mr. Brook moved to Texas and became a member of the Harley Sadler Shows, serving as band and orchestra leader for several years.

Besides his parents, he is survived by his wife, Mrs. Gladys Brook, and little son, Vernon Ralph, of this city; and three sisters, Mrs. J. Harold Morgan of Culver City, California, Mrs. Thomas Abel of American Fork, Utah, and Mrs. Lloyd Jensen of Brigham City, Utah.

Home ambulance. Latest reports from Abilene indicate that he will recover. J. L. Young, Iowa Park mechanic, who was assisting the two truck drivers, received slight leg injuries.

The large truck on which the three men were changing a tire was one of a caravan of 10 en route to Hobbs, New Mexico, where oil well supplies were to be loaded for transfer to East Texas. The truck line is operated by the John B. Barbour Company of Iowa Park.

While the men were removing a broken rim from the gunt wheel as the truck stood in the center of the street, the tube exploded, throwing the tire into Dodson's face, crushing his head and causing internal injuries. He was thrown four feet into the air and 20 feet from the truck.

### Never Regained Consciousness.

No hope was held for the small, well-muscled man, but he was taken to the hospital and given treatment. He never regained consciousness. His wife and one child survive. Mrs. Dodson, with her mother, Mrs. Boatman, of Lubbock, arrived Monday afternoon, and the body was taken overland to Jacksboro Tuesday by the Odum Funeral Home. Funeral services were to have been held there Wednesday.

The explosion descended on the quiet street by surprise, and hundreds of men rushed to the scene of the cannon-like blast, half dazed by the unusual setting and by the three men who sprawled 10 to 20 feet from the truck. As Young, the least injured of the three, reeled to his feet, a doctor was summoned, and a stretcher was provided for Scott, who was unconscious for some time.

Dodson was taken from a pool of blood that flowed from his head and ears. He seemed to be breathing his last, but he lived for more than an hour after being taken to the hospital.
