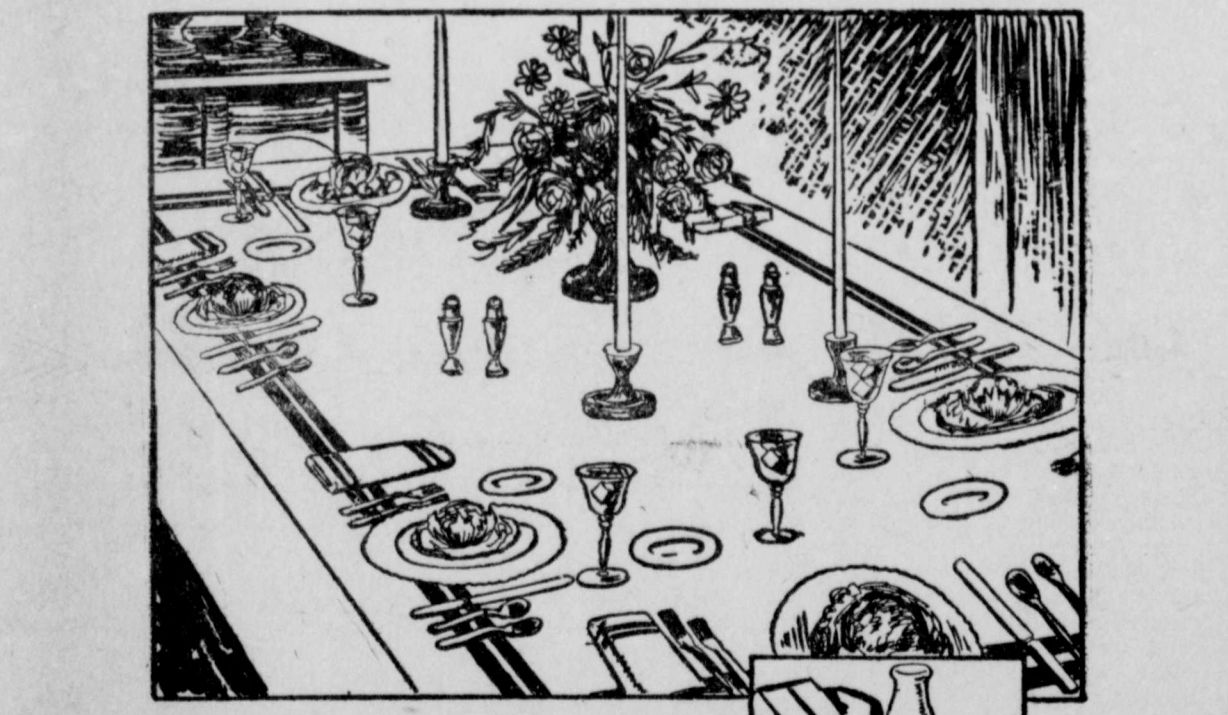

(Concluded from First Page)

posses in human life. When Europe emerged from the darkness of the Middle Ages, led by the Star, she entered her renaissance and God's people entered into a new glory of service.

Any student of history can see the foot-prints of Jesus across the centuries. God's plans may be long in their fulfilling, but they are sure, and as centuries rolled by each one made its contribution to God's purposes.

a. The fifteenth century brought Italy to the fore in art and religion. God placed Isabella on the throne of Spain, and planted a vision in the heart of Columbus. The printing press was developed in Germany, and Wycliffe appeared on the scene in England.

b. What a century was the sixteenth! The star of Galileo arose in Italy; Germany shakes under the might of Luther; Calvin arose in Switzerland; the Spanish armada and religious liberty came to the forefront in England; Knox was felt in Scotland.

c. In the seventeenth century we find Cromwell, the Pilgrim fathers and John Bunyan exercising mighty influence.

d. The Wesleys, Washington and the revolution changed the tide of affairs in the eighteenth century.

e. The nineteenth century was one of development. George Washington, Martha Washington, plows and Cincinnati, telegraph, telephone and railroads all had their part.

f. And then the twentieth century. Today there is a new scholarship, a new social order, a new value of life and the things of life. Today men are asking, "Where is Jesus? We have seen His Star." The world can find Jesus only as

you discover and reveal Him to a confused humanity.

IV.—Some paths that lead to His discovery:

a. The Church. There was a time when the Church kept alive the arts and the sciences, but today the church is to keep alive a faith in the living God. The church lives after the standard of the Lord Jesus. Your contribution to the church determines its influence. He is the goal of our endeavors.

b. The School. The school room is the door to the abundant life.

c. Our Conscience.

d. The Bible. "A lamp unto my feet." If you want to know the ethics of life, the ground of human and divine relationship, the duties of son and daughter, etc., you will find them all in the Bible.

V.—The wise men saw His Star. The wise of age and condition are looking for His Star. It cost them something; it will cost you something. They had faith to overcome difficulties, traditions, Roman government, Herod, etc.

VI.—They went forward. The race and the individual cannot go back. Ever since that morning the "the Spirit of God moved upon the face of the waters" and the light came, the watchword of nature and of men has been "Forward!"

The race cannot go back to the days of the lowly serf in his misery, and the proud king on his throne. We cannot go back to the conditions of the wooden plow, the ox cart and the spinning wheel; we cannot go back to the little red school house with only its three R's and a hickory stick; we cannot go back where might is right and permit the false to occupy the throne of reason, disregard the influence of the Lord Jesus and the fact of the brotherhood of man.

You cannot go back into the yesterdays and pick up the golden threads of youth, or view again

childhood's rosy morn. The roads leading back are closed. I tried it one time: The home, the swimming hole, the orchard, the school house—the years, the circumstances of life and the duties of life have conspired together to build a wall, cutting me off from my yesterdays, and I am not able to scale it. The roads are closed.

VI.—You will want to come back. You will think of the four years spent here, and your feet may lead you back to these halls and classrooms. You will listen for the voices of your classmates; you will listen for the voices of your instructors, but hear them only in the halls of memory.

VII.—Soon your paths will lead out into the exacting duties of life. A few more days and your class will separate to meet never more upon an occasion like this. Yet a little while, and the man who has taught you throughout the years

will walk out over the horizon and you will hear his footsteps no more; his voice will be forever still.

But whatever be the changes of life, Jesus shall live and reign, and He shall lead you on through time and eternity—until "the stars grow old, the suns grow cold and the leaves of the judgment book unfold."

My prayer is that He shall lead you into the good and the true. May you, my son, be all things that your father wanted to be and failed to be; may you, my daughter, be clothed with that graciousness and nobility of character, thus fulfilling the ideal that your mother has hidden in her heart throughout the years—until the "last day is done, the last battle is fought and won."

Your tottering reed shall lead you to the brinks of eternity, when your dimming eyes shall see the King in His beauty.
