At that time we were asking a five-cent margin on gasoline, which was customary in Snyder; but the major oil company filling stations forced me to sell an unbranded gas at less

money than they were selling their own product, which started the gas price war in Snyder, and not the C. of C., who now attempt to take the honor. Prior to this date (about March or April, 1929) I had been receiving the same margin as the other filling station men. On July 16, 1929, when the state




