Bob Smith Tells His Experiences On Battle Lines

From Shanghai, China, scene of the bitter fighting between Chinese and Japanese recently, comes a letter from Bob Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. George F. Smith of Snyder. Young Smith is said to be the youngest sergeant in the United States Marine Corps. The letter, written February 5, follows: "I wish that I could have written sooner, but I suppose you've heard about this war that is going on over here, and it's been pretty hard finding time to do anything at all. "When the Chinese arrived at Manila, we were transferred to the U. S. S. Houston a transport, and rushed there to Shanghai, where we were sent to the 'front.' The front consisted of a lot of sand-bag barricades, the Chinks and Japs were fighting right in front of us, and it was our job to see that none of them came into the American Settlement—quite some job, too, when every now and then a stray shell would drop over our way. "You will recall my remarking that I would like to be in a real war. I still have that wish coming. You can't call the slaughtering of innocent women and children war—and that's just what this was. Without any forewarning at all, the Japs turned their big guns on Chapai and Woosung (suburbs of Shanghai) and completely demolished both places. I can't quite see how the United States can take the insults that Japan has handed her and still be a respected nation. They dropped a bomb on one of our own billets and it was just a stroke of luck that none of us were killed, and yet an airplane from Japan was sufficient. But it looks as if this little fracas is drawing to a close, both sides are willing to call it quits, thank heavens. "I haven't had a decent sleep since about January 18, and I've had the same clothes on now for over a month. A little rest and a chance to clean up would go over with a bang for me. "I'll write more later. Don't know how long I'll stay here. I'm really slated for Peiping, but you might drop me a line at this address."

A saddleless old Dobbin from the Morris ranch has been placed at our disposal, since our Ford special of the vintage of '25 has to be nursed along due to too many rocky roads in this highway-less area.

and a dry battery. But it wasn't satisfactory. So he made a low-pressure glass tube, like the ordinary electric light bulb, but containing two filaments, with a dry battery and a telephone receiver in circuit connecting these two hot electrodes. He was on the verge of a great discovery.

Next he substituted a cold nickel plate for one of the hot filaments. Starting from a totally different basis, he had constructed a Fleming rectifier, but with this important, this most important difference: De Forest still had a separate "B" battery in the circuit connecting the two electrodes. The incoming wireless waves controlled this extra "B" battery current which supplied ample energy to operate the telephone receiver effectively.

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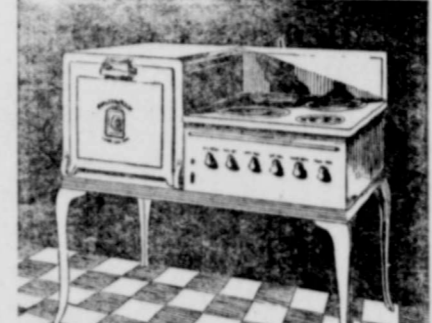

Snyder Thinly-Clads Lead Field of 37 Entrants at Texas Tech Tourney

The fastest track team in West Texas showed its heels to squads from 36 other high schools last Saturday as the worst sandstorm of the year whistled through Texas Tech stadium.

Snyder's name. Led by Bedford McClinton, who was easily high-scoring man with 14 1/2 points, "Red" Moore's delegation took a total of 25 points; just three points ahead of Amarillo.

McClinton took first in the low hurdles and 100 yard dash, and was lead-off man in the special and shuttle relays, both of which Snyder won. He also took third in the 50 yard dash.

Buck Howell placed second in the 100 yard dash, carried local colors in the special relay, and was the hero of the shuttle relay when he beat out the Amarillo entry by inches.

In the special relay, McClinton took the 230 yard hurdles, Buck ran the 230 yard dash, and York Murphy ran the 100. Pessire coming in the finishing heat on the 440. McClinton opened the unusual shuttle relay with a 50 yard low hurdle, Byrle Rigby following with a 50 yard dash. Murphy added another 50 yard dash, and Howell ended the race with a 70 yard dash.

The last relay was the most exciting event of the meet. R. L. Williams, high school principal, describes Howell's finish as the most beautiful dash he has ever seen—and he has watched Bruce and other Southwestern stars in action. "Taking the baton at least a half stride behind the Amarillo man, Buck was off like a shot," he says. "It was almost neck and neck right to the finish, when Buck gave the most beautiful finishing touch to a dash that I have ever seen."

This event had special significance because Amarillo and Snyder were tied with 20 points each up to this final race.

In the preliminaries, with the wind to their backs, Buck stepped the 100 in 9.5, and McClinton in 9.6, while the latter won with a mark of 9.8 in the finals, to set a new mark for the Tech relays.

The following permanent trophies obtained at the Lubbock meet were shown by Coach Red Moore to the high school students in chapel Tuesday afternoon: Large plaque for first place in meet; plaque for each of the relays; wrist watch, high point man; jacket, first in low hurdles; pocketbook, third in 50 yard dash; 8-inch silver statue, first in 100 yard dash; sweater, second in 100 yard dash.

Roy Burnett and Earl White were other entrants from Snyder.

STATE G. O. P. LEADER VISITS

John Fishback Grant, Houston lumberman, who visited Snyder Thursday of last week, in West Texas in the interest of his candidacy for the Republican nomination as governor of Texas. He was the first state or national candidate to call here this season.

Grant is a harmony candidate in the respect that he is the only Republican in the race for the state's highest office. The formal nomination will be awarded at the state convention August 9, at a place to be selected May 24, at Mineral Wells, when delegates will be named to the national convention.

Hoover will win again, Grant feels sure, and he thinks Al Smith will be his Democratic opponent. "If Garner should be on the ticket, in either place, Texas probably would go Democratic; but if Smith is the nominee Hoover will again win the state's electoral vote."

E. J. Anderson, county Republican chairman, pointed out to his guest that Scurry County polled the largest vote for Hoover, in proportion to its size, of any county in Texas, in 1928.

It was Mr. Grant's first visit to this section of West Texas. "I like it," he said.

Newt Miller, 27, was charged in Colorado Monday in connection with the fatal shooting of N. M. (Slim) Davis, late Sunday as he sat in an automobile in front of the home of Brownie Miller, a brother of Newt. The shooting occurred a block north of the Mitchell County jail, at 7 o'clock.

Immediately after the shooting, Newt Miller surrendered to Chief of Police H. S. Hickman. He handed the officer a pistol, telling him, "I think I have killed Slim Davis' officers said."

The subject of the argument that led up to the shooting was not revealed.

Davis had been sentenced to the penitentiary for liquor law violation here and another liquor case was pending against him in 32nd district court. He was convicted December 10, 1925, of a prohibition law violation, but was pardoned by the Ferguson administration before he had served a day of his sentence. In December, 1931, he was tried in 32nd judicial court on another liquor charge, but a hung jury resulted.
