Thanks to Clyde Rowe.

Snyder has Clyde Rowe to thank for the excellent work being done by the band this year. Hour upon hour of free work and painstaking service have brought a group of willing youngsters to the point where they are anxious to win some laurels at Abilene Friday. If they do not win a top ranking they will continue to be an outstanding band and a distinct asset to Snyder as a whole.

Colorado—Hostess.

Colorado City was an exceptionally fine hostess Sunday, Monday and Tuesday to District 2-T of Lions International. She went the last yard, and the first, to make more than 200 guests feel that they were welcome. The 25 Lions who made the journey from Snyder will vouch for the success of the convention no matter whether food, fun, fellowship or frivolity be considered ingredients of success.

Conservative—Banking.

Bankers who gathered here Saturday took their customary conservative attitude toward depression-prosperity figures. William Z. Hayes of Dallas sounded the keynote when he declared himself to be a pessimist-optimist. He said he hoped for the best but prepared for the worst. Perhaps this type of conservatism is needed to counteract the sometimes-radical trend of modern thinking and acting.

West Texas Feeders' Day.

Every effort is being put forth at the Spur Experiment Station to develop means for reducing the cost of finishing cattle for the market. At the All West Texas Feeders' Day to be held there on May 4, the final results of a 112-day feeding test in which 100 standard steer yearlings, divided into lots of ten, will be announced. Scurry County cattlemen will undoubtedly attend the meeting in sizeable numbers.

Look Out for Barrow.

Clyde Barrow and John Dillinger, as tough as they are, do not have much rope on a few of New York's big bankers. A few of the cuss-'em-out customs observed so studiously by the great American public during the depression were based principally on prejudice and rumor, but the attitude toward the stock market manipulators and their financiers was evidently justified in the lights of recent developments from America to Canada to Greece.

"Child and His Community."

It is no accident that the Parent-Teacher group convening here Friday and Saturday will discuss "The Child and His Community." The subject is a keynote to the unselfish spirit that entered into the founding of the organization and has since lifted it to a sweeping plane of child-serving.

Snyder would not say enough if it were to say only this to its visitors: "Welcome. Make yourselves at home. May your stay in our city be pleasant and inspiring." It is not enough to go forth, after the invitation has been made, and assist the delegates from the South Plains in making their district convention successful.

Only by entering into the spirit of P.-T. A., which knows nothing of prejudice and self-seeking, which spread-eagles above the jealousies that beset most large organizations, can Snyder become the host city that her coming guests deserve.

Civic groups often have axes to grind. Lodges and study clubs have personal advancement in intellect and character as their prime objectives. The professions are crowded with men and women who hear little except the clink of silver coins and the rustle of greenbacks. Even charity has become in many instances a commercialized canker in the body of society.

The P.-T. A. sets itself apart from these by studying ways in which it may be of service, in a broad sense, to education and to child character; narrowly, to the child, that pulsating bundle of nerves whose training is nothing short of tomorrow's harvest.

"The Child and His Community," then, is the keynote. Snyder shall do her utmost, welcome visitors, to prove herself a sympathetic host city, with a heart beating in tune with your symphony of child-serving.

The WTCC and Bankhead Bill.

It is not news that the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has saved cotton farmers many thousands of dollars, principally through direct intervention with the government cotton authority to give this area a square deal after its depression-drouth.

But it is news that this remarkable regional organization is coming to West Texas' aid on the heels of the Bankhead Bill's apparently unreasonable terms as applied to this immediate section. And the local Chamber of Commerce is interceding for the whole county through the regional body.

Many counties will suffer disastrously if their tax-free ginnings are held down to present figures. The WTCC realized that this disaster was on its way long before the Bankhead Bill became law. It has been gathering facts and figures, argument and sane statements, for many weeks. Scurry County, one of the hardest hit counties if the law is enforced in its present form, will naturally be one of the chief beneficiaries if the WTCC is successful in its present efforts.

Do not be surprised if you read in your daily newspaper some morning that the WTCC has won more thousands of dollars for cotton farmers by wooing the government with factual logic again.

Red Moore—Builder of Teams.

As Red Moore leaves the sod of Tiger Field for greener pastures, he will carry the best wishes of Snyder and Scurry County sportsmen. Nor will the sportsmen alone wish him well. Red has sold himself to the fathers and mothers of boys, and to patrons who know that sportsmanship is a virtue that will be carried far from the athletic field.

Red Moore has brought many laurels to Snyder. Two regional football championships; three district football championships; two district track championships; third place in state track meet one year. There you have a record that will remain as long as Snyder High School stands. But it is not improbable that the seeds of character and permanent training sown by this five-year coach will reach over and beyond the records he has led in establishing.

A lengthy editorial would not do justice to Red. He is one of those fellows who goes long on action and short on words. His lanky enthusiasm and his Irish frankness are enough to repel the thought of hokum in this column, or even the thought of flowery phrases that might be unquestionably true.

Winning, Red made friends. Losing, he made friends. Leaving, he holds friends.

At Ranger, where the going will be rougher and the pressure will be greater, the former Snyder coach will prove equal to the occasion. The Bulldogs will learn to stick to him with the fervor that only a straightforward, capable, painstaking, friendly coach can invoke.

EDITORIAL OF THE WEEK

CLIMATE, PLUS.

West Texas may, or may not, have the things that are necessary to create an industrial structure similar to that which dominates the northern and eastern picture. But it has something in the way of an asset that the foregoing area most emphatically does not have. And that is climate, plus.

It isn't just a mere matter of discomfort produced by the extreme low temperatures which characterized the current northern winter. Medical science has definitely established the value of the therapeutic properties of sunshine, has revealed, more sharply than ever, man's dependence on the orb of day. Those who have any remaining doubt on the subject might check, for example, the pneumonia death rate in the smoke laden atmosphere of Pittsburgh as compared to that of other points. And other effects produced by so many dreary, cloudy days.

Florida knows how to capitalize on its climate, reports the best season since the late lamented boom of 1926. Consider how much of California's business structure is likewise based on climatic attractions, how it is stressed in national advertising campaigns, again.

Then remember that the high, dry atmosphere of West Texas offers something that is absent in the damp, sea level setting of Florida, is a definite improvement over California.

Why cannot the individual cities of West Texas prepare for those hounded out of the North by winter rigors and get together on a regional advertising program that will tell people who know it not what we know so well that we pay no attention to it?—San Angelo Standard-Times.

The Scurry County Times stated last week that the spring term of the district court there was proving to be a "near washout." The return of booze has neither routed the depression nor decreased crime. It has aggravated both evils. Hurrah for West Texas, the soberest and the most prosperous spot in America today.—Lynn County News.
