Payne Captures Mayors Seat, 3 Keep Spot On School Board

Baird citizens turned out Saturday to cast their votes in the city and school board elections.

Frank Payne was elected Mayor receiving 184 votes to Ray Hass' 108 votes. Running for city council rather than seeking re-election as mayor, H.L. Brame accomplished his goal with 168 votes.

Seeking re-election and triumphed with 152 votes over Evalyn Fox with 146 votes was Virginia Shanks.

Incumbents James Grant, Bruce Williams and Stan McCormick, seeking re-election on the school board kept their spots with 178, 158, and 156 votes respectively. Challenger Bufford Burns

who received 110 votes did not receive a seat.

Also holding school board elections were Clyde, Cross Plains and Eula.

Clyde voters elected Tom Benson, Curtis Watson and Elizabeth Longbotham to the school board.

Joe Hanke Jr., retained his seat on the Cross Plains School board with 340 votes and a new member, Scott Edington with 235 votes was elected.

Abilene police officer, Glenn Lawrence, received 96 votes to lead a field of five candidates trying for two places on the Eula School Board. Larry LeMay was seconf with 93 votes.

The best discus throw of the year

Defosses hurled the discus 187.3
which broke the Relays record, pre-
viously set by Leon Farmer of Killeen in
1974 by 2 inches, and won the event
at the Texas Relays.

Coming into the Relays, Defosses'
best throw was 175-8. He hit 184.4
during the preliminaries and got his re-
cord throw on his first try in the finals.

Being better on the last throw last

year at the Cisco AA State Meet, never
entered his mind. His confidence was
spurred on by a 197-foot throw at work-
outs last week.

His throw Friday was six inches better
than the class AA State record, which
can only be broken at the State Meet
in May.

Defosses is hoping the wind will be
good, as they will be throwing in the same
rings as Friday.

Ricky was the only area athlete com-
peting in the high school division.

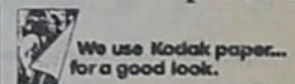

Former Clydite Dies

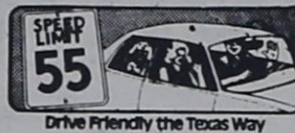

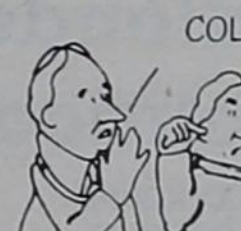

Contracts Needed For Crushing, Exporting Additional Peanuts

Additional peanuts produced for crushing or exporting must be contracted by April 14," Oran Bains, Chairman of the Callahan Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee, said.

Additional peanuts are those marketed from a farm for which a poundage quota has been established and which are in excess of the poundage quota, and also those marketed from a farm for which no farm poundage quota has been established. "This production must be either placed under an approved contract with a handler or be placed under price support loan, at the \$200.00 per ton loan rate. If the additional peanuts are marketed, or considered marketed, in any other way except as green peanuts, they will be designated as quota-marketings and subject to a 38.5¢ per pound penalty," the ASCS official said.

The peanut price support program no longer limits the number of acres of peanuts that can be plant-

ed. This means that any person can grow peanuts anywhere in the country and market the peanuts for other than domestic edible use. Under previous

According to Mr. Bains, a handler may contract with a farmer to buy additional peanuts for crushing or export or both. However, all contract forms must be submitted to the county ASCS office for approval by April 14.

All peanut growers are required to certify their planted acres to the county ASCS office and have peanut marketing cards issued before they can sell peanuts. The cards reflect the number of pounds of peanuts that can be marketed for domestic edible uses or marketed as contract additional peanuts for export or crushing. Peanuts marketed in excess of the contracted quantity are considered marketings of quota peanuts.
