ON TEXAS FARMS

With the help of 20 men, and logs and shingles donated by other citizens, the Arbor community in Houston County has built a relief canning center at a cash expense of \$16.

May Rain Figures Not So High When Comparisons Made

Old-timers who are saying that May, 1935, was the wettest May in county history may be dead wrong. Figures prove they are wrong as far as Snyder is concerned, and except for a few communities visited by cloudbursts, it is probable that they are wrong in regard to the balance of the county.

A check-back of official records kept by Mrs. Wesley Evans reveals that two Mays out of the past 19 have been wetter than the May of 1935. Rain totaling 5.09 inches fell in May, 1922, and just two years earlier the total had been 4.66. In 1923 it reached 4.40, and the following year it was 3.97.

These figures compare with 4.47 for May of this year. The 19-year average for May rains is 2.68. So you see May is a tolerably wet month, after all.

Here are the May figures: 1917, .99; 1918, 2.46; 1919, 2.19; 1920, 4.66; 1921, .87; 1922, 5.09; 1923, .75; 1924, 4.27; 1925, 4.26; 1926, 3.10; 1927, .70; 1928, 4.40; 1929, 3.97; 1930, 1.39; 1931, 1.17; 1932, 3.47; 1933, 2.20; 1934, .65; 1935, 4.47.
