Thanksgiving Desserts.

Perhaps you'd like to change from the traditional mince or pumpkin pies and serve something different but equally appropriate to climax your Thanksgiving feast, If so, try one of the recipes suggested here.

Pumpkin Chiffon Pie One package of plain gelatin, onefourth cup cold water, one-half cup milk, one-half tsp. nutmeg, one-half tsp. salt, one and one-fourth cups canned pumpkin, one-half tsp. gin-

ger, one-halp tsp. cinnamon, one cup sugar, three eggs. To slightly beaten egg yolks add one-half cup sugar, pumpkin, milk, salt and spices. Cook until thick in a double boiler. Ice Cream Pie One-half cup sugar, two tbsp. flour, one pt. vanilla ice cream, one baked pie shell, one No. 2 can sour pitted cherries and juice, four tbsp.

sugar, two egg whites. Mix sugar and flour together and add to the cherries. Cook until thick, stirring constantly. Chill. Pack the vanilla ice cream into the baked pie shell and spread on the cherry mixture. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold in four tbsp sugar. Cover the top of the pie with the meringue. Place under the broiler to brown the top. The meringue must be browned quickly so that the ice cream will not melt.

Two quarts dry bread crumbs three-fourths cup fat, butter and turkey fat, one small chopped onion, makes steam, and steam around a pint chopped celery, two tsp. salt, roasting turkey or any tender meat one to two tsp. savory seasoning, pepper to taste.



Figures Indicate Cotton Advances

Cotton prices advanced sharply to the highest point reached so far this season, and the 10-market average of 12.15 cents for middling 7-8 inch cotton on Friday, November 15, was 67 points higher than week earlier, according to a U. S. Department of Agriculture :eport out of Dallas.

"Continued improvement of demand conditions, with an advance in the general level of prices of other commodities and securities, and a further decrease in the offerings particularly of the medium and higher white grades as a result of continued rains in the cotton belt, were important factors contributing to the advance in cotton prices," says the report.

"Smaller adjustment payments to farmers as ten-market average price of middling 7-8 inch cotton approached the 12-cent level, is believed to have contributed also to the decrease in offerings by farmers. The volume of sales reported decreased seasonably and forwarding to world mills decreased substantially from the large volume of the past few weeks.
