LOCALS PLAN **ELEVATOR FOR** BUMPER CROP

Prospect of Big Grain Harvest Is Responsible for Yoder, Ely, Arnold & Ely Decision.

Plans for immediate construction in Snyder of a small but efficient grain elevator were announced this week by D. P. Yoder, and Ely, Arnold

& Ely Gin. Decision to erect the new enterprise between the Ely, Arnold & Ely Gin and the wholesale gasoline tanks, on the R. S. & P. tracks just south of 28th Street, was made by the local men because they foresee the need this summer for quick handling of the county's prospec-

tive bumper grain crop. Most of the machinery for the elevator is being fashioned by D. P. Yoder, who was trained and served a number of years as an engineer. Members of the gin firm will be associated with him in construction and operation of the elevator, and

in purchasing wheat, Although designed primarily to provide quick and easy handling of grain from trucks to railroad cars, the elevator will have storage capacity of between two and three carloads of grain, or upwards of 3.000 bushels.

Operated at capacity, the equipment will probably load 1,000 bushels, or about a carload (60,000 pounds) per hour. Average operaion, however, is expected to result in loading of one and one-half to two carloads per hour.

With probability of harvesting upwards of 400,000 bushels of wheat

this season, provided moisture continues to fall at opportune times, Scurry County promises the biggest grain crop in her history.

MYSTERY CAR PLUNGE KILLS **GRADON BURT**

Livestock Buyer and Rancher Is Found Dead After Machine Hurtles From Highway.

Cause of the 50-foot plunge from Highway 7 that brought instant death to Gradon Burt, Snyder livestock buyer and rancher, Friday afternoon about 4:00 o'clock, remains a mystery to efficers and others who investigated the accident.

The 38-year-old native of Scurry County was dead when his crushed car was reached by R. B. Norman of Amarillo, who was traveling toward Snyder several hundred yards behind Burt.

Mrs. S. M. Pieper and Mrs. J. B Dunn of Inadale, who were driving toward Snyder between the Burt and the Norman cars, said the 1935 Dodge sedan was careening, apparently beyond control, just before it disappeared into the creek bed.

The Burt car, in which the local man was driving alone five miles southeast of Snyder, veered gradually from the highway, catapultin through space for 50 feet just before it reached the concrete bridge over the creek. It evidently landed headon against the southwest abutment of the bridge. The motor was driven into the body of the car.

Gone Are the Days.

The gentle art of driving cattle to market has undergone an important and far-reaching change, according to a report recently made public by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The old way was for the rancher to take his cattle out on the road and ride herd on them. The new way is for modern trucks to carry the cattle on long or short hauls. Last year, according to government figures, 56 per cent of all cattle and 67 per cent of all calves received at the principal markets of the country arrived by truck.
