Official check of returns from the Scurry County trustee elections held Saturday, April 3, were made Monday by the Commissioners Court in regular session.

The check revealed that W. B. Lemons barely retained his place as county board member from precinct 3 over Rev. R. E. Bratton. The vote was 69 to 63. In precinct 4, D. Z. Hess defeated Joe A. Merritt, 144 to 85, for a county board place.

After checking the vote, authorizing a new public road across the R. E. Jeyce place in the southern part of the county, and approving a number of bills, the court adjourned until Saturday of this week.

Blood Poisoning After Fall Fatal To Local Woman

Blood poisoning that grew out of a minor wound sustained from a fall in her home last Thursday proved fatal in a local hospital Wednesday afternoon, 1:30 o'clock, to Mrs. H. S. Moreland, 42, wife of an employee of the State Highway Department here.

Mrs. Moreland was carried to the hospital Tuesday, when her condition became critical. The infection began from a slightly bruised knee, result of a short fall in the Moreland home, East Snyder. Home remedies were applied, and nothing was thought of the bruise until sharp pain and swelling set in early Friday night. The poisoning gradually became worse and was never headed by attending physicians.

Final rites are being held this (Thursday) afternoon, 4:30 o'clock, at the First Baptist Church, with Rev. Lawrence Hays officiating. Odum Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements for burial in Snyder cemetery. Mrs. Moreland was a Baptist.

The Morelands came to Snyder eight years ago from Ballinger. Surviving, in addition to the husband, are three children, Dawson, 19, Lloys, 17, both graduates of Snyder High School in 1936, and Berry Lee, 10, who is in the seventh grade; one sister, Mrs. W. H. Virden, Robstown; four brothers, Felix Thomas of Pyle, Roland Thomas of Taico, Jess Thomas of Ballinger and Ross Thomas of McCombs; her mother, Mrs. J. H. Thomas, who resides with the Moreland family here.

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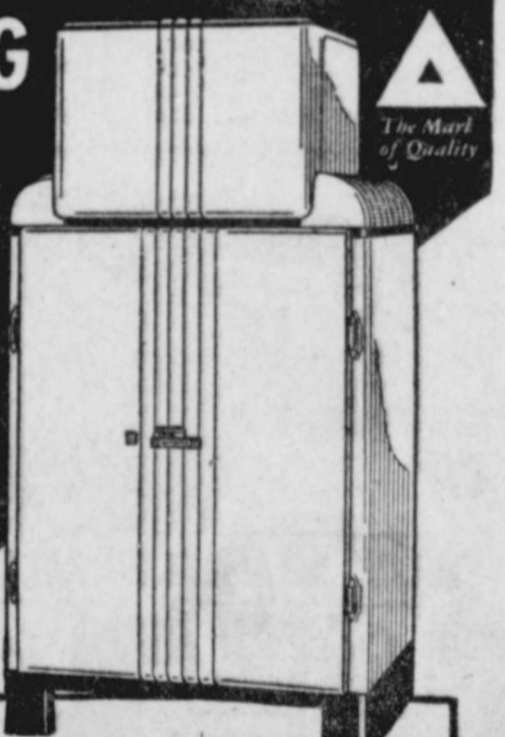

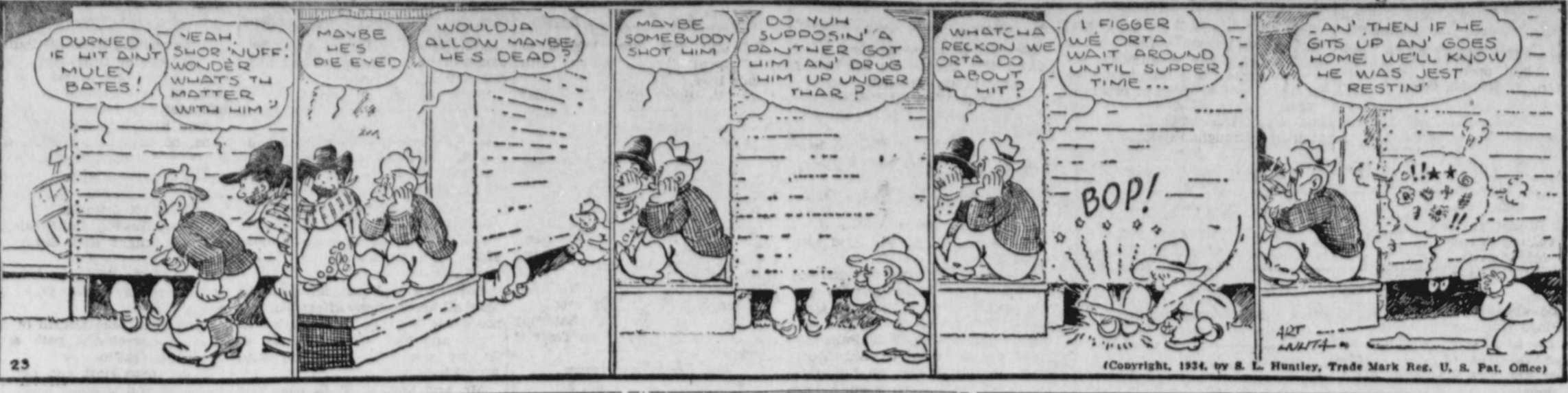
