

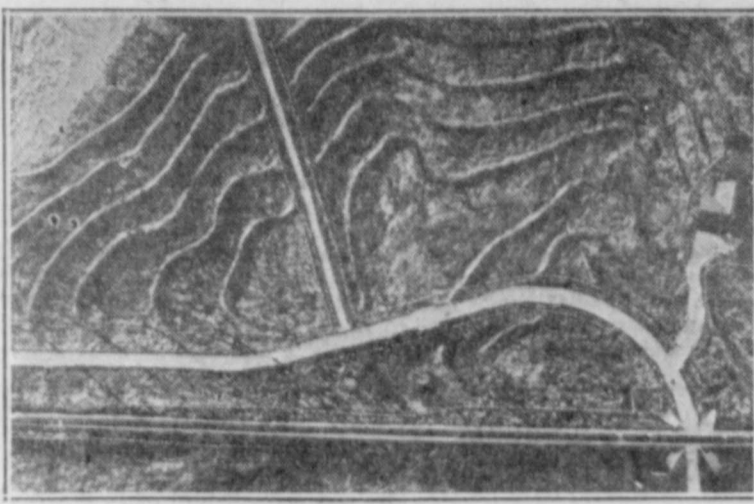
District Highway Engineer Tells About New Terracing Program

FRENCH CITES OLD AND NEW CONSTRUCTION

Editors' Note: The following article was delivered as a speech by W. A. French, superintendent of the State Highway Department in Division 3, at a terracing short course at A. & M. College recently. The article has a particular appeal for Scurry County because it includes discussion of the construction of Highway 101 near Snyder.

The critical engineer might say that there would be no surface tanks for stock water and there might be a time when there would be a rain greater than any known before. In order to offset this argument it is suggested that for every one or two thousand acres of drainage area a storage tank be constructed without a spillway, or if a farmer or ranchman has a small ravine or creek through his place, small storage tanks could be constructed without spillways and enough water diverted so that he will have stock water, but at the same time being careful not to divert too much which would cause the dams to break and cause floods and erosion below.
What would be done with the run off from ranches? All of the ranches in the drainage area should either be terraced or listed on contours. The plowing of the level furrows will increase the grass production more than 100 per cent and increase the moisture content in the sub soil to a depth of from six to eight feet.
The federal government is now aiding ranchmen in building of surface tanks. This will help prevent run off of excess water and could be so designed and constructed that there would be no run off. The run off from small pastures and ranches which are adjacent to and above farm lands could be controlled in several ways. If the surplus water is needed it could be evenly distributed over the land by a system of "spray pan" terraces.
Construct Level Leves.
If the water is not needed, a level levee would be constructed between the farm land and pasture or ranch. The material for the levee could be obtained from a series of low places or borrow pits and hauled to proper location. These borrow pits would act as storage basins for the excess water and would also give the ranch watering places for the stock. These levees and basins could be so designed and constructed that there would be no run off.
What would be done with the land which has already eroded so that it has now become useless? That is, the hilly or mountainous land and that which is commonly called "broken country." This part of the country could be handled by building a series of small dams without spillways.
When the highway department was organized in 1917, we had only county roads divided into first, second and third classes with 60, 40 and 20 foot rights of way respectively. The first class roads with 60 foot right of way were considered sufficiently wide, and as the highway commission had no money for right of way purchases they had to be contented with what the counties would furnish.
The first roads were therefore built on 60 foot right of way. The

House Approves Bill That Would Assist Farmers

Action of the House of Representatives last week in passing a bill providing for the continuation of the three and one-half per cent interest rate on Federal Land Bank loans is of particular interest to West Texas farmers. The measure provides that the three and one-half per cent rate shall be extended for one year, for a four per cent rate for the period July 1, 1938, to June 30, 1939, and for a four per cent interest rate on land bank commissioner loans for a period of two years.
The three and one-half per cent rate has been in effect for the past two years and the act establishing the reduction expires June 30, this year, unless the measure as passed by the House is approved by the Senate and signed by the president before that date.
Congressman George Mahon stated that the fact that the House voted the bill without a dissenting vote was significant evidence of the continued friendliness of Congress toward farm legislation.
No estimate has been made as to commissioner loans, but final approval of the three and one-half per cent interest provision in the bill would save Federal Land Bank borrowers an estimated \$31,700,000 in interest charges during the next year. Congressman Mahon estimated that a saving of \$200,000 during the next year would be realized by Federal Land Bank borrowers of the 15th congressional district.

Social Security Question Box

Editors' Note: The Times is publishing a series of questions and answers concerning the federal old-age benefits provision of the Social Security Act. Employers who wish to have further questions answered should write to the Social Security Board office, 1550 Allen Building, Dallas.
Question: What should an employer do if he loses his Social Security account card? What should he do if he has been issued more than one account card?
Answer: If an employee loses his account card, he should report such loss to the postmaster, where his original application for an account card was made. He may later receive a duplicate SS-5 form. Application for Account Number. He should fill out this form, showing on line 14 the place and date of his original application. After this form is returned to the postmaster, the worker shortly will receive a duplicate card.
If an employee receives two or more account cards, he should present, preferably in person, all account number cards issued to him to the local post office or to any Social Security board field office, either of which will designate the number to be kept.
An employee should have only one account number, so that all wages paid him may be accurately recorded to his credit under a single old-age benefits account.

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Heavy Shortage Of Good Layers Seen by Expert

A heavy shortage of laying hens, with a corresponding increase in egg and poultry prices, is in prospect for the fall of 1937 and the early part of 1938, according to George P. McCarthy, assistant poultry husbandman of the Texas A. & M. Extension Service.

High feed costs and low prices for poultry products has resulted in the heaviest culling program in recent years. The unfavorable price picture has also resulted in a decline in the purchase of baby chicks. Commercial hatcheries have reported a 35 per cent decline in the sale of baby chicks.

With better egg prices in prospect, McCarthy urged that poultrymen give their pullets every chance to come into early production and to maintain production. "Poultry men who feed their pullets properly during the summer and give them every opportunity to develop will be well repaid during the fall and winter," he said.

Not much chance exists of any unforeseen increase in the number of laying hens before well into 1938. June and July chicks have never proved profitable and commercial hatcheries have suspended operations for the summer.

Inquiries in Scurry County indicate that fewer baby chicks were sold than usual and prospects are for fewer pullets next fall for layers. The farm family with a well developed lot of pullets properly housed, fed and cared for will cash in on the higher priced eggs. Prospects are good for a big feed crop and chickens will help sell it to a good advantage.

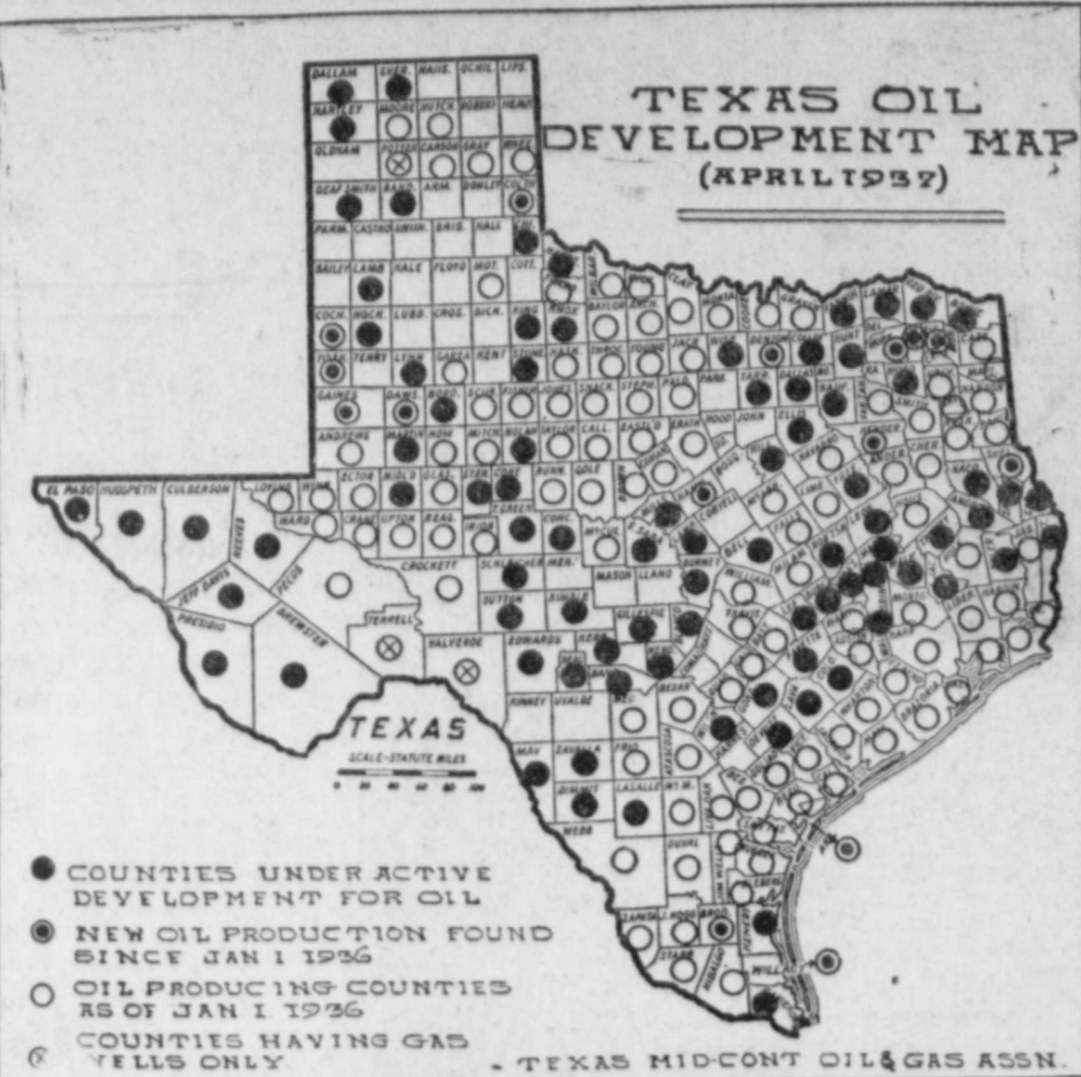


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TEXAS' MAJOR "CROP" AS SEEN BY MAPPERS

Mahon Requests Additional ROTC Set-up for Tech

Congressman George Mahon appeared last week before the senate appropriations committee in Washington urging that funds and officers for an additional ROTC unit at Texas Technological College be provided. The item would be included in the war department appropriation bill which is under consideration by the senate committee at this time.

The report of the ROTC inspector from Fort Sam Houston, headquarters for the eighth corps area, made March 1 this year, recommended that an additional unit be established at the college, preferably a field artillery unit. This type of unit would make the training available to about 1200 students at the college who are ineligible for training in the existing engineering unit which is open only to engineering students.

The outcome of the matter will depend upon the disposition by the house and senate of the proposed appropriation item for funds and personnel. The war department advised Mahon that the Texas Tech application for such a unit was in excellent standing.

Borden County Farm - Ranch News

Borden County farms in the 1936 agricultural conservation program have earned a total of \$40,302.80 in payments received to date. Three hundred and twenty-seven persons have shared in the payments on 209 farms, upon which payments have already been completed. There are only six unpaid 1936 applications, and the checks for these remaining farms are expected within the next few days.

Thirty earthen tanks have been completed in Borden County under provisions of the range program. Sixty-four thousand, three hundred and forty-three yards of dirt have been measured in these tanks, and considerable water has been held in recently completed tanks, due to general rains over the county during the past several weeks. There are approximately 29 tanks under construction at the present time, in addition to the 30 that have been finished and measured.

One hundred and thirty-nine farms have been plane table mapped for compliance under the 1937 agricultural program in the county and 81 other farms will be mapped

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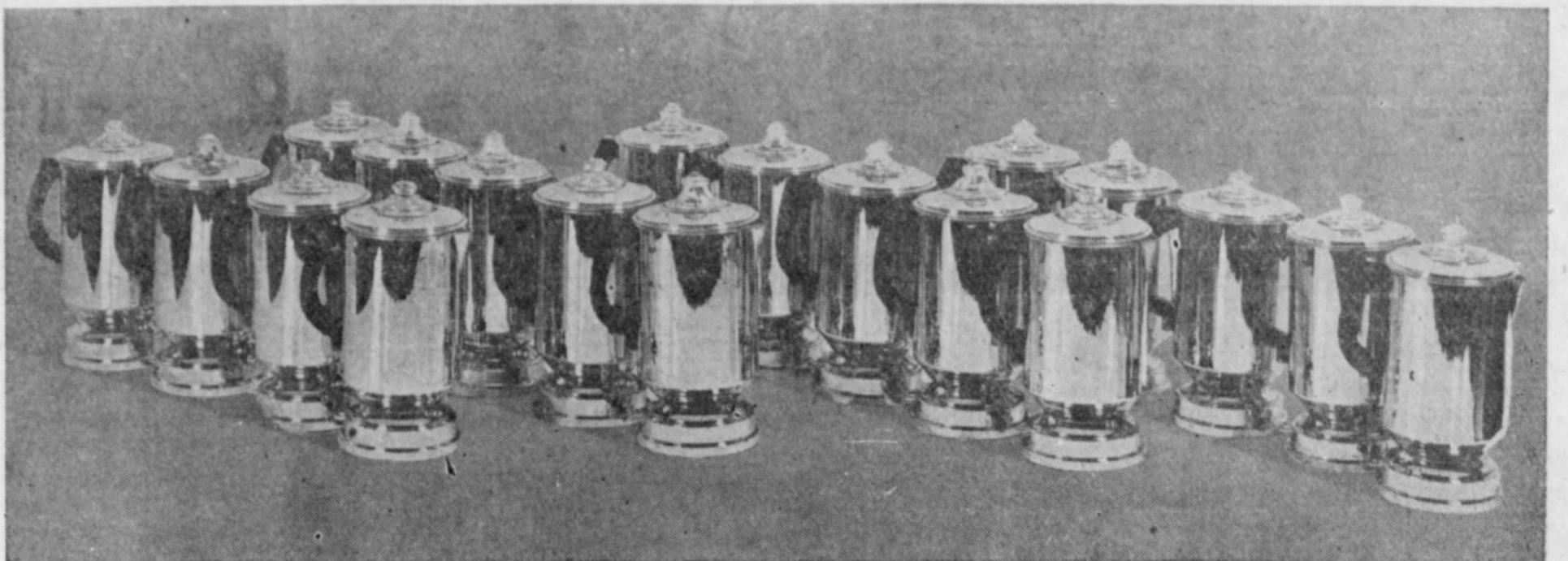

NOBODY'S BUSINESS

Austin—What effect the action of Con. Martin Dies, who obtained adoption by the national house of representatives of an amendment to the bill creating a new federal judgeship in the Houston district, that would require the appointee to be a resident of that district, upon the plans of Governor James V. Allred to obtain the appointment as federal judge, furnished grist for the political gossip mill here.

Dies Mad at Jimmy. Dies offered and fought for the amendment because of his feud with the Texas governor, growing out of the candidacy of Clyde Smith of Woodville, against Dies last summer. Smith, who started the state four years ago by making a very creditable race for attorney general, as an unknown was appointed assistant secretary of state under the Allred administration, and Dies credited the Allred forces with encouraging him to run against Dies.

Press Freedom Curtailed. Disregarding the plea of Texas newspaper publishers that the law was a direct attack upon the freedom of the press Governor Allred signed the bill prohibiting dentists from advertising last week-end.

An interesting bit of gossip concerning the bill circulated in Austin was to the effect that it was lobbied through the Legislature by Ex-Senator Carl Hardin of Stephenville on a contingent fee paid by the "ethical" dentists' organization.

Some idea of the task confronting the legislature may be drawn from the final appropriation figures, after Governor Allred had vetoed certain items and approved the big appropriation bills for the biennium. The total of the appropriations is \$74,569,809, to run the government for the next two years, and increase of more than \$10,000,000 over 1935-36.

Firemen were called to the fire, but could be of small assistance because only their booster tanks could be used. Two diamonds were included in the contents of the house, which were completely destroyed.

KNOW TEXAS

Summer travelers who feel the call of the "wide open spaces" must of course, look to the West to find a vacation spot. Texas Panhandle, painted with the glowing colors of its cowboy legends, offers a varied bill of fare to the visitor.

Probably the most inclusive route through the northwest section of the state begins at Fort Worth on federal highways 81 and 370, passes on through Wichita Falls to Amarillo. After a circle of the Panhandle, it turns south through Plainview and Lubbock.

Remains of ancient Indian cultures are glimpsed by the tourist in the interesting old towns of Tascosa and Old Mobetie up in the eastern corner. Then, traveling along the scenic Canadian river and southward, he comes upon the land which formed the well-known XIT Ranch, a 3,000,000 acre tract which was paid for the building of the state capitol. Just a remnant now remains.

Another large tract is the Goodnight Ranch in the lower Palo Duro Valley southeast of Amarillo. Nearby is a state park of 15,000 acres, and also a museum of relics collected by the Panhandle Historical Society.

Although most of the great old ranches are being replaced by fields of wheat and cotton, and more recently by oil and gas fields, between the high plains and Fort Worth are four ranches large enough to deserve mention—Spur, 6666, Matador, and Waggoner. In the nearby towns rodeos are held throughout the summer.

The territory of most historical importance is around Albany, Graham and Throckmorton, where Forts Richardson, Griffin and Belknap are located. These are among the most famous of the old frontier forts.

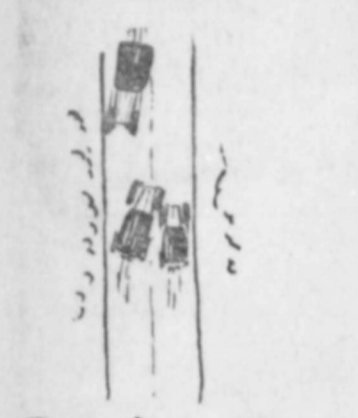
