## COUNTY AGENT LACE ACCEPTS NEW POSITION

Man in Charge of Scurry County Office Since 1933 Will Swap With Breck Agent.

After a conference in Breckenridge Wednesday, County Agent W. R. Lacey officially informs The Times that he will swap places with the agent in Stephens County, effective January 1.

Confirmation for the swap had previously been received from the Extension Service and from the Scurry County Commissioners Court.

The change will take from Scurry County a man who was stationed in Snyder in April, 1933, to have charge of special work in Scurry, Dawson and Borden Counties.

Luke Ballard coming. Luke Ballard is the agent who will come from Breckenridge, county seat of Stephens County. He has held that position since January 15, 1934. He is one of the oldest agents in that section, in point of service, and Lacey has a similar distinction in this district.

On July 1, 1933, with the beginning of the plow-up program, Lacey became emergency agricultural assistant for Scurry County and the eastern portion of Borden, including Gail. On November 1, 1933, he became county agent of Scurry alone, and has served in that position continuously.

Lacey holds a B. S. degree in agriculture from A. & M. College. From 1927 until 1932 he worked out of Sweetwater as a representative of the Ralston Purina Company. For several months prior to taking up county agent duties here he was field man for a South Texas creamery.

His Biggest Job. Lacey's biggest job in Scurry County has been, of course, the administration of the various government agricultural programs. In this capacity he has dealt not only with practically every farmer in the county but also with practically all ranchers, business men and many others.

The agent places next in importance the trench silo program that has been started in the county—a program that has branched out to include practically every section of the county. Control of erosion and conservation of moisture by terracing and contouring have also been major programs.

Lacey and his wife, the former George Winston, have been active in the civic, social and religious life of the community.

## OFFICIAL BALE TOTAL 42,070

The official government report of December 1 shows that Scurry County has ginned a total of 42,070 bales. Total figures for December 1, 1935, were 14,544 bales ginned up until that date last year.

Due to the rainy weather of recent days, county gins have turned out very little cotton this week, but a report Wednesday night indicates the five Snyder gins have turned out 21,060 bales to date.

County gins have ginned more cotton this year than for any previous year, with the exception of 1932, which was a record year. From recent reports, this, our second largest cotton crop in the history of Scurry County, will soon be out with the exception of a few late bolls.

## Big Spring Will Push Connecting Road to Snyder

At the annual Big Spring Chamber of Commerce banquet Monday night at the Settles Hotel, the 212 people present were served venison, with all the trimmings.

Dr. E. O. Ellington was toastmaster for the occasion, Cliff Wiley of Big Spring being the main speaker of the evening. Dr. H. G. Towle, Snyder attendant, described the banquet and meeting as "one of the best in recent years." Mrs. Towle also attended.

One of the chief objectives for 1936 of the Big Spring Chamber of Commerce (in cooperation with the Snyder Chamber of Commerce) is a paved, all-weather road from Big Spring to Snyder.

Plans have been underway for some time to secure a paved road from Big Spring to Snyder, and next year civic leaders from both cities plan to work out a definite solution on the project.

## POSSIBLE CUT IN HIGHWAY AID AFFECTS AREA

If U. S. Funds Sliced Appreciably, Highway 15 Program May Be Postponed.

Curtailment of 1939 and 1940 work on Highway 15 would probably result from the proposed slice of U. S. highway aid, according to a statement made Saturday by W. A. French of Abilene, division engineer.

Estimated to cost \$15,915,290, the 1939 regular federal aid program of road construction, subject to approval of the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads, was announced several days ago by Robert Lee Bobbitt, chairman of the state commission.

In the following statement to papers of his district, French touches on this county's proposed road program:

"The 1939 program does not affect this division very much. We have only one project that is to be constructed, and that one is on Highway 15 in Borden County from Gail west to the Dawson County line. However, the elimination of projects in the adjoining divisions will materially affect this division and also eliminate projects which we contemplated building on the 1940 program. The reason we did not get any more projects on the 1939 program is that most of our federal aid roads were built or are being built on our 1937-38 program.

"The highway commission has recently requested the Bureau of Public Roads to place Highway 15 on the federal highway system, from Roby in Fisher County to Snyder in Scurry County through Borden County and on to the state line. This project would more than likely be built in 1940 and it is our opinion that if the 1939 program is reduced, the 1940 program will also be reduced."

## Friends Worth Most To Former Resident Now Ill at Dalhart

From The Dalhart Texan, November 26: "From the bed from which perhaps he will never arise, L. H. Lockhart on Thanksgiving Eve smiled through pain and desperate illness and said: 'If I had it all to do over again I would still rather have friends who have been to visit me than to have all the money in the world. Money bags don't come to your bedside and bring comfort and cheer, and talk with you and make you feel better.'"

Mr. Lockhart came to Dalhart 19 years ago from Snyder, old stamping ground also of "Stormy" Thompson of Dalhart. Seven years Mr. Lockhart was cabinet maker with the Rock Island here, moved 13 years ago to the Canyon community, traveling back and forth a year to his Rock Island job.

"His good wife says he holds his friends as his most prized possessions, and the folks who know him best say he is worthy of a million friends. He and his family are temporarily at Seventh and Scott Streets in Dalhart."

## READY SIGNAL SOON ON IRA'S ELECTRIC LINE

Thirty-Five Subscribers on Newly Completed Highline Extension From Dunn Area.

Last wires were strung Monday afternoon for the new Texas Electric Service Company highline into the Ira community.

Only continued bad weather will prevent the current being turned into the lines within a few days, probably Saturday, according to Elmer L. Taylor, one of the first and most consistent boosters for the Ira electric highline.

Lines from the main highline have been run into 35 residences, stores and public buildings in Ira and on the route from Dunn to Ira.

The new line attaches to the line that was built early this year to the northern outskirts of Dunn. About 40 connections have been made at Dunn and China Grove, and a number of connections were made at Buford, Mitchell County, when the line to Dunn was completed.

## Switchman Dies When Oil Tankers Crash Into Cows

Calvin Curtis, 37, Santa Fe switchman, was killed early Wednesday when four cars of a string of empty tankers crashed into a small herd of cows at a crossing in the south part of Sweetwater.

At the same crossing three weeks ago Gus Bethany, another switchman, was severely injured.

The accident delayed the morning Santa Fe passenger train in Snyder Wednesday by almost two hours. Two tank cars were derailed and two were overturned, and the wreckage had to be cleared before the passenger train could pass.

The car in which Curtis was riding was the first of a long string of cars being pushed by an engine. The switchman was riding on the front end, and when the car hit one of the cows, causing the derailment, the impact threw him under the wheels. One hand was severed, both legs almost cut off just above the knees. Curtis died at 1:15 p. m. at a Sweetwater hospital. Final rites are slated for this afternoon.

Curtis had been an employee of the railroad for 10 years. Besides his switchman duties, he was caretaker at Santa Fe lake and lived at the lake house.

## County Cotton Rally Saturday

Dr. Knapp to Be County Teacher Program Talker

Dr. Bradford Knapp, president of Texas Tech, will be principal speaker on an all-county teachers' program, slated for Thursday evening, 7:00 o'clock, in the band room of the Snyder gymnasium.

"Public Safety" will be the subject of the visiting speaker's message. He has made a special study of the subject, and has spoken on public safety before a number of state and district groups.

Snyder Band, directed by R. L. Reschar, will give several numbers. Each of the major schools in the county outside of Snyder—Pylon, Fluvanna, Hermleigh, Ira and Dunn—is scheduled to give one entertainment number.

All teachers of the county have been invited to attend, according to Superintendent Frank Farmer.

## ACIDIZATION OF WELL DELAYED

Acidization of the Robinson well near Ira has been delayed this week because materials have not arrived, according to word from the test late yesterday.

The well recently was drilled to a total depth of 3,515 feet, but cement plugs were set at 2,900 feet. No major showings were reported.

The bit in the Shaw well, a second county test that has been receiving considerable attention, was drilling late yesterday at 2,495 feet, after a temporary shutdown during which the hole was cleaned out.

## J. R. Mize of Stanton Succumbs Thursday

J. R. Mize of Stanton, father of Rufus E. Mize, veteran Scurry County school man, died at his home last Thursday afternoon, after several weeks' illness. The former Scurry County man has operated a service station at Stanton for 13 years.

Survivors include six children and seven grandchildren. The children are: Rufus E. Mize of the German community, Scurry County; Thomas D. Mize of Wink; Hoyt Mize of Carcarran, California; Mrs. S. J. McKandies of Midland and Mrs. Sam Timmons of Stanton.

Scurry Countians attending the funeral besides the Rufus Mize family were Joe Roemisch Sr. and J. A. Roemisch.

## Mexican Quarters' House Partial Loss

Snyder volunteer fire department answered a call Monday morning at 11:00 o'clock in the north part of Snyder. The fire was in the Mexican quarters, near the Santa Fe depot, with the home of a Mexican family being a partial loss.

Chief N. W. Autry says this was one of the "biggest little fires recently." The booster pump had to be refilled three times before the fire was extinguished. Part of the furniture and clothing was saved.

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## IMPROVEMENT BEING SOUGHT

What do you think ought to be done here in this county and in your community to improve the cotton situation?

This is the major question that is being asked Scurry County farmers in letters sent to them this week from the office of the county agent.

The question will be the key part of a meeting to be held at the courthouse Saturday afternoon of this week, 2:30 o'clock.

Leading a delegation of authorities on the cotton situation will be F. E. Lichte, Extension Service cotton gin specialist; E. A. Miller, extension agronomist, and possibly D. T. Kilough, cotton breeder, Texas agricultural experiment station.

"Serious Condition." These experts will discuss the seriousness of the cotton situation as it faces the South, particularly Texas, today.

"The quality of Texas cotton," declares the letter mailed Tuesday by County Agent W. R. Lacey, "has deteriorated to the point where short cotton is hard to sell at any price and now many spinners in placing their orders for cotton specify that no cotton from Texas and Oklahoma be included in the sale."

"Our exports of cotton are still on the down-grade, and, according to authorities on the subject, it is necessary that our quality and staple length be increased to meet foreign competition successfully."

Want to Know More. "We know you want to know more about this condition that affects our main cash crop and what can be done about it. In many sections of our state, one-variety communities for growing good quality cotton have been organized and have been highly successful in helping the farmers who cooperated to receive more for their good staple cotton."

Ira community in Scurry County recently started the one-variety plan on a modified scale—the first community in the county to take such a step.

Fisher County farmers and others interested in cotton improvement in that county will gather at Roby courthouse at 9:30 o'clock Monday morning, December 20, for a meeting similar to the one planned for Snyder.

## Melvis Neal Gets Second Airplane Owned by Locals

Melvis Neal, local mechanic, has purchased a rebuilt two-place Aerona monoplane, which is stored at present in the municipal airport at Sweetwater. Neal becomes the second Snyder plane owner, since Carl England, shop foreman at The Times, purchased a new Taylor Cub some time ago.

While Melvis is owner of the government licensed two-place ship, his son, Ray Neal, is putting in hours in the air so he can obtain his license to fly.

Melvis Neal plans to move his light two-place ship to Snyder in January, as soon as a landing field is cleared off and a hangar built. Snyder is one of the few cities of its size in Texas to have two local plane owners.

Cargile Home Burns. The Ab Cargile home, located one and one-half miles southeast of Polar, was destroyed by fire about 2:30 a. m. Sunday morning. The Cargile home was a total loss, with nothing saved. Origin of the fire was unknown.

Two members of the 1935 graduating class of the local high school were married in a simple service held in Breckenridge Tuesday evening, 6:30 o'clock, when Miss Florence Winston became the bride of J. R. (Sam) Joyce Jr., at the home of Rev. and Mrs. Phillip C. McGahey, former Snyder residents.

The marriage united two prominent pioneer families of this section—the Winstons are widely known cattle dealers, and the Joyces own and operate one of Snyder's leading cotton gins.

Rev. McGahey, formerly pastor of the First Baptist Church here, read the service before members of his family, who are close friends of the Winstons. The bride was smartly dressed in a three-piece suit of green wool for the marriage.

Born and reared in Snyder, the elder daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wade Winston, Florence received her early education here, graduating in the spring of 1935, as did Joyce, and since has attended Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene. She received the highest honor given in the local high school when her name was placed on the permanent honor and merit plaque with those of outstanding members of previous senior groups—one each year.

During her high school days she became a member of the Snyder High School chapter of National Honor Society and of Lucky 13 Sports Club, girls' social group, and other music and study groups both in school and the town. Last year she was designated as one of the most popular freshman students in Hardin-Simmons, where she has done one and one-half years of work.

Joyce, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Joyce, was also reared in Snyder, graduating from the local high school, where he was for several years an outstanding athlete. Since his graduation in 1935, Sam has attended John Tarleton Agricultural College, Stephenville, and more recently studied at Draughon's Business College, Dallas. ### Top Winston Bull Sells for \$1,400 as Interest Runs High in Hereford Sale

Men and women who had never before seen an auction sale of registered Herefords almost held their breaths as bidding on roly-poly Domino Return 418th climbed well past \$1,000 last Thursday afternoon at the Winston Brothers place.

Tension of the crowd of several hundred buyers and onlookers had reached a high peak before Joe Winston of Aledo, a distant relative of the local breeders, finally took the fine animal out of the auction ring by bidding him in at \$1,400.

Domino Return 418th, following in the footsteps of the famous Domino Return whose blood runs through and predominates the Winston herd, easily topped the sale of 97 choice

Herefords. The animal is only 11 months old.

For the early part of the sale an average well above \$300 was maintained. As the day waned the sale did not start until 12:00 noon. Auctioneer Earl Gartin swung his gavel more rapidly, sold the last batch of animals in twos and threes, and the final average was consequently cut down to \$240. This was one of the top averages for Hereford sales of this size in the Southwest this year.

Joan Henry Dean Jr. who lives between Snyder and Lamesa, picked up 25 females in the sale, including the top lady of the sale, Louisiana 2nd, at \$700.

Inclement weather prevented a few distant buyers from attending

the sale. But the gathering of cattlemen from New Mexico, the highlands, the South Plains and other areas of Texas was one of the largest that has attended a Hereford auction in recent months, according to many visitors.

Visitors at the sale included such well known men in Hereford circles as: Hays Walker, publisher of the American Hereford Journal; R. J. Kinser, secretary of the American Hereford Association; G. W. Barnes, beef specialist with the Extension Service; E. C. Martin, district Extension Service agent; R. O. Peterson, Drivers Telegram; Frank Farley, Hereford Journal; Francis Biggs, Western Livestock.

Several hundred persons were served with luscious steak, salad, coffee, cake and other food at 11 o'clock. The meal was served in the rear of the large circus tent that had been put up for the occasion. Pyramided seats circled the auction ring on three sides.

Frank Reeves, livestock editor of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, and Harry Holt, who "chousers around" for the Abilene Reporter, gave the sale complete coverage.



### Borden County Farm - Ranch News

By E. B. McLeroy, County Agent

Applications for payment in connection with the 1937 soil conservation program have been received and are being signed by Borden County farm operators and owners this week.

This is the final procedure to be completed prior to issuance of payments to 1937 soil program cooperators in the county. The applications for payment will be returned to the state office, and when approved by the audit section, checks will be issued to the various cooperators and these checks will be sent to the county agent's office, from where they will be mailed direct to producers.

Compliance work under the 1937

range program is scheduled to be completed in Borden County by December 31. Approximately one-half of the range program cooperators have completed their work under the current program, and the remainder is expected to be ready by the first of January. Certification of practices under the range program are being forwarded to the state board as each ranch completes the requirements for earning the maximum payment.

Ninety-two tanks have been completed and measured to date, and the total will exceed 100 in Borden County this year. Approximately 250,000 yards of dirt has been used in construction of earthen dams in the county since March 1, 1937.





## A County Achievement.

It is no accident that Dunn, China Grove and Ira have been connected with highlines during the past 12 months. The forward step was due largely to forward looking men in the three communities—men who would not take "No" for an answer.

More of these rural lines will not come by wishing. They will come by working. If you folks at Union, Plainview and other communities want some pointers about how to get the job done, just confer with the doers at Dunn, China Grove and Ira!

Prof. Picard plans to explore ocean depths with a balloon filled with lighter-than-water oil, instead of with the usual lighter-than-air gas.
