NOBODY HURT AS GALE CUTS 3/4-MILE SWATH

School Condemned as Safety Move After Inspection-Billingsley Home Practically Razed

The Dunn community witnessed a cyclone, rain and hail storm Sunday evening, 10:30 o'clock, that made the 19-year-old high school plant unsafe for occupancy early this week, blew part of the roof from the Dunn School gymnasium, wrecked two residences and hailed out the crops of a number of community

farmers. The storm, which approached from the southwest, lifted the entire school garage from over three Ira School buses, and scattered the structure—in twisted sheet metal and splintered wood-over an area three-quarters of a mile to the

northeast. The home of N. A. Billingsley, just south of Dunn, was moved from foundation and walls were virtually wrecked. The barn and windmill of Billingsley were wrecked entirely, as was a windcharger. Southwest portion of the Billingsley home was moved at least 10 feet from original oundation. Billingsley plans to rebuild in the immediate future.



Pointers Given for Repair of Cookers By McKinney Man

County hosuewives will have to, in many instances, last for the duration, J. P. Dowell of McKenney, who has been servicing a number of pressure cookers from Scurry and hearby counties, gives the following advice to cooker owners:

"The necessary forcing off of sticky covers often scores the lid or kettle into a steam-tight joint and a leaky cover. We can quite often reguind a corroded cover or kettle into a steam-tight joint, but it is practically impossible to remove scored places. A lubricant such as cooking oil or lard applied to the nside flange of the cover will often nelp sticky covers, but we know of o specific remedy.

'Cracked kettles or cracked covers cannot, to our experience, be satisfactorily repaired. "Referring to cooker repairs, the kakage at the petcock can often be overcome by removing petcock and filling the cover threads with joint compounds such as plumbers If the threads are stripped, it necessary to tap and thread the opening to a larger size, that is, a one-quarter inch pipe size, and install a one-eighth by one-quarter inch bushing in which the petcock can be installed and made into a steamtight joint. In removing petcocks great care should be taken not to damage the threads in the ocoker





BONUS TIRES MAY RELIEVE **COUNTY NEED**

The county's entire war effort is being paralyzed by the acute lack of tires and tubes-since produce, cream, butter, eggs and fryers cannot be moved to market without a means of transportation

Applications now on hand at the County War Price and Ration Board have piled up until supplemental allotments of tires and tubes must be granted the county if persons in dire need of rubber are to be accommodated, it is pointed out.

The County's War Price and Ration Board, a spokesman said, would be only too glad to grant tires and tubes to every eligible applicantif the tires and tubes were here to
