## Muleshoe revises high school class schedule

Muleshoe High School students will be greeted by a new class schedule next year when they report to school.

The Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees approved a return to the seven-period day for the 1999-2000 school year during Monday's bi-

monthly meeting.

In other business Monday, the school board approved changes in the math curriculum, amended the budget for \$298,000 in construction and renovation projects to be done over the summer, and recognized Muleshoe's district champion boys basketball team.

Muleshoe experimented with a hybrid schedule this year that in-

cluded classes that met every day and others that met every other day (block).

A student survey showed that most favored the current schedule. But high school principal David Jenkins said the current format is a scheduling nightmare because the school has not been able to find computer software that can generate the schedules.

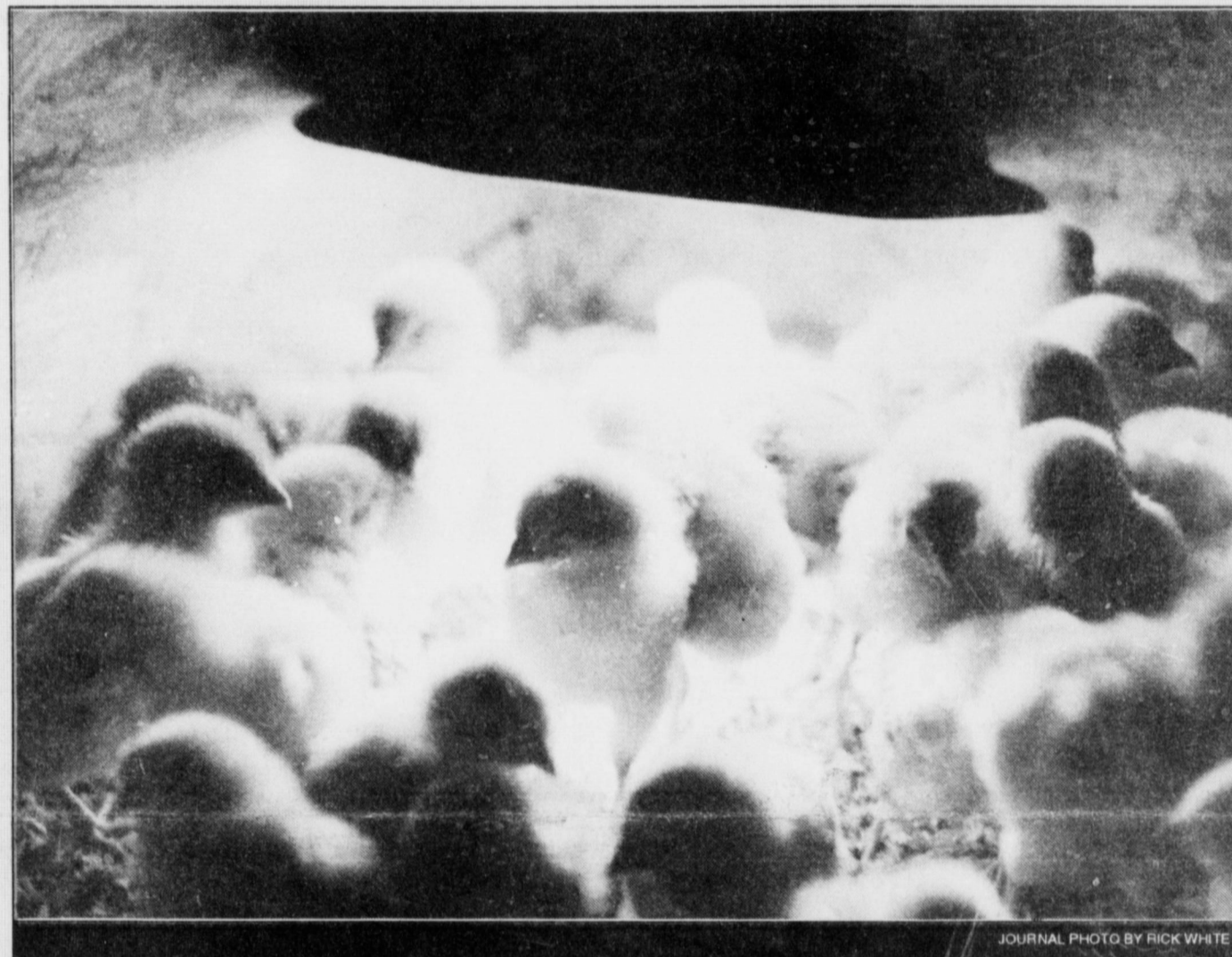
They were done by hand last year.

The seven-period schedule would allow most students to take three elective classes, according to Jenkins.

Changes in the math curriculum include the addition of two new courses — honors geometry and

## County briefed on legal issues

Bailey County Commissioners were reminded of the importance of good record keeping on soil and water conservation worksheets at their regular meeting Monday.

Texas Ranger Dusty McCord addressed the commissioners about the legal issues concerning the worksheets. According to information McCord has compiled from a current investigation, there is cause for concern over the amount of soil conservation work done in Precinct 4 last year.

"A lot of times, the documents tend to show a story," McCord said. "There might also be a reasonable explanation for what the documents imply."

Statistics show that Bailey County Precincts 2 and 4 had a large number of loads of caliche and dirt hauled by county trucks, but a comparably small number of machine hours were billed to the citizens last year.

"By being very specific in the description of the property and the type of work done, we won't have to rely on only memory," the ranger said.

Some of the suggestions McCord relayed to the court

## Area not immune to computer virus

You could already be a victim and unknowingly make 50 to 60 of your friends victims of the latest computer viruses spreading throughout the world.

The two latest viruses called Melissa and Papa join the Happy 99 virus as a nuisance, but none have been reported as malicious so far. Experts are not sure of all the characteristics of the viruses or what they are capable of doing.

The viruses are sent as attachments to e-mails. When opened, the

viruses open your address book and send out an e-mail with itself attached to up to 60 other computers. This can cause an overload to mail servers.

"These viruses can not affect the mail server at Five Area because we don't use the Microsoft Exchange or Outlook mail server software that the virus attacks," Five Area Computer and Internet technician Danny Dunagan said.

"The virus could affect a company's internal mail server if they use these programs," he added. "So far, there have not been any

confirmed incidents of the Melissa or Papa viruses here, but there have been reports of the Happy 99 virus."

Many antivirus companies have already made updates to their software that handle the new viruses.

According to Dunagan, many experts believe these viruses are being used as test runs for a potentially more destructive virus to be released in the near future.

"The best thing about these viruses is that people are taking

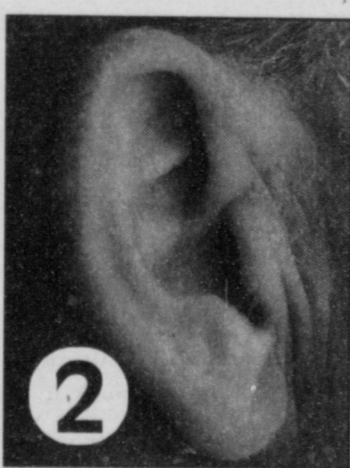

were:

- make sure the work done is in compliance with the guidelines in Section 201.151 of the Agriculture code. The basic premise of the code states that the commissioners must determine that equipment is free to perform the work requested and not being pulled off road jobs for the county, the work is needed to preserve production necessary for the public welfare, and that the county receives compensation from the people they do the work for.

- if in doubt as to whether the work applies to the statute, call the county judge or attorney and get an opinion.

- return all worksheets in a timely manner.

- keep a daily log of all activities and transactions.

The ranger also addressed the court about the importance of using state contractors to buy tires for county vehicles.

"The contract price is usually cheaper than what the dealer pays for the same tire," McCord said. "The county can save a lot of money if they

know in advance they need to replace tires."

In other business, the court discussed needed repairs to the courthouse. The county recently hired the architecture firm of Adling Associates to assess the condition of the courthouse. The firm submitted a grant request to pay for the repairs but it was denied. Judge Marilyn Cox requested advice from the firm on how to do the repairs in stages.

They returned a letter listing the top three concerns. The top priority is the repair of the con-

crete surrounds at the entrances of the building. Chunks have been falling off of the building and pose a safety hazard.

"This is a danger to anyone coming into the courthouse," Cox said.

Upgrading the electrical power, lighting and communication systems, and cleaning and weather sealing the exterior of the building were the other concerns listed by Adling.

The court will put this item on the agenda and vote on any actions at the April 12 meeting.

The court also approved a request by the Jennyslippers to lease the miniature golf course for a period of one year.

math models — and a recommended sequence of courses.

Math models teaches practical math applications for students who do not plan to attend college.

Planned capital outlay projects include construction of a new administration office at

precautions now to safeguard their computers," Dunagan said. "The best thing people can do is to get a good virus protection program and make sure to keep it updated."

If you don't have virus pro-

tection software, Trend Micro's HouseCall site at [www.antivirus.com](http://www.antivirus.com) can detect if your computer has been infected by these viruses. "I've been to their site and it seems to do a pretty good job," Dunagan said.

**"Productivity appraisal" may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch or timber land!**

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers, and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on its market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock, or timber—not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

**When is the application deadline?**

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 1999 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

**Do you need to reapply annually?**

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.

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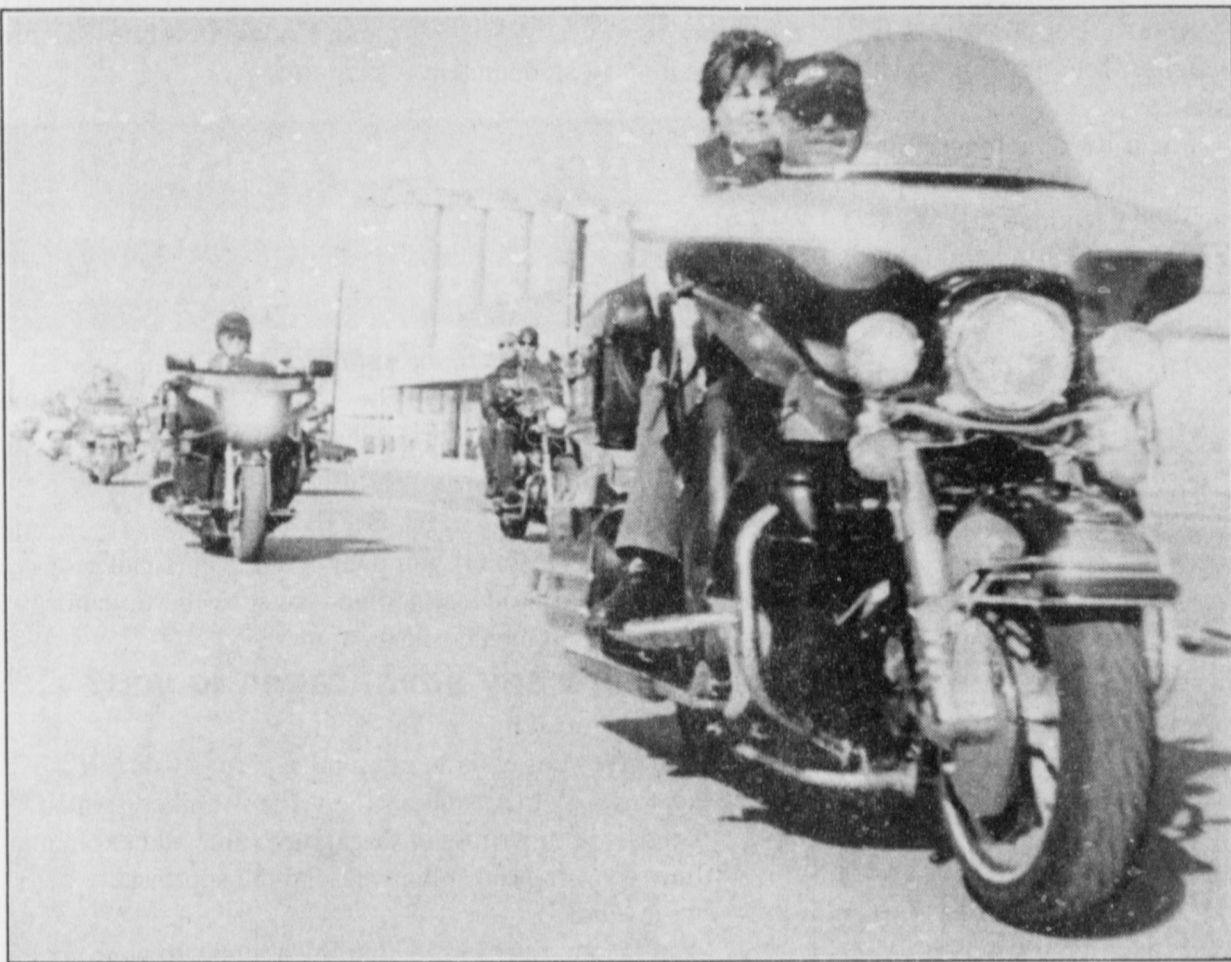

**Protect your rights! "Render" your taxable property by April 15th.**

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office...or you may draft a similar form.

**Who must file a rendition?**

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income—such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

**Are there any advantages to you?**

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 1998. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1999.

**What's the deadline?**

The last day for filing 1999 renditions is April 15. Call your appraisal district for the last date the rendition may be post-marked, if mailing. You can get an extra 15 days if you ask for it in writing by the April 15 deadline.

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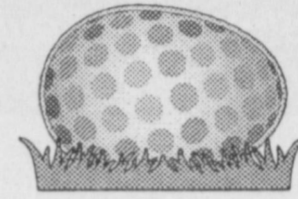
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
