aged over 11,000 a year. From 1919-1920 they average over 15,-000. Then, at the close of World War I, they immediately dropped to about 7,000. That year of 1920 compares with the year 1947 which we are about to enter. But here is the important fact: In 1922 failures shot up to nearly 24,000 and these failures continued to increase until a maximum of 31,822 was reached in 1932. Since then, failures gradually decreased to an all-time low of 810

Every year men who own small and successful businesses are getting older and some every year die. Often these businesses are for sale cheap. In some cases there are no children to carry on; while in other cases the business must be sold in order to pay the estate taxes. Hence, barcan be considered notwithstanding the coming inevitable failures.

The question will arise as to how much to pay for an existing business. A very good rule is five times the average annual net earnings after taxes. Certainly ten times would be a maximum price to pay. There also are other considerations such as location, competition and the general character of the business. As a check, one should consider the average earnings for ten years as the last five years earnings may have been largely influenced by war

LOCATING BUSINESSES FOR SALE

Returning Servicemen who are serious in their desire to purchase an existing business should go at it systematically as about 300,000 were Clifton Rogers Home sold the past year. This can best be done by carefully reading the advertisements in the newspapers of larger cities of the state in which one desires to settle. It also might be well to wirte the Chambers of Commerce, banks or law firms where one cares to locate. It usually is wise to buy a good buusiness in a small community rather than in a large city. At any rate, the wise veteran will take at least a year looking over the field before purchasing even an existing business.

One other suggestion: The main value of an existing business consists of the name, accounts and goodwill. This means that often the business has assets which can be liquidated, thereby reducing the price which the purchaser must pay. These assets may include real estate, buildings and old machinery which the purchaser does not need but which can now be sold at favorable prices. Frankly, I advise returning Servicemen, who desire to someday have a business of their own, to start in now and lay up cash which will be ready to use when the next crash comes and failures again jump to over 30,000 a year.

Texas Contributes High Percent In War Casualties

In one of the most comprehensive rosters that has been issued from this war, the War Department releases as of June 27 the figures in casualties that Texas contributed o World War II. With a breakdown on figures, it may well be seen the part that Texas contributed to the war in manpower-and easualties.

At the beginning of this war Texas contained 4.78 per cent of the population of the United States and possessions, not including the Philippines, but to show that she went more than her share in manpower, she contributed 5.00 per cent of the fighting manpower. Of this contrioution, 2.91 per cent failed to return. The nation's percentage loss is 2.98. Maryland had the lowest percentage loss at the 2.20 per cent mark. Texas is listed as having lost 15,-764 of her young men and women







Advice On How To Buy Your New Rug

Judging quality and wear in new ugs may be a problem to many homemakers according to Mrs. Bernice Claytor, specialist in home improvement for the A. and M. College Extension Service, and she has several suggestions to prospective

The amount of wool in the rug, the construction of the rug, and the quality of the wool itself determine quality and wear in the rug.

Assuming that the wool is of good quality, the rug with a greateramount of wool will be a rug of higher quality, Mrs. Claytor says. A label will usually tell whether the wool used is worsted or woolen. Worsted rugs wear well and look well, but the initial cost is apt to

carefully examined to check on construction. A high-pile rug will year better than a short-pile rug of the same density. But a rug with a short dense pile is preferable to a loosely woven high-pile rug.

Tightly woven foundation yarns, called "filling" are important in the wear of a rug. These are usually cotton or jute. Tightness of weave in the "filling" of a rug can be tested by shifting the rug back and forth in the hands. If the back

Knowing Meat A LESSON IN BEEF CUTS Cuts Valuable To Homemaker

Ability to identify the many cuts of beef, veal, pork and lamb is of practical value to every homemaker—to every food buyer. No less important is a knowledge of the cooking method or methods best suited to each cut, since meat must be cooked according to cut for best results.

Chart is a Guide

This chart will serve as a guide in selecting and cooking beef. The methods recommended were adopted following exhaustive meat cookery studies at state colleges and the United States Department of Agriculture.

In cooking meat, the degree of tenderness is the governing factor. Some of the cuts are tender and are prepared to best advantage by dry heat methods-roasting, broiling, panbroiling and frying. Others are less tender and must be cooked by moist heat - braising and simmering. Meat should never be boiled, say the authorities.

A rule of meat cookery found to be more important than any other is: "Always use low temperature." This applies no matter what cut is being prepared or what cook-ing method is being used.

Advantage of Low Heat Thousands of carefully con-trolled tests have shown that from 15 to 20 per cent more meat is provided when it is cooked at low temperature. Furthermore, the meat is more tender, is juicier, more uniformly cooked and more flavorful.

In selecting meat cuts, it is im portant to remember that there is no difference in the nutritive value of the lean and fat of the lesspopular cuts and the more popular ones.

Everybody went to church in those days; prayer meeting was an event rather than a formality. A political rally attracted crowds far and near while an ice cream supper was tops in attendance. School and church picnics would ordinarily bring out one hundred per cent co-operation, while a "badger fight created a sensation.

The man who worked all Spring and Summer-as they did at the turn of the century-would seek a place for diversion after he laid his crop by. He would either go to see his relatives in East Texas, hunt up a camp meeting where horse feed and tie ropes were supplied, or take

off on a fishing trip If he had been provided with modern-day attractions such as movies he more than likely would have been far more contented to spend a few hours listening to Clark Gable than he would have driving a spavined team back to Hunt County for a visit with his wife's kinfolks.

Many other comparisons could be drawn, of course. Yet oldsters marvel at the progress that has been made and as well as they like to think of the "good old days" it would be a hard matter to get a single one of them to agree for a return of those halcyon days.

WASHINGTON, July 3 - AP - The Southwest Power Administration fight for funds precipitated an unusual division of votes in the Senate.

The reason was the old issue of public versus private ownership of electrical power systems. There was no state or sectional division of votes, and little of party cleavage, as marks most roll call votes where the appropriation of large amounts of money for one section of the country is involved.

Backgrounds facts are these: The SPA with a program affecting six states: Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arkansas, Missouri and Kansas, drew up a comprehensive expansion program contemplating construction of dams, power lines and stand-by steam generating plants at an estimated total cost of \$200,-000,000.

The Budget Bureau recommended appropriation of \$23,000,000 for the 1947 fiscal year beginning July 1. (The SPA activities would cover a 300,000-squaremile area compared with 83,000 under the TVA's jurisdicition.) The House Appropriation Committee cut the budget figure to \$3,000,000, but on the House floor an amendment by Speaker Sam Rayburn of Bonham was adopted increasing the sum to \$7,500,000.

Then, the Senate Appropriations Committee decided to cut the whole thing out except for \$100,000 administrative expense money. The Senate vote was whether to sustain the committee. By a six vote margin, 36 to 30, the \$7,500,000 was left in the bill.

A study of the roll call vote showed that only three senators from the six states affected supported the SPA. They were Senator Ellender of Louisiana and Fulbright and McClellan of Arkansas, all democrats. McClellan made it clear he wasn't in favor of the SPA's ambitious ideas, but only the \$7,500,000 program because it would connect the Grand River dam, Okla., Norfolk Dam, Ark., and Denison dam on the Red River with transmission power lines.

Prune Shrubs Now Or Postpone Year

next year, says Sadie Hatfield, landscape gardening specialist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. Shrubs should not be pruned after mid-july.

Cutting back shrubs in summer tends to hold back growth of limbs, twigs and leaves and aids the plant to form a crop of fruit or flowers next spring. Prune out also all dead and diseased limbs and any branches which crowd other plants or get in the way of windows or paths. Generally speaking, evergreen shrubs are pruned in the winter or dormant season, and decidious shrubs-those which shed their leaves in the winter-should be

pruned at the same time. Plants may be fertilized after pruning. Fertilizing later in the summer develops new growth which may be frostbitten before it hardens. Late pruning may do the same
