Prices of Cotton Lose \$9.25 Bale in Drop Lost Week

Cotton prices lost about \$9.25 per bale during the week and most futures months declined the 200-point limit on Tuesday, according to the weekly cotton report to The Times from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Prices for many other com_ modities also declined sharply during the week.

In spot markets inquiries for cotton were fairly numerous, but the volume of sales was small. Mill buyers were mostly out of the mar-

Department of Agriculture anmounced that cotton paid for under foreign aid act of 1947 would not be eligible for the export subsidy. Some cotton planting in South Texas was reported.

Prices for middling 15-16 inch cotton in the 10 spot markets avermed 31.64 cents per pound on Wednesday, February 11, compared with \$3.50 on Thursday of last week and 22.97 cents on the corresponding day · year ago. The average price for the week ended Wednesday was 32.95 cents per pound against 34.41 cents for the previous week. All futures except October dropped the 200-point limit on Tuesday, February 10, and there were further declines on Wednesday. This brought enten mid-October, 1947. The current price is nearly 1% cents below the parity equivalent of middling 15-16 inch in the 10 markets and is about 3% cents above the present everage loan rate.





Marshall got an important assist from Gen. Omar Bradley-plus unexpected assistance from the Pennsylvania Republicans and other politicians. Nevertheless, it was the secretary of state who did the most to take his colleague-in-arms out of the political picture.

Today, President Truman is smiling broadly and saying privately that he knew all along Ike wasn't going to run. But that wasn't the way he felt about it just before Christmas.

Even before this, Truman had been so sore at George Allen for fired his once-beloved court jester right out of the White House.







Year Closed with **Continued Climb** Started in 1945

The year 1947 ended with business activity in Scurry County and the rest of Texas continuing the climb that has been almost uninterrupted since October, 1945, reported the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research this week in a release to The Times.

Bureau's composite index of business activity stood at 209 in December, the highest point reached since July, 1945, when it was 213, Dr. Stockton, professor of business statistics and statistician of the bureau, pointed out. The December, 1947, level was only 12 per cent below the war-time peak of 238. Expansion of retail trade still coninued to be one of the strong factors in the 1947 gains. Total retail sales of \$4,686,000,000 were up 13 per cent from 1946.

The construction industry, after disappointing showing in 1946, began to make impressive gains in

1947, reaching an all-time peak. Cash farm income in 1947 surpassed the high level of 1946 by 47 per cent, totaling \$1,838,000,000. Prices of all farm products were approximately 20 per cent higher at the end of 1947 than at the end of 1946, and these prices combined with bumper crops produced a cash income to farmers approximately four and one-half times that receiv-

In brief, 1947 showed the largest volume of peace-time business in the state's history. However, possibly more significant than the large volume of business has been the rapid and persistent rise in prices that has preceded with little interruption throughout 1947, according to Dr. Stockton.

Turn out on board; knead lightly, then pat into a rectangle about ¼ inch thick. Spread with softened butter, sprinkle with apples and brown sugar and cinnamon. Roll as for jelly roll and cut in 10 pieces. Place apples in a buttered casserole. Add honey and butter. Place rolls on top of apples. Bake in a hot oven for 50 minutes. Serve warm with plain or sweetened whipped cream.

If you want to save flour in a pudding, you might try this flake pudding, made with apples:

Apple Flake Crunch. (Serves 4 to 6) 6 cups pared, cored and sliced

Combine fruit, molasses and spices. Add sifted flour and salt. Dissolve soda in cold water, add and blend thoroughly. Turn the batter into a greased lid or doubled parchment paper tied snugly. Steam for two hours on top of stove. Turn out and serve with hard sauce or softened ice cream.

Rice makes nice puddings, meat balls, croquettes, spoon bread or spanish rice. Try it also in soup or as a casserole with meat and gravy. Stale bread may be made into crumbs for toppings, extender or for rolling goods before frying; use as french toast or melba toast; croutons or bread cases; bread pudding or brown betty.

Fruits that are left over do nicely in fruit cups or whips. Try them in sauce over cake, as gelatin desserts, with custard or with ice cream; or, use in upside down cake or cobblers. Egg yolks are easily used in yeast


