### ROBY, TEXAS, NOVEMBER 20, 1902.

FRIGHTFUL WRBCK. For awhile he engaged in mer-One Man Dangerously Hurt and Six Others Slightly Injured.

This morning about 5 o'clock the westbound Texas & Pacific through train, known as the Cannon Ball, was wrecked a mile and a half west of Abilene, from some cause unknown, the result being the worst passenger wreck in the history of the road in this immediate vicinity. The train was manned by Conductor Tobin of Fort Worth, Engineer Jim Ellis of Baird, and Fireman George Weldon of Big Springs. No definite idea can be had as to the cause of the wreck. It may have been a breakdown of the tender, a broken rail, a fallen brakebeam or the spreading of the rails.

The first notice Engineer Jim Ellis had of the trouble was the tender breaking loose from the locomotive, which at once bounded forward some distance shead keeping well out of the way of the wreck, the rear driving drive wheels alone getting off the rails, so that practically no damage was sustained by the locomotive. Then began a most frightful scene. Poor George Weeldon, the fireman, was caught on the tender, which was literally split in two and piled around with apparently no chance for life to be left in anyone near it. Weeldon was taken out from under it with his scalp out in a half circle from his forehead above the left eye around behind his left ear, lay-ing the whole top of his head
