Attorney General Crawford C. Martin today urged Texas consumers to check their records and file refund claims for broad spectrum antibiotics purchased during the years 1954 through 1966.

August 16, 1969, is the deadline for mailing a notarized claim to the Clerk, United States District Court, P. O. Box 745, Bronx, New York 10451.

Texas consumers will receive a share of \$100 million offered by five large drug manufacturers in settlement of multiple civil antitrust actions filed against them by Martin and the Attorneys General of other States.

Rural Water Systems Need Amendment 4

Progress in the rural areas
is important to all Texans.
If rural Texas is allowed to
develop to full potential, the
burden of current urban
problems of over-crowding
and possible resulting civil
disorders will lessen and the
residents of the state will en-
joy a greater degree of hap-
piness and prosperity.

Desired and needed prog-
ress can only be obtained if
the rural sections have re-
quired utility services avail-
able. Now that electric pow-
er has reached all areas of
the state, the next basic need
for growth is water. In a
few short years, more than
500 small, non-profit rural
water supply systems have
formed in Texas. These sys-
tems, like those that are mu-
nicipally operated, are own-
ed by those they serve. On-
ly a limited few have ade-
quate resources to hire the

desired services of operation
employees. Rather, most
are operated, maintained and
developed by rural residents
devoted to the ideal of hav-
ing good, fresh water sys-
tems in the country areas.
If these systems are to
grow and allow Texas' econ-
omy to develop to its fullest,
they must have the same tax
advantage enjoyed by the
city-owned systems—no tax-

Welfare Cuts If Amd. 5 Fails

Texans on August 5 have the opportunity to show their concern for nearly 400,000 needy Texans who are either too old, too young or too disabled to earn enough to live on. On that voters will decide whether to approve a proposed Constitutional amendment—No. 5 on the August ballot—which authorizes an increase in the amount of money the state may provide for the care of these needy people.

More than half of them (229,000) are old age pensioners, 65 or older, who are trying to live on an average Old Age Assistance grant of \$58.96 a month. Almost 19,000 are adults who are permanently and totally disabled, who receive assistance grants averaging \$59.74 a month. A little over 4,000 are blind people, whose grants average \$71.71 a month.

Another 133,000 are children under 21 who are deprived of parental support. Most of these children (86 percent) are being reared by their mothers. Their fathers are not in the home because they are dead, divorced, in prison or have deserted their families. Fathers of

the remainder are incapacitated and may or may not be living in the home.

Financial and medical assistance is provided to those people through programs administered by the Texas Department of Public Welfare. State funds available for public assistance payments now are limited by the Texas Constitution to \$60 million annually.

State Welfare Commissioner Burton G. Hackney explains that the limit on these funds, combined with a growing number of people in need and rising costs of living, has led to a crisis in the state welfare program for the needy children of Texas.

Amendment No. 5 is designed to increase that ceiling to \$80 million, and to appropriate immediately an additional \$15 million a year for the next two years. This would make available for each of the next two years \$75 million for all four assistance programs of the Department: Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to the Disabled and Aid to Families with Dependent Children.

While attention has been focused on this public assistance ceiling, scant notice has been given to the effect of this financial crisis on the medical care program for welfare recipients in all cat-

egories.

Commissioner Hackney notes that these public assistance funds serve as "cushion money" for the Medicaid program in Texas. Whenever the appropriated funds for Medicaid run short, some assistance money can be transferred and used to pay for medical coverage for welfare recipients.

Hackney said that if Amendment No. 5 is not approved and if Medicaid funds are depleted before the end of the next fiscal year, there would be no "cushion" available for the Medicaid program. Under Federal regulations, Medicaid once implemented cannot be cut back. A lack of funds could therefore result in Texas having to give up its Medicaid program, the Commissioner said.

Providing drugs for welfare recipients also enters into the picture. Even though a vendor drug program was not approved during the just-ended regular session of the Legislature, the State Welfare Department does anticipate that such a plan will be added to its Medical Assistance program. In the meantime, payments for prescribed medicines are being made to clients through the public assistance grants, which fall under the Constitutional ceiling.

Approval of Amendment

No. 5, therefore, becomes a matter of direct concern for pharmacists. Commissioner Hackney said, because if the Welfare Department is to continue to pay for prescribed drugs through assistance grants, adoption of Amendment No. 5 is a necessity.

Passage of Amendment No. 5 will directly relieve the crisis in the program of Aid for Dependent Children, but it will also benefit the chronically ill, aged, blind and disabled.

The Welfare Department has had to make severe reductions in grants to families with dependent children.

"Right now," said Hackney "we say we should be providing \$25 a month for a child's food and clothing, and we recognize this as a bare minimum. Yet we are able to provide for that child only \$12.50 a month—or 50 percent of the minimal amount we say should be allowed. And of course this also means we are able to reimburse only 50 percent of budgeted drug needs of families with dependent children. Even this limited level of help can be maintained through August.

If Texas voters fail to approve this amendment, it will mean another immediate cut in grants to families with dependent children—the

third in 12 months. It is possible that by or before the end of the next biennium, the \$12.50 we are able to provide now for a child will drop to only \$6.25 a month," Hackney said.

He also stated that failure of the amendment also would affect the other programs. "Before the end of the next biennium, we probably would have to reduce the level of assistance to the disabled, and probably by the end of the biennium, we would even have to reduce by a smaller percentage the level of Old Age Assistance."

Approximately 90 percent of current welfare expenditures in Texas, including medical assistance, goes to the elderly, the blind and the disabled. "This leaves only 10 percent for the one program that helps the children," Hackney said. "They need this help and more—through education and a more wholesome environment—if they are to be guided toward productive, responsible citizenship as adults."

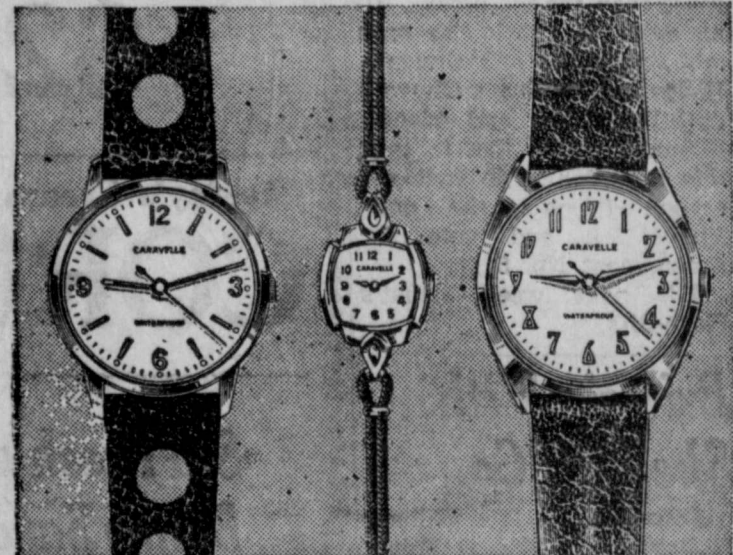
