State To Repair Fisher F-M Road

Texas Highway Commission approved a \$2 million expenditure for betterment and improvement of state highways and farm to market roads in District 8 during 1970.

Most of the work is seal-coating, for which Fisher County received several projects which included, 12.6 miles of FM 57 from U. S. 180 to State highway 70, \$21,400; 8 miles of FM 57 from US 180 to the Jones County line, \$14,200; 14.1 miles of FM 419 from U. S. 180 in Roby to Capitola, \$22,200; 7.3 miles of FM 608 from FM 611 to the Nolan County line, \$11,600; 7.1 miles of FM 1657 from FM 611 west of Rotan to U. S. 180, \$11,600; 7.9 miles of FM 1812 from U. S. 180 to the Jones County line, \$12,500.

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Of the grains marketed in Texas, grain sorghum is the giant. In 1968, grain sorghum receipts exceeded \$320 million. Total 1968 cash grain receipts exceeded \$620 million.

Open House at the Spur Research Station will be held beginning at 9:00 AM. Thursday September 4 and end at noon. P. T. Marion, S. P. Hammock, Dr. Lowell Shake, E. D. Robinson, C. E. Fisher, and Dr. M. M. Kothman will make short talks on the tour. Tours will last about 2 hours.

Texas A and M University researchers have found that an inexpensive by-product of the cottonseed oil refining process contains a factor which prevents common scours in calves. The by-product is acidulated soapstock (acid oil), which is an excellent source of fat in milk replacer formulas for calves and has an

unique anti-diarrheic quality. Research dates back to 19-56 when Dr. R. E. Leighton of the A and M Animal Science Department discovered an anti-scour substance in a methylated product made from cottonseed oil soapstock. Later attempts to isolate the factor revealed that it was in the non-distillable, hexane-insoluble, saponifiable fraction of the product.

Because this finding indicated similar results might be obtained from a less sophisticated soapstock product, researchers explored the use of a number of cottonseed oil by-products.

Excellent success has been reached in the past two years with dairy calves fed a milk-replacer formula containing 15 percent acidulated soapstock. The material was supplied by Anderson, Clayton and Company.

The researcher noted that the cottonseed oil refining industry formerly regarded the product as of little value. Disposal was often a problem. Later, uses were found in the feed industry, but it is currently the least expensive fat ingredient in calf milk replacers.

Cost per pound is 5 cents or less in large quantities. The ever-increasing use of milk replacer formulas in feeding both dairy and beef calves, plus the surprising reduction in calf diarrhea which results when the acid oil is used in the diet, suggests that this finding will be

of considerable importance to livestock feeders, feed manufacturers, veterinarians and the cotton-seed oil industry.
