Hammers Finally Beat Pied Pipers

Rotan's Yellowhammers broke the tradition of Hamlin taking first game of season, here last Friday night. According to available record this is the second time in some 17 years that the Hammers have managed to take an opener from Pied Pipers. Rotan scored a TD in the last quarter for a 6-0 win.

The winning TD was on a nine-yard pass from quarterback Walter Hargrove to halfback Mickey Early after about two minutes had gone in the final period. The score climaxed a 67-yard drive.

The battle overall was a defensive contest played mostly between the 30-yard lines.

There were no serious scoring threats in the first half. Both teams did get inside the opposing team's 10 in the third period, but the defense held on downs in both cases.

Early was the leading groundgainer for the Yellowhammers. For Hamlin, Robert Bolden and Spencer Ford led the rushing attack.

Rotan got 170 yards total offense, and the Pied Pipers got 151 yards, all but one by the ground.

Defense standouts included sophomore tackle Santos Flores and linebacker Hank Day for Rotan and lineman Bill Hodnett and Charlie Sellers and defensive halfback Charlie Shira for Hamlin.

Record Water Use In Rotan

Rotan City Council met in regular session Tuesday, Sept. 9, with following members present: Mayor Charles G. Hogsett and Councilmen, Tyrus Harrison, Jay R. Hendon, Sam Hamm and S. M. Weathersbee. Also present were Jack Aaron, M. A. Hughes and Kenneth Vann.

Audit of the past fiscal year, which ended March 31, 1969 was presented by City Auditor, Bartlett Strayhorn. After a complete explanation of the audit the Council, thru a motion, approved and accepted the audit.

The 1969 tax roll was presented by Kenneth Vann, Tax Assessor - Collector. The total valuation for oil, personal and real estate taxes is \$3,310,748.00. This being \$76,847.00 less than the 1968 tax roll. Loss due to the lower values in the oil taxes.

The Council accepted the recommendation from Police Commission to change the salary of City Judge back to the fee system.

The Council instructed City Supervisor to make an extra effort to collect old paving assessments and delinquent personal property taxes and to file tax suits, if necessary for the collection of these taxes. Jack Aaron, Water Superintendent, reported they purchased more than 18,000,000 gallons of water during August. This is the second highest usage in history of Rotan—the previous month, July topped it with 19,000,000 gallons.

Collins Attends Service School

Austin — Mr. Tom Collins, Veterans County Service Officer for Fisher County attended the 22nd Annual State-wide Rehabilitation Conference for Veterans Service Officers, which was held at the Austin Hotel in Austin, Sept. 8-11.

This Conference was conducted by the Veterans Affairs Commission of Texas, in cooperation with the American Legion, Disabled American Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Veterans of World War I, and the Veterans County Service Officers Association of Texas. The purpose of the meeting was to offer Service Officers from the entire State of Texas an opportunity to gain first-hand knowledge of recently enacted legislation dealing with benefits to veterans and their dependents and survivors. The recent rains have been very beneficial to farmers and ranchers in the county. Most tanks are now well supplied with stock water and pastures are looking real good.

The late planted sorghums should at least make some grazing now. When it dries up small grain planting will be on most farmers' minds. Top yielding wheat varieties from last years test plots were Caddo, Crockett, and Scott 66. 45 pounds of nitrogen on wheat last year almost doubled the yield on our fertility test located on the C. D. Herron farm at Sylvester.

Top yielding oat varieties last year were Ora and New Nortex. Alamo X oat varieties last year were Ora and New Nortex. Alamo X oats also produce high yields.

Fisher County 4-H and FFA members are very fortunate to have a large set of platform scales donated for use at the County Showbarn. These scales were donated

by T. C. Jinkens of Sylvester. Mr. Jinkens purchased the Harvey Ranch and moved to Fisher County last January.

Destroy cotton stalks immediately after harvest to reduce trouble next year from pink bollworms, boll weevils and tobacco budworms.

Destroying the stalks eliminates the food supply for these insects and holds down their reproduction this fall.

A flail-type shredder does the best insect killing job. The shredder fields should be plowed out immediately and all residue covered to a depth of at least six inches. New leaves, squares and bolls late in the year are considered delicacies by the pests. These are the foods needed by the insects to reach the diapause condition necessary for their winter survival.

Recent rains may alter planned use of cotton defoliants or desiccants. Dry weather stunted cotton will

likely take on new life, says Fred C. Elliott, Texas A&M University Extension cotton specialist, and if the showers continue, a change in pre-harvest chemical use may be necessary.

A 'two-shot' treatment for stripper harvesting when conditions are not favorable at harvest time is outlined. A defoliant, either a chlorate or phosphate material, is applied when 60 percent of the bolls are open. This should cause about 80 percent of the leaves to drop and green bolls to mature and open more rapidly.

If defoliation is not complete in 7 to 10 days, the use of arsenic acid is suggested to get the remaining leaves. He says the practice can speed up harvest and also improve the grade of the cotton.

If adesiccant, arsenic acid, is used for the initial application and unfavorable weather follows, a second application of arsenic acid is not recommended. Could get into residue trouble, warns Elliott.

If a second application is necessary, use a chemical with different active ingredient. The use of 2, 4-D formulations is not recommended.

Elliott cautions against the use of any defoliant not labeled as to exact chemical content. Unknown defoliants may injure exposed fibers, unopened bolls or cause fire hazards at the gin. He suggests defoliating only enough acreage to stay ahead of harvesting and adds that unusual delays in harvesting may result in regrowth or barby cotton. Stripping too soon after applying a desiccant, on the other hand, may also cause barmy cotton.

The following is some information on growing iris: Good drainage and full sun are essential in growing the bearded iris. If the soil is poorly drained, the plants will be extremely susceptible to crown and root rot. Prepare the soil to a depth of 12 to 18 inches, working in

a complete fertilizer so that it is thoroughly mixed. In heavy, poorly drained soils it is advantageous to plant in raised beds using redwood timbers or brick and mortar to bring the bed level 5 to 6 inches above the surrounding soil level.

When reworking an old established iris bed, select only the strong, healthy rhizomes for replanting. Discard any diseased or stunted plants.

When you plant the rhizome, build a cone shaped mound of soil in the bottom of the hole so that the top of the cone is almost even with the surface of the surrounding soil. Place the rhizome on top of the cone with the roots spreading down around the cone. Shallow planting is best, with the rhizomes set just below the soil surface.

There are only two reasons to trim off iris foliage: to prepare plants for digging and transplanting, and to remove foliage that is badly infected with disease. At transplanting time, cut back the foliage to one-third its original height. In established beds, leave the foliage as it is necessary to build up food reserves needed to produce the many large flowers desired next spring.
