## Hammers Close With Loss

The Yellowhammers took their first defeat in District play, of the season at Roscoe Friday night 15-6. This gave Roscoe District title.

After two unsuccessful drives by the Plowboys and three unsuccessful ones by the Hammers, Roscoe finally mounted a scoring drive for TD.

Roscoe led 9-0 at end of first quarter. Rotan had the ball once more in the first quarter, but to no avail. However on their first possession of the second period, the Hammers rallied and marched 94 yards in 9 plays.

After a two-yard gain by Steve Nowlin. Phil Springer went through left guard for 10 yards. Two plays later, Hargrove passed successfully to John Wylie for 14 yards to the 32 and a first down.

Next Nowlin got a first at the 44 or a 13-yard scamper and two plays later Springer had another eight yards and first down. Following eight plays, either throwing incomplete passes or making short gains, Hargrove went to the air again, netting first down at the Roscoe 15 on an 18 yard pass to Springer.

Another complete pass from Hargrove to Wylie gave Rotan the ball on Plowboy six, setting up the TD play.

Hargrove handed to Early who sped through left guard for the six-pointer with 3:22 left in the half. A run by Early for the two-pointer made the line of scrimmage and maybe another foot, but the effort failed, leaving the score at half at 9-6 for Roscoe.

Neither of the could score again until the Plowboys rallied in the final stanza.

Early led Yellowhammer rushing with 84 yards in 15 carries, while Nowlin had 62 yards, carrying the ball 14 times.

# COUNTY AGENT NEWS

It's that time of the year again when rats and mice move into better quarters for the winter. These pests not only eat and spoil grain, but also can carry diseases and in general play havoc around the farm.

Just 50 rats can eat enough grain annually to feed a dairy cow. One rat can eat about two-thirds as much mash as a hen but the big loss comes from the waste and contamination they cause.

Property is damaged or destroyed by their gnawing, burrowing and nesting. Grain bags, paper cartons and wood containers are damaged and their contents spilled and contaminated.

Rats can also start fires by gnawing electric wire insulation and electrical appliances may be damaged by short-circuiting open switches. They use inflammable materials in the nests and their burrows can weaken foundations.

All told, some 35 known rat-borne diseases are a threat to humans and animals. A good cleanup job will eliminate their favorite living quarters but baits or other materials may be needed to bring them under control.

During the last half of November some 40,000 Texas ranchers and farmers will receive a livestock survey questionnaire from Cary Palmer, State Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This is a joint endeavor of the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Statistical Reporting Service, USDA, to provide a program of county estimates for Texas.

In Texas there are 254 counties and each farmer in each county is an important part of the State's agriculture. Their reports are needed to provide accurate estimates for Texas cattle, hogs, and chickens. Another survey on sheep and goats will be made in late December.

We urge each farmer to fill out his questionnaire carefully and return it promptly in the self-addressed envelope to the Agricultural Statistician. This will do much to provide the accurate data needed for the State.

County data bulletins for 1968 are now available by writing to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Box 70, Austin, or by writing John C. White, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, P. O. Box BB, Capitol Station, Austin.

Pesticide residues in foods remain at safe low levels according to the most recent report of the Food and Drug Administration. In reporting the results of a survey of 30 market baskets of food representing 80 items, the Food and Drug Administration stated that "in every case, residues were within acceptable daily intake levels established by the World Health Organization and the Food and Agricultural Organization of the United Nations." Market basket or "total diet" surveys are conducted in addition to a program of examination of up to 25,000 samples of raw agricultural commodities annually for pesticide residues. It is of interest that the Food and Drug Administration has cited the results as showing a relatively low incidence of violations in most food categories over a period of several years.

As a further insight into the wholesomeness of the food supply, many tolerances established for pesticide residues in foods are 2,000 times less than an amount of the chemical that has been found to produce "n. effect" in the most sensitive animal tested. Other residue tolerances are established on the basis of acute, short-term, and long-term toxicity studies, reproduction studies and the study data on man.

Pest control practices provide the American consumer with a plentiful, wholesome, quality food supply free of insect and disease damage; and thus, contribute directly to the standard of living enjoyed in this country.

Blackleg has been showing up on several ranches in the county. I strongly recommend that cattle be vaccinated for this disease. Calves vaccinated before 3 months of age should have another shot before weaning. The small cost of this vaccine is nothing compared to the loss of a cow or calf.

If the garment doesn't live up to its guarantee, the manufacturer says he will return the purchase price or replace the garment. Fannie Brown Eaton, Extension clothing specialist says.

She urges consumers to read garment labels, give the labels or hang tags and the dated sales slips. This proves how long a consumer has had the guaranteed garments. Be sure the sales slip is dated when a guaranteed garment is purchased, the specialist cautions. Store clerks may not mention that garments carry a guarantee because so few clothing have one as yet.

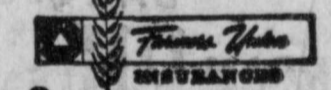

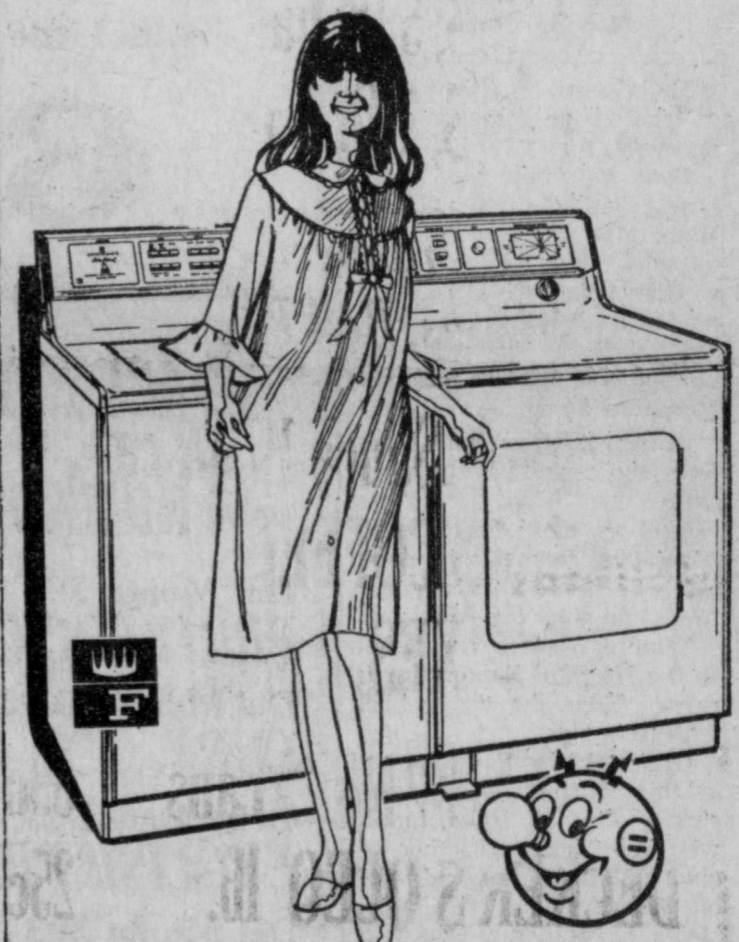
