Cotton Harvest Moving Rapidly

Cotton harvest has moved rapidly every dry day during the past two weeks, with gins being very busy most of the time.

Considerable cotton remains in fields over the entire county. Many farmers are having difficulty in getting custom stripping done, but major problems reported is many fields in low places and subirrigated remain too wet for machinery to enter, and an acute shortage of hand pullers exists. Many fields have been so boggy since before Christmas, that strippers cannot enter.

Roby gins had a total of 4861 Tuesday with much cotton left in fields.

Rotan gins had reached 6690 bales and final estimate runs between 7500 and 8,000. Hobbs had ginned 2960 and estimated about 150 more bales to come in.

Many Voters Eligible This Year

Robert Buck, Fisher County Tax Assessor-Collector reports voter registration ended with a rush Saturday. He stated Tuesday that applications were still coming in by mail, postdated before the deadline and he estimated about 3150 would be near the final count. He had 3127 at that time.

Buck said some duplications were being found as citizens had made application some time ago and had forgotten about it, making another application.

This heavy registration indicates considerable interest in elections during the year. Final count for 1969 was 2645.

Vehicle License Plate Sale Opened Monday

Motor vehicle license plate sale opened Monday morning with both F&M in Rotan and Tax Collectors office in Roby reporting brisk business for an opener.

The 1970 plates are lettered and numbered in light blue on a fluorescent white background. The deadline to register in person is April 1, when the new plates must be displayed on cars.

County Tax Assessor-Collector Robert Buck states that although the system is new both to his office personnel as well as car owners, they can handle registration more rapidly than the old system, and still more time will be cut when they become

Water Board Approves Rotan Sewage Disposal

Rotan's application for a permit to operate the present sewerage disposal plant was approved by the Texas Water Quality Board January 30, 1970. This Sewerage Disposal Plant has been in operation for a number of years without a permit from the Texas Water Quality Board or the Texas Health Department.

Delegates Make National F-U 'Fly-In' to Washington

Fisher County Farmers Union leaders making the National Farmers Union sponsored legislative Fly-In to Washington February 1 to 4th were President Kiefer Cauble, V-P Jerry Hoodempyle, Foy Mitchell, Guy Kemp, J. C. Sheffield and Max Carriker. Hoodempyle also is delegate from Frisher Co. Young Farmers chapter. The group left Sunday and were scheduled to return Wednesday night.

The three-day schedule in Washington included a meeting with USDA officials at the Department of Agriculture to discuss commodity programs and agricultural trade. The group were greeted by Secretary of Agriculture Clifford Hardin.

A State Department visit gave the Fly-In participants an insight into agriculture's foreign trade and the Foreign Trade and Development Act.

Breakfast meetings were planned with members of the Texas congressional delegation, and the Texans made courtesy calls on other members of congress.

They provided congress with information concerning the needs of Texas agriculture and rural community.

The main thrust of the Washington Fly-In program is in support of passage of the Farm Trade Problems. Officials of the State Department discussed the Food for Freedom Program and Coalition endorsed Purcell Bill which will make permanent present commodity programs. Unless action is taken on commodity programs this year, the present program will expire. The Purcell Bill is co-sponsored by forty members of congress, including five Texas congressmen.

Other problems facing Texas farmers discussed with USDA officials included the policy decision to eliminate the advance payment on feed grain, reduction in cotton projected yield, cut in rice acreage, reduction of ACP funds, cut in wheat acreage without increase in price support, restrictions on the loan program for farm storage and drying facilities for grain, and refusal by USDA to increase dairy support prices to 90% of parity.

In describing the Washington Fly-In program, Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman of Waco said, "The Washington Fly-In Program, which included several hundred farmers from six states, comes at a very critical time because farm programs expire this year. Texas participants in the Fly-In effort went to Washington armed with statistical information showing what impact weakening of the farm programs will have not only on agriculture but the entire rural community. Farmers Union is taking the lead in this program, but we are inviting all organizations, all farmers and the entire rural community to join in our effort.

Political Pot Is Beginning To Boil-New Candidates

Interest in local politics are beginning to develop with two new filings. J. P. Davis of Roby filed Monday for Commissioner Precinct 4, incumbent Thurman Terry had previously announced.

A four-way race for Commissioner, Precinct 2 shaped up when E. J. (Junior) Kiker filed, late last week. Incumbent Tex Abbot is not making the race. Filing previously were, David (Dick) Gruben, Frank Allen and M. A. Hughes.

J. D. Burk and incumbent Ed Perkins are in County Judge race.

Running unopposed are District Clerk Eula Mae Hull, County Clerk John W. Ashley, County Treasurer Ina Goodwin and Justice of the Peace, Precinct 4, Joe Wetsel.

Record Number Phones In Rotan

Southwestern Bell Manager J. McCasland reported that the number of telephones in Rotan grew to more than 1,500 during 1969.

He noted this figure compares with 1,172 telephones here at the end of 1960.

"Rotan residents also seem pretty talkative," McCasland said. "They dialed 4,825 calls per average business day during November."

McCasland said a record \$99 million construction budget has been set by Southwestern Bell for its San Antonio Area, of which Rotan is a part. The area covers roughly the western half of Texas.

The \$99 million figure is for land, buildings, central office equipment and outside plant such as cable installation.

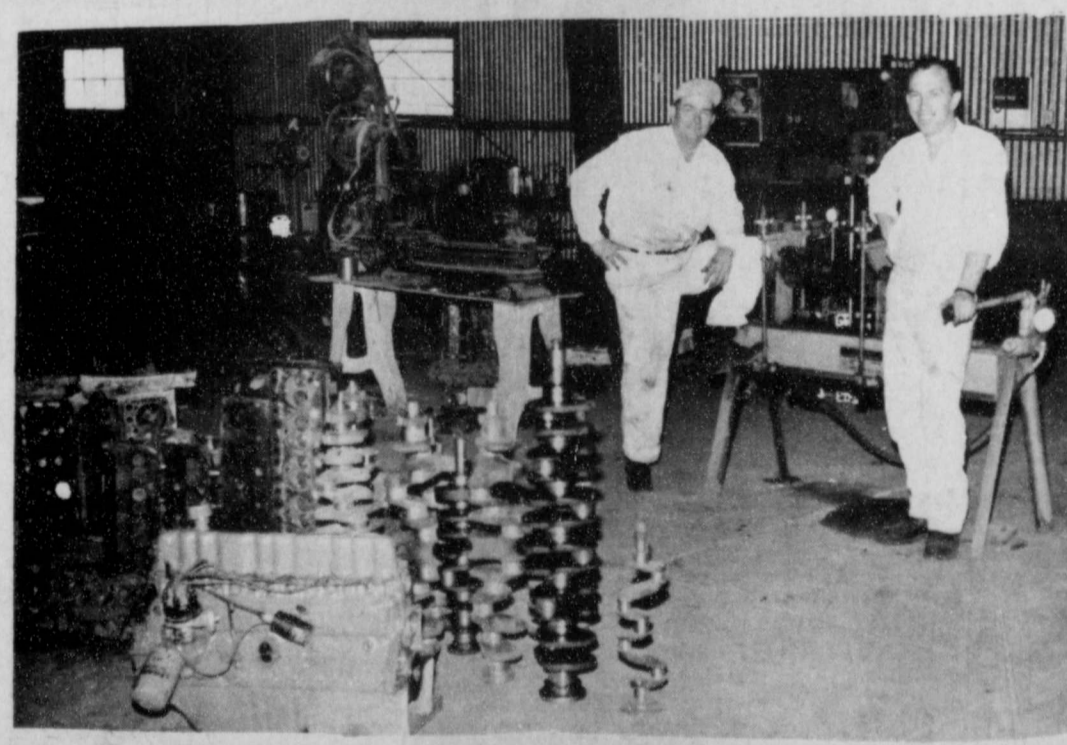

NEWS**

Self-feeding of a "popped",
dry-heated sorghum grain mix-
ture to finishing steers has re-
sulted in a lower feed intake
than that of dry, rolled grain
in tests by Texas A&M Uni-
versity researchers.
J. W. Sorenson, Jr., A & M
professor of agricultural en-
gineering, described this
finding at the Seventh Annual
Symposium on Thermal Agri-
culture.

The talk on "Dry Heat Pro-
cessing of Sorghum Grain for
Beef Cattle" pointed out that
this lower intake was accom-
panied by increased efficiency
of feed utilization, but gave a
negligible decrease in the
rate of gain and final
weight.

These results were found in
research conducted by A & M
Scientists to determine the
feasibility of dry heat in a
"Popping operation for pro-
cessing sorghum grain for beef
cattle. An infrared-heated re-
ciprocating steel table machine
and a gas-heated vibrating
tray conveyor machine were
used in this study.

Grain moisture content of 15
percent was optimum for ob-
taining the highest percentage
of completely popped grain.
Maximum popping achieved was
45 percent.

"Popping" the grain added
a lot of bulk to the feed as
evidenced by the bulk density
figures for loose-fill samples
which ranged from 40 pounds
per cubic foot for the original
whole grain to about 60 pounds
per cubic foot for the complet-
ely popped grain.

Cattle which were fed the
dry, heat-treated grain showed
significantly higher diges-
tibility of dry matter, organic
matter, non-protein organic
matter and nitrogen-free ex-
tract, but not of fats, fiber or
protein.

An unknown part, but not
all, of the increased diges-
tibility could be attributed to
the lower level of feed.
No differences in diges-
tibility were found among cattle
fed three different fractions of
"popped" grain indicating that
dry heat rather than "pop-
ping" per se was the reason
for changes in performance.

Prevailing conditions neces-
sitate that livestock producers
explore all possible ways to
cut production costs.

Some areas of concern in-
clude problems of reproduc-
tion, herd diseases, feedlot
problems and diseases, select-
ing feeder calves and using
new veterinary practices.

Here are management sug-
gestions which have worked
well. Feed your stock cows
sensibly; control internal and
external parasites; sell cows
that do not wean a good calf
every year; pregnancy check
cows and heifers and sell open
cows; have your veterinarian
give herd sires a complete
physical exam; sell cows with
poor teeth, bad udders or phy-
sical problems; vaccinate for
disease control when necessary;
isolate and test new breeding
stock and include your veteri-
narian on your management
team.

Bulletins and other publica-
tions are available at our of-
fice, not only on managing
the cow herd but also on pas-
ture improvement subjects and
other phases of beef production.

City Ordinance

This ordinance was voted by citizens of Rotan April 5, 1960, and adopted April 12, 1960:

An ordinance making it unlawful to keep livestock or poultry within the city limits of the City of Rotan, Texas, without a license; providing regulations for keeping livestock or poultry; prescribing procedures for granting and revoking licenses; providing for inspections; defining the term livestock and poultry; prescribing penalties; providing separability of sections; and providing that such ordinance shall become effective thirty days after its passage.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Rotan, Texas:

Section 1: The term "livestock" as used herein shall be construed to mean any horse, mule, jack, jenny, cow, cattle, hog, sheep, goat, rabbit, or guinea pig; and the term "poultry" shall be construed to mean chickens, turkeys, geese, ducks, and guineas.

Section 1 A: That the term "person", as used herein shall be construed to include both singular and plural and shall mean and embrace an individual, corporation, association, partnership, or society, and their agents, servants, and employees.

Section 2: No person shall keep livestock or poultry within the city limits of the City of Rotan, Texas without first obtaining and thereafter keeping in force a license permitting him to do so.

Section 3: Licenses shall be granted or allowed to remain in force only when regulations as follows are observed:

A. The livestock or poultry shall be kept within structures or enclosures and not be per-

mitted to run at large.

B. To prevent the same from serving as breeding places for insects and from emitting noxious odors, the manure or dung incident to the maintenance and care of the livestock or poultry shall be removed from structure in a reasonable time not to cause a health menace. The manure or dung so collected shall either be placed in containers or disposed of so as not to cause unnecessary odors or flies.

C. The structure or enclosure within which any such livestock or poultry are confined shall not be less than 75 feet from any dwelling house.

Section 4: The procedure and requirements for the granting and keeping in force of licenses shall be as follows:

A. Any person desiring a license permitting him to keep livestock or poultry within the city limits shall file an application with the City Clerk on a form provided by him for that purpose. Said application shall among other things call for the name and address of the applicant, the estimated average number and types of livestock or poultry to be kept.

Section 5: Any person who violates any provision of this ordinance shall be fined not less than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100.00). Each day that such violation occurs shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 6: If any section of this ordinance is found to be unenforceable, the same shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections.
Section 7: The City Clerk is hereby directed to make publication of the caption of this ordinance together the penalty provision hereof as required by law; and it is hereby further ordained that this ordinance shall become effective thirty days after its passage.
C. When an application has

been filed in due form, the City shall turn the same over to the City Health Officer who shall inspect the facilities wherein the livestock or poultry is to be kept and prepare an opinion as to whether the same are in compliance with the regulations hereinbefore provided.

D. The application with the opinion of the City Health Officer attached shall be submitted to the City Council, which shall then pass on the application.

E. The City Health Officer may periodically on his own initiative and shall upon complaint of the City Marshall or any resident of the City make an inspection to ascertain whether the regulations as hereinbefore provided are being observed. If he finds that aforesaid regulations are violated, he shall prepare and file a statement to that effect with the City Clerk. The City Council shall then give ten (10) days notice by publication of hearing. If after a hearing the City Council finds the aforesaid regulations have been violated, it shall then order the permit cancelled.

Section 8: Any person who violates any provision of this ordinance shall be fined not less than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100.00). Each day that such violation occurs shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 9: If any section of this ordinance is found to be unenforceable, the same shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections.

Section 10: The City Clerk is hereby directed to make publication of the caption of this ordinance together the penalty provision hereof as required by law; and it is hereby further ordained that this ordinance shall become effective thirty days after its passage.

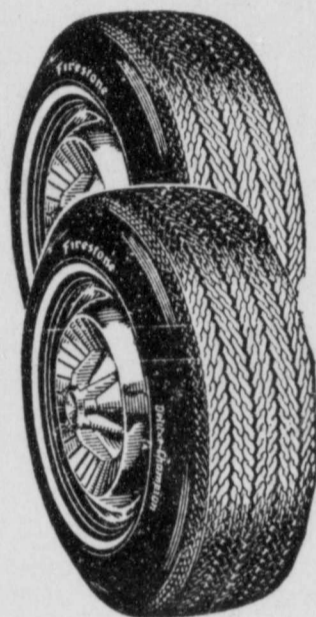
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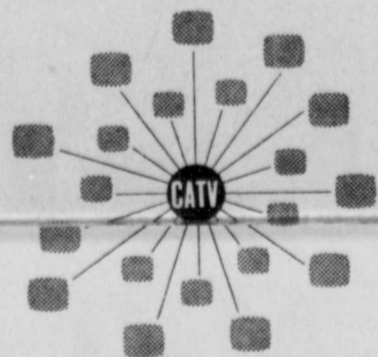
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Mrs. Williams Died January 27

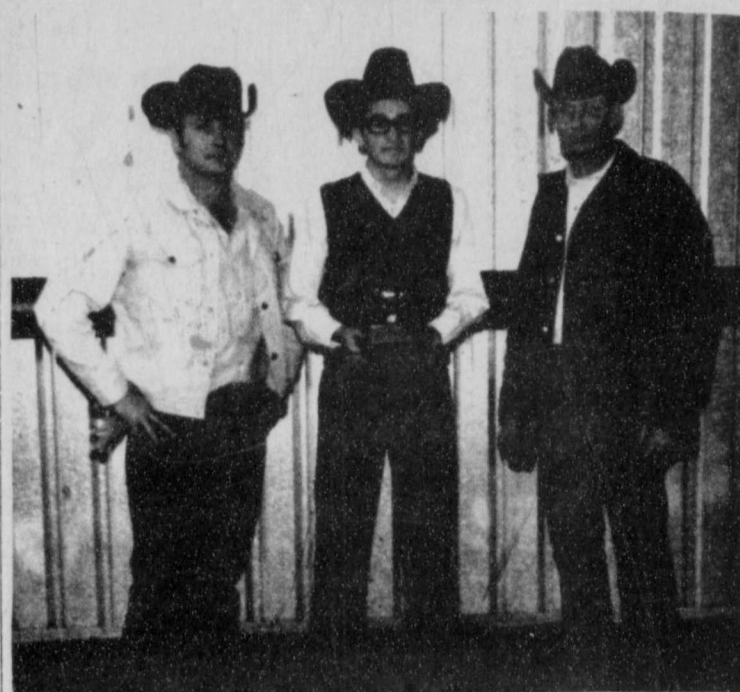
She was a member of Little Zion Baptist Church in Rotan.

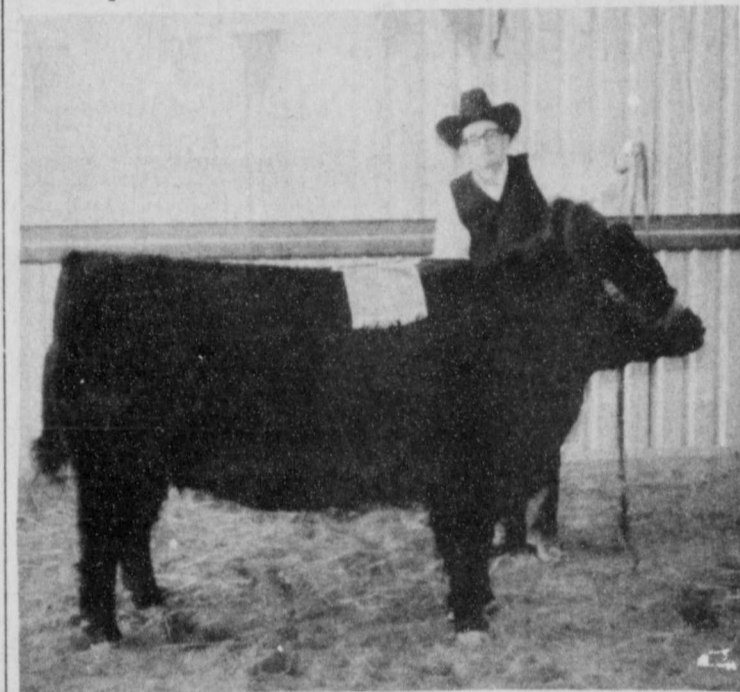

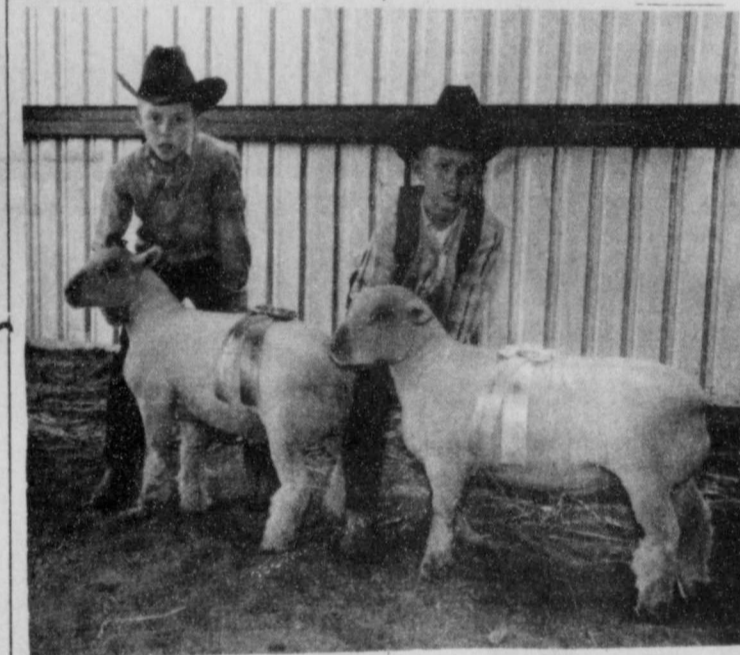

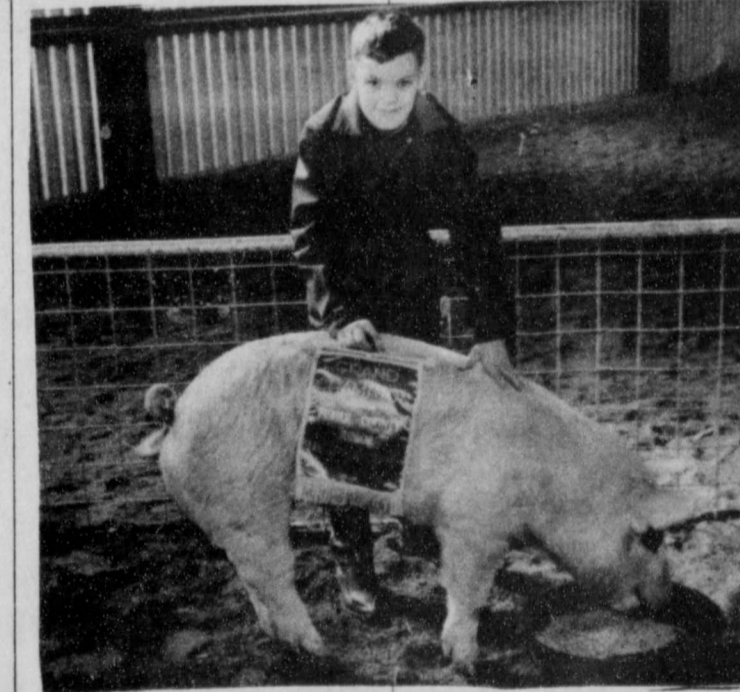

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF ROTAN, FISHER COUNTY, TEXAS; PROVIDING FOR FUTURE CHANGES AND AMENDMENTS; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROTAN:

SECTION 1. Effective as hereinafter provided, the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Rotan by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

- First 800 cu. ft. or fraction thereof \$1.9711 gross; \$1.774 Net.
- Next 1200 cu. ft. @\$1.6933 per Mcf Gross; \$1.524 per Mcf Net.
- Next 3000 cu. ft. @\$1.1378 per Mcf Gross; \$1.024 per Mcf Net.
- Next 20000 cu. ft. @ \$.86 per Mcf Gross; \$.774 per Mcf Net.
- Over 25000 cu. ft. @ \$.8044 per Mcf Gross; \$.724 per Mcf Net.

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.

Net rate shall apply to all bill paid within ten days from monthly billing date; gross rate shall be applicable thereafter.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

In addition to the aforesaid rate, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by the City in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction.

SECTION 3. This ordinance, and the rate fixed herein shall become effective with billing periods commencing on and after February 1, 1970.

Cable television systems make a significant contribution to the economy of communities which they serve, and as a whole represent a substantial investment in the national economy. Mr. Bartlett Strayhorn, Local Representative of Cable Electronics.

Mr. Strayhorn said that for a few dollars a month cable tv subscribers enjoy television pictures superior to those received off-the-air (especially for color tv) and have a greater selection of channels from which to choose their entertainment.

"Yet", he said, "few ever stop to think they are participants in a multi-billion dollar industry that is helping to improve the economy of their own communities."

Mr. Strayhorn, whose company is participating in National Cable TV Week, explained the impact of a typical CATV System on the community it serves.

"Before a cable system generates any revenue," he said "it must make a sizable capital investment in its plant. The cable distribution system can cost as much as \$4,500 per mile if strung on existing utility poles, or as much as \$7,500 a mile if placed underground."

"The tower site, tower antennas, signal receiving and processing equipment, vehicles, office equipment, test equipment and other major items together with operating capital may represent as much as \$100,000."

Mr. Strayhorn said that other expenses such as salaries, advertising, insurance and office supplies could mean an annual outlay of \$200,000.

Moreover, he said, one should consider franchise fees paid to local governments, income tax payments and taxes paid on physical community."

Mr. Strayhorn said "But, there is another important contribution to the community -- impact on local businesses."

He said more TV sets are sold and thus more work for repairmen. Cable TV may offer the community for local advertising for everyone, from drug store to supermarket. All of it starts dollars flowing in the local economy.

On the National level, Mr. Strayhorn said, it has been projected that in the next 10 years cable television could add 900,000 jobs, contribute \$5 billion in capital investment, and pay an estimated \$500 million in city, state and federal taxes.

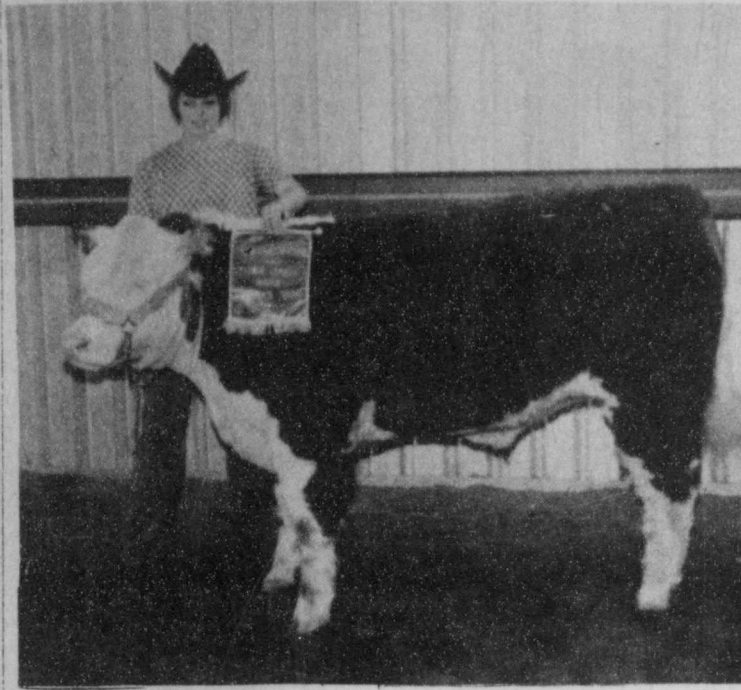

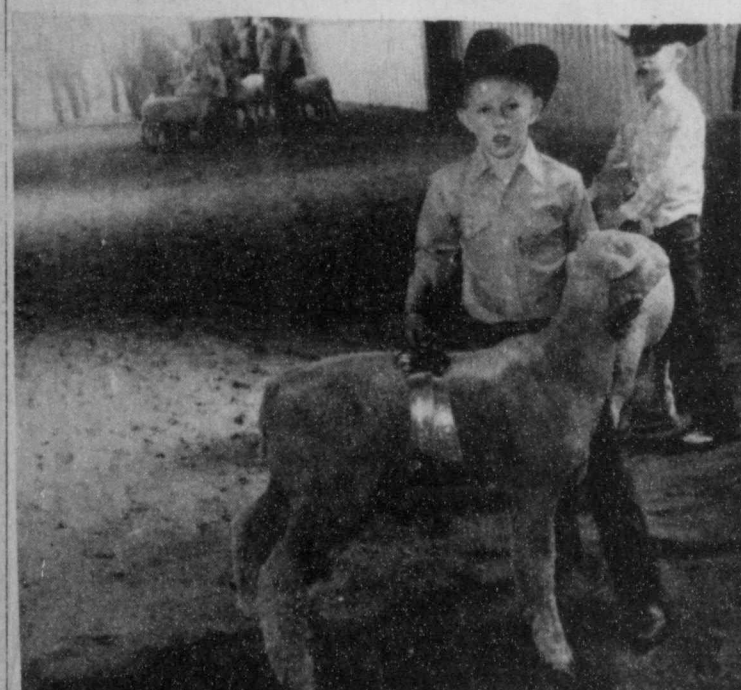

Ben Hardin Dies in Butte Montana

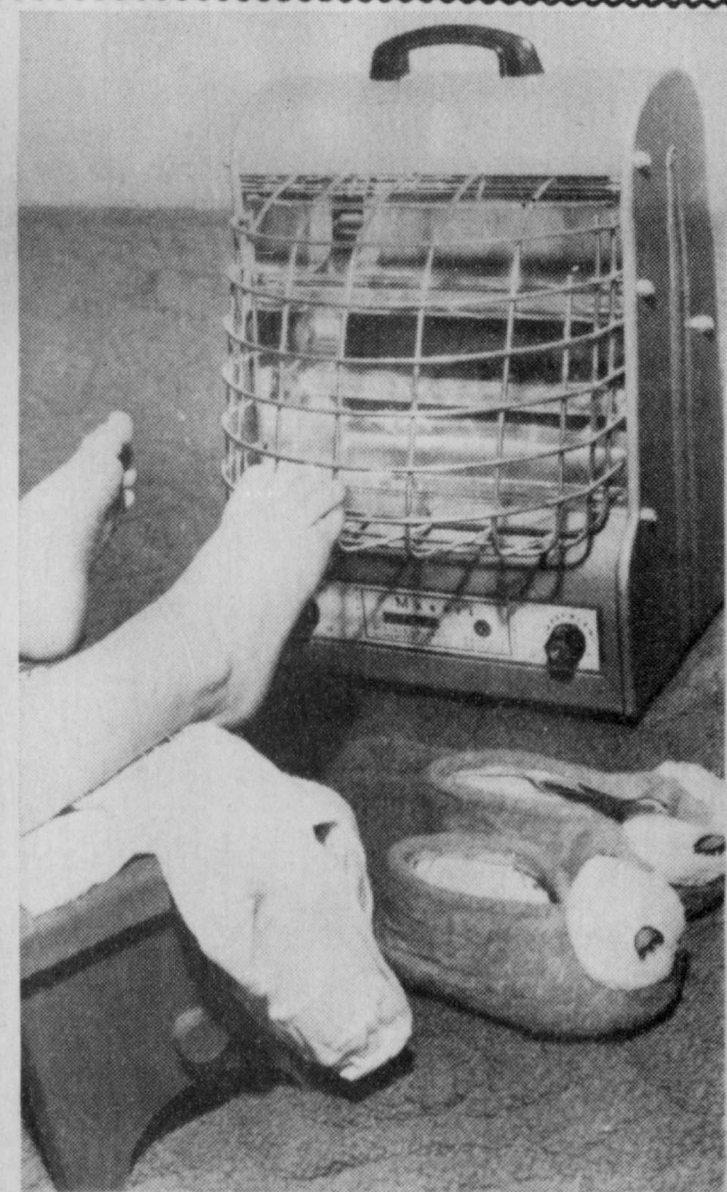
