This speech was written by Doug Upshaw and given at the joint meeting of the FHA and FFA in Roby Monday night, February 23.

"The American success formula has a secret ingredient. It is called freedom. The Future Farmers learn this secret and use it often. But what is the FFA? This is something few know the true meaning of. That is why I decided to tell the people who make up the Future Homemakers and Future Farmers what the FFA really consists of. I can truly say that the FFA has benefitted me more than any other organization, 1 have traveled over 4,000 miles and attended numerous meetings, but the value of knowledge and the friends I've gained can't be measured in such simple terms. For the FFA has taught me to accept people and their personalities. It has also helped me to see other people's attitudes and understand them better. But this all goes along with an effective program. Many do not realize that the classes we have at school are not just FFA, but a combination of Vocational Agricultural courses combined with the FFA.





With the State's April 15 motor vehicle inspection deadline approximately 90 days away, large numbers of Texas motorists have yet to take their vehicles in for the

mandatory annual safety inspection. Colonel Wilson E. Speir, Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today

urged all motorists whose vehicles have not been inspected to visit an inspection station as soon as possible. "Those getting the inspection now will avoid long lines which are certain to develop at many stations as the April 15 deadline draws near, " he said. The DPS Director noted that Texas adopted an annual inspection program on September 1, 1969. All vehicles inspected since that date have had the sticker placed on the left side of the windshield with a large number tab inserted to show the month of

expiration. For example, vehicles in-



When we think of the fact that sin is running rampant, and that as Jeremiah, the weeping prophet, said, "the land is full of adultery, for because of swearing the land mourneth; the pleasant places of the wilderness are dried up, and their course is evil, and their force is not right." (Jer. 23:10), we cannot restrain a feeling of distress. Then when we consider the divided state of the religious worlk, see error riding high, and find such indifference to and even prefudice against the pure word of God, we have difficulty trying to prevent discouragement being added to distress. Jeremiah felt these emotions when he wrote, "My heart within me is broken because of the prophets... I have seen also in the Prophet of Jerusalem a horrible thing: they commit adultery, and walk in lies; they strengthen also the hands of evildoers, that none doth return from his wickedness they are all of them unto me as Sodom, and the inhabitants thereof as Gomorrah." (Jeremiah 23:9, 14) So, in his day, as now, there were leaders in religion who strengthened the hands of evildoers by their disregard for the word of the Lord. Then, for Jeremiah's encouragement, and for ours, God said, "What is the chaff to the wheat? Is not my word like a fire? saith the Lord; and like a hammer that breaketh the rock in pieces?" (Jer. 23:28, 29) That was equal to saying that all who were wicked and all their efforts to show disdain for His word were but chaff, and that in spite of flinty hearts His word once received would burn out impurities, and break up hard-heartedness. "It will not return void. " (Isa. 55: 11) No one can estimate the ultimate good accomplished when the word of the Lord is faithfully proclaimed. Like a fire burning chaff, it will destroy the doctrines of men; and like a hammer breaking rock, it will break the hard heart unto repentance. Paul understood its power when he said, "It (the gospel) is the power of God unto salvation. " (Rom. 1:17)





There are strong signs that the health industry is rapidly approaching a crisis. It is already at the critical stage for many who have recently experienced serious and prolonged illness. The system by which America heals its sick, is itself a failing patient. The chart of rising health-care costs shows a degree of fever which calls for urgent remedy. The burden of a cure rests

partially on medical men themselves, who must act to protect their honorable calling from radical, and perhaps disastrous measures. Perhaps it rests even more on government not intruding into the sensitive

doctor-patient relationship. Responsibility falls on the public who, whatever happens, will continue to pay the bills. Last year, individuals and groups spent more than \$60 Billion on health. This is almost 7 percent of our National

Gross Product. So it is one of the biggest businesses in the Nation. Of this sum \$52.6 Billion went for personal medical care. By comparison, in 1950 the bill was about \$20 Billion. Fully half this \$40 Billion increase can be charged to price ise alone.

Many factors conspire in these price rises. Inflation generally is, of course, first. This inturn has put pressures on those who make medical-care work, to increase hospital charges.

There have been tremendous advancements in medical hardware. These are machines undreamed of a generation ago, which help make people well

-- sometimes at great cost. There have been countless improvements in surgical techniques, saving many lives that a generation ago would have been lost -- but again, costing lots of money.

#### COUNTY AGENT NEWS ~ by Richard Spencer

Farm record books should be used as a major source of information for filling out the 1969 Agricultural Census questionnaire.

Most of the Census questions can be answered from the farm record with only a minimum of time required to adjust the information. Because of the importance of the Census derived information, the best possible answers should be supplied. Some farm owners will need to complete only the first and last section of the Census form since they are renting or leasing their farms; thus, someone else will provide the specific information as to the farm operation.

The information given on the Census form is strictly confidential and is not released except as part of a summary of a county, district or state report. The forms should be completed as soon as possible, and returned in accordance with instructions received with the questionnaire.

Questions are still being asked regarding the status of the hog cholera eradication program in Texas. Texas entered Phase 3 of the

program on August 1,1969. This is the active phase of the program and brought into play the cooperative State-Federal indemnities which are used to pay for hogs depopulated because of cholera outbreaks. Since last August approximately 200 herds have been depopulated in Texas. The state's share of indemnities has amounted to over \$200,000. The interstate shipment of hogs vaccinated with modified live virus vaccines has been

prohibited since January 1,1970. Also, Phase 3 prohibits the interstate shipment of modified live virus vaccines after the supply within the state is exhausted.

AN ORDINACE RELATING TO DISPOSAL OF DEAD AMINALS AND ANIMAL OFF ALS:

Be it Ordained and Enacted by the City Commission of the City of Roby of the County of Fisher, of the State of Texas: Section 1: That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association, or corporation to dispose of animal offals or dead aminals in or near the dump ground of the City of Roby, Fisher County, Texas. Section 2: That any person,

firm, association, or corporation convicted of a violation of this ordinace shall be subject to a fine in the City Court of Roby, Fisher County, Texas of not more than one hundred and no/100 dollars for each offense.

Section 3: That should any part of this ordinance be held invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining parts whall be severable and shall continue to be in full force and effect.

Section 4: That all ordinances conflicting with provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed insofar as the same affect this ordinance.

Section 5: That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after March 1, 1970.

Payments will be made for the number of live hogs on the premises when the State or Federal veterinarian arrives. No payment will be made on hogs which have died prior to the arrival of an authorized veterinarian.

If cholera is suspected, it is therefore most important that the producer get in touch with the Texas Animal Health Commission, Austinora local veterinarian.

The program is to eradicate a disease which has cost the nation's swine industry \$50 million annually.

Much of the success of a rose garden depends upon the quality of the plants used and the manner in which they are planted and maintained.

For the beginning rose gardener, we suggest starting on a small scale. A dozen well-cared for plants will produce more flowers and give the gardener more pleasure than four or five dozen poorly cared for plants.

The rose garden should receive at least six full hours of sunlight each day. Good air circulation is essential. However, some protection from prevailing strong winds is desirable.

Plantings near trees should be avoided since the rose root is a poor competitor against this type of intrusion.

If possible locate the rose garden where it can be seen and enjoyed from inside the home.

It is especially important to remember that roses do not like "wet feet". Good drain-age, both surface and subsurface, is essential for the growth and productivity of roses. A tile drain system or planting on a raised bed will usually take care of the drainage prob-

Few industries have turned in a performance in behalf of U.S. consumers to equal that of the oil industry. In terms of price and quality of product, it has done an incomparable job. During the decade 1959 to 1968, the U.S. government's Consumer Price Index rose more than twice as much as the average pre-tax price of gasoline. While the average price of all items in the Index went up 19.4 per cent, gasoline rose 8.3 per cnet. Milk was up 17 per cent; potatoes, 30. 4 percent; shoes, 28. 17 per cent; housing costs, 17.6 per cent. Another fact about the oil

industry is that the gasoline of today is far different than the gasoline of 10, 15, or 20 years ago. The gasoline of an earlier day would not function in present-day auto. Octane ratings--one of several important measures of gasoline quality-- are at an all-time high in the U.S. But petroleum experts point out that octane numbers alone are not a reliable guide to overall gasoline quality. One petroleum authority, in warning that many of the characteristics of a high performance motor fuel are totally unrelated to octane ratings, says that high quality gasolines are tailored for the altitudes and climates where they will be used. They must vaporize readily at low-temp eratures for quick starting, provide dependable power and

good mileage, have good stability and be low in gum and sulfur content. None of these desirable properties is measured by octane number. The simple facts about

The statewide campaign, which is being coordinated by the Texas Farm Bureau, will utilize publicity in newspapers and on radio and television as well as some locally-sponsored messages on those media, Warren said. He added that others in agriculture, particularly agri-business firms and grocery stores, would be asked to join in the effort.

As an example of how farmers have increased their efficiency, Warren said that a farmer today feeds 45 persons, compared with 23 persons just ten years ago. To help to this, the average investment per farm has jumped from almost \$44,000 to almost \$93,000 in

the past ten years. The farm leader said that the average American family spends only about 16 percent of its after-tax income for food, compared to some 30 percent spent in Europe and 50 percent in Russia. Also, the American housewife has a large variety of wholesome foods, attractively packaged and even precooked in some instances, to choose from he pointed out.




