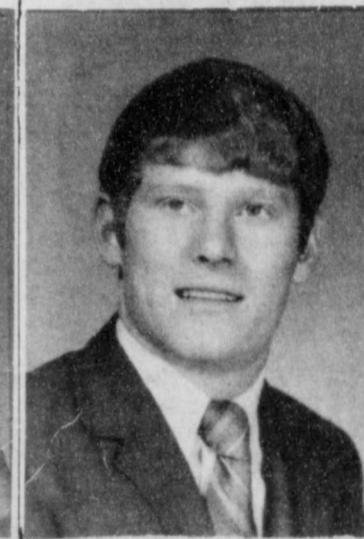
BARBARA MITCHELL

Governor Preston Smith will address public officials and community leaders of West Central Texas on Thursday, May 28, in the Taylor County Exposition Center display building.

The Governor's address will feature a seminar on Texas Communities Tomorrow, his program for development of towns with population of 12,000 or less. He will be introduced by Jones County Judge Leon Thurman, president of the West Central Texas Council of Governments, the seminar sponsor.

More than 800 persons of nineteen counties have been invited. The counties are Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Taylor and Throckmorton.

Rotan officials and citizens who plan to attend the seminar includes Bart Strayhorn, secretary, West Central Texas Council of Governments; Stan Nowlin, member of WCTCG; City Councilmen, Sam Hamm and Mac Weathersbee; W. C. Edwards, Rotan Water Board Director and James Springer.

Several Roby businessmen plan to attend the Seminar, but names were not available at press time, these will be carried next week, previous to the affair.

The seminar will convene at 9 a. m. in the exhibits building of the Exposition Center. Presiding will be Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey vice president of the Council of Governments.

Participants in the seminar will be welcomed by Taylor County Judge Roy Skaggs and Ed N. Wischamper, president of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce.

Community development programs and services will be reviewed by staff members of several state agencies that are members of the Texas Communities Tomorrow Service Team, and by members of the Governor's staff. Following the luncheon, they will be available for consultation with individuals in attendance.

Discussion subjects will be water quality, air pollution and solid waste disposal problems, community planning, housing, industrial development, and vocational-technical education. Speakers will be Thomas Kelly, engineering assistant, Texas Water Quality Board; Jimmie D. Dickens, chief sanitarian,

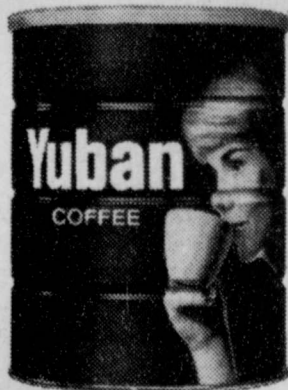

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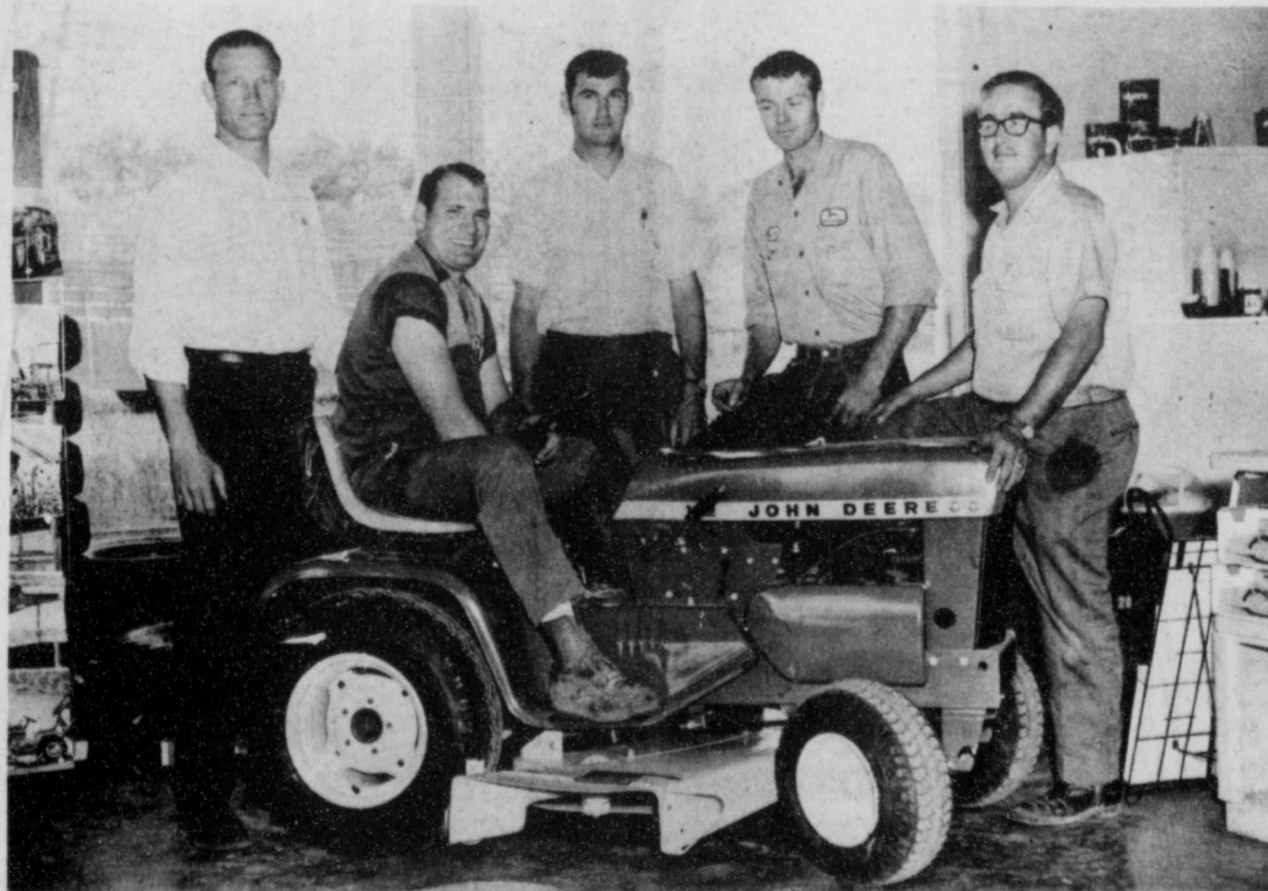

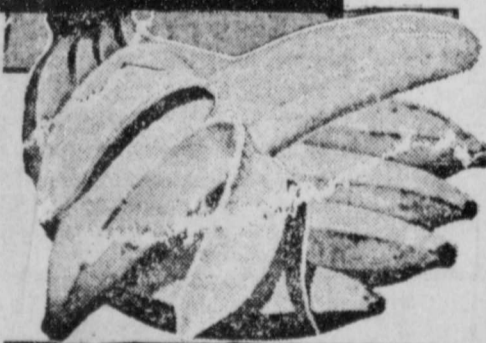

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

With the many excellent forage sorghum hybrids and varieties available today, producers must make careful selection of the proper maturing type in order to obtain maximum silage production.

If early forage production is desired or late planting becomes necessary, then early maturing sorghums should be selected.

However, maximum forage production is usually obtained with later maturing forages. Another advantage is the fact that late maturing types have the ability to remain dormant during periods of limited moisture and still make a crop from late summer rains. These forages often yield 10 to 15 tons of silage per acre from late August rainfall following a prolonged dry period.

Producers that still use top can and Hegari varieties are encouraged to use hybrids containing these varieties in their parentage where they are available. These hybrids should produce higher yields and still have much the same forage quality characteristics of the two varieties.

A number of sterile forage hybrids are also available. These hybrids may be used as wind barriers in vegetable production. The sweetness of the various forage sorghum hybrids depends largely on their parentage. Due to apparent animal preference and increased palatability, hybrids with both a sweet male and sweet female parent have become more popular in recent years.

However, in silage studies higher fermentation losses have sometimes occurred in sweet sorghum types than in non-sweet types, especially if the moisture is quite high at harvest. These losses have been attributed to over-fermentation caused by high sugar levels in the sweet sorghums.

Proper plant population is another important aspect in producing a good quality forage crop. On 40-inch rows plants should total 20,000 to 40,000 per acre on dryland and 50,000 to 80,000 under irrigation.

Seed size among the different hybrids and varieties is such that from 14,000 to 20,000 seed make a pound. Thus, producers should consider the number of seeds planted per foot of row rather than pounds per acre. At 16,000 seed per pound with 60 percent emergence, about 10,000 plants would be established from planting one pound of seed. Therefore, a planting rate of six to eight pounds of seed per acre would result in the desired 60,000 to 80,000 plants for irrigated production.

Planting smaller seed would require fewer pounds of seed for the desired number plants per acre while a higher planting rate would be required with larger seed. Of course, the percent emergence influences the final stand but 60 to 65 percent is considered average for forage sorghums.

Cutting at the proper stage of maturity is also vital for top quality forage. The highest quality silage from forage sorghum is usually obtained when the grain is in the soft dough stage and has about 70 percent moisture. Cutting too early can

often lead to poor quality silage since the moisture content is too high. Forages that produce high tannin with a low grain content should be watched carefully. If cutting is delayed, the stalks often become dry and pithy and a poor quality silage results. Because of wide variation in the types of forages, the seed company's recommendations on when to cut for silage should be followed closely.

Bagworms, damaging pests of evergreens and occasionally of broadleaf plants, can now be found feeding on these host plants.

Evergreens should be examined closely and if small bagworms are found, control measures should be applied.

The worms will be difficult to see because of the bag which they construct around themselves to which foliage is attached. As the bagworm feeds and grows larger, so does the bag.

Heavy infestations of bagworms can completely strip the plant of foliage. When this happens the plant may be lost. The same plants are infested by bagworms year after year; unless control measures are applied.

Control measures are most effective when worms are small and before serious damage is caused to plants.

Spray applications of malathion, carbaryl (Sevin), lead arsenate, or toxaphene are effective for control of bagworms. These materials are available under several trade names from nurseries, garden supply stores and supermarkets.

Directions given on the label for application should be carefully read and followed.

Sulfamethazine (Sulmet) added to high concentrate lamb rations along with chlortetracycline (Aurumycin) resulted in marked improvement in feeder lamb performance in trials at the McGregor Texas A&M University Research Center.

Low levels of an antibiotic, such as chlortetracycline, are generally included in feeder lamb rations to improve growth and reduce losses from enterotoxemia, says Dr. Millard C. Calhoun, sheep and Angora goat nutritionist at the center. Chlortetracycline is cleared for use in feeder lamb rations by the Federal Drug Administration. However, sulfamethazine has not yet been cleared nor has the combination of the two drugs.

Combination of the two drugs has been approved as an additive to beef cattle rations during the first 28 days of the feeding period. Used together, the drugs demonstrated increased weight gains and reduced losses from respiratory problems.

Success of such a combination in beef cattle feeding led to this investigation for use of sulfamethazine and chlortetracycline in feeder lamb rations. Under two different feeding periods of 28 days and 56 days, there appeared to be a beneficial response from including either chlortetracycline or a combination of it with sulfamethazine in high concentrate rations for lambs. In at least two trials of four, addition of sulfamethazine gave a marked response over that obtained using chlortetracycline alone.

Average daily gain increased by .14 pounds with the combination of the drugs. The two used together gave .72 pounds average daily gains compared to .58 for chlortetracycline alone. Sulfamethazine used with chlortetracycline also gave an increase in feed efficiency from 6.7 to 5.8 pounds of feed per pound of gain.

Douglas Upshaw has been announced as winner of the 1970 DeKalb Agricultural Accomplishment Award given to outstanding Seniors in vocational agriculture departments. He was chosen to receive this award on the basis of scholarship, leadership and his supervised farming program.

Doug is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Upshaw of Roby. He attends Roby High School and has been Area II Vice-President of the FFA, member of the Beta Club, and a four year letterman in athletics. His farming program consisted of raising registered swine, cotton and grain crops.

After graduation, Doug plans to attend McMurry College fulfilling a football scholarship. Doug is the 14th DeKalb Accomplishment Award winner from Roby High School, and as such his name will be engraved with the other winners on a special honors plaque provided by the sponsor.

F-B Plans For Expanded Program

3. It mythologizes the Genesis account of creation, and in doing so, destroys faith in Christ. One who cannot believe in the miracle of a literal creation cannot believe in the actual miracle of the virgin birth or the resurrection of Christ. They stand or fall together.
4. The evolutionary theory, in assuming that man has developed and climbed upward through all ages, contradicts and destroys the story of the fall of man. If man did not fall, then he needs no Redeemer. Christianity is a remedial system. We do not need a remedy where there has been no ruin. Evolution denies that such a fall has ever taken place and such a ruined state now exists; therefore, it denies the need of a Redeemer and makes useless and void the story of Christ, man's Redeemer.

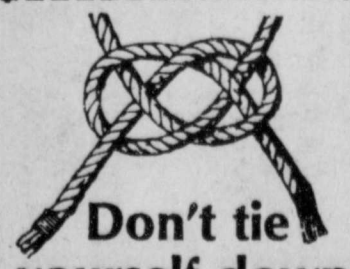

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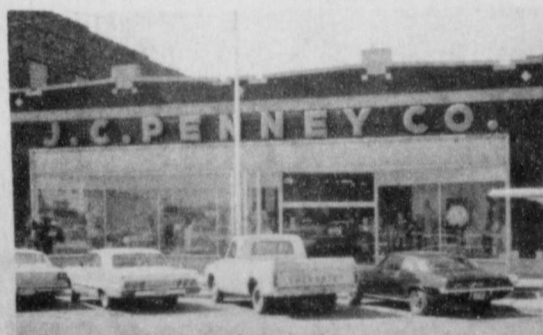

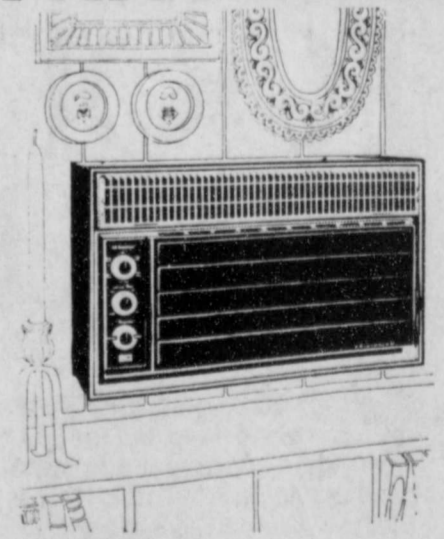
