Travis McDonald will introduce the speaker, Austin McCLOUD.

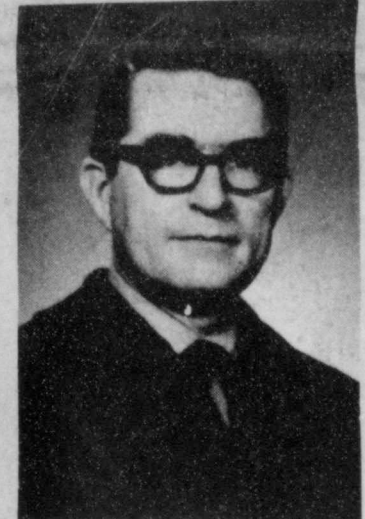
Kathy Tibbels, and Maxine Phillips will sing "You'll Never Walk Alone" followed by the presentation of awards by Neil Wright, principal.

This location will make an attractive place with ample parking room.

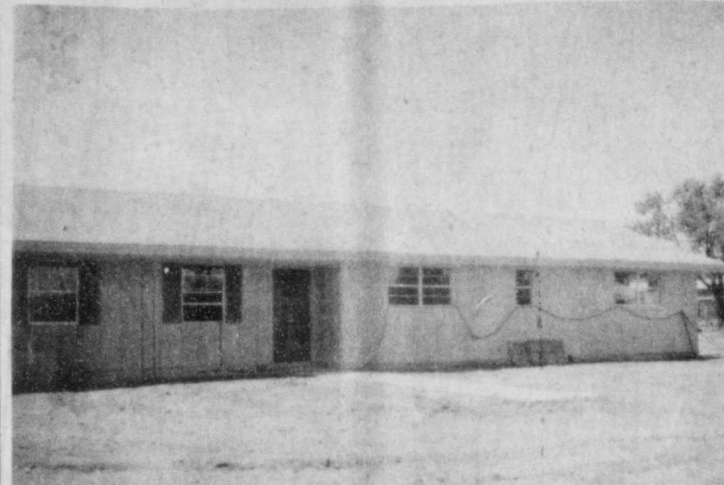

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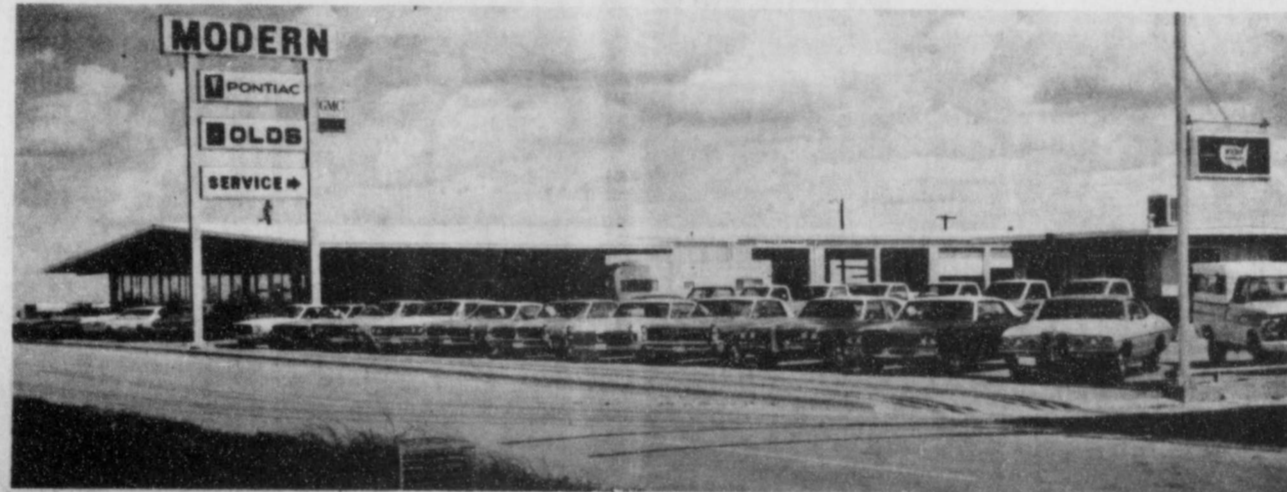

AGENT  
NEWS**

Though there have been many  
changes in practices and meth-  
ods over the 24-year period since  
the 7-Step Cotton Program was  
initiated by the Texas Agricul-  
tural Extension Service, its  
basic objectives are still very  
sound.  
Last year, Fred C. Elliott,  
Extension cotton specialist, said  
that more the 47,200 farmers  
used cotton in their balanced  
farming program and followed  
other recommendations outlined  
in production guides and plan-  
ned county programs.

Machines and chemicals con-  
tinue to be vitally important to  
growers in cost-cutting. Almost  
half of last year's acreage was  
treated with pre-emergence  
chemicals for weed and grass  
control. After the crop was up  
and growing, chemicals and  
mechanical equipment were  
used to keep weeds and grass  
under control; thus largely  
eliminating hand hoeing.

As harvest season approached,  
chemicals again were used as  
defolians or desiccants to ge-  
t fields in condition for mechan-  
ical harvesting. More than 51,000  
farmers used harvest-aid chemi-  
cals.

Then came the army of strip-  
pers and mechanical pickers to  
do the harvesting job. Anesti-  
mated 39,675 strippers were  
used to harvest 73 percent of  
the state's 1969 production  
while 5,762 mechanical pickers  
accounted for another 25 per-  
cent. Thus, 98 percent of last  
year's production was harvested  
with machines.

Elliott took a backwards look  
at what has happened to per  
acre cotton lint yields in Texas  
for the last 90 years. From 1880  
until the boll weevil hit in 1901,  
yields averaged over 200 pounds  
per acre. In 1901 it dropped to  
148 pounds and only twice from  
then until 1946, when the 7-  
Step Program started, did yearly  
averages exceed 200 pounds  
per acre.

The all-time record yield  
was posted in 1968 at 410 pounds  
per acre with a 408 average in  
1965. Over the last 20 years  
yields have trended upward.  
This period has seen the most  
rapid advances made in using  
research finding and demon-  
stration results.

The veteran cotton specialist  
credits many changes for the  
improved yield picture. Soil  
testing and fertilizer use, rota-  
tion systems, improved varie-  
ties, better cultural practices,  
more effective insect control  
programs, development of more  
effective chemicals for weed  
and grass control and larger  
and better machines and equip-  
ment to name a few. Irrigation  
has also been a heavy contribu-  
tor in many areas.

But it has been the cotton  
farmer's acceptance of the  
new ideas which have been of  
utmost importance. We're do-  
ing the production job a great  
deal differently from just a  
few years ago and the pace of  
change is not expected to slow  
much in the future.

Chlorosis is caused by the in-  
ability of plants to take up suf-  
ficient iron which is essential  
for the development of chloro-  
phyll, the green pigment in  
leaves.  
Primary causes of the disorder  
are high lime content of the  
soil and excessive use of phos-  
phate fertilizer.  
In addition to fruit trees, oak  
and maples, ornamentals such  
as roses, pyracantha, abelia,  
Hollies and photinia are also  
susceptible.

Regardless of the type of  
shrub or tree, chlorosis can be  
easily spotted. Leaves will  
yellow between the veins early  
in the growing season. Veins  
usually remain green but, in  
extreme cases, the entire leaf  
yellows and may be almost  
white in appearance.

Grass tends to turn yellow in  
spots and close observation may  
reveal a striping of the leaf with  
green veins and yellowing in-  
between. Chlorosis can be  
controlled by spraying the foli-  
age until wet with a solution  
of iron sulfate (copperas). For  
trees and shrubs, use one level  
tablespoon of copperas per two  
gallons of water and include  
about one and one-half tea-  
spoons of liquid household de-  
tergent to insure even cover-  
age. For grasses, increase the  
amount of copperas to three  
level tablespoons in the same  
in the same mixture. Three or  
four applications at weekly in-  
tervals may be required for  
effective control.

In addition to foliar spary,  
soil applications of copperas  
are also recommended for  
lawn grasses. One pound of  
copperas per 100 square feet  
of area broadcast and watered  
is adequate.

Chelated iron compounds  
are also effective for control-  
ling chlorosis when applied as  
directed by the manufacturer.  
Copperas will stain masonry  
and any other material or  
equipment if left in contact.  
Remove solutions by rinsing  
and sweep walks clean of dry  
material immediately after  
application.

Most of the problems en-  
countered by home gardeners  
in producing annual flowers,  
such as petunias or zinnias,  
can be coped with while the  
plants are young.

Watering is important. Small  
plants should be given adequate  
water during the first few weeks  
but the soil should not be wa-  
terlogged. Light watering en-  
courages shallow root systems  
while thorough watering pro-  
duces a deep root system which  
will help the plants to with-  
stand hot and dry summer weath-  
er.

Weeds should be eliminated  
since they crowd out annual  
flowers and also rob them of  
sunlight, water and soil nutri-  
ents.  
After the weeds are taken  
care of, we suggest a soil mulch  
of cotton burs, straw, sawdust  
or black plastic. Mulching will  
help keep weeds under control,  
the soil temperature lower and  
conserve soil moisture.

After annuals are growing,  
pinching off shoots and branch-  
es to give them the proper  
shape and to maintain long  
flowering becomes important.  
Some plants will not form side  
branches unless they are pinched.  
These include snapdragons, zin-  
nia, salvia (scarlet sage) and  
some varieties of petunias.

The top should be pinched so  
that at least three to four pairs  
of leaves remain on the shoot.  
Pinching may sacrifice a few  
early flowers, but flowering will  
be extended over a much longer  
period of time.

Good residue management is  
one of the better soil and water  
management practices leading  
to increased crop production.  
Residues plowed or disked in-  
to the soil help keep it open,  
thus allowing for good water  
infiltration and aeration.  
Farmers interested in provid-  
ing the necessary raw materials  
for residues should keep their  
land planted to close growing or  
high residue crops half to two-  
thirds of the time.  
Incorporation of residue into  
the soil provides an added bonus,  
in that it is an effective way to  
prevent the carryover of disease  
organisms. Cotton root rot, for  
example, can be substantially  
reduced by a combination of  
deep tillage and the incorpora-  
tion of large amounts of residue  
deep in the soil.  
Forty pounds of Nitrogen ap-  
plied when turning straw under  
will help decompose the resi-  
due and should increase yields  
the following year.

Twenty-one of our forty-two graduating seniors began their education in the Rotan School system. With our history of a class and a school, our future looks brighter.

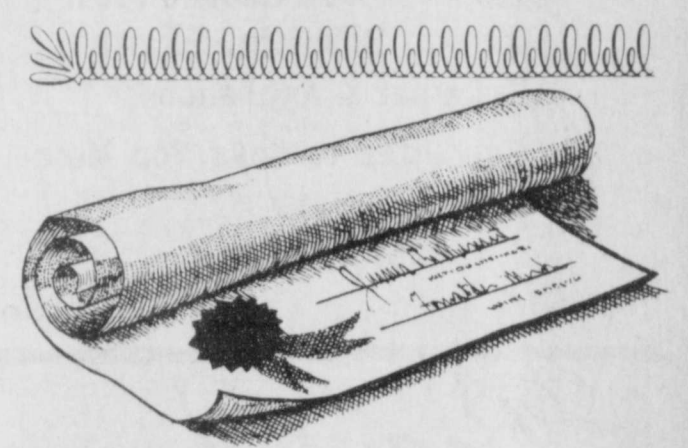
