Larry Taylor was born near San Antonio. As a lad of eleven or twelve years of age, Larry began associating with older boys and gradually drifted into their ways: Typical Juvenile Delinquent. Along with this he was learning all the illegal tricks with cards and dice and soon became a professional gambler with a natural knack for making money. Though just a teenager, he was BIG TIME!

During this time, because of his many underworld associates, Larry was introduced to narcotics. He became a "user" and finally a known police character.

This was the Larry Taylor before July 22, 1955. It was then he experienced the miraculous transformation that changed his storm-tossed life, to a joyous life for Christ. In a very short time he realized God was calling him to preach. He enrolled in a well known Bible school and then climaxed his education by attending Howard Payne Baptist College in Brownwood, Texas.

This well-dressed, handsome young man is today one of Southern Baptists' foremost and phenomenally successful evangelists. He is a colorful, brilliant young man, but has a wealth of background experience. His unusual success has skyrocketed him to prominence all across the Southland. His ability in leading young people to the "right path" is extraordinary. His dynamic, but sane constructive preaching has resulted in some of the largest and most fruitful revivals in Southern Baptist history. Over 15,000 have united with the churches during his brief ministry. He has conducted over 300 revival crusades.

He is in constant demand with speaking engagements taking him to high schools, colleges, civic clubs, radio and T. V. daily.

Larry makes his home in San Antonio where he resides with his wife and two sons.

Girls 8 to 12 will run Barrel Race, Pole Bending, Flag Race and Breakaway Roping.

Boys of the same age group will have Barrels, Pole Bending, Breakaway and Tie Down Roping.

Two Girls groups, 13-15 and 16-19 will run barrels, flags, poles and ribbon roping.

13-15 year boys will have Tie Down, Ribbons, Barrels and Bull Riding.

Boys 16-19 will run Tie Down, Ribbons, Bareback Riding and Bull Riding.

The Posse has arena and the stands in good condition for this year's production and with the current pleasant weather fans should have 3 nights of good entertainment.

In regular meetings the city council of Roby and the city council of Rotan agreed to a merger connecting the two towns together on a local telephone call basis. Bud McCasland, area manager for Southwestern Bell, said the connection could be completed within 18 to 24 months. He said the installation of equipment would be necessary in the Roby and Rotan offices and additional lines built between the two cities. He added this merger would mean a rate increase for local telephone service.

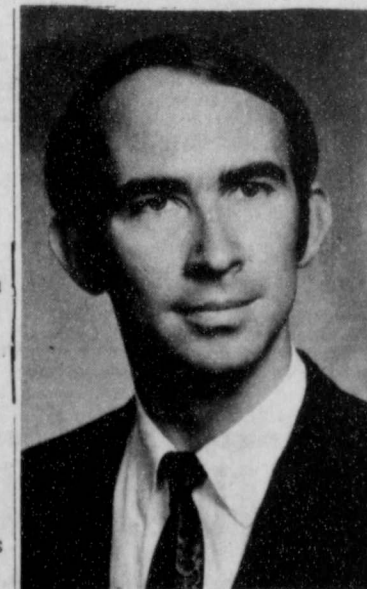
The residence telephone customers rate will be \$6.50 a month and the business customers monthly rate will be \$14.25. McCasland went on to say the new rates would go into effect when the equipment is installed and working.

This rate increase would be the first increase in telephone rates since 1959 for both cities. The connection of the cities will increase the calling scope to approximately 2100 customers.

McCasland added, extended area service connections is a coming thing for progress in West Texas towns. Several other communities in this area have already made similar mergers. This particular merger connecting the two largest cities in Fisher County demonstrates an interest for progress in Roby and Rotan.

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COUNTY AGENT NEWS

by Richard Spencer

Once again it is time for ranchers and others to guard against fire, the greatest hazard to rangeland during the hot summer months.

Good moisture during the spring has resulted in good vegetative growth in many areas of the state, and the high temperatures and summer dry period will result in optimum fire conditions.

Everyone has a stake in preventing range fires. The rancher depends upon the vegetation produced for livestock forage which ends up in the steaks, lamb chops, and other products which all Texans enjoy.

Fisher men and water enthusiasts want clear lakes for fishing or other forms of recreation. However, fire denuded rangeland leads to soil erosion when the rains come, resulting in silt-filled muddy lakes.

The forage produced on rangeland provides cover and food for wildlife, too. A wild fire can reduce the hunter's opportunity for plentiful and well-fed game.

There are solutions to prevention of fire. The motorist can make sure all cigarettes are put out and placed in the ash tray instead of thrown out the window; recreationists can be careful with camp fires; landowners can build fire guards, have sprayers and other fire fighting equipment in good repair and readily available and local governments can have up-to-date workable plans for fighting fires.

Everyone has a part in preventing range fires and all will suffer from such fires. Everyone should do their part of help prevent range fires.

Cut hay while it is young and tender. Young plants are palatable and highly digestible, but become tough and stemmy when they approach maturity.

These suggestions are offered on timing of the hay harvest. For sudan, sudan-sorghum hybrids, johnsongrass, native grasses and similar plants, cut them in the boot stage or just before the seedheads emerge.

Coastal bermudagrass should be cut after no more than 4 weeks of growth.

Most spring hay crops contain high amounts of moisture when cut at the preferred stage. Too, the weather is often rainy, cloudy and cool and the ground moist; thus creating curing problems.

There isn't much you can do about the weather but something can be done about maintaining the quality of the hay. The use of hay conditioners reduce curing time by as much as one-half; thus, the crop can usually be cut and cured at the right time with little or no rain damage.

The county agent says that fertilizer should be applied after each cutting, especially nitrogen. If the production from the first cutting is fairly high, phosphorus and potassium may also be needed.

Hay producers should take soil samples before harvesting so that fertilizer recommendations will be available for the application immediately after the harvest.

More efficient methods of

fertilizer production, transportation, storage and handling must be found in order to eliminate possible fertilizer price increases.

In most geographical regions of Texas, cropping is such that most of the fertilizer is applied during a short period. Hence with rate per acre increases and a more general use of fertilizer, the capacity of the fertilizer to supply the farmer's fertilizer when he wants it is becoming more difficult and expensive each year.

The costs of transporting, storing and handling fertilizer is a significant portion of the retail price; farmers have become dependent on plant nutrients supplied in fertilizers to maintain crop production at economical levels.

Farmers have also become accustomed to purchasing fertilizer when convenient and at low prices. Since the annual use of fertilizers in Texas is over two million tons, with a considerably higher potential, everyone concerned with agriculture needs to give consideration to methods of getting fertilizer to the farm at a fair price to the farmer, but also one that will return a profit to the industry.

In the future, farmers who wait for their fertilizer at the end of the row may pay for this convenience. There are problems to be solved, including the development of fertilizer storage facilities suitable for other uses part of the year, and the problem of finding people who can, and are willing, to finance local storage.

The profit sapped manufacturer may be less interested than in the past.

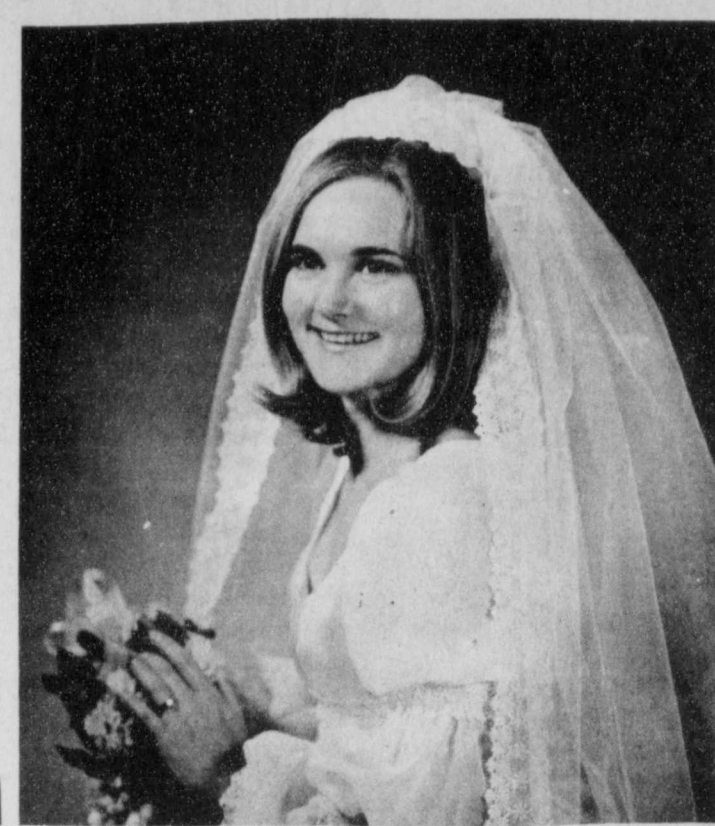
Changes in the present system are needed. The B.A.G. Systems of Dallas have used a polyester and nylon bag, which is coated inside and out with polyvinyl chloride resins, that is moisture and chemical resistant.

The reusable bag holds up to 3,300 pounds and can be handled with a fork-lift truck. This might be a new concept for farm or field storage in order to spread the use of manufacturing and transporting equipment over longer periods of time.

What does the future hold? This can only be speculation, but the fertilizer industry will make many changes.

Accent on Health

J. E. PEAVY, M.D., Commissioner of Health

Are you one of the approximately two million people in the United States who have diabetes and don't know it?

The answer to this question can be of utmost importance to you and your family, says the Texas State Department of Health.

There are approximately four million diabetics in the United States, but only about half know they have the disease and are doing something about it. Medical science is helping them in their efforts to continue as near normal lives as possible.

But what about the some two million unknown cases—those persons who have the disease and are unaware of it?

In Texas the State Health Department is promoting a state-wide testing program through local health departments in an effort to discover hidden cases. And the testing program is getting results. Migrant health projects also are cooperating.

In May, for example, the State Health Department Laboratories in Austin made 1,667 tests and found that 329 persons needed further study. So far this year—through May—blood samples from almost 9,100 persons have been checked for diabetes by the lab. Other laboratories operated by the state

also make diabetes tests. One further statistic shows that during the past nine months of the current fiscal year the diabetes program has resulted in tests for just under 14,000 persons, with almost 2,700 requiring further blood testing based on preliminary tests.

The testing program falls under the Chronic Disease Division, directed by Dr. Howard E. Smith. Objectives of the division, encompassing diabetes, is to "reduce the mortality, morbidity, discomfort and disability from these diseases in our state."

In searching for possible diabetics, the Health Department doesn't use a scatter-gun approach since it has limited personnel to aid in detection.

Experience has shown that certain types of persons are more likely to have diabetes. They may be: 45 years of age or older; close blood relatives of known diabetics, especially those in the older age brackets; obese persons; and the parents of a baby who was large at birth (nine pounds or more).

The Health Department is making diabetes screening a part of its regular services to the people of the state. If a diabetic is found, then close relatives of the victim are screened for the disease.

As It Looks From Here

A promise is hereby made that at some time or other something more cheerful will be written. It is not by choice to deal with the unpleasant and unpalatable but, at the moment, there seems to be no broad choice.

For instance, while our interest is more or less zeroed in on Southeast Asia, and while there is a build-up of concern for happenings in the Middle East, we may fail to have our attention drawn to things even closer home.

One of these concerns is Russia's build-up of military potential in Cuba. There is good reason to believe that the Soviets are playing the venture into Cambodia and other areas in Southeast Asia at a low key and for good reason. In the meantime, Russia appears to be shifting from a defensive role to one of an offensive character in Cuba.

It is reported that three Soviet bombers capable of carrying nuclear bombs for a distance of 8,000 miles are now stationed in Cuba.

From observations, military flights from the big Soviet naval base in Murmansk are bringing submarine replacement crews to Cuba where they board Russian submarines, which are known to cruise off our shores.

Reports of nuclear missiles in Cuba in 1962 were delayed for a considerable period of time which made the late show-down most serious. This appears to be the case at this time.

Perhaps the Russians think that internal dissent in the United States has weakened us to a point that we will not react to a shift in nuclear deployment and that a nuclear presence in Cuba, and in the Caribbean generally, will be ignored. This is one of the great dangers of the "dissent" which we have in our Nation.

It is, of course, publicly known that the Kremlin has recently sent into the Caribbean Sea a naval task force believed to include missile bearing cruisers and destroyers. When this was officially known, and it was, the Administration should have taken the issue up publicly and forced out into the open that which has seemingly been ignored. This has been an invitation for the Russians to continue to probe for a strengthening of their position as close to the Western Hemisphere as possible. The official attitude seems to be to "play it cool" nearer to home than on the other side of the World.

It was while we were absorbed in controversy at home and elsewhere that the Soviets first sent naval units to within only 90 miles from our own shores. There has been no direct repercussions which are perceptible.

Whatever the reasoning behind it, it is pretty obvious that Russia's military is taking advantage of extending her forces in almost vital strategic position.

When it has been necessary for the United States to act in a confrontation with Russia, nothing has happened. It may not always be so but there are always certain risks to take. Imagine their reaction if we deployed nuclear carrying weapons into the Black Sea or Barents and Okhotsk Seas.

Those who see nothing but good intentions on the part of the Soviet Union, reason that with their capability of launching and attack from their own soil, there should be no fear from near-by weapons. The question should follow such reasonings as to why they are expanding a force so near our Country. Sooner or later we could be placed under blackmail.

Tax Man Sam Sez'

The Tax Reform Act of 1969 is helping thousands of Texas students save time and trouble on filing an income tax return this year. This summer students who will not owe any income tax for the year can fill out the new Withholding Exemption Certificate, Form W-4E. This authorizes their employer to stop withholding tax and they won't have to file an income tax return next January 1 to get their money back. The same rule applies to some retired persons and part-time workers. For 1970, a single person who makes less than \$1,725 owes no tax. This is based on the \$1,100 low income allowance and a personal exemption of \$625. A taxpayer over 65 can earn wages up to \$2,350 without incurring a tax liability. If you qualify, talk to your payroll office, but you will not ordinarily qualify if you are married, due to the community property law in Texas.

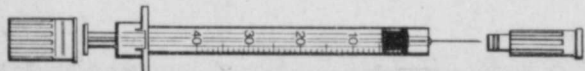
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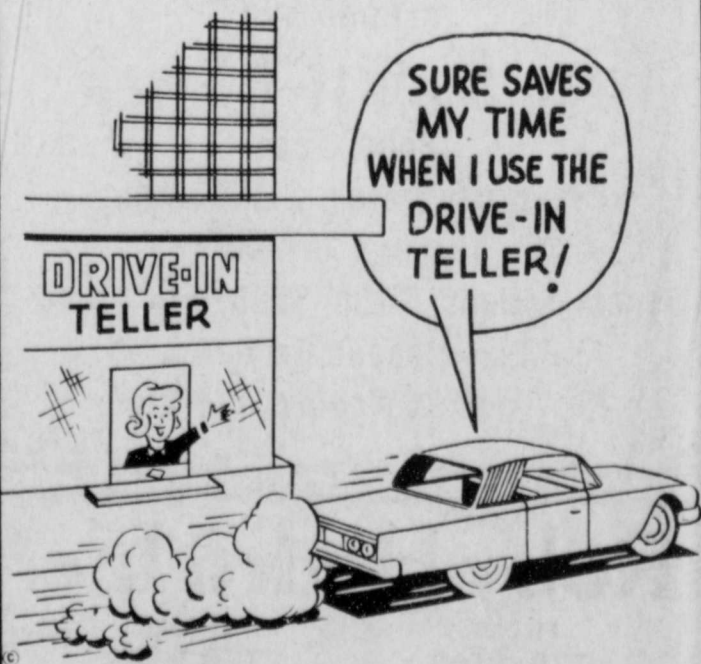
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To Observe 50th Anniversary

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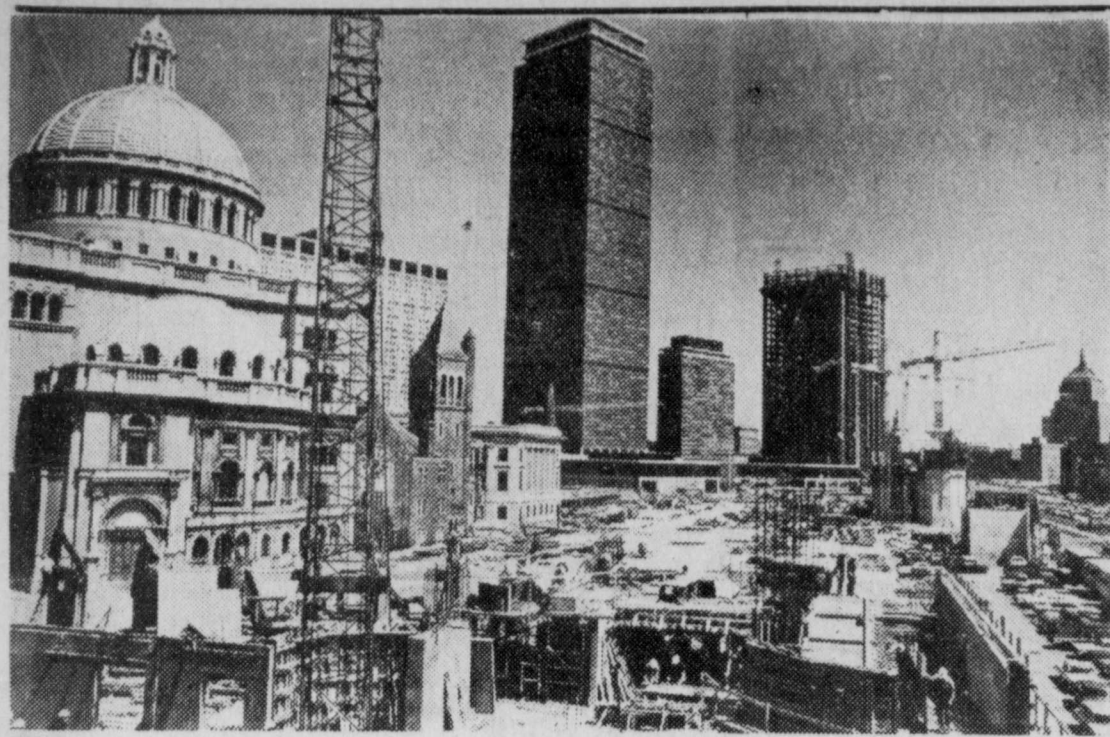

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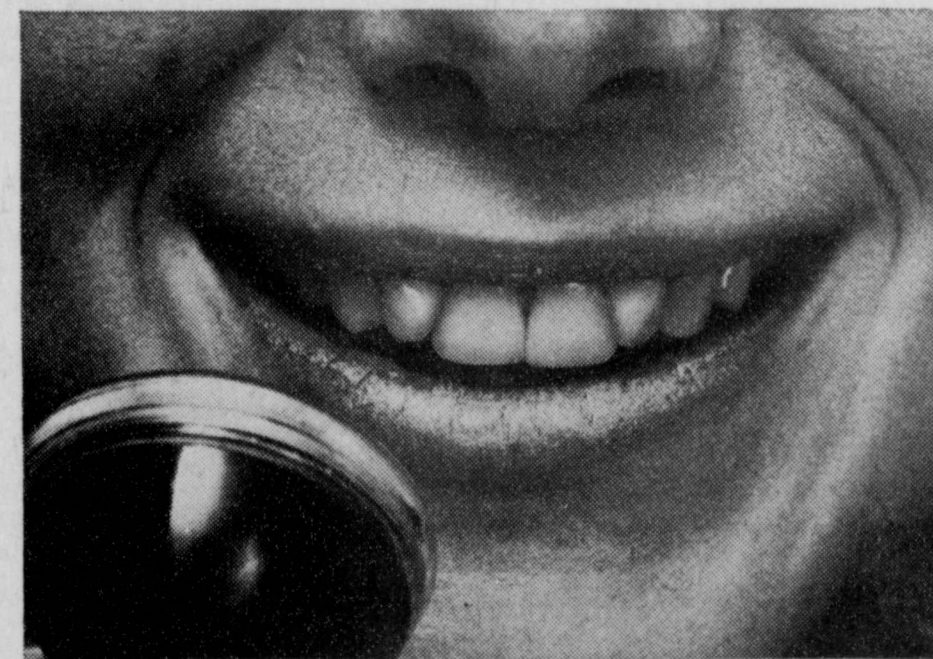

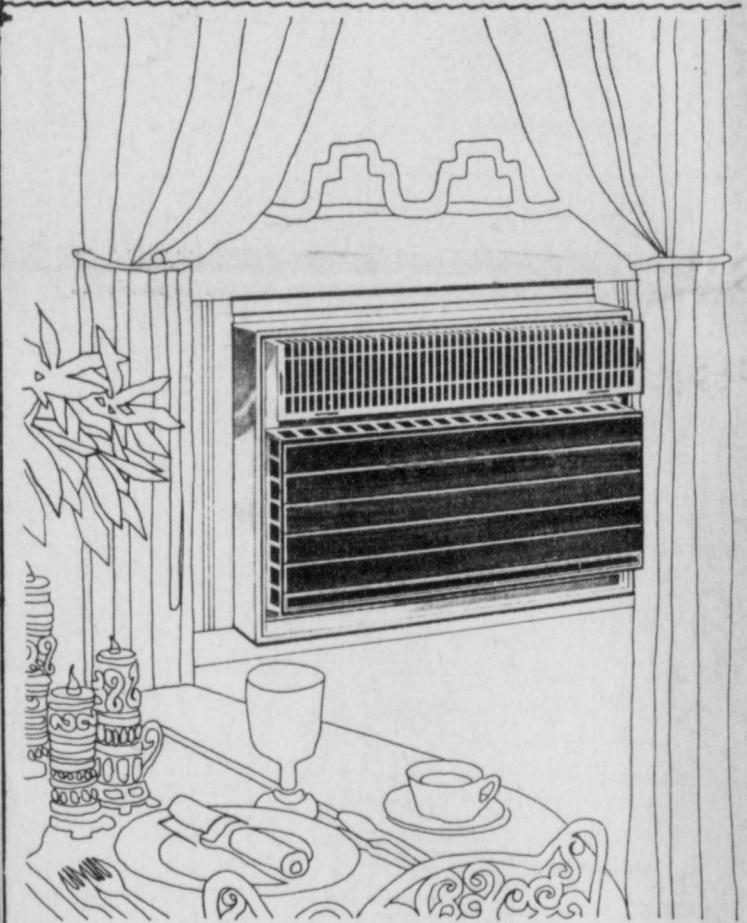
