Tax Refunds Yet To Come

A record number of North Texas taxpayers received an income tax refund upon filing their 1969 income tax return. Most taxpayers are required to file an income tax return between January 1 and April 15. Although all the returns have not been processed and all the refunds have not been issued for the 1969 tax year, 1,095,428 refund checks amounting to \$223,454,916.33 have been issued to North Texas taxpayers. This record number and amount of refunds were mailed out after processing 1,554,614 returns.

School For Adult Drivers-Hamlin

The Texas Department of Public Safety in cooperation with the Hamlin Police Department and Sheriff's Department of Jones County announced that an Adult Driver Training School will be conducted in Hamlin beginning July 13th at 7:00 PM to 10:00 PM, July 13, 14, 15, and 16. Location of the School will be Hamlin High School in Hamlin. If registration justify, there will be two classes, one in English and one in Spanish, limited to 65 in each class.

Major E. K. Browning, Jr., Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety states that in cooperation with Sheriff Woodrow Simmons of Jones County and Bryan Wasson, Chief of Police of the Hamlin Police Department, this assistance is being provided in order to assist unlicensed drivers 18 years of age or older who need more knowledge and skill to qualify for a Texas Drivers License. He also states that there will be no charge for this service.

Persons interested in attending this school are expected to register at the Drivers License Office in Hamlin, Roby, Rotan, Stamford, and Anson on regular scheduled Driver License days, prior to entering one of the classes. Persons registering

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Continuous production of high yielding, quality forage dictates that careful attention be given to the maintenance of a bountiful supply of nitrogen throughout the growing season.

Production of top quality forage for grazing, hay or silage requires that the plants have access to adequate supplies of all the essential plant nutrients and the plant nutrient used in the largest quantity by forage crops is nitrogen.

Each ton of air dried forage, testing 12.5% crude protein, contains 40 pounds of nitrogen. This 40 pounds can come from a number of different sources such as decomposition of organic matter, carryover or residual from previous fertilization or from the current fertilizer application.

Generally speaking, at least 60 pounds of nitrogen are required for each acre harvested. This means that additional nitrogen must be added immediately following each harvest or grazing period since most soils are low in this nutrient.

The ultimate source of all nitrogen used by plants is nitrogen gas, the inert gas that comprises about 78% of the earth's atmosphere. However, only properly inoculated legumes are capable of utilizing this elemental gas, which totals about 35,000 tons above each acre of the earth's surface.

Plants use nitrogen as nitrate or ammonium. All inorganic nitrogen sources, regardless of original form, are rapidly converted into the nitrate form when incorporated into soils that have the pH, temperature, and moisture conditions favorable for nitrification.

For this reason, nitrogen sources are usually about equal in agronomic response when "mixed into" the soil just prior to the period when used by the crop. This holds true for all sources, as well as for solids, liquids or gasses. Solids or liquids put on the surface and carried into the soil by irrigation water or rain give similar results.

Nitrogen recovery, under field conditions by the crop to which it is applied will vary from about 50% to 75% with the average for Texas being between 60% and 70%.

When considering nitrogen sources for surface application consideration should be given to the nitrogen source. Evidence from research work indicates that urea, solid or in solution, is less effective than ammonium sulfate, which in turn is slightly less effective than ammonium nitrate, because of volatilization losses which may occur when pH, moisture, temperature and air movement are critical.

All nitrogen fertilizers should be incorporated into the soil, however, when incorporation is not feasible, care in matching the nitrogen source to conditions that minimize volatilization losses is necessary.

Troubled with ants in the home, garden or lawn? If they are a problem, first try to find their nests and then apply a recommended insecticide. By watching the movement of the ants, the nests can often

be located and it may be inside the house or just outside close to an opening that permits entry to inside. The different species of ants have different nesting habits. Sometimes ants in the home must be controlled without finding their nest.

Chlordane is an effective insecticide. It will quickly kill ants in current infestations and will prevent reinfestations for weeks or months.

It may be used as a spray, dust or granules. A spray is usually preferable in the home. It is easy to apply and is safe to use when label instructions are followed.

To prevent ants from entering the house, apply a 2-percent chlordane spray to the outside walls, from the ground to the windows and to the lower part of the window frames and round doors. Treating a band around the house will also give added protection.

Several other insecticides, diazinon, dieldrin, lindane and malathion can also be used for ant control. They are available as ready to use sprays or as wettable powders or emulsifiable concentrates for mixing with water to make a spray.

Regardless of the insecticide used, use cautions that contain label instructions should be read and followed closely when applications are being made. Storage of the material should also be in a place of safety and out of reach of small children and pets.

Accent on Health

J. E. PEAVY, M.D., Commissioner of Health

In the past, most people have gotten their first impression of the dentist and the need for dental care when a trip to the dentist's office became necessary to treat a disease of the teeth or gums. That first impression may soon be changed for hundreds of children through the utilization of a new service now being planned by the Dental Health Division of the Texas State Department of Health.

Dr. Carlos Lozano hopes to have two state-financed mobile dental health clinic trailers in operation by the beginning of the school year—one designed as a prevention unit for use by the state and the other as a dental care unit for the City of Houston. The trailers are designed to be primarily used for the benefit of children and for indigent patients. Dr. Lozano feels that prevention is increasingly becoming an important function of the dentist, and more effort will have to be generated in that area.

One of the state-financed trailers, now in the planning stage, will go to the City of Houston for work in conjunction with their Model Cities program. The Houston trailer will be a treatment facility to be located in indigent neighborhoods. This trailer, 12 feet wide by 60 feet long, will be fully equip-

ped with the latest and most modern dental health equipment. It will have two regular size dental chairs and one dental hygiene chair for children. This facility will be for the treatment of adults and well as children. It will also include x-ray equipment, a pedodontic chair, private conference and health education rooms, and a small dental laboratory. This mobile facility will require one full-time dentist, seven part-time dentists to assist in the operations of the clinic, one dental hygienist, and three assistants.

The other mobile clinic now on the drawing board will be used primarily as a prevention unit to work with local school districts to demonstrate oral hygiene and self-care methods to the children. This problem has been much neglected in the past. Dr. Lozano says that most children are not taught by their parents how to properly take care of their teeth, and the proper care techniques have not received adequate attention in the schools. This prevention unit will be used primarily on school grounds. It will be put into service in Region 7 of the State Health Department in East Texas, with headquarters in Tyler.

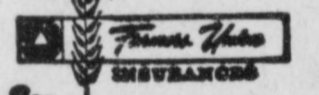

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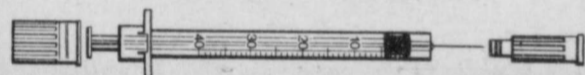

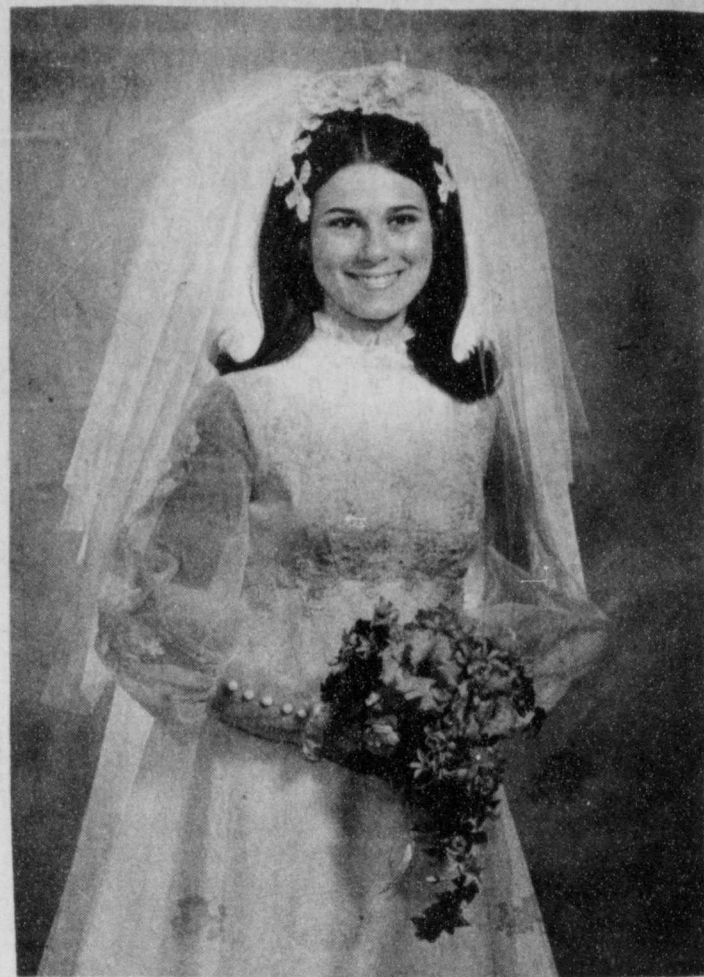

Food for Thought

Know what is often called the "caviar" of vegetables? Or which vegetable is the most versatile of all? Or which one is grown in darkness yet is highly nutritious?

Of course you guessed mushrooms, but you may not agree that they are a vegetable. Botanists say they're a fungus. But then, they also say that tomatoes are fruits, and most homemakers don't think of them as such.

Mushrooms are a delight for many reasons. They're inexpensive, low in calories—only 66 calories to a whole pound—and high in food value. The U.S. Department of Agriculture lists mushrooms in its basic food groups since they're relatively high in phosphorus, rich in riboflavin, niacin, calcium, other B Vitamins, iron and copper.

For some 20 centuries men have looked upon these tiny umbrellas as a gastronomical delight and a botanical mystery. As early as 300 B.C. the historian Theophrastus wrote about Greeks feasting on mushrooms.

The Romans, too, were mad for mushrooms. So much so that in Rome they became a symbol of luxury, and were cooked in a special set of utensils designed just for them. The utensils were called botatoria, and were never used for any "lesser food."

Apparently the first cultivated mushrooms appeared about 400 years ago in limestone caves outside of Paris.

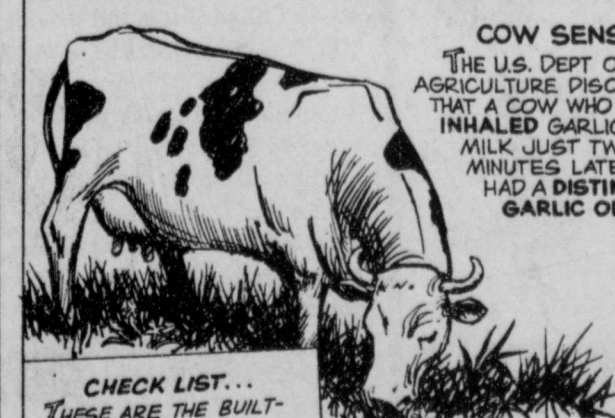

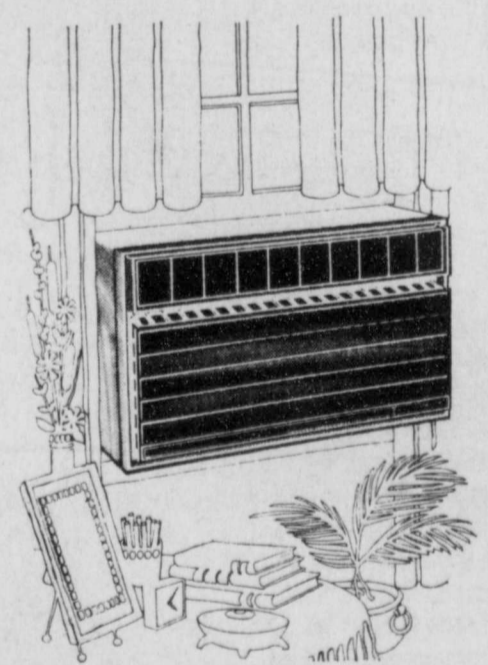
