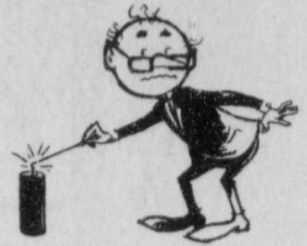

Many Farmers To Receive Program Payments Early

Farmers who have contributed to stabilizing markets for food and fiber and to the conservation of soil and water resources by taking part in the 1970 wheat, feed grain, and cotton program are receiving their program payments earlier this year than ever before, according to J. W. Landers, Chairman of the Fisher County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The first batch of payments were made beginning July 1, 1970. Additional payments will continue to be made as rapidly as farmers certify compliance with program requirements and as fast as individual farm records can be processed and checks returned to ASCS county offices for distribution to farmers.

Because of the excellent cooperation between farmers and their local ASCS office, 60% of the participating producers in Fisher County will receive their payments on or

about July 1st. Most payments should be completed by mid-August, if farmers who signed up will complete the necessary certification indicating that they have complied with all of the program provisions.

Farm program payments help maintain a balance between supply and demand, the Chairman explained. He pointed out that both farmers and consumers benefit from this balance.

Agricultural productivity almost doubled in the past 20 years, but farmers' markets take only about a third of this increase. This means we need new markets. Farm programs help us hold down farm production and maintain farm income until new markets are developed and old ones expanded.

Hugh surpluses must be avoided. They are costly in tax dollars and are wasteful of food and fiber.

Farm programs help farmers

make adjustments in their individual farming operations that in the long run will result in more farm income from the marketplace and less from the public treasury.

Since farmers are \$50-billion-a-year purchasers of goods and services produced in our cities and rural towns, the workers and business firms in cities and towns benefit from farm programs, too.

Farm programs also make important contributions to conservation of natural resources and help fight pollution. Acres that are diverted out of crop production under farm programs are put to conserving uses such as the growing of grass and trees. Such practices conserve soil and water, provide habitat for wildlife and small game, help prevent pollution of our streams from sediment and agricultural chemicals or waste products, and reduce air pollution caused by blowing dust, the Chairman explained.

When a farmer takes land out of production and puts it to a soil-and-water-conserving use, he gives up the value of the production he normally would have received as income. At the same time, the farmer pays taxes on land removed from production even though that land produces no crops. Program payments are designed to compensate him for these voluntary contributions toward a more stable farm economy and a better environment.

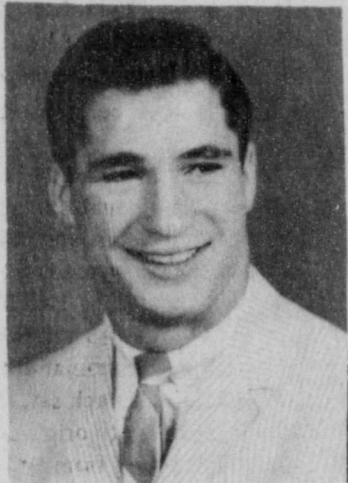

Brother of Roby Lady Hero in Bomb Scare



The following article recently appeared in the Sunday Missoulian, in regard to Tom Whiddon who is brother of Mrs. Roland Ray, Jr. of Roby. He is health and physical education instructor at University of Montana. He deserves much credit for bravery shown in 'disarming' the bomb, which proved to be a fake, but the men didn't know whether or not it would explode and blow them and the gym to small pieces.

FAKE BOMB FOUND AT U; THREE HELD
Three persons were arrested by city police late Wednesday night and were being held pending filing of charges after an apparently fake time bomb was found near the University of Montana Men's Gym, site of UM ROTC offices.

The "bomb", consisting of a clock, battery and three hollow red tubes all attached with wires, was placed in a small cardboard box on the south side of the gym. The bottom of the box was marked "This Bomb Is Phoney" and "Darby Liberation Front."

Identification of the three was being withheld by officials late Wednesday night.

Harold Bauman, custodian at the gym, said that at about 10:15 p. m. he was looking out a gym window and was a white panel truck pull up to the area and turn around so it was adjacent to the building. One man got out of the truck with a white shoe box, Bauman said. "He came up and placed it right under my nose right under the window," the custodian said. He added that because of the darkness, he could not identify the person.

George W. Cross, assistant dean of students and professor of health and physical education, had just left the building and was in his car in the adjacent parking lot and witnessed the panel truck in the area. He, Bauman and Tom Whiddon, a health and physical education instructor, approached the box and Whiddon knocked the top off with a broom handle. When the three saw what appeared to be a time bomb, Bauman got buckets of water and doused the box; Whiddon and Cross dismantled with apparatus by knocking battery wires off and dismantling the clock with the broom handle.

The clock reportedly showed about a minute to midnight and the alarm was set to go off at midnight.

Bauman said that after the three had dismantled the apparatus and campus and city police were on the scene, a white panel truck again returned to the area from the University Center vicinity. At that point, police arrested the three occupants of the vehicle.

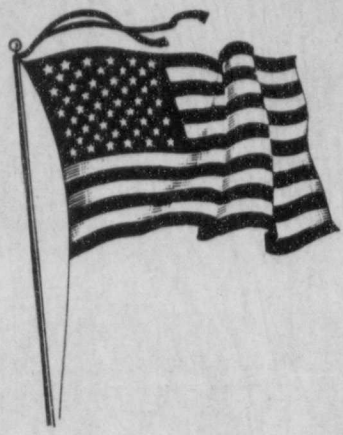

SS Requires Birth Certificates

Concerned about proving your age when you file for social security benefits? Wayne Baker social security field representative for Fisher County says this is a problem for many people. "Of course, with a birth or baptismal certificate recorded at or within 5 years of your birth, you have no problem as that's all you'll need," he added.

In the absence of a birth or baptismal certificate, other evidence must be used. Some good documents are an early school record, family Bible, or school or Federal census record.

Baker said if you do not have any of those documents, you can submit a combination of several proofs. These include your delayed birth certificate, one or more insurance policies, a child's birth certificate which shows your age at the time of the child's birth, driver's license, military record, or voting

registration or an old poll tax receipt.

According to Baker, you should obtain your proofs in advance of retirement to avoid a delay in your first social security check.

The Social Security Administration recognizes the occasional difficulty in obtaining adequate proof of age, and will help you as necessary.

Check the social security travel schedule at the post office and see Baker if you need such help.

**As It Looks
From Here**

In writing about the Secret Service last week, it was indicated the subject this week would be counterfeit money. The Secret Service, which has the responsibility of coping with counterfeiting, has a big job.

Counterfeiting is one of the oldest games in history and is today on the rise. One reason is the fact that large quantities can be produced by improvements in photography and printing equipment. The Secret Service says that the counterfeiter, unlike earlier times, need not be a master craftsman. Amateurs, working in legitimate print shops, have been able to produce passable currency.

Although our bills are produced from plates made by the finest engravers in the world, counterfeiters are able to fool the unsuspecting. The Treasury Department is now studying ways to make it even more difficult to copy our currency.

Counterfeiters usually stick to producing bills of \$10 and \$20 denominations although \$1 to \$50 bills have been in circulation.

The producer of bogus bills usually sells them to a dealer for 10¢ or 15¢ on the dollar. The dealer then sells them to a distributor for another reduction and finally to the passer who pays from 25¢ to 35¢ on the dollar, depending on the quality. These people are expert and the appearance of genuineness reduces the risk of being caught. The risk is great and counterfeiters are finally apprehended but not before a lot of people have been their victims. It is a very difficult task but the Secret Service is doggedly expert in its work.

The passer or "shover", as they are referred to, practices certain procedures to avoid detection. Large stores are usually passed up mainly because currency goes to a cashier and there is a waiting period to receive change. If the cashier is suspicious, the police may have been called in the meantime. The passer is constantly on the move.

People are cheated before the Secret Service learns of the spurious money. By careful observation, most anyone can tell good money from bad. A belief has been common that rubbing a bill on white paper is a test of its genuineness. This is not the case since ink on both good and bad will rub off.

A few pointers are helpful in identifying counterfeit bills. It is important to examine the portrait. The portrait is most intricate and an example of the

fine art of engraving. Counterfeiters have never been able to exactly duplicate the picture. The fine screen of regular lines forming the background in genuine currency usually becomes broken and ragged on counterfeit. This is particularly true of the eyes. On the genuine currency they stand out, almost sparkling. They are clear and on a clean background. The counterfeit blends into a sort of a smudgy background and will likely be too light or too dark.

Another point is that the portrait distinguishes the bill's denomination. Some counterfeiters raise the denomination by scraping off the number on small bills and replacing a higher one. The denomination and the portrait always to together from the portrait of George Washington on the \$1 to that of Chase on the \$10,000 bill. This leaves nine in between and presents a pretty good game to be able to name the denomination which goes with the picture.

The seal on the bill it tell-tale, if examined carefully. On good currency the saw-tooth points around the circle are identical and sharp at the tips. Fake notes are likely to be irregular and broken.

Color is important. Federal Reserve Notes have a green seal and serial number while United States notes have a red seal. Should colors of the seal and serial number differ, it is an imitation. Unevenly spaced serial numbers should be a warning.

Counterfeiters have a difficult time in imitating the blue, silk threads imbedded below the surface in genuine bills. More often the threads in counterfeit are more coarse and the color not true. Some manage to imitate these threads with pen and ink lines but they are detectable on close examination.

The thickness of currency is often a sign of good or bad money.

To be profitable, large batches of bogus money must be produced. Swindlers smuggling counterfeit out of the United States to people in foreign countries run a double risk but it has been done. Right now Ireland is experiencing a wave of fake U. S. bills. Since American money is acceptable most any place around the world, foreigners are likely to be easier prey but Americans, somewhere, are swindled about every day.

**All Savings Bonds
Draw Interest**

"All outstanding E Bonds are still drawing interest regardless of age - none has reached final maturity," Rex Brack, Senior Vice President, Braniff International, and volunteer state chairman, said today.

Brack made the statement because of wide public misunderstanding of terms and conditions of U. S. Savings Bonds.

"E Bonds now being issued have a maturity of 5 years, 10 months, with an automatic 10 year extension," Brack said. Older E Bonds - with original maturities ranging from 7 to 10 years - have been granted one or more 10 year extensions so no E Bond has reached 'final' maturity and they continue to earn interest.

Brack said the current rate is 5 percent, if held to maturity. Yield is 4.01 percent the first year; thereafter, 5.20 percent to maturity. 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COUNTY AGENT NEWS

By Richard Spencer

What resources are needed for full employment in an agricultural enterprise and what are the returns?

Farmers continually ask county agents these questions. Equipment, livestock units, land requirements, feed resources and similar items are the bundle of resources considered in developing income and expenses for an enterprise and the basis for borrowing finances.

As land, farm equipment, livestock and various input items increase in price, it becomes more important to estimate the resources needed for certain levels of return and full employment.

If you are looking for full employment in beef cow-calf operation it will take 300 mother cows. An estimated return to labor-management of \$5,703 should be realized on 24 cent calves and an estimated return of \$13,383 on calves sold at \$30 a hundred weight.

With 300 mother cows, 2,500 hours of labor and a \$164,250 average annual investment are required. The annual fixed expenses are estimated at \$14,462 and the annual operating expenses are approximately \$15,985.

This may be improved by including a stocker or conditioning program or by a pasture-forage fertilization program.

If you see a triangle of fluorescent orange and reflective red ahead on the highway, it means slow down and drive carefully, it's the Slow Moving Vehicle emblem and was placed on the machine as a warning to motorists to slow down.

The emblem was developed by agricultural engineers to warn drivers when they are approaching a slow-moving vehicle. The emblem can be seen and recognized up to 500 feet away at any time of the day and under almost all driving conditions.

Many accidents are caused simply because the motorist often does not realize that the object ahead is moving so slowly until it is too late to avoid a collision. If the emblem is in place, and is duly noted, there is time to slow down or even stop.

The center of the emblem is fluorescent yellow-orange, the most visible color in daylight, and the outside border is reflective to show up at night. The emblem is intended for use on vehicles designed to travel 25 mph or less and can be easily mounted on most farm equipment.

Truck Drivers To Aid Holiday Drivers Over 4th

Trained truck and bus industry safety men will take to the roads July 4th to participate in a unique Holiday Road Patrol.

The Texas program is being sponsored by the Texas Motor Transportation Association and its Council of Safety Supervisors, a state-wide organization representing the motor carrier industry.

Jack C. Bryan, Director of Safety for the Texas Motor Transportation Association of Austin said about 45 to 50 road patrol cars will be on the most heavily traveled highways of the state during the holiday weekend. The cars will be manned by experienced members of the Texas Council of Safety Supervisors who will be particularly alert for motorists in trouble.

The Holiday Patrol vehicles will be equipped with tools, spare fuses, warning flags, first-aid equipment and gasoline safety containers. In addition, many of the cars are radio equipped to allow the drive to summon repair equipment or additional help.

"While these men will not have arrest powers," Bryan emphasized, "we will cooperate with the State Highway Patrol in every way possible."

Governor Preston Smith and Col. Wilson Speir commended the Texas truck and bus group for its cooperation and said:

"We welcome the added assistance from the safety men of the truck and bus industry. Their wide experience on the roads and their record of assistance to motorists will aid substantially during this period of high density traffic."

The industry spokesman pointed out that truck traffic is expected to be light on the highways over the holiday, since most firms restrict movements to only essential shipments. The Holiday Road Patrol will closely observe these drivers as they do during their normal year around road patrol operation to assure courteous and safe operation of the trucks.

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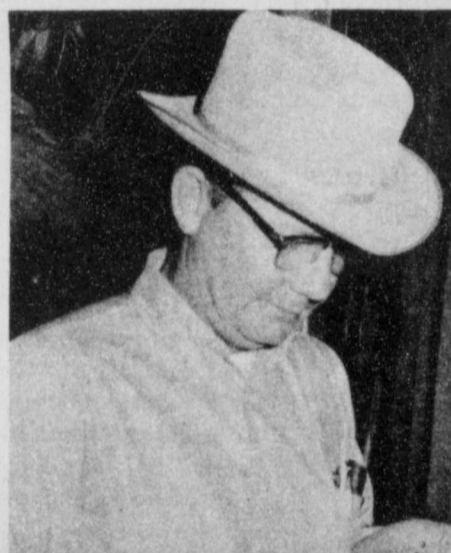
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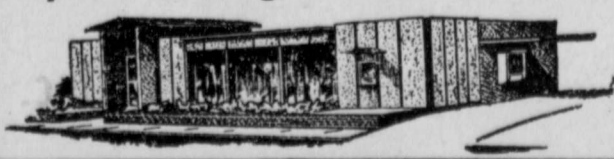

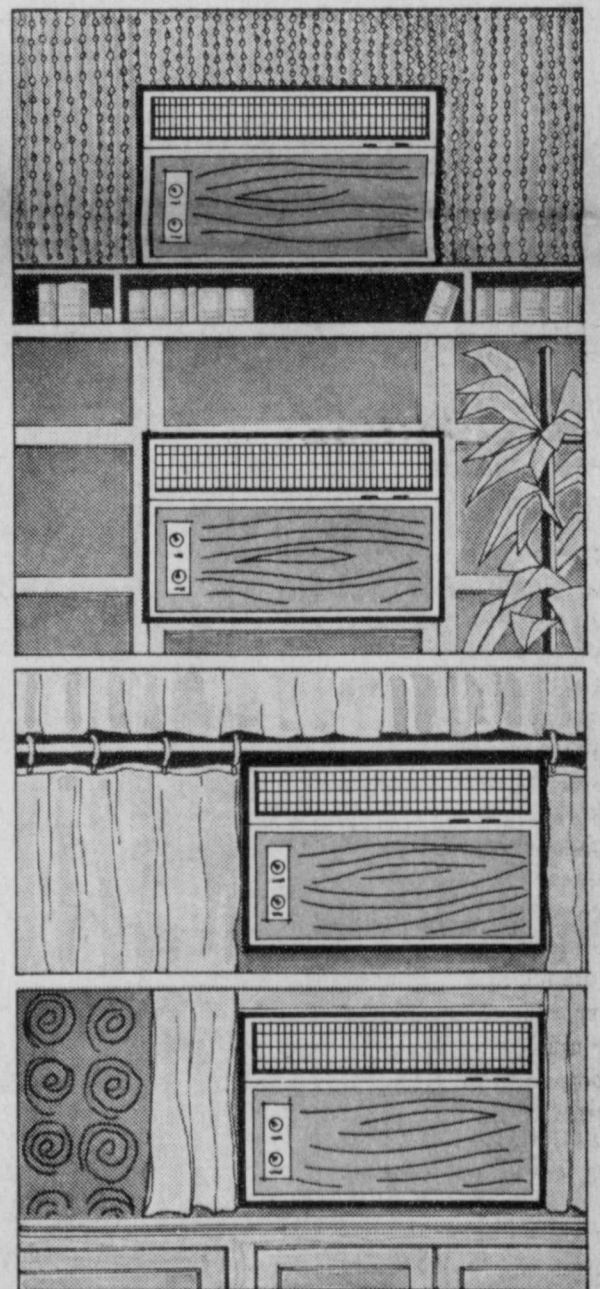
