

Posse First In Stamford Parade


Fisher County Sheriff Posse took 1st place in Riding Club contest at opening parade of Texas Cowboy Reunion at Stamford last Thursday.



The United States has no business, and it would in fact be dangerous to our freedom, to enter agreement whereby any United States citizen could be tried in the Country where alleged acts. under the Treaty were committed and punished under the laws of that Country. In theory, a United States citizen could be convicted of a crime without definition, under rules and procedures of foreign courts and liable to punishments not yet named. Already some of our men in Vietnam are being charged with atrocities against civilians Conceivably, since no statute of limitations is involved in the Treaty, our men in Vietnam might be charged and tried at some future date for acts taken in the lawful prosecution of the war against the communists. One of the obligations which parties to the Treaty assume is to pass ligislation outlawing and punishing the crime of genocide. Should the Congress decline, it is supposed that any one of the 74 Nations could charge us as a Nation before the International Court of Justice. In such instance, our whole




