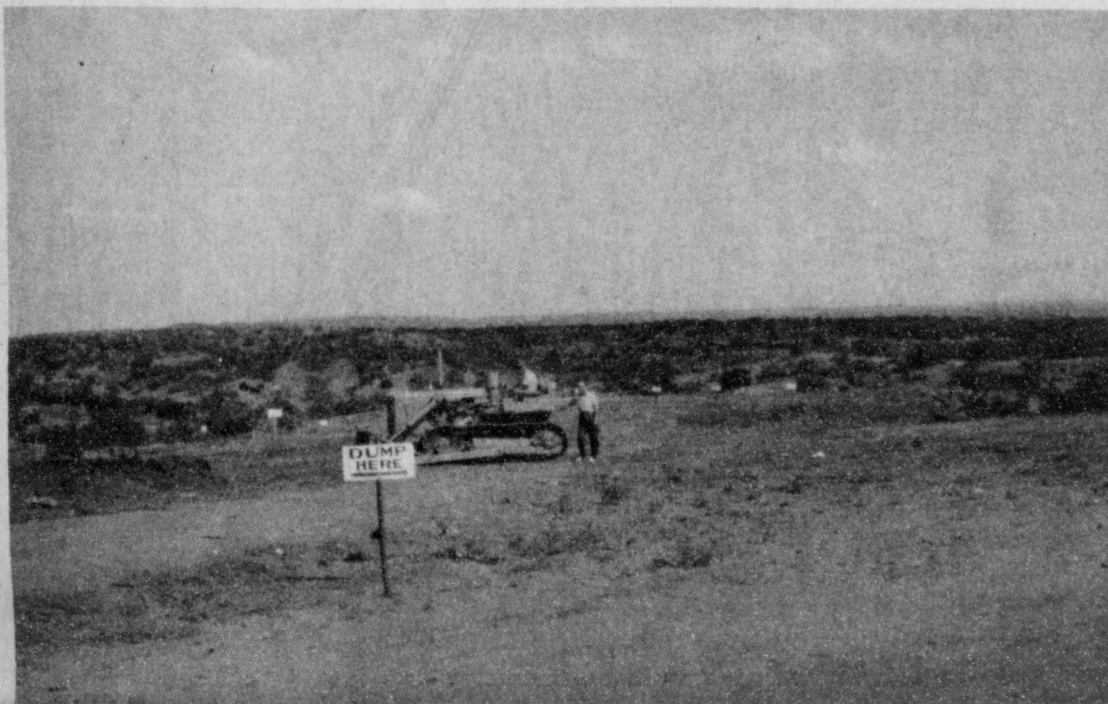

Hog Cholera Eradication

Texas Swine producers, the Texas Animal Health Commission and the United States Department of Agriculture are cooperating in a concentrated effort to completely eradicate hog cholera. This state program designed to completely eliminate this dreaded swine disease from the boundaries of the United States by 1972. Texas is currently in Phase 3 of a 4 Phase Eradication Program. The purpose of this phase is to eliminate those few infected and exposed herds that remain to threaten the eradication program and to prevent the spread of hog cholera virus from infected areas.

Moving infected and exposed pigs leads to the spread of this disease from farm to farm. To eliminate this method of spreading hog cholera, quarantines are put on areas where hog cholera occurred. To stop movements, while State and Federal Veterinary Officials eliminate infected herds, Federal quarantines restrict movement of hogs and pork products across state lines from infected areas. However, slaughter hogs from the quarantined areas can be moved across state lines if they are inspected on the farm by a Federal, State or an accredited Veterinarian and are shipped for slaughter. Such slaughter hogs must be accompanied by a special certificate authorizing movement from a quarantined area. Hogs shipped without this certificate are subject to seizure. Federal quarantines are lifted just as soon as the threat of the disease has been eliminated; Generally speaking, State quarantines which quarantine only the premises are lifted at about the same time. Cooperation of swine producers with Federal and State Veterinarians often shortens the length of the quarantine.

The eradication of hog cholera can not be accomplished without the cooperation and help of swine producers. Producers can help by promptly reporting suspicious outbreaks of hog cholera to their Veterinarian at once. Owners of herds in which hog cholera is diagnosed will be paid for their losses from State and Federal Indemnity Funds. Indemnities can not be paid for hogs that die before the first visit of a State and Federal Veterinarian.

Accent on Health

J. E. PEAVY, M.D., Commissioner of Health

It's often been called the "near-perfect food", and rightly so, because milk contains more life-giving properties than almost any other food. But this very fact makes the control of the sanitation and quality of milk and dairy products a constant concern of the Texas State Department of Health.

In Texas, the Legislature has given the Commissioner of Health Dr. J. E. Peavy, the authority to adopt regulations in conformance with those released by the Commissioner.

"Proper handling" as interpreted by these health departments means the production of clean milk from cows which are tested and proven to be in good health. As a continuing safeguard, the milk must be handled under rigidly enforced sanitary conditions to prevent its being contaminated from the time of its production until it reaches the processing plant. It is likewise maintained at temperatures which inhibit bacterial growth. After the milk arrives at the plant, its sanitation continues to be rigidly maintained through proper pasteurization and final packaging in sanitary containers. With all of the safeguards which are routinely and continuously applied, the possibility of milk becoming a carrier of pathogenic disease is virtually eliminated.

The Milk and Dairy Products Division of the State Health Department is responsible for public health protection by regulating milk and dairy products, including butter, ice cream, cheese, and the like, produced, processed, and consumed in Texas. The division also has the responsibility of inspecting Grade A producer dairies, milk processing plants, receiving stations, and other by-products plants that ship milk and dairy products into the state of Texas. Approximately 3,867 inspections in seven states other than Texas have been made by Health Department personnel during the first five months of this year. Permits have been issued to about 200 over-the-road tankers.

Here in Texas, local health departments join with the state agency in maintaining frequent inspections of the 4,178 producer dairies, 77 processing plants, 13 receiving stations, 79 transfer stations, 68 manufacturing plants, 10 single service plants, and 197 trucks and vans in operation within the state. Frequent samples are taken and checked at several regional health laboratories, as well as the state lab, for sanitation, bacteria count, and butterfat content.

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Everybody has a different belief or remedy for those little bugs that cause so much misery.

The truth about chiggers or redbugs is that the bugs can be present everywhere there is any form of vegetation.

Since the requirements of chiggers are so wide and cover just about any type of climate and vegetation, they are found in every county of Texas. Soil and temperature do have some effect, but the type of grass, vine or weed most influences the presence of chiggers.

Eggs hatch into immature chiggers called larvae. Chiggers in the larvae stage are the troublemakers, since they are parasitic on man and animals. The larvae transform into nymphs into adults. Nymphs and adults feed on insect eggs, small insects and other organisms found on or near decaying woody substances.

When the larvae come in contact with man or animal, they move about in search of a suitable location to feed. Delicacies for chiggers are areas of the body where the clothing fits tight or where the flesh is thin, tender or wrinkled.

Chiggers attach themselves by inserting their mouthparts into the skin. When they feed they inject a fluid which liquefies the tissue and causes reddish welts, swelling, itching and (in some persons) fever.

A chigger attached in a pore or at the base of a hair may be so enveloped by swollen skin that it appears to be burrowing in the skin. This leads some people to mistakenly believe that chiggers embed themselves in the

skin or that welts contain chiggers.

Protection from chiggers can be achieved through use of a repellent before entering areas where the bugs might be present. Repellents most effective are diethyl toluamide phthalate, dimethyl carbonate, ethyl hexanediol and benzoate.

If and when chiggers do infect the skin, the following steps are the most effective in obtaining relief:

Take a bath as soon as possible and then apply a dab of antiseptic to each welt to kill the chiggers and reduce possibility of infection.

Destroying the chiggers reduces the itching but does not stop it because the fluid injected into the skin is the cause. No treatment is known that will give permanent relief from the itching, but temporary relief can be obtained with a local anesthetic.

A formula compounded by a druggist of 5% benzocaine, 2% methyl salicylate, 0.5% salicylic acid, 73% alcohol and 19.5% water when applied to each welt will give relief for an hour or longer.

In lawns and areas where chiggers need to be controlled dust or spray formulations can be effective. Dusts recommended are carbaryl (Sevin), chlordane, lindane, sulfur or toxaphene. Sprays that can be used are carbaryl (Sevin), diazin, dieldrin, lindane or toxaphene. The materials can be applied to grass and ground litter to rid the area of the bugs.

That's Flash-Bits

Christian Science Lesson

Questions about the origin and preservation of life are answered from a metaphysical viewpoint in the Lesson-Sermon on "Life", to be read in all Christian Science churches on Sunday, July 19.

One of the readings from Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures, by Mary Baker Eddy, Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science, states:

"We apprehend Life in divine Science only as we live above corporeal sense and correct it. Our proportionate admission of the claims of good or of evil determines the harmony of our existence,--our health, our longevity, and our Christianity." One of the Bible passages is from Job: "The Spirit of God hath made me, and the breath of the Almighty hath given me life."

Tax 'Man Sam Sez'

The 1969 Tax Reform Act contained a change that can be important to many taxpayers. Under the old law you could decrease your withholding tax for the following year if your itemized deductions for the past year ran high enough to create a very large refund. However, under the new law you can now decrease your withholding during the year before you pay a lot of withholding tax that you don't owe. A good example of what can happen was brought out by the tornado and storm victims in West Texas. Many of these taxpayers are eligible to immediately reduce the amount of tax withheld from their pay, since their itemized deductions for the 1970 tax year will include a casualty loss amounting to several thousand dollars. Of course the itemized deduction provision of the law is not limited to casualty losses, but also applies to all types of itemized deductions. If your itemized deductions have increased by a very large amount you can obtain a new Form W-4 and a Form W-4 Schedule A from your payroll office to get an immediate increase in pay instead of a refund check next April.

As It Looks From Here

If "What Happened on The Way To The Forum" was strange, equally so was a recent court decision in Credit River, Minnesota. (The name of the town is coincidental with the circumstances in a court case to foreclose on property.) What occurred could be of vital interest later on or it might be nothing at all.

A Federal Court in Minnesota has ruled that Federal Reserve Notes, some of which you likely have in your pocket at the moment, are worthless.

In May, 1964, a man in Savage, Minnesota borrowed \$14,000 from the First National Bank, securing the loan with a mortgage on real estate.

Three years later the borrower still owed \$476 and the bank foreclosed. The bank bought the property at a sheriff's sale and a year later brought suit for possession. The case was tried in 1968 by a jury which held that the bank was not entitled to recover possession of the property and that the debt was void because the borrower did not receive lawful money on his mortgage.

The bank thereupon appealed to the Federal District Court. The filing fee was \$2. The bank presented two paper \$1.00 bills in payment. The court refused the fee as unlawful tender, citing the Constitution as legal reason.

Article I, Section 10 of the Constitution provides "no state shall make anything but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts." The Court said "these Federal Reserve Notes are not lawful money within the contemplation of the Constitution of the United States and are null and void. The Notes on their face are not redeemable in gold or silver coin...."

The Court went on to say that an act of Congress to make Federal Reserve Notes legal tender was unconstitutional and no authority existed for their issuance.

The Court held that Congress has only the authority to coin money and regulate its value. The last time Congress so acted was in 1878 when it fixed the value of the dollar at 412.5 grams troy weight of silver. This stands as the present intrinsic value of the dollar in spite of the sandwiched coins now in circulation, authorized by Congress in 1965. On the other hand the silver dollar has not had the "sandwich" treatment by adding copper. When melted down, which is illegal, it has a greater silver value than that fixed in 1878.

States currency is not legal money unless the holder can go to any bank window and receive silver or gold in return for it. The other side of the coin (no pun intended) is that United States citizens are not allowed gold coin. The contradiction is obvious.

What the Court decision in Minnesota really means is anyone's guess at the present time but the man who owed the bank \$476 on his \$14,000 loan, still owns his farm. No test has been made of the case in the Supreme Court and the question remains undecided as between the authority to issue Federal Reserve Notes and the interpretation of the Constitution.

It is a case of many ramifications. If the decision of the Federal District Court in Minnesota should be upheld by higher courts, it would mean that mortgage holders all over the Country would be denied the authority to collect unless the loan was paid in gold or silver. The question as to how or for what purpose the borrowed money was used seemingly was not an issue. Logically the acceptance of Federal Reserve Notes all down the line as legal tender would alter the situation but apparently this was not resolved by the decision.

Be this as it may, the matter deserves the attention of the Supreme Court and the Congress before more serious consequences occur.

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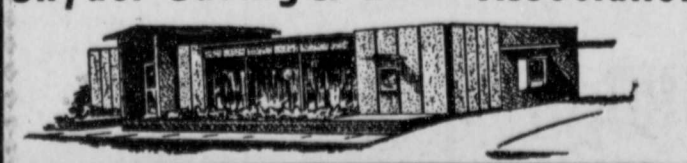

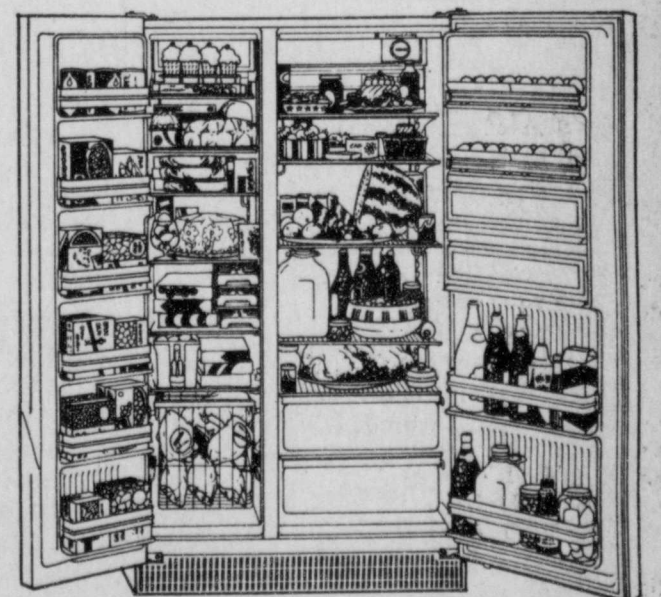
