To Be Enforced

To make Texas beautiful and a more healthful place to live is the aim of all the citizens of Texas. The Governor of Texas, the Honorable Preston Smith, has proposed such a program over the entire State. One portion of this program is in conjunction with the Health Departments program of Solid Waste Disposal and the Air Pollution Acts.

To do Rotan's part of beautifying Texas and to comply with the rules and regulations of the Health Department, the City has began a sanitary landfil at the city owned dump ground. This method of disposal is working better, without the use of a full time attendant, than even the most far out dreamer could conjur up. Citizens of Rotan and of the surrounding communities, who use the dump ground, are complying with the signs and therefore making this a workable program without excessive expense and controls.

There are some rules and regulations which should be brought to our attention as to the methods of caring for our garbage, trash, and debris, inside the City of Rotan. First and foremost is the trash and garbage receptacles. The regulation size is not less than five gallons and not larger than thirty-two gallons. The containers must have a lid which should be tight fitting to prevent the blowing of trash, accumulation of flies and animals from scavangering. The most common used are metal containers with handles for easy handling, these can be purchased from our local mer-

chants or from the City of Rotan. Any purchases from the City may be added to the monthly water billing, if so desired. Barrels are not to be used and shall be removed from the alleys. The total weight of the cans and their contents shall not exceed seventy-five pounds.

Trash or such nature that it cannot be placed in the regulation receptacle shall be carefully prepared in units or pieces not to exceed seventy-five pounds and placed near the trash cans for accessable collecting and removing. Tree limbs, shrubs, and hedge cuttings shall not exceed five foot in length and shall be prepared in pieces, bales, or units not to exceed seventyfive pounds and place near trash cans, also. If this trash, limbs, and debris is not handled in the prescribed manner an added charge will be assessed the owner of such and placed on the monthly billing for extra service rendered.

It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to burn trash or garbage within the city limits or Rotan. For persons violating this regulation there shall be an assessment of a fine or fines not to exceed one hundred dollars for each violation.

The caring for the garbage, trash, rubbish, and debris will do much to beautify Rotan and make it a more healthful town to live in. Isn't it nice for our visitors to say our town is clean and well kept? Cooperation of each citizen will be the major factor in getting this remark from them.

The crippling, contagious disease of polio has struck the State of Texas once again. Following an epidemic of the disease in South Texas, state, local, and federal health officials have mounted a state-wide immunization campaign to protect all young children against this disease. By the end of June, the Texas State Department of Health had received reports of fourteen possible cases of the disease. Of these, only three have been confirmed as polio. One case was diagnosed as ECHO virus, and then others remain under observation. One death has been attributed to polio, and the disease is suspect in one other

Dickerson, chief of the Communicable Disease Services section of the State Health Department, reports the paralytic polio outbreak in Texas has become an epidemic of the Trivalent vaccine is under the definition of the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices of the U.S. Public Health Service. marily children under one year of age, with the oldest reported case only three years old. These reported cases are coming out of families who have failed to take their children to a doctor or their local health department for immunization against the crippling disease. None of the children under observation by health officials had received any polio vaccine. All cases have some degree of paralysis. Dr. Dickerson says health officials have mounted a massive polio immunization campaign. Some 40,000 does of the Tri-

valent Oral Polio Vaccine were distributed in the last weekend of June to residents in the epidemic locality. But Dr. Dickerson stresses the need for a state-wide vigilance, and urges all parents to get their children immunized as soon as possible. Polio immunization is carried out in five steps. The first dose recommended for the child of two months of age, when the protective antibodies the child received from his parents are beginning to diminish. A

second dose is required at the go of four months A third does follows at six months of age, a fourth dose at eighteen months virus during a four week period of age, and the fifth and final dose is recommended just prior to the child's admission to

A search for a physical process to improve the utilization of grain sorghum by cattle has been going on for a long time

A possible solution is recognized in dry heat processing of the sorghum by J. K. Riggs, J. W. Sorenson, Jr., and Price Hobgood, all of Texas A&M University.

A project, planned and enacted in 1967, provided an opportunity to study the equipment requirements, the effect of initial moisture content on popping characteristics of sorghum grain and the bulk densities of the various components of the oppped grain mixtures.

The study also evaluated feedlot performance and carcass characteristics of cattle fed the dry heat-processed and nonprocessed grain in allconcentrate finishing mixtures. Rumen volatile fatty acid levels and grain digestibility were also determined in the work done cooperatively by the Departments of Agricultural Engineering and Animal Sci-

ence at A&M. An infrared-heated reciprocating steel table machine and a gas-heated vibrating-tray were used in the research to determine the feasibility of using dry heat in a popping operation to process the sorghum grain for finishing beef

Results of the study showed that the grain should be cleaned to assure an even flow free from foreign materials for efficient operation of the reciprocating-table machine.

A grain moisture content of 15 percent was optimum for obtaining the highest percentage of completely popped grain which was 45 percent. The weight or bulk densities of the loose-fill samples ranged from 49 pounds per cubic foot for the original whole grain to about 6 pounds per cubic foot for the completely popped

A patio floor should be level enough to be comfortable when using garden furniture but still have sufficient slope to allow water to drain away from the house. Good drainage requires a minimum five inch drop in twenty feet, and this will be barely noticable when standing or moving about the area, yet sheds water readily.

The size and shape of a patio is frequently dictated by the space available, however, there seems to be more danger of providing too little space than too much. Remember, that lawn and patio furniture is always heavier and more bulky than regualr house furniture and for this reason it requires considerably more space to entertain the same number of people

out-of-doors. The minimum size for a patio should be 300 square feet and anything larger would make it more comfortable. This is especially true if cooking facilities are included on the patio plan, as the heat from the grill could make a small patio rather

uncomfortable. Consideration should also be given as to when the patio would be used. Since most outdoor entertaining is done in the late afternoon or evening, the patio should be located so that it is shaded from the hot sun at that time, and if possible, to also take advantage of any prevailing wind even it it means using a windbreak to reduce the wind velocity.

So that the outdoor living area will appear to be a part of the total landscape plan rather than an afterthought you just happened to add on. visit the local library and study some of the excellent books on the subject that are now available. Also, make a plan drawn to scale and showing the patio's relationship to the house and the rest of the yard and make up your planting plan. ****





When God requites, it is always just; but not necessarily always pleasant to the recipient. Adonibezek was a power-thirsty King who lived in the days of Joshua and a few years afterward. He stated that he had had the

thumbs and great toes of seventy kings cut off. When the Israelites captured him, they cut off his thumbs and great toes. It was with a sense of retributive justice that he was caused to say, "As I have done, so God hath requited me. "

It is the same principle as that stated in the sermon on the mount as Jesus said, "Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy. "Matt. 5:7, or as he said, "For with what judgment, it shall be measured to you again. "Matt. 6:2. Paul makes it clear that this rule works both ways with this familiar passage, Whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap. For he that soweth to his flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption; but he that soweth to the Spirit shall of the Spirit reaplife everlasting. "Gal. 6:7, 8. Sow bad, reap bad; sow good, reap good.

Man gets in reverse often and requites evil for good both to man and God. After the goodness of God had been shown to Israel in manifold ways, the people were sinful and rebellious, and Moses said, "Do ye thus requite the Lord?" Deut. 32:6.
