Shotguns must be plugged permanently to three shell capacity and may not be

larger than ten gauge. Hunting with rifles is prohibited.

Game Warden Roy Lynn reports abundance of doves in this area, and a drive on any road will bear this out.

He also reports a good quail crop, and indications point to a good season.

The Gold Star Award is presented by the Texas Agriculture Extension service and is the highest award which can be attained on a county level. This is the highest award a 4-H member can attain on the county level.

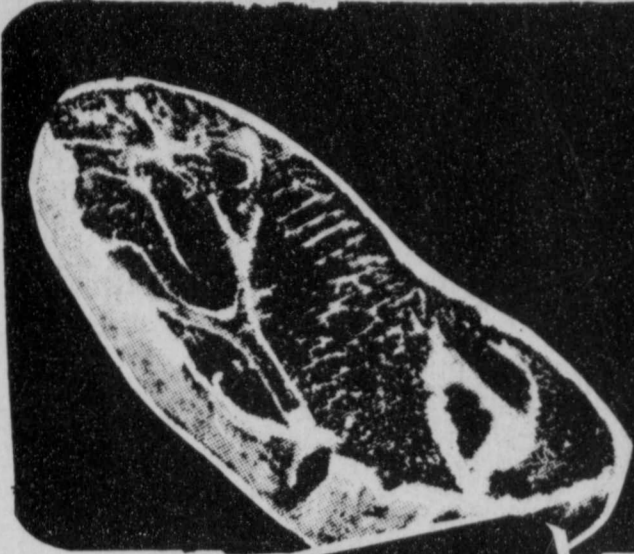
