Rotan's Yellowhammers took their second high scoring win of the season Friday night when they swamped Stanton Buffalos 53-13 before a large crowd in home stadium. Hard rainfall just before game time failed to dampen ardor of Hammer fans.

After a scoreless first quarter, Rotan began their hammering when Walter Hargrove sprinted into the end zone for the first tally of the game, and then made good on the PAT to put the Hammers out in front, 7-0.

Steve Nowlin, Mickey Early and Chico Garcia all swept into the end zone before the first half ended sending the score to 28-0.

Just before the end of the half, Stanton quarterback Glen Ray lofted a 27-yard scoring pass to

Jackie Swanson for the first Buffalo score of the game.

The Buffalos went into the dressing room at half-time trailing 28-6.

After the half, Hargrove intercepted two passes setting up two more TD's, and Steve Nowlin again crossed the end stripe sending the 'Hammers into the fourth quarter leading 49-6.

Jana Jeffrey placed 6th in both the summer yearling and junior heifer classes in the junior show. Shelia Jeffrey also placed 6th with her junior Hampshire gilt.

Judges for the events were Jim Gray of San Angelo - sheep; Jack Lacy of Lampassas - Angus cattle; and Dr. T. D. Tanksley of College Station - swine.

Cotton Insect Report No. 5

Fields inspected from September 14 to September 18 for Cotton insects provided information for the following comparison of sprayed and unsprayed fields. The figures given represent the range of punctured squares in the respective fields.

Roby west sprayed 11% unsprayed 10-14%; Roby east sprayed 7-24%, unsprayed 29%; Roby south sprayed 4-6%, unsprayed 18-24%; Roby north sprayed 8-9%, unsprayed 41%; Claytonville sprayed 6%, unsprayed 9%; Hobbs sprayed 5%, unsprayed 5%; Sylvester sprayed 10-18%, Royston sprayed 7-16%, unsprayed 29-80%; and North Roby unsprayed 35-76%.

Bollworm damage was found in all parts of the county. The worst infestation was found east of Roby with one field having 24% damage per hundred terminals. Cabbage loopers were located in one field.

Roby WMU Met One Country, One Constitution, One Destiny Engagement Tuesday

Roby First Baptist Church WMU met Sept. 15 at 2:30 for Bible study. Subject of the study was "Struggle for Unrestricted Gospel." Our scripture lesson was found in Acts and song was "Send the Light." Mrs. Ann Woolley had call to prayer and led the prayer. Mrs. Woolley also taught the Bible lesson.

It was in 1955 that the Daughters of the American Revolution originated the idea for one entire week of each year to be devoted to the Constitution of the United States of America. It is a period of thoughtful study and consideration of the events that led up to the forming of the Constitution, and of the means of preserving it from those who would destroy or weaken it. That week, by act of Congress and Proclamation of the President of the United States, is September 17 through 23 of each year. When Mayor Wendell Morrow of our city signed the Proclamation he made this statement: "I would like to proclaim every week as Constitution Week." And it is in this spirit that the following is presented.

First, let's refresh our memories with history that we learned so many years ago concerning "The Declaration of Independence." This document, written by Thomas Jefferson, was prepared in only two weeks. It was ratified after a two day debate by delegates of the monarch they felt impelled to disown. The Declaration tied a knot that King and Parliament were unable to untie. Unlike the Constitution the Declaration has never been amended or changed since its adoption. This fact adds to the impression that it is obsolete. Nothing could be further from the truth. The principles expressed are still very much alive and are the essence of American self-government today. It was eleven years later that the Constitution was written and molded the thirteen Colonies into ONE Nation and provided a standard of legal reference as the supreme law of the land, subject to amendment as the need arose. The political theory implicit in the Constitution is that no man or set of men should rule the people, but that the governing power should rest in the hands of the people themselves through their chosen representatives. This concept is the identical idea expressed in the Declaration of Independence -- that the people are sovereign and can only be governed by their own consent.

The 5 principles, which Jefferson called "self-evident truths" still have validity 194 years after they were written. They stand today as a solid bulwark of the American democratic system. Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower wrote in the

Readers Digest of April 1966, on a subject "Thoughts for Young Americans" in which he recommends the study of the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States as handbooks to be referred to time and again to keep them in our minds as we do the morals and instructions we receive from our Christian teaching of our Bibles -- to ponder the true meaning of the documents which is expressed in the 5 "self-evident truths":

- (1) That all men are created equal -- This concept extinguished the century old belief in the divine rights of kings. It also means that all men, regardless of race, color, religion or creed, were created on the same plane and entitled to equal treatment under the law.
- (2) That all men are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights -- Unalienable being the key word and meaning in the legal sense, that the rights with which men are endowed with at birth are God-given and cannot be transferred as one might transfer real-estate or personal property.
- (3) That among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.
- (4) That to secure their rights, governments are instituted among men deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed. There are two pillars of thought here. One, that a government exists to guarantee all citizens their birthright of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness; the other, that a government obtains its just legal powers from the consent of the people it governs, and has no other temporal or secular authority. These two pillars still stand as the solid supports of the American political system and are implicit in the first 10 Amendments to the Constitution, which make up the Bill of Rights.
- (5) That whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is right of the people to alter it or institute a new government. However the Declaration warns that this right should not be treated lightly, as it went on to say, "prudence, indeed, will dictate that government long established should not be changed for light or transient causes".

We ought to take to heart President Eisenhower's advice to read and ponder the meanings of these two great documents. The freedom we now enjoy is a legacy

from brave patriots who shed their blood in defense of these "self-evident truths".

We read in the 16th chapter, 5th verse of Numbers; "Tomorrow the Lord will show who are His. . . Some essentials for successful living, characteristics of the men and women who shape tomorrow, include, gearing themselves for emergency living, that is, mental alertness, intellectual instability, and a persistent crowding of opportunities, assuring a state of constant readiness for the vicissitudes of life; Husbanding a magnanimous spirit, which never empties the heart and seldom the purse; The practice of self inventory learning today to trim your lamps often so that they will give more light and less smoke; and finally acquiring the knack of being able to anticipate a problem before it becomes a crisis.

For the future of America, we must latch on the good things of the past, at the same time accepting necessary changes of the present and future. The way of life is not static. The blending of the old and the new is no small effort, but it is imperative of our era. We must recognize that there are some phases of both conservatism and liberalism that are good. However, we must always take a stand on what we consider to be for the good of the community and the country. Stand for something, lest we fall for anything.

The one thing which we as individuals must never forget is the all powerful God in Heaven who has blessed each of us with life and has blessed America with the greatest Nation ever known on the face of the earth. If we forget God we might lose this great Nation. We might lose the great freedoms we now enjoy.

Those who are pledged to responsible government need the backing of concerned citizens. Unless responsible citizens face up to their task, socialism may become the form of government in America. And, as Nikita Khrushchev said, socialism is the first stage of communism. The greatest problem confronting every responsible citizen today is how to pass on our marvelous way of life, ideals, convictions, faith, incentive and integrity cannot be conveyed from one generation to another by the drawing of wills. There are too many in high places who have too little concern about the policies that made America great. The people should support the Government not the Government the people.

Respect for the rights of others, and understanding of those rights is a condition of freedom and rights for oneself. If we approach our common problems and the great public issues judiciously we can make a great contribution to the public good. It is necessary that the adult generation's world must be. And it is to be hoped that the vision of the new generation, in turn, will become the substance on which can be built illustrious centuries to come.

Freedom -- no word was ever spoken which held greater hope, demanded greater sacrifice, needed more to be nurtured, praised more the giver, condemned more its destroyer, or came closer to being God's will on earth.

Americans need the enlightenment of the soul which comes with deep and abiding faith in God, faith in our fellowman, faith in America -- the last bulwark of freedom. May Americans always be protectors of our freedom.

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

The following is a statement from Mr. John Watson of New South Wales, Australia, who runs 32,000 head of sheep and has doubled his carrying capacity twice in the last ten years. "Don't turn grass into fat for sale; fat contains very little water, flesh is 80% water. It takes five times as much grass to make a pound of fat as it does to make a pound of flesh and fat is worth far less than flesh." Maybe this is why the judges are taking the big growthy lean livestock?

Insects normally are not known as being particularly good parents to their offspring. However, female twigg girdler beetles take great care to see that the young beetle larvae have a proper environment during their development.

The beetles are called twigg girdlers because of the type of damage they do. The females laboriously make a notch-like incision through the bark and into the wood of twig after twigg she then deposits her eggs in small niches on the severed portions. The girdling is done so that the larvae that hatch from the eggs will have wood in suitable condition of moisture and decay.

The adult beetles are 3/4 - 1 inch long and colored brown to grayish. The most noticeable characteristic are the very long antennae that are longer than the beetle's body.

Although the beetles are only trying to make a proper home for their offspring, they do cause considerable damage to shade, fruit, and nut trees. The girdled twigs die and either hang on the tree or fall to the ground. In young trees, there may be appreciable injury. Hickory, pecan, oak, persimmon, poplar, and honey locust are among the trees attacked by the beetles. Pecans may be deformed and the nut crop reduced. In persimmon, the beetle wounds afford entrance for a deadly wilt fungus disease.

Girdling begins during late summer and the damage at this time may go unnoticed. Close inspection of wilted twigs is necessary to see whether they have been notched. In the fall, girdling damage becomes more apparent as the twigs begin to drop to the ground.

Chemical controls are effective when they are timed to coincide with the beetle's girdling and egg laying activities. Sprays containing malathion or carbaryl should be applied to the trees when the first girdled twigs are noticed. This is usually in late August or early September. Three applications at 2-week intervals are usually necessary.

Infestations may also be reduced by gathering and burning all severed twigs since the larvae remain in them until Spring.

Fields treated with most defoliant, desiccant, insecticides and some herbicides should not be grazed by livestock.

Agricultural chemicals, commonly used as herbicides, insecticides, defoliant and desiccants, are necessary for profitable cotton production in Texas. Some of these chemicals are highly toxic to livestock and animal death can occur when treated fields are grazed. Besides causing direct death to animals, chemical residues from treated fields may contaminate meat or milk and make them subject to seizure under state and federal regulations.

It is a producer's responsibility to adhere to specific restrictions on grazing fields treated with any pesticide or harvest aid chemicals. Follow all label instructions, if in doubt about grazing restrictions.

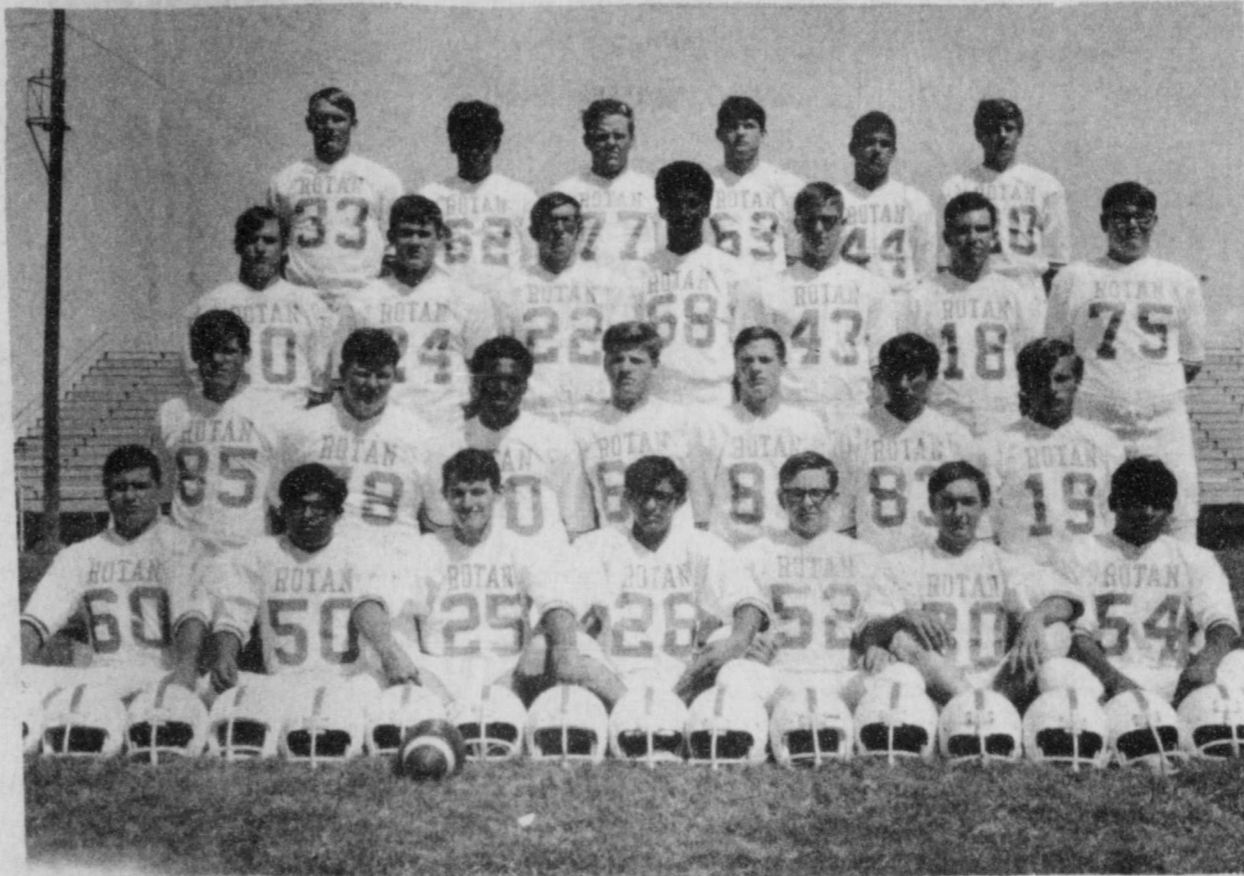

Coin Show Sept. 26 At Sweetwater

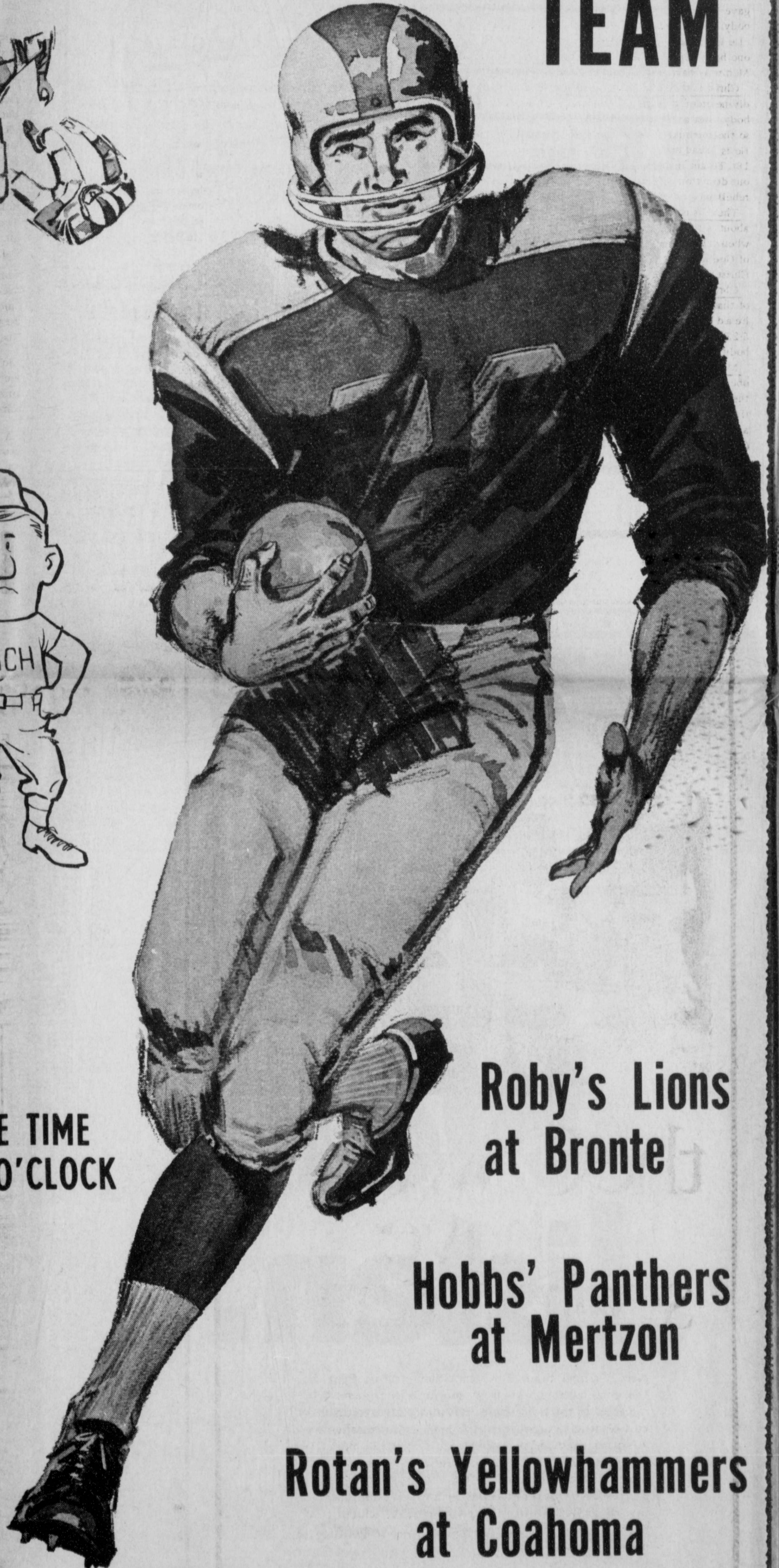
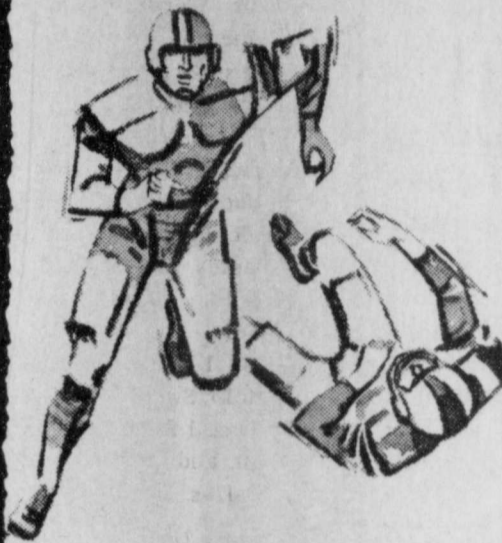

THE CHURCH OF CHRIST

The church of Christ is the spiritual body of Christ. Paul declares of Jesus, that God put all things in subjection under His feet and gave Him to be head over all things to the church, which is His body, the fullness of Him that filleth all in all (Eph. 1:22-23).

He is the head of the body, the church (Col. 1:18). "There is one body" (Eph. 4:4), thus it follows that Christ has but one church. Men may have many, but our Lord has but one.

Christ is the head of the church. One head and one body is the divine order. It is the office of the head to govern and control the body. Just as the physical body receives direction from its head, so the spiritual body of Christ receives its direction from Christ. He is "head over ALL THINGS to the church" (Eph. 1:22; Matt. 28:18). To act in matters of worship or other religious practice without direction and authority from Christ is to act in anarchy and rebellion.

There is no life apart from the body. We had just as well talk about a living finger, living foot, strong arm or growing limb when cut off from the physical body as to talk about being a child of God and having spiritual life outside the church, the body of Christ. Spiritual life is "in Christ" (Rom. 6:11; 1 Jn. 5:10).

Christ saves the Church. If you are in the church, you are a part of that body of which Christ is the Savior for "Christ also is the head of the church, being himself the Savior of the body" (Eph. 5:23). The church does not save, but Christ saves the church. His body. He "gave himself up for it" (Eph. 5:25).

Men enter the one body by baptism. It is by being baptized in obedience to the command of Christ that we enter into His body, the church. Paul said, "Know ye not that all we who were baptized INTO Christ were baptized into His death" (Rom. 6:3). "For as many of you as were baptized INTO Christ, did put on Christ" (Gal. 3:27). But to be in Christ is to be in His body, thus, "by one Spirit are we all baptized INTO one body" (1 Cor. 12:13).
