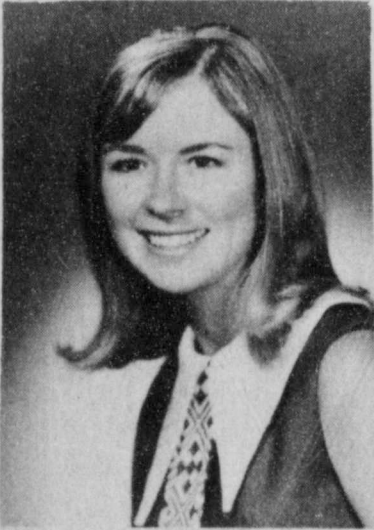

Farm Cash Income Should Increase

Cash receipts from all agricultural products in Fisher County should be more than \$12,000,000.00 by the end of 1976, says County Agricultural Agent Richard A. Spencer.

This will be an increase of 28% more than the current cash receipt total of \$9,500,000.00, according to projections from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This goal is part of a state-wide "3.76 in '76" program begun earlier this year by the Extension Service; and is a concentrated effort to have \$3.76 billion in cash receipts before the end of 1976. This would be one billion dollars more than the cash receipts of \$2.75 billion reported in the 1968-69 crop year, which serves as a base for the 1967 projections.

The 3.76 program was announced in January by Dr. John E. Hutchison, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, after two months of intensive study by groups of specialists who determined long range projections on the agricultural commodity groups produced in the state. The figures that resulted from the studies were predicted cash receipts, not including government subsidies

to producers. After the initial announcement in January, the individual counties were asked to submit their own projections for the end of 1976. Agricultural producers and businessmen were consulted and the combined opinions were reported to the Extension Service state office.

After these estimates were gathered and combined, it was found that the county totals varied only four percent from the original projections by the Extension specialists, according to Dr. W. D. Black, agricultural economist at Texas A&M University.

Dr. Black says that the 3.76 program should be beneficial to Texas agriculture because it gives the industry "something to hang its hat on."

"Too often, people tend to just look at next year," he asserts. "If you look down the road, you know what it takes to get there." Texas currently accounts for more than five percent of the nation's agricultural income; but to meet the 3.76 in '76 goal, Texas must increase its rate of growth to ten percent of the projected national increase in cash receipts.

Bret, whose shop instructor at Rotan High is M.R. Womack, won the 5th place prize for his arc welded a-frame lift.

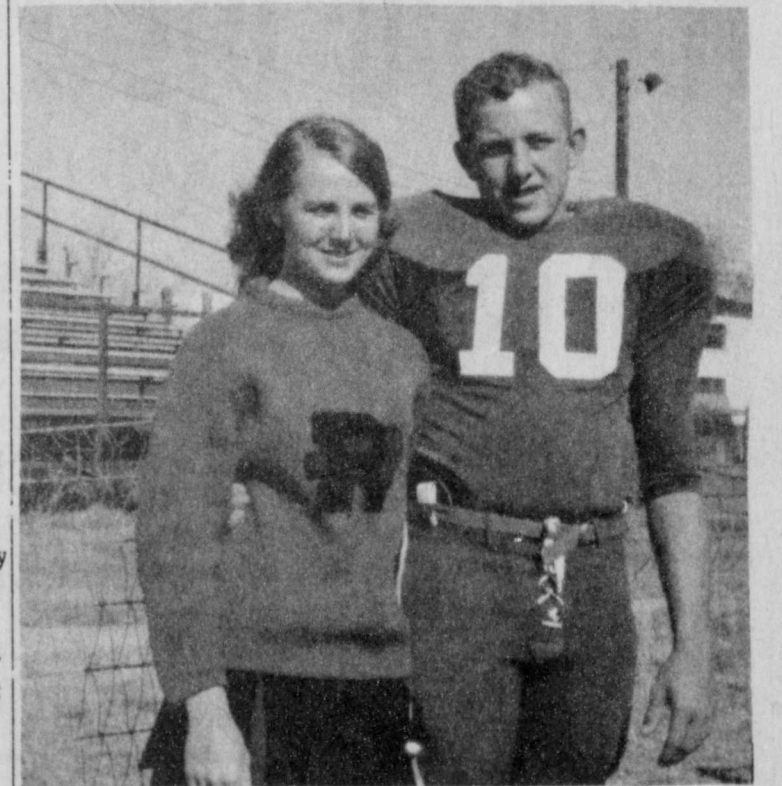
He competed in a region including 14 states other than Texas.

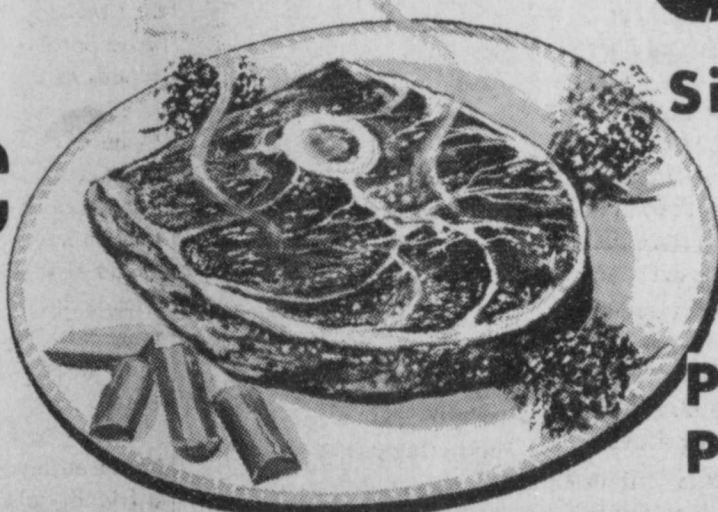

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The First Thanksgiving Proclamation

"By the President of the United States of America.

"A proclamation.

"WHEREAS it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the Providence of Almighty God, to obey His will, to be grateful for His benefits, and humbly to implore His protection and favor; and

"WHEREAS both Houses of Congress have by their joint committee requested me to recommend to the people of the United States a day of public Thanksgiving and prayer, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many signal favors of Almighty God, especially by affording them an opportunity to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness:

"Now, therefore, I do recommend and assign Thursday, the 26th day of November next, to be devoted by the people of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being who is the beneficent and author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be, that we may then all unite in rendering unto Him our sincere and humble thanks for His kind care and protection of the people of this country previous to their becoming a nation; for the signal and manifold mercies and favorable interpositions of His Providence, which we experienced in the course and confusion of the late war; for the great degree of tranquillity, union and plenty, which we have since enjoyed; for the peaceable and rational manner in which we have been enabled to establish constitutions of gov-

ernment for our safety and happiness, and particularly the national one now lately instituted; for the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge; and in general for all the great and various favors which He hath been pleased to confer upon us.

"And, also, that we may then unite, in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the Great Lord and Ruler of Nations, and beseech Him to pardon our national and other transgressions, to enable us all, whether in public or private stations, to perform our several and relative duties properly and punctually, to render our National Government a blessing to all the people by constantly being a government of wise, just and constitutional laws, discreetly and faithfully executed and obeyed, to protect and guide all sovereigns and nations (especially such as have shown kindness to us) and to bless them with good government, peace and concord. To promote the knowledge and practice of true religion and virtue, and the increase of science among them and us, and generally to grant unto all mankind such a degree of temporal prosperity as He alone knows to be best.

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

by Richard Spencer



In recent weeks, the Chicago Stockyards have closed and many people are asking why. "Relatively large numbers of cattle no longer go through this type of terminal market," Dr. William E. Black, Extension economist at Texas A&M University, says. "Although the number of large farmers are relatively few, they produce about half of all the calves sold, and they are the ones leaving these markets."

"These stockyards represent the old system of marketing cattle and are the first victims of a new and more efficient system which is emerging."

There is an increasing realization that the old system is inefficient and causes consumers to pay more for beef than they otherwise would if a new system was developed. The beef industry, if it is to prosper and grow, can't live with the inefficiencies. It must eliminate them if the beef industry is going to meet the competition from other foods and synthetics in the years ahead.

In a recent study, U.S. Choice beef carcasses hanging in a Chicago supermarket cooler were traced back to a Montana ranch where the cattle were born. The study showed that these cattle had changed hands 14 times from the ranch to the supermarket cooler.

The worst part is that these animals had spent 45 percent of their lifetime regaining losses in weight and condition from these moves. Shots, changes in feed and ownership and other factors had taken their toll.

Many farmers and ranchers say there's not much room for improvement in the present system, but the fact is, the present method of marketing is changing. The larger producers are beginning to sell their livestock directly to feedlots through contractual arrangements or are retaining ownership and contracting for their animals to be fed in the commercial feedlots.

There are so many inefficiencies in the present system that retail prices of beef could be reduced, yet returns to beef producers significantly increased if they were overcome.

In order to do this, there must be a coordinated marketing system that provides a number of alternative ways to market livestock. The central question now is whether the leadership for improved coordination in marketing of livestock will come from within or from firms outside the livestock industry.

If the coordination comes from within, it can either come from farmers and ranchers who join together and form their own marketing associations, or from feedlot operators, meat packers or both who 'reach backward' and integrate producers into the system. However, once there is a high degree of backward integration, producers will have lost their opportunity to organize their own marketing organizations.

The other alternative is for firms presently outside of the livestock industry to move in with organization, capital and management to do the coordinating job which producers should be doing. Society at large doesn't care who's going to be the coordinator. They just want a high quality product put on the counter as cheaply as possible and an assurance of supply. It does, and should, make a difference to those who are now in the livestock industry, however. Some feel they have the answer to the question of who will coordinate the marketing system of the future, but as of now, it remains to be answered.

gravel drive, and a Burford holly on each corner, it doesn't mean that it has been landscaped. In fact, it appears as though the owner ran out of funds before he finished because he didn't plan ahead.

The ideal procedure is to plan the house and ground as a unit before construction begins. In this way, the house can be designed to fit the site with a minimum of grading or cutting and filling of soil. This results in a better use of the site and makes it easier to provide a close relationship between the indoor and outdoor areas. Other factors to consider in developing the site are the views, topography, seasonal wind directions, sun angles, space usage, both inside and outside the house, and legal building restrictions.

The less the site must be changed, the better use one can make of existing features and still achieve unity in the total landscape design. All too often the house design is chosen without thought as to the lot on which it is to be located. Consequently, many valuable and irreplaceable trees and other landscape features must be removed to make room for the house. With coordinated planning of the house and lot, destruction of existing beauty can usually be eliminated.

Building a new home soon? If so, be sure to allow for the cost of landscape development. This includes such items as grading, drive, patio, retaining walls, screen fences and walls, plants, and professional services. Under average conditions, the landscape budget should be between 10 to 20 percent of the cost of the house and lot. This does not include the cost of such features as a swimming pool or tennis court.

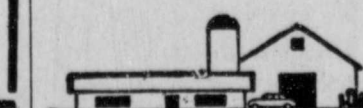

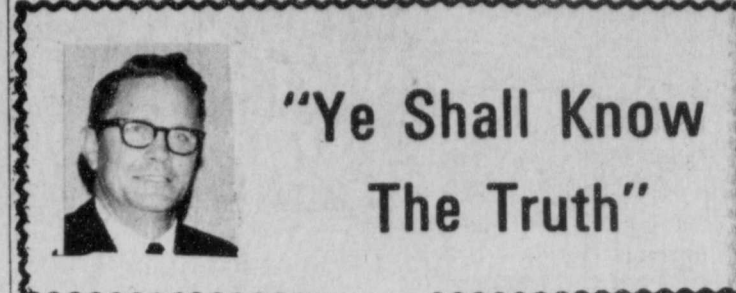

BECOMING A MEMBER OF THE CHURCH

After declaring He would build His church (Matt. 16:18) Jesus said to Peter, "I will give unto thee the 'keys' to the kingdom of heaven..." (Matt. 16:19).

The imagery is that of the gatekeeper of the city who had the keys to the gates of the city and the authority to open for admission. The Lord in giving the "keys of the kingdom" to Peter delegated to him the authority to first declare the terms upon which men are admitted into the kingdom of God, the church. This authority was not only given to Peter, but to all the apostles. He then sent the Holy Spirit to qualify them to speak the terms of admission (Jn. 16:13-14; Acts 2:1-4). It is important that we listen to what they said.

On the first Pentecost after the resurrection of Christ, multitudes were gathered in Jerusalem "from every nation under heaven" (Acts 2:5). The Holy Spirit descended upon the apostles and they began to speak. Peter, being the chief speaker, preached the life of Christ--"Jesus of Nazareth, a man approved of God among you"; the death of Christ--"Ye have taken, and by wicked hands have crucified and slain"; the resurrection of Christ--"Whom God hath raised up, having loosed the pangs of death"; the ascension and exaltation of Christ--"Therefore, being by the right hand of God exalted"; and then the coronation and kingship of Christ--"God hath made that same Jesus, whom ye have crucified, both Lord and Christ."

Upon hearing this sermon they believed that Jesus is the Christ, and they were pierced to the heart with the thought that they had murdered Him. "When they heard this, they were pricked in their heart, and said unto Peter and to the rest of the apostles, 'Men and brethren, what shall we do?'" (Acts 2:37). The answer comes resounding back "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost" (Acts 2:38). Glorious thought! The kingdom has been opened and everyone who will respond to that command may enter. "They that gladly received His word were baptized and the same day there were added to them about three thousand souls" (Acts 2:41). "And the Lord added to them (to the church--K. J. V.) day by day those that were saved." (Acts 2:47).

Has your preacher ever told you to do what Peter told those people to do?
