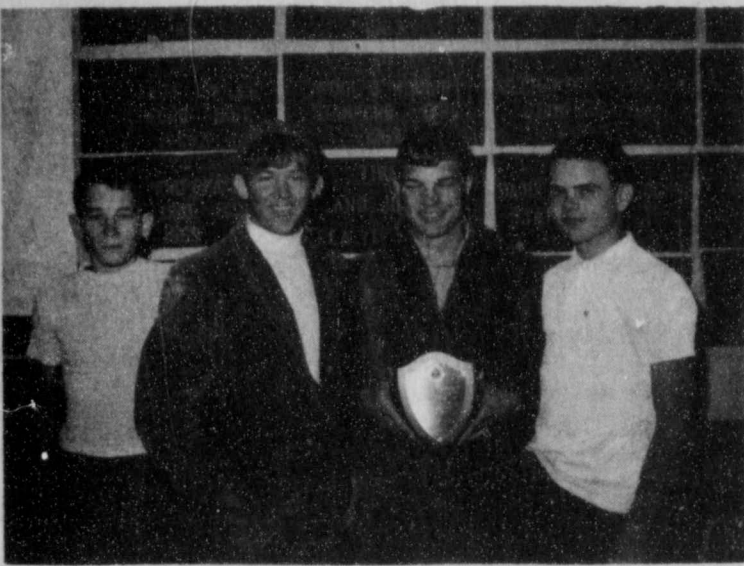

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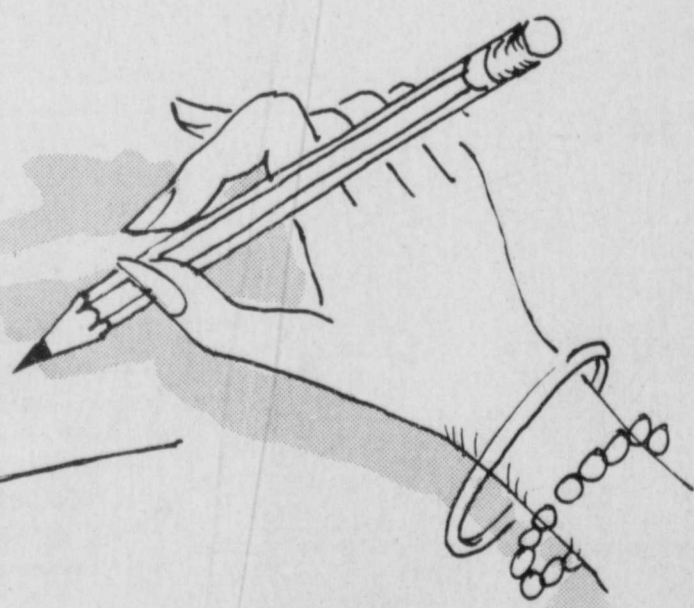

## Nazarene Revival Opens March 31



Revival at Rotan Church of the Nazarene will open March 31, with services daily at 7:30 p. m. thru April 5.

Dr. Lyle Eckley, of Lubbock, is superintendent of the West Texas District in the Church of the Nazarene.

He took this position in June 1968, succeeding Rev. Raymond Hurn, Lubbock, who had been elected two weeks earlier by the Nazarene General Board to be secretary of the Department of Home Missions for the general church with offices in Kansas City, Mo.

Mr. Eckley had been superintendent of the Northwestern Illinois District for 20 years prior to his move to Texas. He also had served six years as superintendent of the New York District in the denomination.

The West Texas District comprises 100 churches with about 6,500 members. The Northwestern Illinois District is made up of 73 churches with about 4500 members.

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## As It Looks From Here

Mr. Daniel P. Moynihan, counselor to the President and a holdover from the previous Administration, is under fire for suggesting to President Nixon that some "benign neglect" should be applied to matters involving "Civil Rights."

Perhaps the word "Neglect" was not the best choice but, seemingly, what he was trying to say is that there has been too much rhetoric on the subject and too many promises.

The way things stand today there is an abundance of evidence that too many promises of everything has contributed to unrest, frustrations and disappointments among many people. Politicians and administrations, as a whole, have gone beyond the possible in promising Utopia for about everything. Regardless of Mr. Moynihan's admonitions there is not likely to be a letup in "tub pounding" for about everything which has an appeal to groups and individuals who have a special interest.

Dr. Anthony Downs, Sr., Vice President of Real Estate Research Corporation, a consultant to the Rand Corporation, Urban, Institute, Brookings Institution and the Ford Foundation, has just released a paper through the U. S. Commission on Civil Rights, in which he says "almost every white American is a racist." Dr. Downs was a consultant to the Kerner Commission, composed of prominent citizens across the country, which says that the cause of civil unrest is failure to do away with poverty and lack of opportunity for minority groups.

How Dr. Downs concludes that about all whites are racists is not explained. How could he possibly know the hearts and minds of people who absolutely have no feeling toward another individual because of his race, creed or color? The fact that he makes such accusations suggests to those who feel some discrimination, that they react with force. This, in turn, encourages discrimination of one sort or another and polarizes a situation often leading to violent confrontations.

In part, Dr. Downs says that "all whites have contributed to a system that constantly produces racist effects." He outlines objectives to combat racism: (1) to change the behavior of whites to that they will no longer consciously or unconsciously support racism and (2) to increase the capabilities of nonwhite groups so that they can overcome the handicaps racism imposes. He advocates a build-up of political power for the support of "black power" and "black nationalism". He wants legislation passed to give more power to minority groups, making it the self-interest of whites to support minority aims.

Not all nonwhites by any means agree with this position. Mr. Roy Innis, National Director of CORE (Congress on Racial Equality), for instance says that forced integration of public schools is not workable and is not a guarantee of an equal or quality education for all pupils, black or white. He says that segregation when properly defined, should be equated with inequality of education. He makes the point that segregation and separation are two different things and that non-white people should run their own schools and vice versa.

letting white people make their decisions and black people theirs, and not having the whites making the decisions for both. He would, of course, require that Federal, State and local funds go to each school district under his plan on an equal per pupil basis.

The race question is not the only source of types of discrimination in this Country. There has always been, there always will be, a selection on the part of any individual to choose his associates for whatever reason. Most of us want and expect everybody to love us—especially we politicians—but they don't. Rightly or wrongly, we simply may not like the way a person wears his hat or steps up on the curb. But, if this be discrimination, what Government has a right to regiment us to the position which denies this right?

With the possible exception of Mr. Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation, no President promised more or tried harder in behalf of the minorities than former President Johnson. For it, he was abused and condemned by many of these same. A good guess is that this was a greater influence in his not standing for another presidential term than the war in Vietnam. Probably it serves the example of the insatiable appetite for promises of immediate Utopia.

A recent occurrence in San Antonio shows the courage of a man who refuses to indulge in racial prejudices or illusory promises for political advantages. The San Antonio Express is a recent editorial says that Congressman Henry Gonzalez will not dance to racist tunes.

Recently at St. Mary's University a dissident group attempted to disrupt a speech by the Congressman. The San Antonio Express describes the militants who attempted to abuse Mr. Gonzalez by accusing him of refusing to make his ethnic background a profession in itself. Congressman Gonzalez, the editorial says, was fighting racism before those who attempted to disrupt his speech were born—and has shown himself just as quick to oppose Mexican-American racism as he has been to oppose Anglo racism.

Over-promising and suggesting to any individual or group that to settle differences by violence and even revolutionary means, raises doubts and distrust where reasonableness should be applied.

Under prevailing circumstances perhaps some "Benign Calmness" would serve best.

## COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Recent changes in the income tax laws will affect all tax payers this year, and will be especially important for tax management by farmers and ranchers. A few of the changes affected the 1969 income tax report, but most of the changes become effective in 1970 and later.

Tax free exchanges of livestock, holding period for livestock, sale of farm land, recapture of depreciation on livestock and new rules for installment sales are among the many important changes.

Most of the changes affecting all tax payers are included in a new publication entitled "Highlights of 1969 Changes in the Tax Law." For your free copy come by the county agent's office.

For a pecan tree to produce an abundance of quality nuts, it must be protected from attack by both insects and diseases.

As an aid to pecan tree owners, whether a home owner or commercial producer, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service now has available a publication which should be of interest to all.

The publication MP-313, "Pecan Diseases and Insects," is a fine reference bulletin which pecan tree owners should find very useful in identifying the diseases and insects common in the area. A brief but to the point discussion has been prepared on each disease and insect of economic importance. Illustrations are used to make the identification job even easier.

The new publication, while pointing up the need for controls, gives only general suggestions but recommends that L-245, "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects and Diseases on Fruits and Nuts," be used for the needed pesticides and their rates.

Copies of both publications are available from the office.

For the 7th consecutive year, herds enrolled in the Texas Dairy Herd Improvement Association showed an increase in milk production. The 26,712 cows in the 227 member herds posted an average production of 11,626 pounds of milk per cow, up 470 pounds from the previous year. The average milk production for all cows in Texas was only 8,210 pounds.

Black spot is a spoiler in the rose garden. This fungal disease can ruin the beauty of one of our most desired ornamental plants.

This disease attacks the young tender foliage, causing black circular or irregular shaped spots on the developing leaves.

Black spot can be controlled by the use of preventive sprays or dusts. Such materials as Folpet, Maneb, Polyram and Dacnil 2787 can all be used on roses as preventive sprays.

Though the selection of fungicides is important, perhaps the regular application of the material at 7-day intervals is even more important. The rose gardener should set aside a time each week for spraying his plants. It might be each Saturday morning or another convenient time; however, the important thing is to see that all plants get a thorough fungicide application every seventh day.

Pruning out last year's canes now will help reduce the amount of disease producing spores carried over from last year. Baking and burning old leaves will also help reduce the occurrence of black spot.

Roses take a great deal of care, but their beauty both inside and outside the home more than offset all other considerations.

### AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO DISPOSAL OF DEAD ANIMALS AND ANIMAL OFFALS:

Be it Ordained and Enacted by the City Commission of the City of Roby of the County of Fisher, of the State of Texas:

Section 1: That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association, or corporation to dispose of animal offals or dead animals in or near the dump ground of the City of Roby, Fisher County, Texas.

Section 2: That any person, firm, association, or corporation convicted of a violation of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine in the City Court of Roby, Fisher County, Texas of not more than one hundred and no/100 dollars for each offense.

Section 3: That should any part of this ordinance be held invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining parts shall be severable and shall continue to be in full force and effect.

Section 4: That all ordinances conflicting with provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed insofar as the same affect this ordinance.

Section 5: That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after March 1, 1970.

Passed and approved by the City Commission on the 17th day of February, 1970.

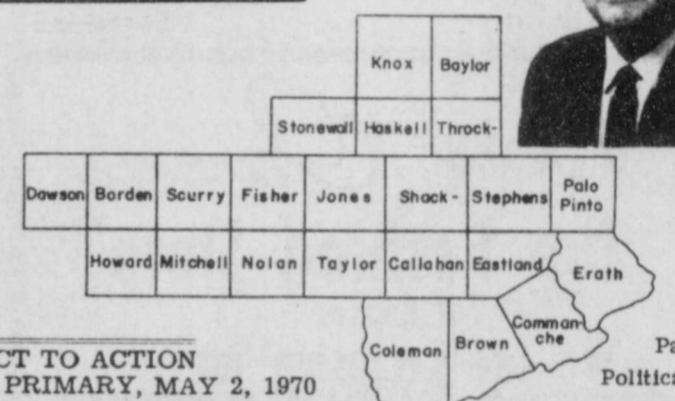

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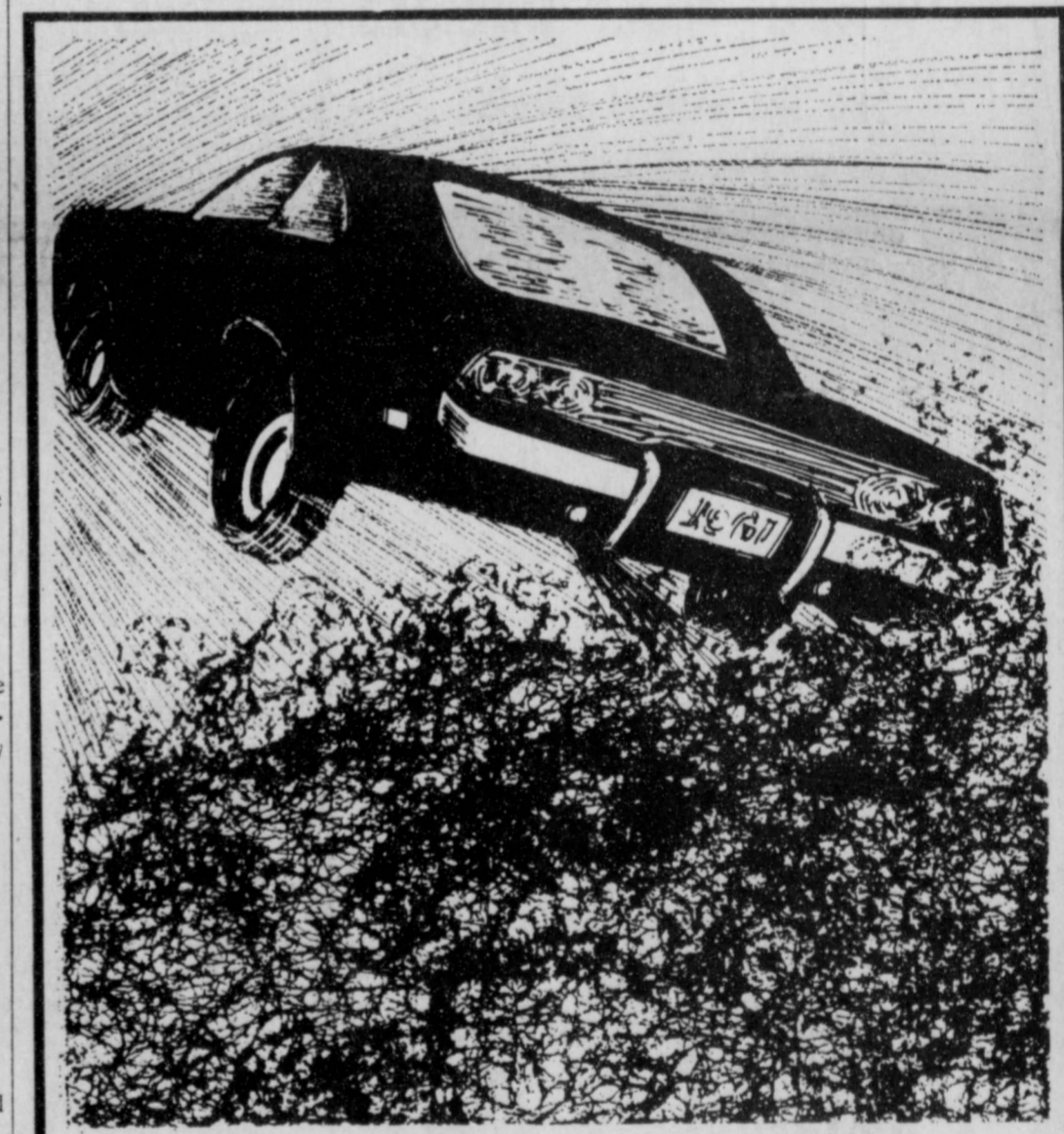

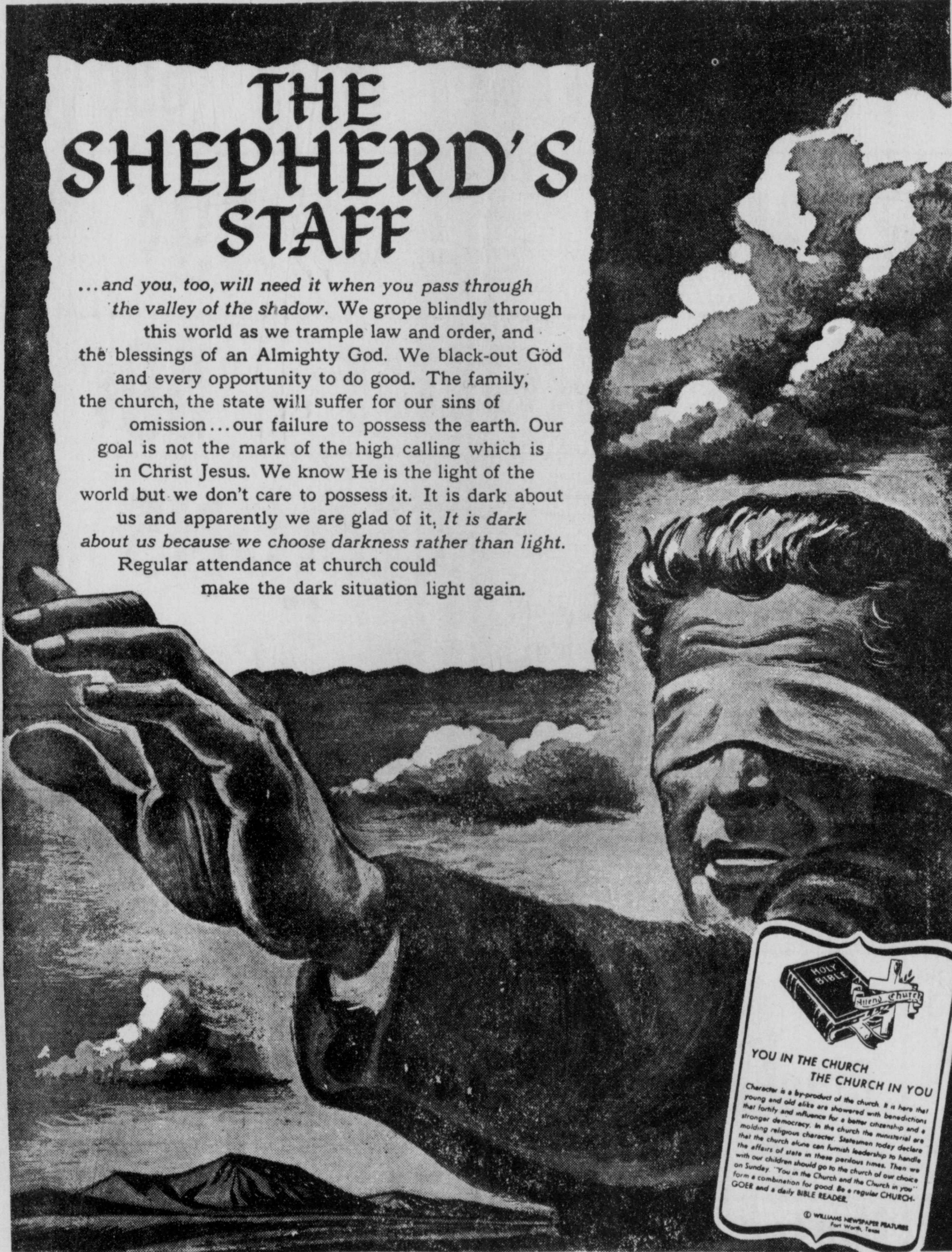

Faith is a great help to men and women as they go through life, but there is no synthetic substitute.

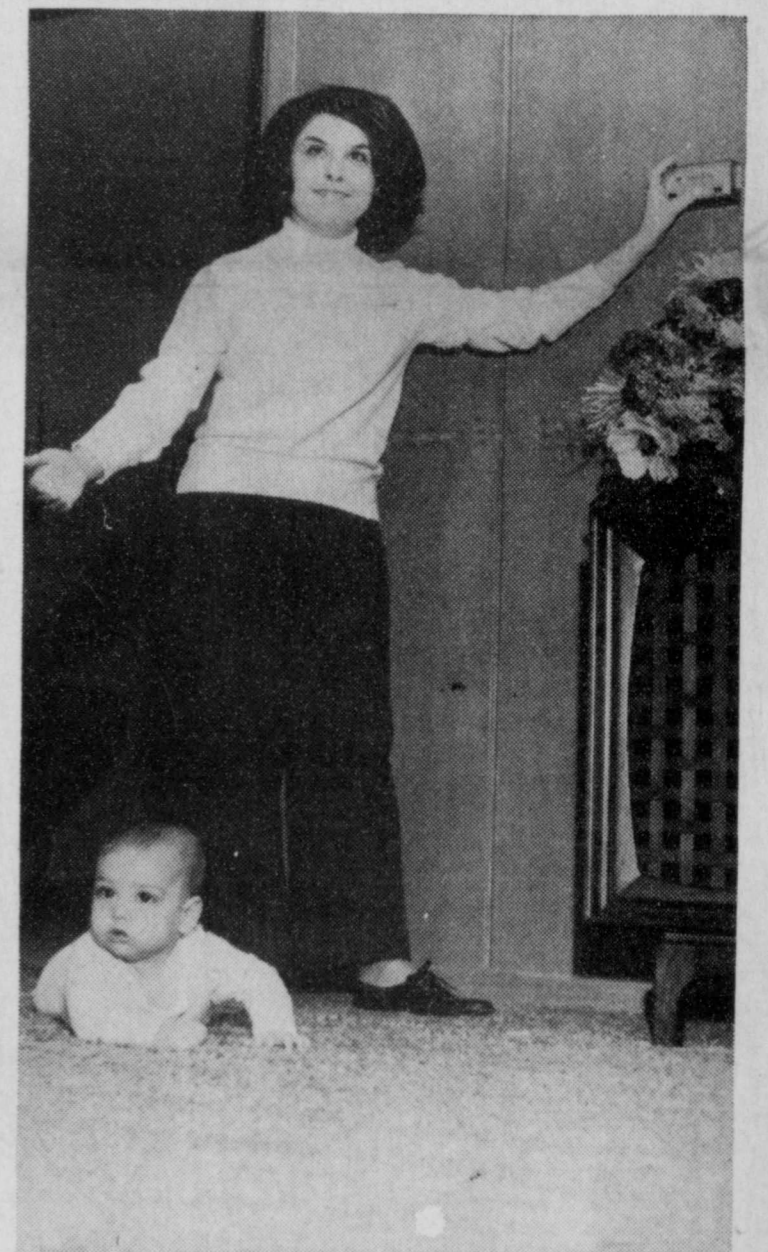
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
