Springer Gives Savings Bond Report For Feb.

Series E and H United States Savings Bond sales in Fisher County during February totaled \$2,704.00 according to County Bond Chairman, R. L. Springer. Sales for the first two months were \$5,884, 12% of the 1971 sales goal of \$50,000.

Treasury figures show that Texans purchased \$17,302,962 in Savings Bonds during February compared to 1970 sales for the same period totaling \$16,678,196 - an increase of \$624,766 or 3.7 percent. Sales for the two-month period were \$34,678,727 for 19 percent of the state's goal of 181.9 million.

Nationally, sales of E and H Savings Bonds were \$431 million - an 11 year peak for February. Sales for the first two months totaled \$861 million - 12.8 percent above 1970. Redemptions were 22 percent below 1970 for the lowest February in five years.

Voting Light In County Elections

Voting was light all races in Fisher County last Saturday.

Only 68 Rotan residents cast ballots in the city election. All candidates were running unopposed. Present Mayor Wendell Morrow received 66 votes, Alan Houston tallied 64; S. M. Weathersbee had 65 and Jay Hendon received 62 votes. One write-in vote was cast for Ted Loving.

There were only 24 votes cast in the Roby City Officers election. Mayor Cecil J. King received 23 votes and 24 votes were cast for both Jimmy C. Price

and Jimmy Hayes.

The Rotan School Board election last Saturday saw the most activity at the polls with 310 casting votes to elect three new board members from a field of six.

Bobby Smith received 229 votes and was followed by Bobby Gruben with 212 and Charlie Joe Helms with 182. Smith, Gruben and Helms will take over the seats vacated by Dr. Bennie LeBlau, Mrs. Jack Patton and Walter Byrd.

Other election results included 105 votes for Luther Summers, 99 votes for Mrs. C. M. Callan and 79 votes for Bill Graham.

Roby School Board Trustee seats were won by incumbent Jerry Hoodenpyle, who captured 77 of the 97 votes that were cast, and Rex Hall who received 67 votes. Emeterio Soliz received 43 votes in his unsuccessful try for a seat.

In a light turnout Saturday 42 voters went to the polls in the Hobbs school district trustee election and elected Andrew Williams, Jimmy Walker and Howard Gordon in an uncontested election.

Eula Mae Hull received one write-in vote, as did Denis Dooley. L. D. McGrew received 2 write-in votes.

Rotan Chamber Lists Nine Projects For Approval

The Directors of the Rotan Chamber of Commerce listed 9 projects for consideration in a Tuesday morning meeting with Soil Conservation Service representative, Charles Black.

A new airport, hospital, county library and dam on the Double Mountain Fork of the Brazos River were projects given Black for consideration as part of a 13 county program geared to improving the resource conservation programs and community development projects for Rotan.

Black has been meeting with numerous interested county clubs and organizations in an effort to determine what projects, plans and actions are needed in order to make Fisher County a better place in which

to live, work and play.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is authorized through the Food and Agriculture Act of 1962 and other authorities to provide local groups technical and financial help in conserving and developing their

natural resources. USDA also helps those groups sponsoring Resource Conservation and Development projects seek funds and services from other federal state and local sources.

This project in Fisher County is being sponsored by the local SCS office, the commissioners court and the West Texas Council of Governments.

Other projects submitted for possible implementation included an addition to the present golf course, a Rough Draw watershed, flood control program on Hackberry Creek, Fisher County salt pollution study and an accelerated soil conservation program.

In other action Tuesday morning Chamber President Joe Dale Burk appointed a nominating committee consisting of Luther Summers, Chairman; Arvin White and Calvin Crow to fill the ballot for the four retiring directors. The terms of James Springer, Joe Burk, Darmon Bratton and Allan Houston will expire in May.

Chamber Secretary James Springer reported to the Directors that the Rotan Lion Club and City of Rotan had each approved the plan to allocate \$400.00 for additional Christmas lights. Springer also reported that a \$1,200 order for new Christmas lights had been turned over to the manufacturer.

The annual stockholders meeting will be held at the Rotan Gin Company on Saturday, April 10, according to Charles McCall, manager.

"There will be 3 new directors elected and an audit presented to the stockholders on the 1970 operating year," said McCall.

The meeting will be conducted at the Gin Office and will get underway at 2:00.

Cotton dividend checks will also be presented to the stockholders at this meeting.

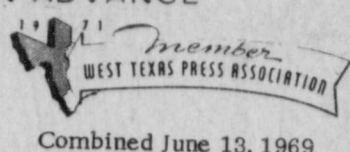

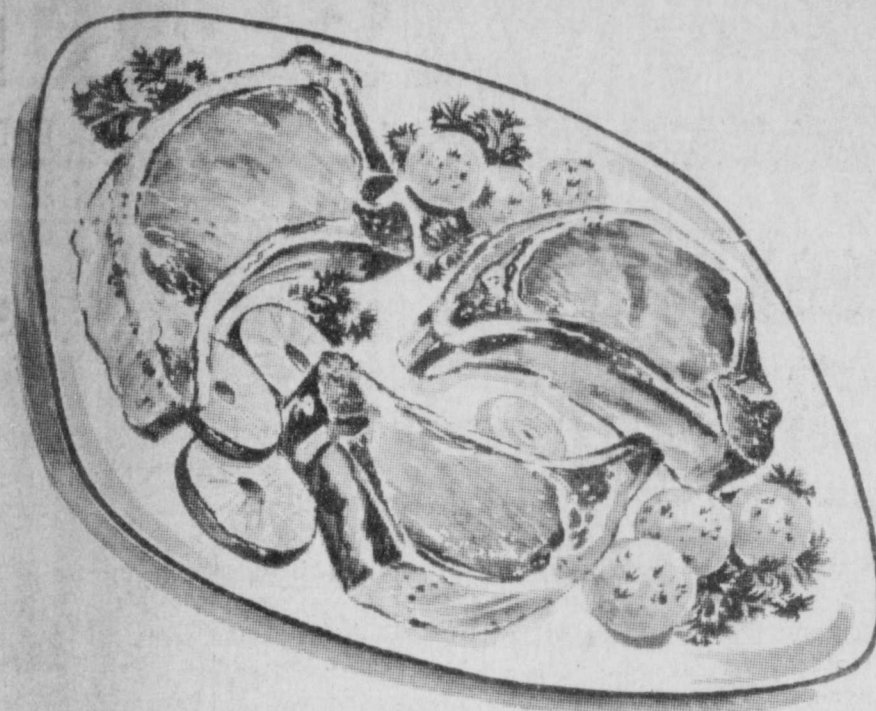

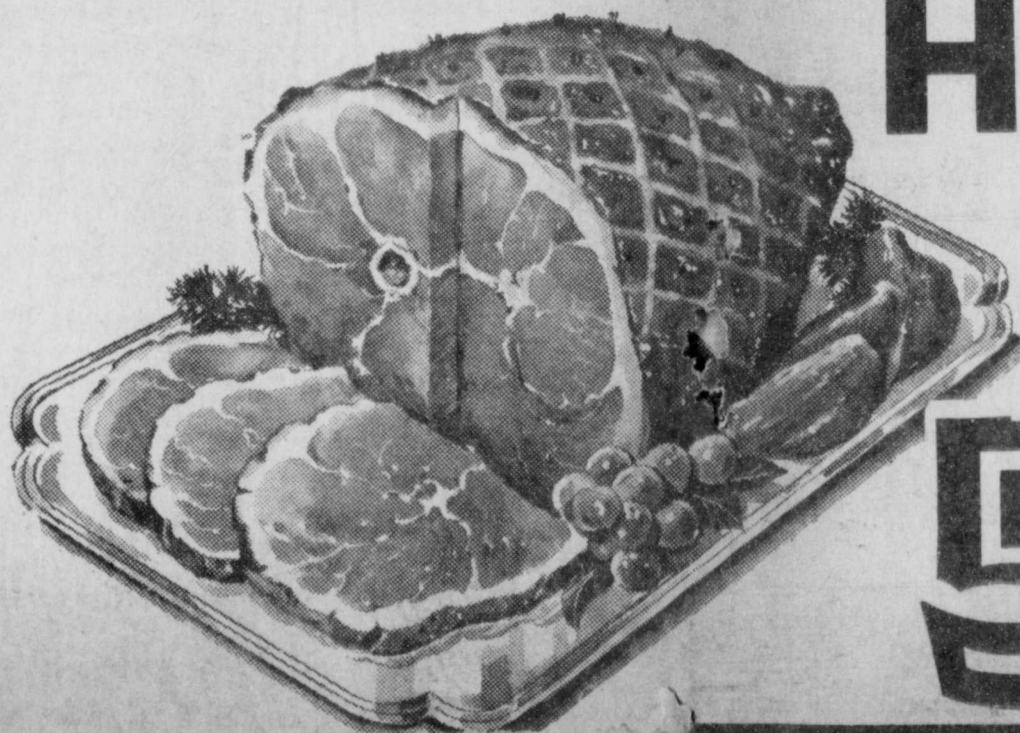

New Conservation Book Available From SCS

A new booklet outlining broad phases of conservation work underway in Texas is now available from the Soil Conservation Service, a local conservation leader said this week.

District Conservationist Charles Black of the Rotan Soil Conservation Service said the new booklet "Soil and Water Conservation in Texas" tells how SCS programs are helping Texans conserve, develop, and protect the state's soil, water, plant, and wildlife resources.

The publication describes SCS soil surveys and tells how they are used by cities, planners, farmers, contractors. It tells how conservation reduces pollution and enhances environmental quality. It also describes resource planning help available from SCS. Other programs explained include the search for improved conservation plants for livestock and wild life; the Great Plains Conservation Program; efforts to help multi-county areas speed up resource programs; and upstream watershed protection projects.

Black said conservation work is coordinated through local soil

and water conservation districts. In the Fisher County area, the Upper Clear Fork Soil and Water Conservation District is the action group through which conservation work is directed. Stanley Nowlin and Alfred Douglass are the district directors for the North zone of the district.

The booklet points out, however, that cooperation of state and federal agencies, cities, counties, conservation organizations, civic groups and others is the key to getting the job done. Black said that in the Fisher County area, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, the Extension Service, Farmers Home Administration and the Fisher County Commissioners Court have been helpful in getting conservation work done in the Upper Clear Fork Soil and Water Conservation District.

Single copies of the booklet "Soil and Water Conservation in Texas" are available free from Soil Conservation Service offices.

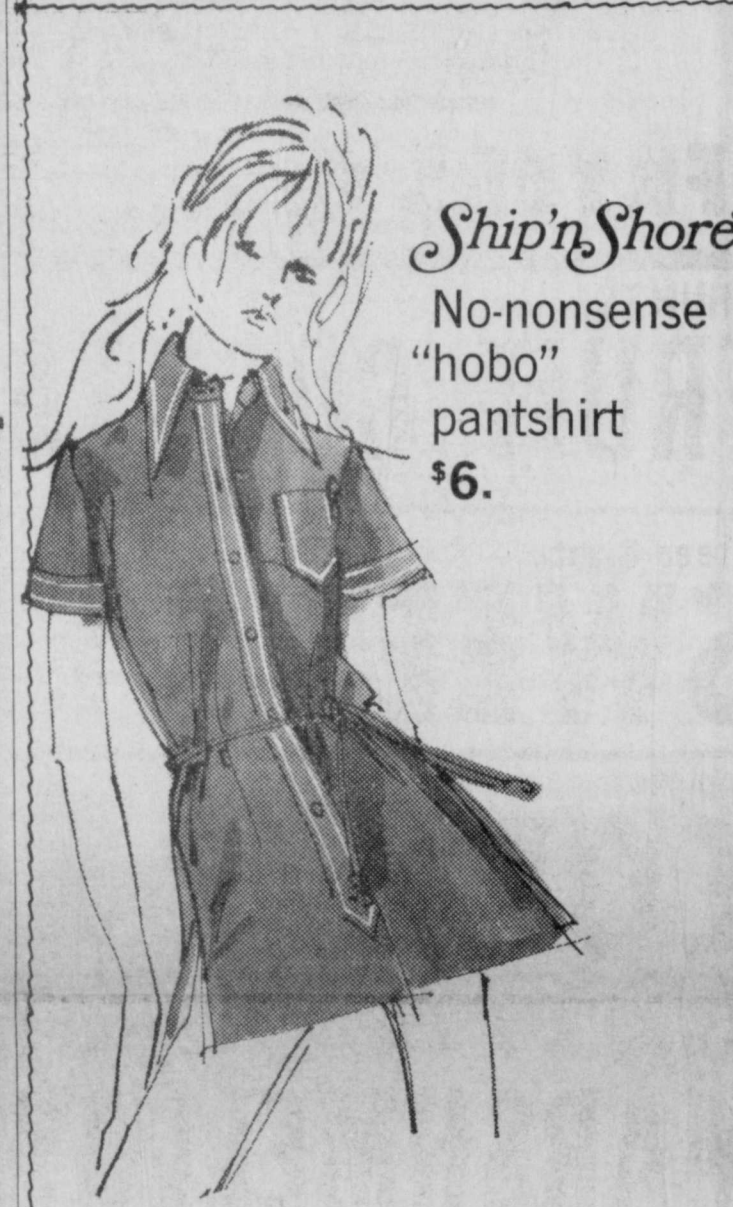

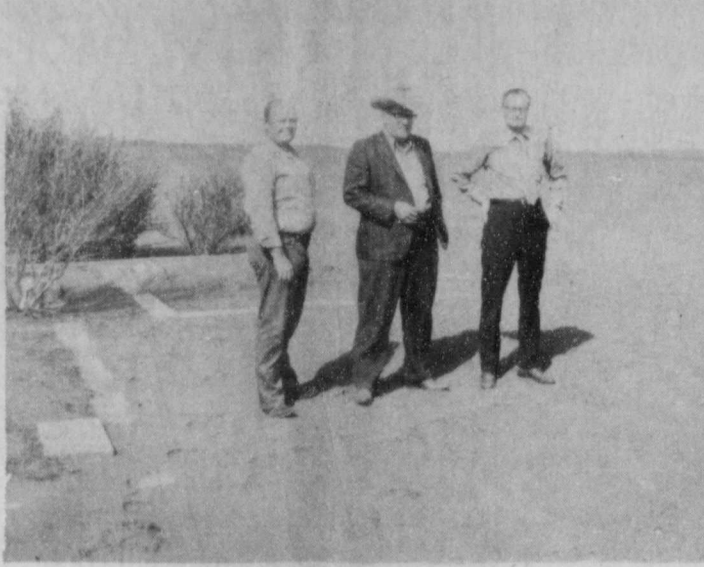

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

The population movement to metropolitan and urban areas in Texas is continuing.

Final census figures show that 79.7 percent of the people in the state in 1970 lived in cities. Texas now ranks 11th among the states in its metropolitan population, with California heading the list at 90.0 percent.

Texas is now the nation's fourth most populous state with some 11,966,730 residents. Only California, New York and Pennsylvania rank higher. Texas ranked sixth in 1960.

Today, 73 percent of the state's population lives in the 23 Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas, areas of populations over 50,000 designated by the federal government. This number will increase if additional counties are added to the list after analysis of the detailed census results. In 1960, only 63.4 percent of Texas' people lived in counties then designated as "metropolitan."

Total population for Fisher County was 6,344, a 19.3% decline from 1960.

A 60-day restriction on movement of swine in Texas was ordered on Tuesday by the Texas Animal Health Commission in an effort to control hog cholera. The order became effective on March 29 and the movement of all feeder and breeder swine within the state will be allowed only by a permit issued after inspection of the herd from which the originate. Slaughter swine may be consigned directly to livestock markets for sale or slaughter or directly to slaughter houses.

Something to think about--- The American Dairy Association says that by the time he is 70, the average American will have used 26 million tons of water, 10,000 pounds of meat, 14 tons of milk and cream, 8,000 pounds of wheat and other great quantities of products from the earth. And who says agriculture is a declining industry?

When pasture land burns everybody loses. With the continuation of the very dry conditions, fire is a real hazard.

For the stockman, the loss of dry forage not only means the loss of animal or wildlife food or cover, but also his very existence as a producer of meat for the consuming public. Then too his land is left bare and could become the victim of wind and water erosion, should the dry conditions continue.

Bare or unprotected land can be severely eroded by heavy rain, tanks and streams and even large water holding impoundments badly silted. Too, stands of desirable grazing plants can be damaged by fire, and under drought conditions, their recovery can be very slow.

Therefore, start no fire that you cannot immediately control or better still do no burning of any kind until conditions warrant.

Bagworms are destructive pests on many evergreen and deciduous shrubs and trees, and sometimes on neglected fruit trees. Late March and early April is the time to control them.

First, remove the bags from infested plants and destroy them. Then when temperatures stay above 60 degrees for 6 to 10 hours during the day, start applying control measures. The pesticide applications should be continued at 7 to 10 day intervals until the infestation is eliminated.

Sevin, chlordane, lead arsenate or toxaphene will effectively control the bagworm. Directions for mixing and applying the materials are given on the label container and should be carefully followed.

The bagworm moth deposits from 500 to 1,000 eggs in a brown, tapered bag attached to a branch of the plant in September. The eggs hatch in March and the small worms immediately begin to feed on the plant's foliage and bark.

The young worms or caterpillars construct a small tapered bag of silk-like material and attach to it pieces of bark and foliage. The bag turns a brown in color.

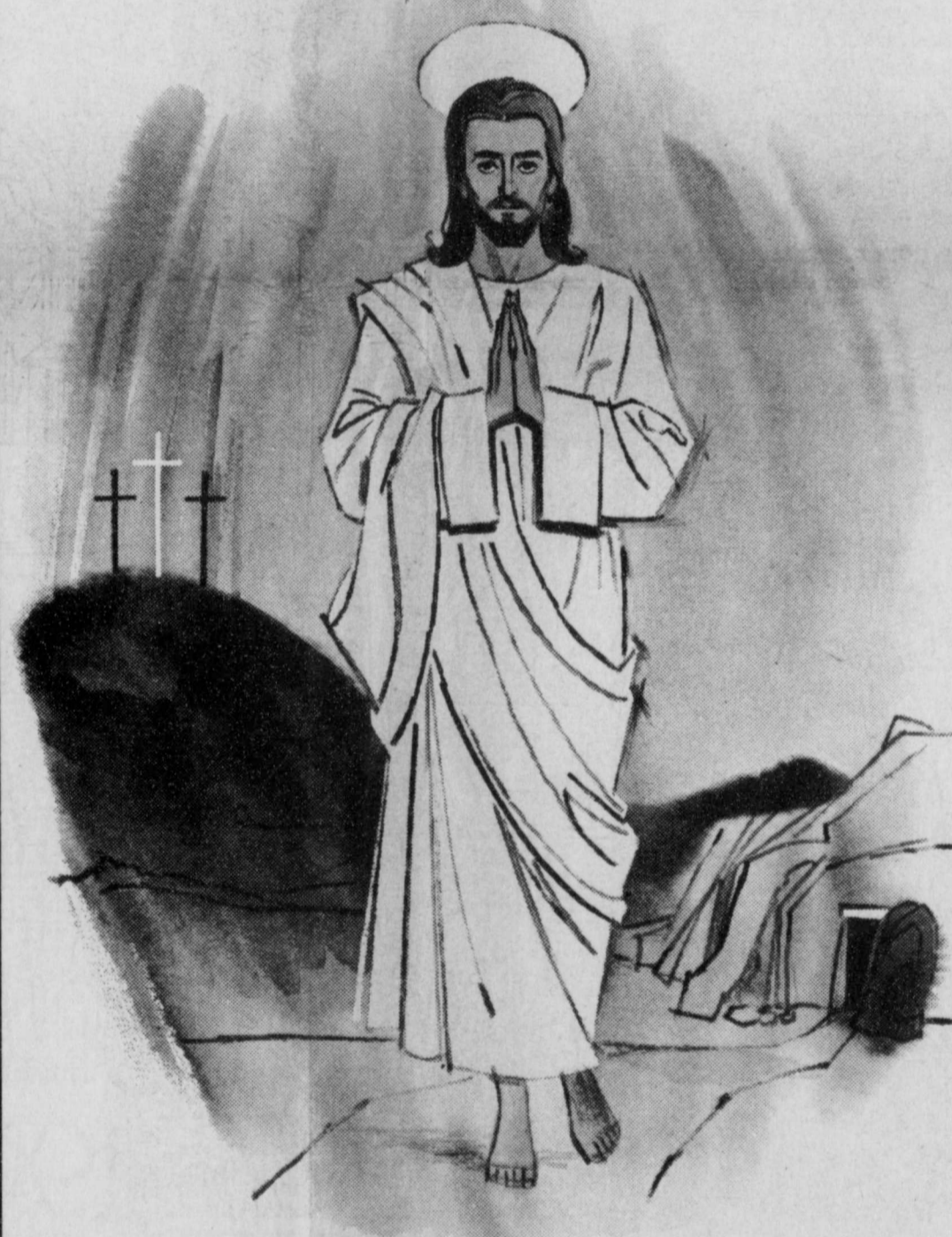

Social Security Report

Social Security beneficiaries born in 1908 or later, who earned over \$1680 in 1970 are required to file a report of their earnings with the Social Security Administration by April 15, 1971. This report is in addition to any Federal or State tax return and it must be filed with the Social Security Administration according to R.R. Tuley social security manager for Abilene.

People receiving disability benefits are not required to file the annual report of earnings, but should report immediately if they become self-employed or take a job. All other beneficiaries, including families of disabled persons, are under the retirement test and each must report his earnings annually, if more than \$1680.

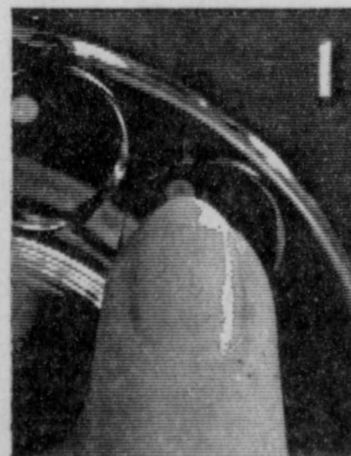

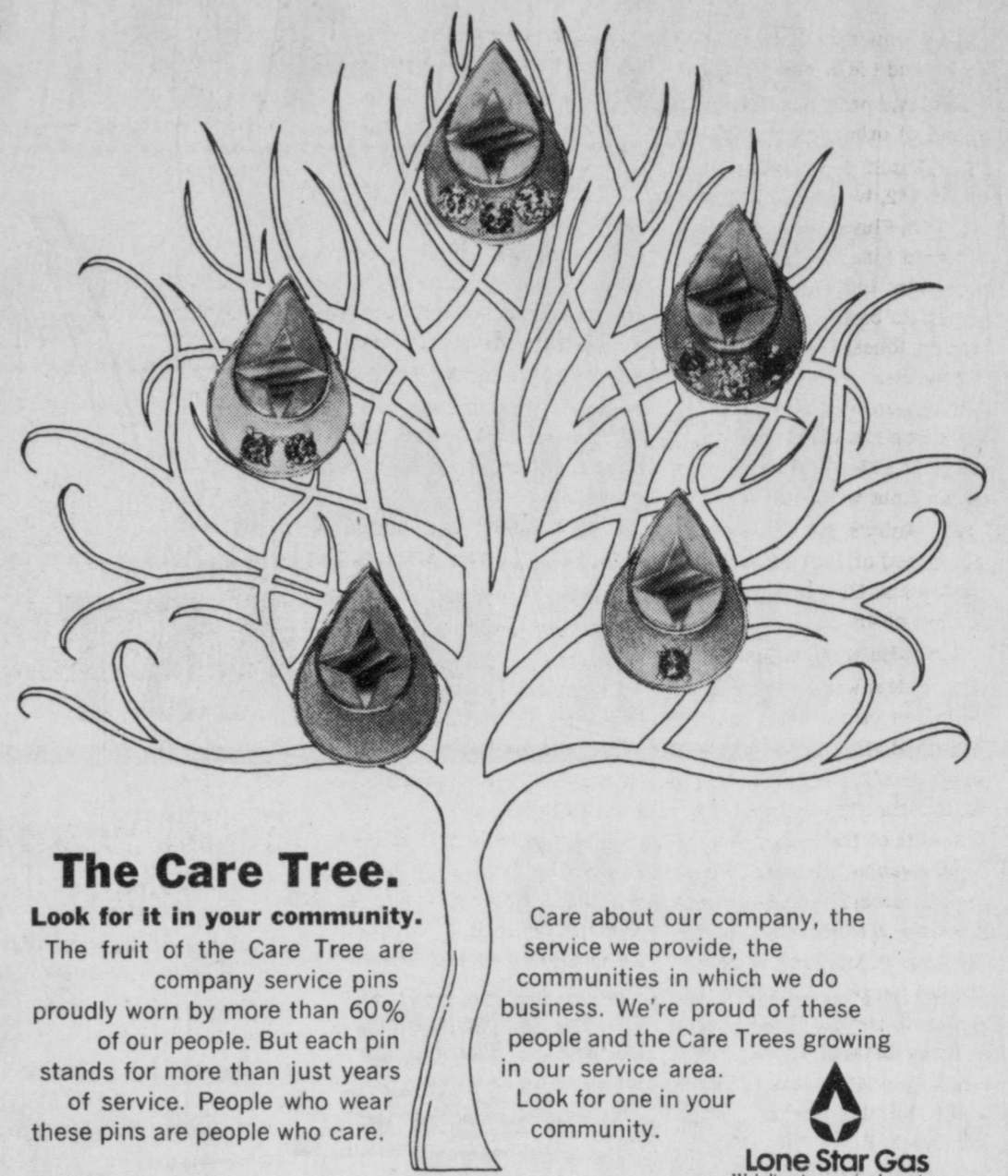

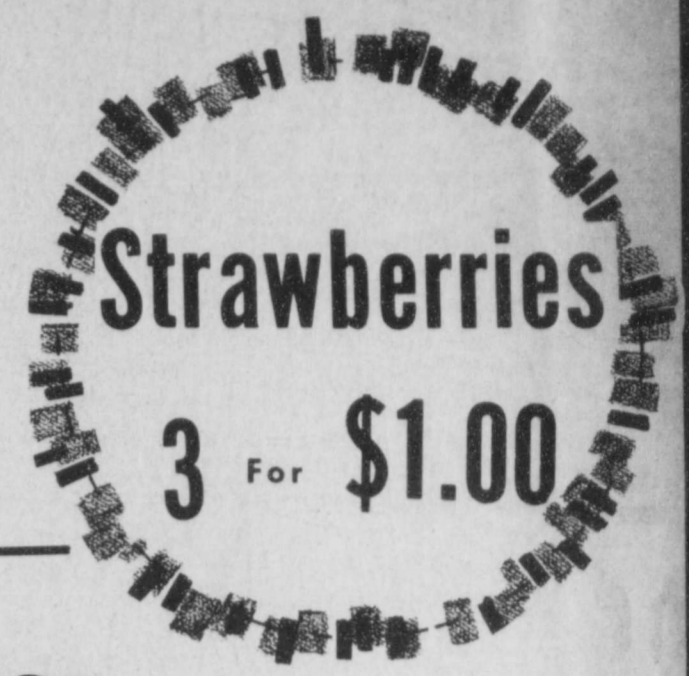
