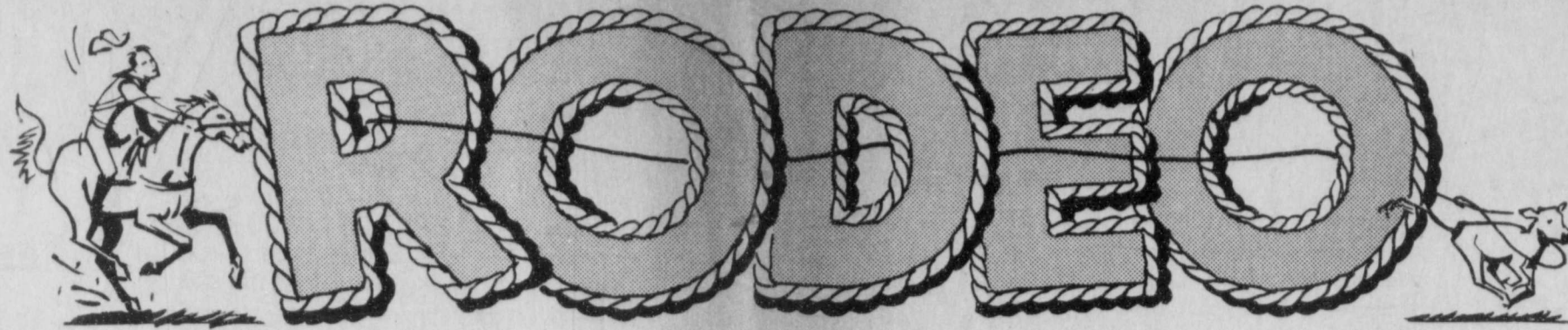


WILD WEST



A touch of the "old West" returns to West Texas this weekend as residents look forward with anticipation and excitement to the opening of the Sheriff's Posse sponsored Championship Amateur Rodeo.

Rotan's rodeo will kick-off with a big downtown parade beginning at 5:00 p. m., Thursday afternoon. Many organizations and county businesses will be entering floats in the parade and all Rotan children are invited to enter their decorated bicycles in the festivity. The Fisher County Sheriff's Posse will award three prizes for the best decorated entries in the float division.

At 8:00 p. m., Thursday night, the first of three big nights of rodeoing will begin. Five main events are on tap, Bareback bronc riding; calf roping; senior barrel racing; saddle bronc riding and bull riding. A special Jack Pot Barrel Racing event has been added this year. All Fisher County boys and girls 19 years of age and under are eligible to enter. Entry fee for this event is \$2.00.

Many Fisher County residents will remember the fine group of stock provided in the past by Adrian Parker of St. Jo, Texas, J. N. McGinnis, the very talented voice of

You can bet your boots that the clowns will have some new tricks and side splitters as they play their part in the show by entertaining and distracting the wild bulls.

Admission to the rodeo will be \$1.50 for adults; \$1.00 for children 12 and under and little cowpokes 6 and under will be admitted free.

Flag Day June 14th

FLAG DAY is celebrated on June 14 in memory of the day in 1777 when the Continental Congress adopted the Stars and Stripes as the official flag of the United States. Flag Day is not an official holiday, but the President proclaims a public observance every year.

In the first years of the Revolutionary War, Americans fought under many flags. The colonists wanted one flag, not many. Finally on June 14, 1777, the Continental Congress passed the following Resolution:

"Resolved, That the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation."

The Continental Congress left no record to show why it chose red, white, and blue as colors for the flag. The resolution on the Great Seal of the United States, chosen in 1782, listed meanings for the colors. RED is for hardness and courage, WHITE for purity and innocence, and BLUE for vigilance, perseverance and justice.

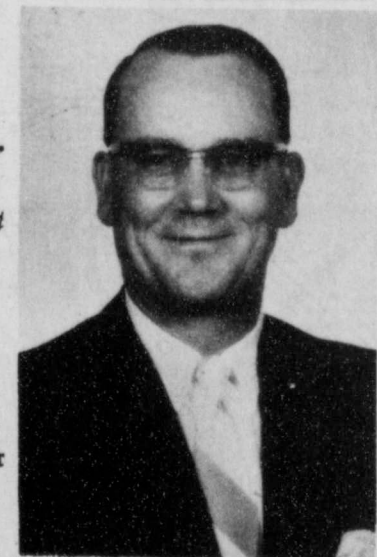

Payoff 1979 Roby Water Authority

Roy Noles, local drug store owner in Roby, presented a very informative program before the Roby Lion's Club at their noon meeting last Thursday.

Noles is a member of the Fisher County Water Authority and presented a review of the progress made by the Water Authority to the Lion's Club members.

According to Noles, the Fisher County Water Authority borrowed \$290,000 in 1952 to build a water line from Sweetwater to Roby. The water authority entered into an agreement with the City of Sweetwater to purchase treated water at a cost of 16¢ per thousand gallons. In order to retire this \$290,000 indebtedness the water authority charged the Roby customers 66¢ per thousand gallons used.

In October of 1963 the basic cost of water was elevated to 20¢ and in June of 1970 another 5¢ hike brought the water cost to 25¢ per thousand gallons for the water authority. The Fisher County Water Authority has not advanced the 66¢ per thousand gallons set up in 1952 as

their cost has been increased. Consequently, where the Water Authority was making a 50¢ per gallon profit until 1963, they now only realize 41¢ per gallon.

In the 19 years the Fisher County Water Authority has been operating they have depleted the \$290,000 indebtedness to \$153,000 and had a \$57,000 balance on hand at the end of 1970.

Sweetwater agreed to furnish Roby water at cost and according to Page 5

Omar Burleson's Comments TEXAS LEGISLATURE REDISTRICTING

Congressman Omar Burleson today commented on the Congressional Redistricting just completed by the Texas Legislature. "By legal necessity," he said, "the State Legislature has just gone through the most difficult job of reapportioning Congressional Districts on the basis of population. The outcome of these adjustments on the basis of population is never calculated to please everyone and, as a matter of fact, they seldom please anyone completely. The Legislature does the best job it can, and it is no easy one."

In Burleson's statement, he continue, "It is my feeling that a community of interest should be maintained in establishing Congressional Districts. It is fundamental that this be preserved for best representation of the people and, in this instance, I believe the Counties added to the 17th Congressional District closely relate to the area which it has been my privilege to represent in the Congress for a great many years. Our District will remain a 31-

County District. We are fortunate to retain 19 Counties, including Fisher County, and I am delighted with the prospect of representing the 12 Counties which will be added."

ed the fact, however, that twelve Counties will be removed from his District. "I regret exceedingly that I will not have the privilege of representing the people of these Counties after

the 92nd Congress, but I shall maintain a personal interest in the communities and hope to keep contacts with the valued friendships established over the years," he said.

Garvis Hinson Honored As Top Appliance Serviceman

Garvis Hinson, Rotan, was honored in Dayton, Ohio recently as one of the top appliance servicemen in the nation.

Hinson, employed by West Texas Utilities Co., won the expense-paid, two-day Frigidaire division of Motors when he was selected as one of only 72 servicemen to represent some 1200 technicians from across the country. Twelve were selected from each of the company's six major sales regions.

At a special awards banquet, Harold W. Campbell, General Motors vice president and general manager of Frigidaire, told Mr. Hinson and the other technicians:

"We respect and honor you for what you have accomplished. Fulfilling the rigid standards which have been established for

accredited technicians is not an easy task, especially when you consider that any of your customers, by one single complaint, can cause you to lose out."

Willie Mae Rogers, director of Good Housekeeping's Institute, added her congratulations in her keynote talk to the visiting technicians.

While in Dayton, the local technician also toured Frigidaire's manufacturing, engineering, and participated in technical sessions, customer relations clinics and service seminars.

The Accredited Technician program, first of its kind in the appliance industry, was originated by Frigidaire in 1963 to recognize individual servicemen who meet high standards in workmanship, experience, training, attitude, and customer relations.

The award is made only on an annual basis and the serviceman must requalify each year. He is rated not only by the appliance dealer he works for but also by the individual customers he serves. One justified customer complaint during the year disqualifies a candidate serviceman.

The more demanding Master Accredited Technician rating, introduced by Frigidaire in 1969, requires the same high standards necessary for the basic accreditation rating. In addition, however, the master candidate must pass a two-hour written exam administered by Frigidaire instructors at one of 29 General Motors Training Centers across the country.

d) Defendant, Ann Hart, owns an undivided 1/4 interest in the oil, gas and other minerals in and under the subject property.

e) Plaintiff has executed an oil, gas and mineral lease covering his mineral interest in the subject property while Defendant's mineral interest is unleased and that the owner of the lease covering Plaintiff's interest is not willing to drill and develop the subject property until the Defendant's mineral interest is leased.

Plaintiff, through his attorney, makes affidavit that the whereabouts of the Defendant is unknown.

Herein fail not but of this writ make answer as the law requires. If this citation is not served within ninety (90) days after its issuance it shall be returned unserved.

ing to reports, the amount consumed by Roby only represents approximately 3% of the total consumption.

Taxes were established at 50¢ per \$100.00 valuation in 1952 in order to deplete the debt and were lowered to 25¢ in 1964. Noles remarked that barring any unforeseen emergencies, the Water Authority should be able to go right on and pay off the balance on the note without any trouble.

In 1963, the authority showed a profit of \$11,375.00. This was the year that Sylvester and McCaulley joined with Roby in the water venture.

In 1965 there was a profit of \$5,803.00; 1966 profits fell to only \$880.00. During the years of 1967 through 1969 the Fisher County Water Authority showed a loss of approximately \$10,000.00, but recovered in 1970 by showing a profit of \$589.00.

The entire water system is expected to be paid in full in 1979 according to Noles.

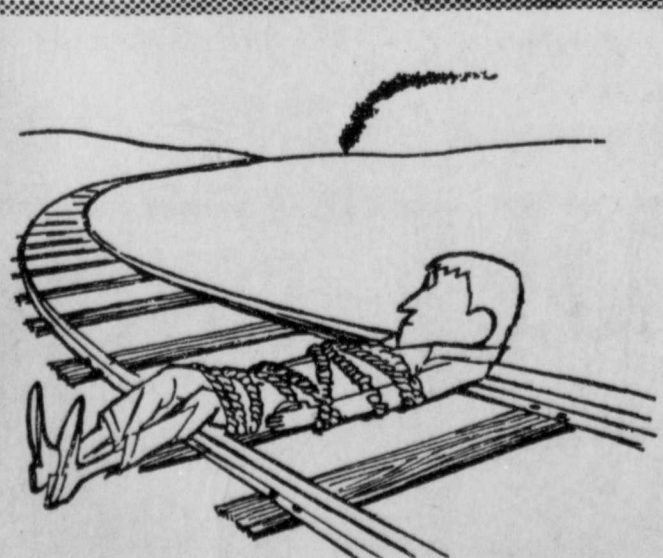

Sixty-second Legislature wound up its regular session with a bang and a roar—and a few whimpers.

In a photo-finish, the House-Senate conferees turned out a record \$6.9 billion biennial budget for near-deadline consideration.

Lawmakers earlier agreed on a \$617 million tax bill which will go into effect July, then followed up with \$35 million worth of new taxes on liquor-by-the-drink and by-the-gallon. Texans will be paying four percent sales (five, in most cities) and auto sales-rental tax, 18.5 cents a pack on cigarettes; \$4.50 per \$1,000 on corporation franchises; and \$5 per barrel on beer. A 10 per cent gross receipts tax will be levied on mixed-drink sales and \$1.95 a gallon on liquor sales generally. A gasoline tax increase, approved earlier, was repealed in a subsequent bill.

Among other achievements for which the 62nd Legislature will be remembered are:

Ratification of a federal constitutional amendment to lower the voting age to 18.

Approval of the liquor-by-the-drink sales act and submission of a mixed-drink referendum to the first group of wet counties on May 18.

Congressional and legislative redistricting.

Submitted a constitutional amendment to authorize the convening legislature in 1974 to sit as a convention to rewrite Texas' constitution.

Passed far-reaching bank law reform legislation.

Creation of a tuition-backed revenue-bond fund to build new state colleges.

Establishment (by constitutional amendment) of a \$100 million bond fund to aid cities that build sewer facilities.

Lawmakers gave up on budgeting for welfare services for this biennium, and will return next year (if not sooner) to appropriate funds for 1973 assistance to the needy, meanwhile hoping for expanded federal aid.

AG OPINIONS--An appointee who served one day as "executive" of a printing company was ineligible for the "employer" membership position on the Texas Industrial Accident Board, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

Governor does not have power to veto proposed constitutional amendments.

A bill providing that a dry area annexed to a wet area shall occupy the same wet status as the annexing area is unconstitutional, as it violates the local option mandate.

Applicants signing petitions for incorporation of a new town must be qualified electors who have resided in the area at least six months. Area must contain more than 200 inhabitants (who do not have to be qualified electors).

Out-of-state witnesses in criminal cases receive compensation solely from the state, not the counties.

Environmental Protection Act of 1971 is constitutional in authorizing private individuals to maintain legal anti-pollution actions on behalf of the public or to sue the state, but vagueness and caption of the bill offer constitutional problems.

Bill authorizing commissioners courts in "counties of one million to 1.5 million" to prohibit keeping of hogs within 500 feet of a residence not in an incorporated city is unconstitutional.

A hospital district in which an indigent prisoner was held by the sheriff is liable for his medical bills when it did not have adequate facilities and treatment had to be administered by another hospital.

Rites Held**

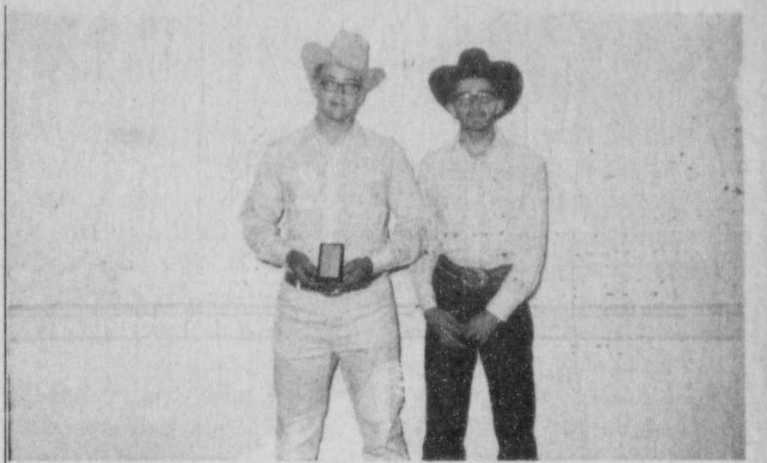

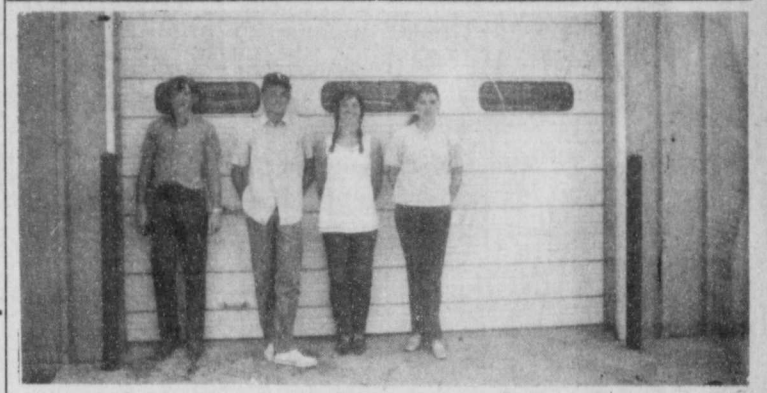

Accent on Health

Ask the first 100 people you meet what their favorite sport is and chances are good that at least 70 will say swimming. Even gold and fishing have taken back seats as sport choices, a recent nationwide survey shows.

Thousands of new pools will be constructed this year throughout the nation. In Texas at this moment well over 50,000 pools are attracting swimmers like bees to a flower.

This is all to the good, because swimming lends itself to social adjustment. It teaches coordination and builds stamina and character. A child who overcomes fear of water has learned courage.

But there are also elements of risk. This accelerated interest in swimming creates hazards to life and limb, and dangers of disease transmission. That's why the State Health Department conducts courses to teach pool operators the various skills of their jobs.

"Short schools" for pool operators are concentrated during the months of spring and early summer, the intention being to enroll as many operators as possible before hot weather and overflow crowds make it hard for them to get away from their work.

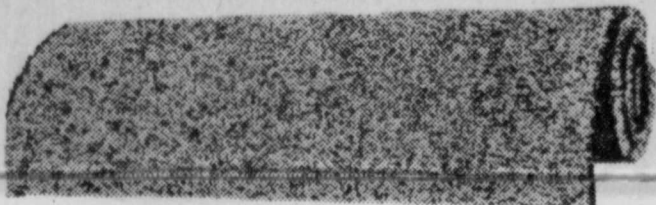
Co-sponsored by the Texas Beach and Pool Association, courses consist of six hours of intensive technical and practical instruction. It covers such things as how to disinfect the water, and how to control water acidity. Water acidity, incidentally, is the factor which causes swimmers' eyes to burn, rather than chlorine as is popularly supposed.

The course also covers pool safety, bathhouse sanitation, and the various filtering systems used by modern pools.

How important are swimming pools as links in the chain of disease transmission? Eye, ear, nose, and throat, skin and intestinal infections are among the most common conditions spread in swimming pools. Typhoid fever and diarrhea diseases have been traced to neighborhood pools.

Most prevalent, however, is ringworm of the feet, commonly called "athlete's foot." It is not contracted in pool water, but by walking on wet walks and floors on which the spores of the infection flourish.

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

The recent rains should brighten everyone's face. Reports are from 3-6 inches over all of the county. Sorghums seem to have grown 6 inches since the rain.

Numerous reports of deaths of cattle from emphysema of the lungs have been received at the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory from over the state during the last two weeks.

This condition is also known as pulmonary adenomatosis, interstitial pneumonia, atypical pneumonia, panters or in Britain, as fog fever.

The disease is very similar to the condition in humans, caused primarily by smoking, however, the disease in cattle has nothing to do with smoking or air pollution.

Rather, it is thought to be caused by an allergic reaction to something the animals are eating. The lungs are the target organ for allergic manifestations in cattle. While the causative agent varies, most of the current cases are associated with the high protein constituents of young Bermuda grass pastures. Cattle have been on these pastures from 2 to 14 days when the first animals are affected. Five to 50 percent of a herd can be stricken. Deaths can be rapid or chronic cases can develop. Up to 50% of those affected may die.

If cases appear, it is suggested that the cattle be removed from the pasture immediately, without undue stress, fed hay and/or grain, and watched closely for a few days. Any animals that breathe unusually fast or with difficulty should be eased to a place where they can be treated. Veterinarians are using antihistamines, atropine and other drugs, if affected cattle are found soon enough.

Cattle should be held off the pasture, until it matures and then should be returned, at first, for short intervals only. Another alternative is to feed hay prior to allowing the cattle short grazing times on the pasture. A veterinarian's services should be sought for diagnosis, treatment or handling of affected herds.

Proper care for roses at this time of the year can mean attractive plants and lots of flowers this fall. Don't lose interest in the rose garden now as hot weather begins to take over.

As the flowers fade and petals fall, remove the old flowers. Don't let the plant expend its energy producing useless seeds. When removing spent flowers, make the cut just above the second five-leaflet leaf above the main cane or branch. This same rule applies when cutting flowers for arrangement use. Cuts made higher on the cane will usually result in blind shoots or deformed flowers.

Roses are heavy eaters, of plant food, that is. They require applications of fertilizer for

optimum growth. The use of a balanced fertilizer at 4 to 6 week intervals is suggested. Manufacturer's suggested rates should be followed. Do not apply fertilizer after mid-August in order to allow the plants to mature and be less susceptible to winter injury.

In areas of the state where iron chlorosis is a problem, local county agents can supply information for correcting this situation.

During hot and dry weather, rose beds should be thoroughly soaked each week to a depth of 8 to 10 inches.

The preventive spray program for mildew and blackspot should be continued. Maneb or Phaltan are excellent materials for preventing blackspot while Phaltan or Karathane are best for mildew control. The spray program should be on a weekly basis from the time growth starts in the spring until the first killing frost in the fall. The interval between applications during periods of high temperature and dry weather may be extended to 10 days or two weeks until mid-August when the weekly applications should be resumed.

Gasoline is a volatile liquid and the storage facilities can have a bearing on its performance in an engine and the amount lost.

For example, did you know that a dark-colored 300-gallon gasoline fuel tank positioned in bright sunlight during hot weather may lose 10 to 12 percent of its capacity by evaporation in about three months? Losses may run higher in smaller storage barrels. Painting the storage tank with white or aluminum paint can reduce evaporation losses by a third.

Fuel contains a blend of several parts, one of which is extremely volatile and provides engines with easy starting. Most of this ingredient can be lost when the gasoline evaporates.

Seasonal changes in grades of gasolines spell trouble if fuel blended for one season is carried over in storage tanks until another season. For example, a winter-grade fuel should not be bought just before spring. This gas may cause the engine to skip or stop because of vapor lock. The condition occurs when gasoline boils in the fuel lines, fuel pump or carburetor. Summer grade fuel may cause hard starting during cold weather.

When gas ages, it becomes gummy, similar to shellac. This gum may stop up the carburetor and cause engine deposits. It could even cause engine damage when mixed with small amounts of fresh gasoline.

Medicare Premiums To Increase July 1, 1971

Because of increasing costs of medical services, Medicare's medical insurance premium will be increased from \$5.30 to \$5.60 per month effective July 1, 1971 according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene.

Those who are enrolled in the medical insurance program and who receive social security, railroad retirement, or a federal civil service pension will simply continue to have the premium deducted from their checks. People not receiving one of these payments must pay their premium direct.

Tuley said, "Even with the impending premium increase, Medicare's medical insurance is still considered a good buy for those age 65 and over. The federal government pays one-half the cost of this insurance from general tax revenues. Those covered by medical insurance will be receiving \$11.20 worth of insurance for \$5.60.

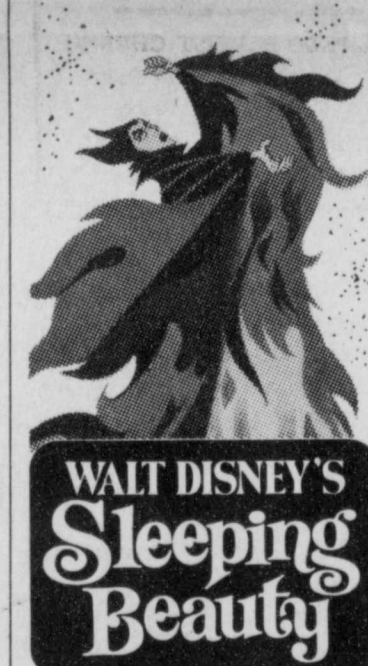
Medical insurance helps pay for a variety of necessary medical services including doctors bills, ambulance service, outpatient hospital treatment, and rental or purchase of durable

medical equipment such as wheelchair or hospital bed for use at home.

He stressed that the premium applies only to medical insurance. Hospital insurance, which pays for inpatient hospital service, is financed by social security payroll contributions.

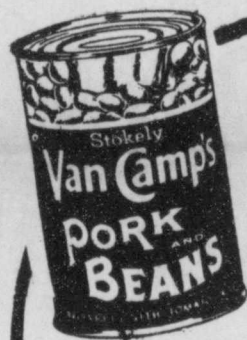
