REA Loan Receives Approval

Congressman Omar Burleson announced approval of a \$355,000 Rural Electrification Administration loan to the Taylor Electric Cooperative, Inc. at Merkel, serving Taylor, Callahan, Coke, Eastland, Fisher, Jones, Nolan and Shackelford Counties.

This loan, together with \$310,581 of the borrower's general funds and supplemental financing from the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corporation which the cooperative proposed to obtain is for the following purpose: To finance 119 miles of distribution lines to serve 870 new consumers and to finance extensive system im-

provements including 3 miles of new tie line and conversion of 20 miles of existing lines to a higher capacity.

Mr. O. S. Moore of Nolan is President of the Cooperative. Mr. Don J. Hart at Merkel is manager.

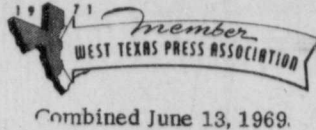
Singing Group Meeting Fri

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Farm and ranch assets in Texas totaled \$29.2 billion on January 1, 1971—showing an increase of four percent or \$1.1 billion from a year earlier.

Advances in real estate values made up 73 percent of 1970's gain in value of net assets. Increases in values of real estate have been accountinf for most of the gains in recent years.

Most of the remaining gain for 1970 was accounted for by higher values for livestock and poultry inventories and machinery and motor vehicles.

Farm prices, which advanced 10.3 percent between 1965 and 1970, were dampened by a rise in farm productivity. Improved technology and generally favorable weather resulted in a 22.5 percent increase in farm output per man hour. In the 1965-1970 period net income gains were held to 11.8 percent by production costs that rose 26 percent.

Changes in the financial conditions of farmers are closely related to trends in the United States economy since non-farmers make up over 95 percent of the population and are the primary consumers of farm products. Changes in the financial well being of the non-farmer segment of the population affect the economic situation of farmers and ranchers through changes in demand for farm products.

Personal income in the United States increased at an annual rate of 8.3 percent in current dollars or 4.8 percent in constant dollars during the last half of the 1960's.

The annual increase in consumer prices during the 1965-1970 period averaged 3.5 percent while personal taxes rose an average of about nine percent. Annual gains in real disposable income averaged four percent for the same period.

The way to maintain high milk production in the summer is to neutralize the forces working against the dairy cow.

Good management is needed to offset high temperatures, insects, sometimes inadequate water supplies, and similar factors. One suggestion is to keep the best pasture close to the farm buildings for night grazing. Dairymen are asked to consider the use of recommended fly repellents on cows, rotational grazing of pastures and providing plenty of cool, clean water and shade in each pasture. If milk production drops, start feeding hay or silage or both if pastures are short.

High grain (low roughage) rations are better suited to hot weather feeding than to cold periods when cows need the ad-

ded heat from roughage digestion and metabolism.

Summing up, the following are suggested: Provide the cows with sufficient high quality feed, avoid mature pastures grasses, keep animal travel at a minimum, control troublesome insects on cattle on pasture, and be sure the cows have adequate drinking water.

A cow may use up the energy equivalent of one to three pounds of milk per day foraging for food and even more as she walks long distances for water and shade. Cows sometimes drink up to five times more water on hot days than cool ones, and they may drink three or four times more often.

Under proper management, the "summer slump" in milk production can be avoided.

Provide some comfort factors for your hogs this summer and keep the hot summer weather from cutting into the profits and efficiency of your operation.

Proper ventilation on the farrowing house is a must to save pigs. Fans delivering air individually to sows through a four to six inch pipe are used in many confinement farrowing houses. Use of adequate ventilation and shade can also "shore up" profits in finishing hogs. Summer gains may be cut in half by inadequate cooling.

Sprinklers or foggers may be used where the hogs are free to move in and out of the wet area but when these devices create dampness and wet floors in a farrowing house, the producer is faced with costly troubles.

Research shows that when the temperature goes about 90 degrees the feed intake drops and growth rate and efficiency decline. Hogs need a temperature ranging from 55 to 70 degrees for maximum growth and efficiency.

It is good business to keep hogs cool and comfortable even though some expense may be involved.

"What is it Smedley, I'm busy."

"It's about my salary, Mr. Goodie. I wonder if you could give me a decrease."

"You had a decrease less than a year ago, Smedley."

"I know, sir, I wouldn't ask if it wasn't important, but I sure could use less money."

"What size decrease did you have in mind?"

"I was hoping for a \$25 cut in salary."

"Twenty-five dollars! That's a big slide, Smedley. What have you done to merit it?"

"I've worked for the company 23 years, Mr. Goodie. And I've never let you down. My work has always been up to standard."

"I realize that, Smedley, but \$25. Wouldn't you be satisfied with a \$15 cut? We have a budget right now. We're already below last year's salary figures. And I hear the union is furious, tax wise."

"Mr. Goodie, a \$15 cutback is better than none, but my wife and I had our hearts set on a \$25 decrease."

"How about \$20?"

"If I get \$25 less, we'd be eligible for an apartment in the city's new development, the one with a pool, sauna and tennis court. Besides my son would qualify for a government scholarship and we could get his teeth fixed."

"You drive a hard bargain, Smedley. But you win. You get a \$25 decrease on this condition. If your work slips, you'll take a \$10 raise, no questions asked."

"Bless you, Mr. Goodie."

"And, Smedley, will you invite me over for tennis and a swim some night when you get into your new place?"

Accent on Health

Texas school children will soon be among the best immunized in the country.

The recent session of the Texas Legislature amended the Texas Education Code to require immunizations against certain childhood diseases as a condition for entering school.

"This new state law will have great impact on the immunization level of the school population and, eventually, all the population of Texas," says Dr. J. E. Peavy, State Health Commissioner. "We are delighted with the law."

The Texas State Department of Health now has authority to set the rules and regulations for implementation of the compulsory immunizations. The Board of Health has set January 1, 1972 as the date by which all children's immunizations series must have begun. School districts that have required compulsory immunizations in the past will still maintain their usual September deadlines for proving immunizations to enter school.

The immunizations previously required to all school children were set only by the individual school district, but now the state is requiring immunizations for up to six childhood diseases in some cases.

Elementary students will now be required to be immunized against diphtheria, tetanus, polio and smallpox. If there is no history of measles, that shot will also be required. All children under 12 years of age must also be immunized against rubella.

The number of required immunizations is fewer for junior high, high school and college-level students. Junior high and high school requires immunizations against only diphtheria, polio, tetanus, and smallpox. College requires full immunization against polio if the student is under 19 years of age, and immunization against diphtheria, tetanus, and smallpox within the past ten years.

Nearly every student in the state will be covered by this broad new law. Immunizations will be required of students in kindergartens that are associated with elementary schools, all the elementary or secondary public schools, private or parochial schools, academies, colleges, universities, schools for the blind, deaf, mentally ill and mentally retarded. The only children exempted are those with religious conflicts, or medical problems—those that a physician determines would be injurious to health.

Dr. Peavy said he urged all parents to contact their physician or public health clinic now, and begin their children's immunization program long before they enter school.

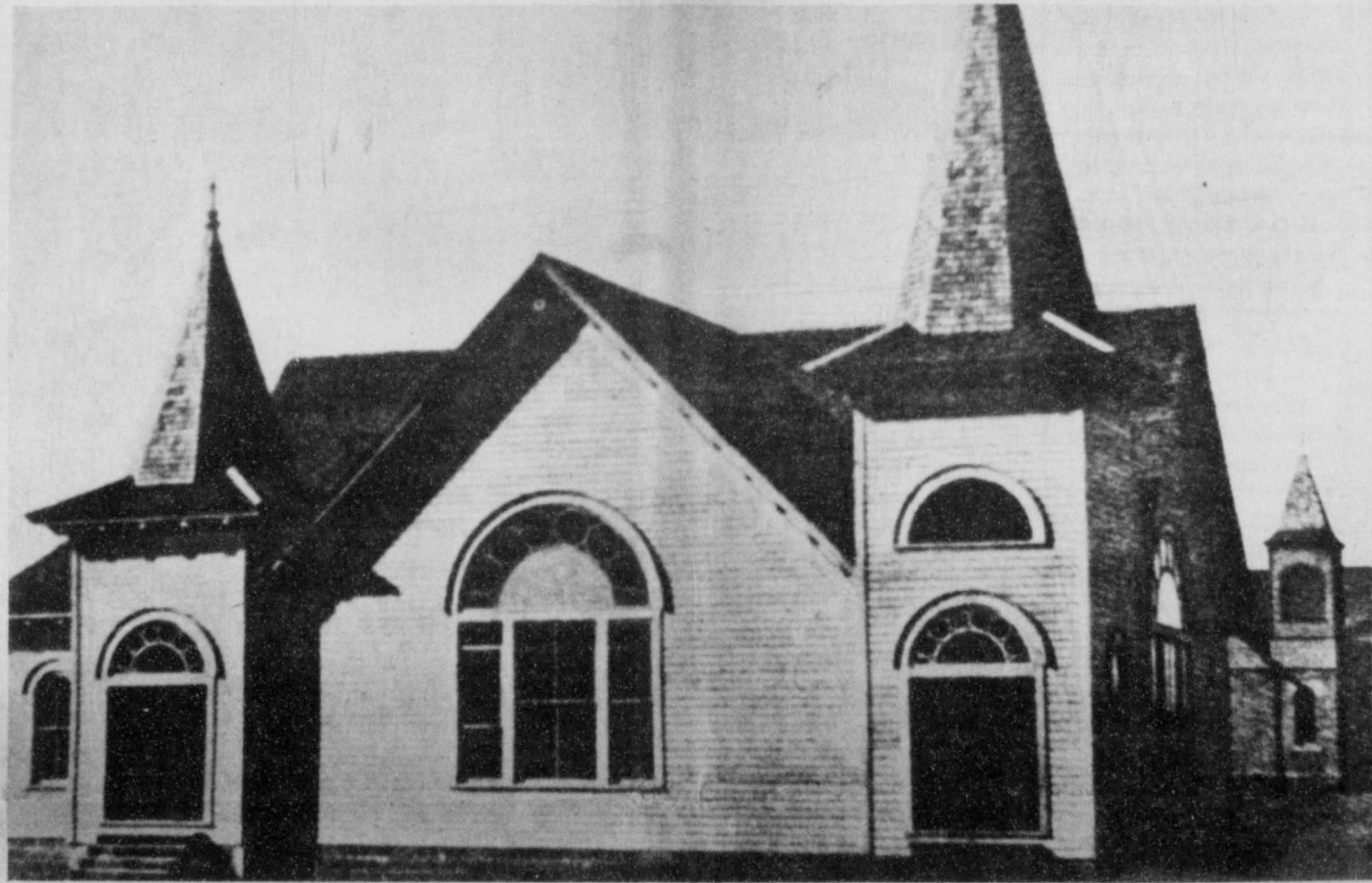

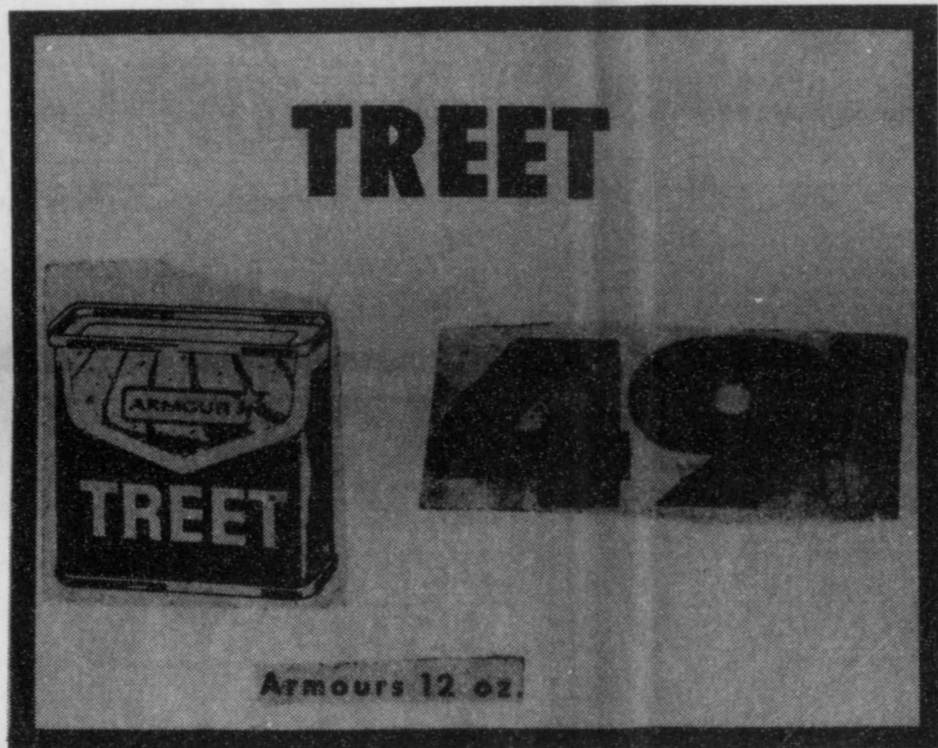
