The parade will begin formation on Farm Road 419 where it intersects U. S. 180, at 4:00 p. m., August 26.

Fisher County Schools today announced a free and reduced price lunch policy for County school children unable to pay the full price.

Local School Officials have adopted a family size and income scale to assist them in determining eligibility.

Families falling within these scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for free or reduced price lunches for their children. They may do so

by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The form itself is simple to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family and any unusual circumstances or

Three Attend Food Service Workshop

Mrs. Wayne Pursley, Mrs. Truman Upshaw and Mrs. L. C. Lanford attended a three day workshop at Big Spring August 10, 11, and 12.

The nutritional goal for school lunches is to furnish at least 1/3 of the recommended daily dietary allowances of the National Research Council for children of various age groups. The kinds and amounts of food listed in the Type A pattern are based on the recommended daily dietary allowances for 9-12 year old boys and girls. As specified in the National School Lunch Regulations, a Type A lunch shall contain a minimum: 1/2 pint fluid whole milk, 2 oz. protein, 3/4 cup fruit or vegetable or a combination, 1 slice whole grain or enriched bread, one teaspoon butter, The dessert and other foods are served for appetite appeal and to increase nutritive value of the lunch.

Under the provisions of the policy the School Superintendent will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local official, he may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. School officials will provide interested individuals with the name and address of the person that has been designated as the Hearing Official.

The policy also provides that there will be no identification of our discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the office of the Superintendent where it may be reviewed by any interested patron.

Roby Homecoming Reschedules

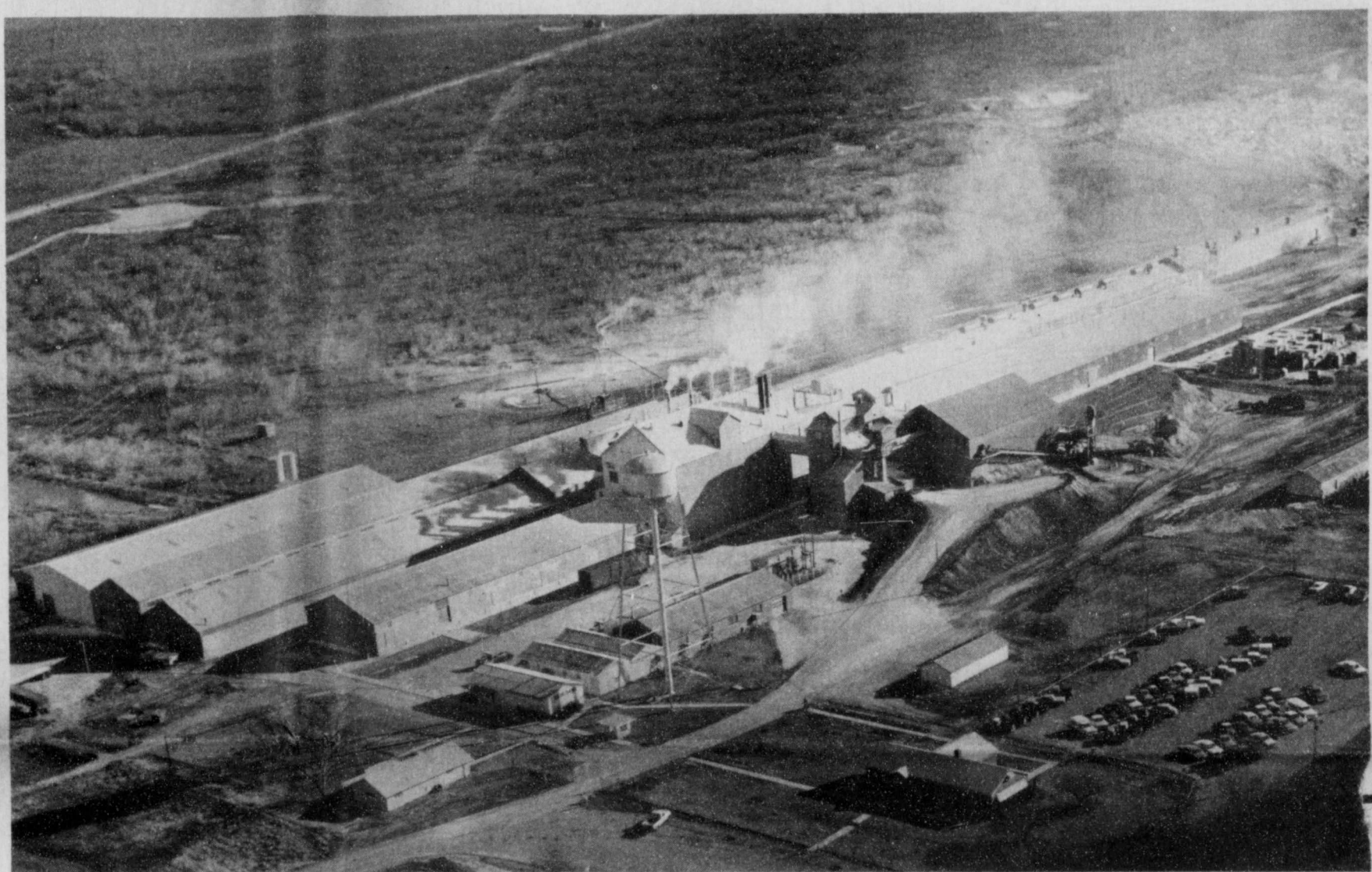
The Roby Ex-Students Association wish to announce a change in the date of the 1971 Homecoming, which will be October 29 and 30 rather than October 25 and 26.

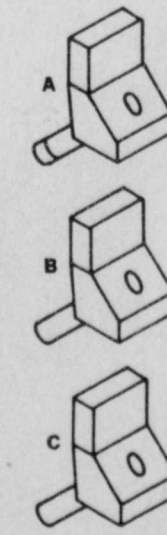

Mr. Heffernan was born Jan. 6, 1913 in Kerrville and was a life long resident.

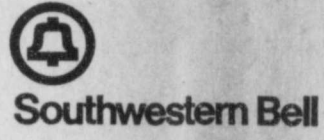

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Small grain planting time is just around the corner and with recent rains maybe better results will be obtained from these crops this year. Recommended wheat varieties for this area include Tascosa, Caddo, Sturdy, Scout 66, Improved Triumph, Triumph 64, Crockett 70, and Concho. Oat varieties recommended are Norwin, Wintok, New Nortex, Bronco, Cimarron, Ora, Nora, Alamo X, and Moregrain. Sturdy and Tascosa wheat have been high producers for this county. Alamo X, Ora, and Nora have been high producing oat varieties; however, they are less winter hardy than the other varieties mentioned.

A field day will be held at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research Station, Chillicothe, August 26. Tours of the station will be held from 9-11 a.m. The formal program will be from 11-12 noon. The event will end with a barbecue lunch courtesy of Chillicothe merchants. Lunch tickets are available from my office.

Texas claimed the top position in exportation of Angus, Beefmaster, Bradford, Brahman, Brangus, Galloway, Red Poll and Santa Gertrudis cattle.

Even though the national totals were below year earlier figures, they are still above the level of the last several years.

Canada and Mexico were the leading countries receiving U.S. cattle, with Canada accounting for about 44 percent of the total. Other important exporters were Chile, Greece, Costa Rica, Japan, Guatemala, and Venezuela.

The principal breed exported from this country was Hereford, with Angus, Polled Hereford, Brahman, and crossbreds next in line. Most of the Herefords went to Canada, Mexico, Japan, and Greece and the Angus moved principally to Canada, Mexico, Greece, and Costa Rica.

Polled Herefords shipments were limited to Chile, Japan

and Canada while Brahmans were exported to many countries with the largest numbers going to Mexico, Venezuela, Guatemala, Philippines, South Africa, and Ecuador.

In terms of the types of breeding animals exported, there was considerable variation due to the breeds. Bulls were most frequently exported in these breeds: Beefmaster, Bradford, Brahman, Brangus, and the Red Angus. Cows or heifers dominated the exportation of Angus, Charbray, Charolais, Galloway, Hereford, Polled Hereford, Red Poll, Santa Gertrudis, Shorthorn, and crossbred cattle.

Storage of carcasses at higher than usual temperature immediately after slaughter is an effective beef tenderizer. Texas Agricultural Experiment Station research shows.

Standard procedure is to move the fresh carcasses into cold storage of about 30 degrees.

One side from each of 27 steer and 21 slaughter cow carcasses was stored in a 50 to 60 degree cooler for 12, 16, or 20 hours immediately after killing before being chilled down to 30 to 32 degrees. Companion sides from the animals, designated as controls, were chilled at 30-32 degrees for the entire 48-hour period of the experiment.

Tests revealed that steaks from steer carcasses stored for 20 hours at the higher temperature were significantly more tender and rated higher in overall eating satisfaction than those from the control sides.

However, steaks stored for only 12 hours at the higher temperature were not as flavorful as those from the controls.

As for the cow carcasses, all the steaks from the higher temperature sides were significantly more tender than those from the controls. Groups from the 12 and 24-hour storages had considerably higher overall satisfaction scores.

The tests also indicated that longer storage periods at higher temperatures are required for tenderness improvement in carcasses from mature animals.
