The Gyp Mill's economic thrust on our economy is no accident. It comes about because interested employees take pride in their work and pride reflects in production, and production produces profits.

The next time a Gypsum employee spends a dollar with you, let them know that you appreciate their business. He is an important member of the team that pumps untolled dollars into the economic strength of our county's economy.

If just the fathers of all the Rotan football players attended a Booster Club meeting there would be approximately 70 dads answer the roll call.
