New School Bus Passing Law Effects Motorists

Anew State law effective August 30 will no longerpermit Texas motorists to stop and then pass a school bus which is loading or unloading children.

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said the new law passed by the 62nd Legislature applies in both cities and rural areas and requires motorists moving both directions on the same roadway with a school bus to stop and remain stopped as long as the flashing lights on the

bus are in operation. Under current law, which applies only in rural areas, drivers

must stop for a stopped school bus, but may then proceed around it at a speed of not more than 10 miles per hour if safe to do

The new law will not require those vehicles on another roadway of a divided highway to stop. and stops are not required if the bus has stopped in a loading zone of a controlled access highway where pedestrians are not permitted to cross.

Speir noted that provisions of the new law will be strictly enforced to afford maximum protection to the school children

The Panthers definitely have to be taken seriously by the other 3-B teams. They have enough strength to knock off any of the other teams on any given





FISHER COUNTY RECIPES The Elf's Corner

The Elf's Comer, Drawer A, Rotan, Texas 79546

We will be sharing with your our recipes, our ideas, your ideas and most of all your love. A few hints, a few thoughts, a few recipes, makes for a lot of friends.

Today, call a friend to ask her over for a cup of your good coffee (if you can't make good coffee, call Mrs. Olson, she will show you.) Anyway share your live by giving of yourself to othersyour gain will be most rewarding.

We want your recipes, jot down a few favorites or just one special something you like, we will print it and share it with

Today, I am going to share with all of you a special colorful recipe "sour dough" because there is more said about this than any other subject. You will ge the idea from what is supposed to be a motto in the old chuckwagon days, the wagon cooks had-"You may ruin my life, Steal my wife; But do not fool with my

The old cooks kept their sourdough in a keg on the side of the wagon in the heat, to get the fermentation process. At night they wrapped the keg in blankets and laid it near the fire to keep it warm. This keg lasted the whole trip out, for everytime they took some dough out, they replaced it with flour.

"SOUR DOUGH" If you drive anything past a model- T, you will probably find it a good eating biscuit.

1 T.baking powder 1-1/2 t. sugar 1-1/2 t. salt

5 oz. vegetable shortening 1/2 oz. bakers compressed yeast

1 pint buttermilk

Mix dry ingredients and cut the shortening in until the mixture looks like coarse ground meal. Taking the milk at room temperature or slightly warmer, dissolve the yeast in it and add half the milk mixture to the dry ingredients. Mix this up well and add the rest of the milk. Now turn this mixture out onto a lightly floured board and shape or pat into a long roll. The less you fool with this, the better your biscuits will be. Pinch off pieces of the rolled dough about the size of a hen's egg. Place them in a lightly greased dutch oven. They should just barely be separated from each other.

Coverthe dutch oven and set it on coals (outside please). Place a few coals on lid also. Check about every 5 minutes to keep from burning. This should take about 20 minutes outside, but if you are baking in the oven, bake at about 425 degrees for about 15 minutes for nice brown biscuits. Hope you like them. This recipe is from Walter Telton's ranch cooking.

Cotton Incorporated To Launch **Bollworm Behavioral Studies**

Cotton producers on the Board of Directors of Cotton Incorporated formulated plans Monday for 1972 agricultural research supported by the \$1 per bale program.

The Agricultural Research Committee concentrated research efforts of the bollwormbudworm complex, boll weevil eradication, cotton stands, and yield and quality improvements.

"Cotton Incorporated (form-

erly CPI) is owned, controlled, and operated by cotton producers," J. Dukes Wooters, Jr., executive vice president and general manager, stated. "This was evidence today as cotton producers called the shots on the type program to be conducted. This research is designed to help alleviate the growers' cost-price squeeze by increasing their profits through research aimed at greater efficiency, limited pest problems, and increased

Dr. George Slater, manager, entomology research, pointed out how specific projects on the many facets of the bollwormbudworm complex will be linked together for a major effort at controlling these destructive

He said, "Coordinated efforts

This demonstration alone can awaken human beings to their capacity to eliminate the causes of war, poverty, disease

Approximately the same number of college students came from abroad for the gathering as all those who attended the first beinnial 18 years ago, students from the United States included. The program was planned to include maximum participation by the students.

"The truth we know, " Mr. Welz said, "is the truth of God and man, the truth of Life for all who live on the earth. It is

the obligation of anyone who knows of this truth to do all in his power to awaken mankind to their capacities as ideas of God to solve their problems intelligently. " The practical effect of this awakening activity was described by a number of college students sho spoke out of first hand experience with

> COTTON INSECT REPORT

by Gary Floyd

From August 16 to August 20, we saw boll weevil damage of 20 to 40% in the shinnery belt east of Rotan and Roby and in the Royston area. There was some bollworm damage in all parts of the county. However, no definite trend could be established. Also, boll weevil buildups were found in spotted areas in the earlier cotton away from the over-wintering belt

From August 23 to August 27 we saw a new crop of weevils hatch out and start feeding. Punctured square counts remained about the same. Bollworm damage counts started down during the latter part of

From August 30 to September 3, we saw a marked increase in punctured squares with counts in the shinnery belt going as high as 63%. In areas that had weevil damage of 0 to 4% before, the damage rose from 2 to 14%. Bollworm damage came down more and very few small worms or eggs were located.

the race or start over again, but the flaggers said that it was too wold and dangerous so the race was ended with a disagreement from the people in the stands.

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
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
