

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS APPROVE \$ 310,000. BUDGET SPENDING FOR '72

In a called meeting of the Fisher County Commissioners Court last Monday, the final approval was stamped on the 1972 county budget.

The 1972 budget was drawn up on an estimated tax roll valuation of \$32,850,000.00. Computing this figure on the county's 95¢ per \$100.00 tax valuation it was estimated that Fisher County would receive some \$310,173.00 to operate on during 1972. After tax discounts, commissions, etc., the net cash to the County Treasurer was estimated at \$290,095.00.

Fisher County Auditor, Al Finch

met with County Judge Ralph Ammons and the other members of the Commissioners Court and released the actual 1971 Tax Roll Valuation figure of \$33,136,840.00. According to Finch there is a \$3,127,740.00 valuation increase over the 1970 figures.

The commissioners unanimously approved the 1972 county budget that will be broken down as follows:

The general fund will receive 48¢ of every 95¢ received. This fund is responsible for paying salaries, purchasing supplies, building maintenance, welfare

expenses, insurance and valuation contracts. It is estimated that some \$146,574.33 will be received by the general fund.

The next largest fund is the Commissioners Road and Bridge Fund. All four of the County Commissioners will receive 9¢ of the 95¢ to be used for keeping the roads and bridges throughout the county in proper condition.

The Public Buildings and/or Permanent Improvement Fund will receive 6¢ of the 95¢ and this money will be used to defray the costs on the upkeep of county buildings such as the Agriculture

Building, two county rest homes, etc. An estimated \$18,321.79 will be placed into this fund during 1972.

The 1966 series of Permanent Improvement Bonds will get 4¢ during 1972. The estimated \$12,214.53 received by this fund will go toward retiring the outstanding debt on the new County Clerk's and County Tax Assessor's Buildings.

The remaining 1¢ of the 95¢ will go to the Jury Fund. The Jury Fund is responsible for paying Court Reporters and Jury Fees. This fund will receive an estimated \$3,053.64.

Punt, Pass & Kick Day Saturday, October 2nd

Saturday, October 2, has been declared Punt, Pass and Kick Day by Mayor Wendell Morrow of Rotan. The competition will begin at 9:00 a.m. at Rotan Yellowhammer Stadium. Rotan Yellowhammer coaches headed by Charlie Davis will handle the local competition.

More than 75 youngsters, ages eight through thirteen, are expected to match punting, passing and place-kicking skills in local competition on that day. Mayor Morrow noted, The Rotan Punt, Pass and Kick program is sponsored by Rotan Motor Company.

In his proclamation, Mayor Morrow pointed out that Punt, Pass and Kick offers young boys an opportunity to compete in a national program which underlines the importance of physical conditioning basic to forms of excellence.

Punt, Pass and Kick is in its 11th year under the co-sponsorship of the National Football League and the Ford Dealers of America. Participation this year is expected to top 1,000,000 for the fourth year in a row.

Participants in the program compete only against boys their own age. No special equipment is needed and participation does not impair a boy's amateur standing. There is no body contact and any boy, eight through thirteen years of age, is eligible to register at a participating Ford dealer. No entrance fee is required.

There were 16 members and 3 leaders present. After the meet-

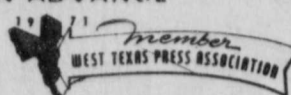
ing, the officers planned the programs for the 71-72 year.

An evaluation of each child will be made, and the results will be given to the parents in a private interview. These children who show to have a potential problem will be given individualized help so that they will have the best educational opportunity possible when they enter school. There is no charge to the parents for these services. The Rotan Schools are a part of this educational effort to meet the needs of the children

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

The 4-H Project Show was cancelled September 25 and re-set for October 2, due to heavy rains last week. We want to again invite everyone to view the 4-H members projects and eat lunch at 12:00 noon.

Fall is a good time to look at your home landscape with a critical eye and decide whether to add or replace some of the plants around the home.

Maybe a rose bush has died or failed to live up to your expectations. Or perhaps a plant has died in the shrub border, leaving a gap. How about adequate shade around the patio or elsewhere to make the outdoor living area more enjoyable?

All landscaping needs should be noted to that selections can be made early while good stock is available in the nursery or garden center. It's natural to put off renovating the garden until late spring after everything is green and spring flowers are in bloom. However, by then the stock is so picked over that you frequently give up and do nothing or purchase something you really didn't want or is not suited for your area.

Balled and burlapped plants and container-grown plants can be transplanted anytime of the year. Many of the deciduous plants, those that lose their leaves each fall, can be more easily handled or transplanted in a bare root condition during their dormant period.

For best results, bare root plants should be set out in late fall and winter from mid-November through February in most areas of Texas. Planting during this period will provide ample time for good root development before warm spring weather forces out new top growth.

However, with proper care, bare root plants can be set out as late as March and April. Success with late spring plantings depends on the condition of the nursery stock and the care provided during the first six months after planting. Most people won't give plants the attention required when they are planted late. Thus the plant is lost.

For ease of maintenance and a reduction in disease and insect damage, choose landscape plants that are native or adapted to the area.

Farmers know that moving farm equipment on highways is a dangerous practice. Nevertheless, it is a practice they can't always avoid.

Many things have been tried to attract attention, such as lights, flags, and reflectors. Attention is only half the job. Something has been needed to tell the motorist approaching from the rear that a slow moving vehicle is up ahead.

A yellow-orange triangle is showing up on more and more tractors, combines, and other farm equipment which travels at speeds of 25 miles per hour or less.

The fanny flag consists of a fluorescent yellow-orange triangle with a dark red reflective border. The yellow-orange fluorescent triangle is highly visible during daylight and the reflective border glows brilliantly as a hollow red triangle in the path of headlights at night. As a result, day and night this reflective triangle gives the message that a slow-moving vehicle is ahead.

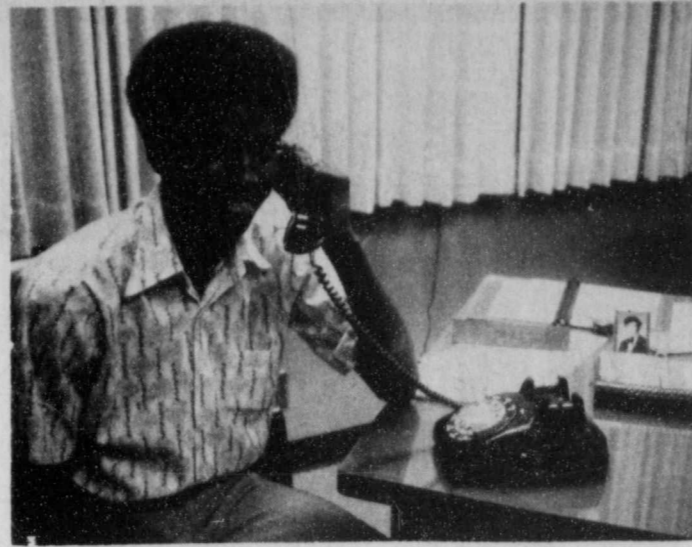
The hardy chrysanthemum, a member of the large Composite or daisy family with complex flower structures, can bring spectacular fall color to the yard or garden. There are about 1,000 varieties to choose from.

Every year many new mum varieties are introduced and many old ones are discontinued. This is the "survival of the fittest" for our garden pleasure. This is the "survival of the fittest" for our garden pleasure. Mums can be seen in many sizes including the cushion, medium and tall sizes.

Colors vary from white to yellow, bronze, burn orange, rust red and dark crimson. Flower sizes vary from half an inch to three inches in diameter. Flower shapes are described as button, pompom, spoon, daisy flowered, decorative, anemone and so on.

Just for fun, try growing a few of your own new mum varieties from seed. The daisy flowered ones are probably easiest to grow from seed. One plant can offer a wide variation in color and type.

Chrysanthemums grow best in the full sun. Many florist chrysanthemums sold as pot mums are unsatisfactory as garden flowers as they bloom too late in the fall.

FISHER COUNTY RECIPES The Elf's Corner

Seems all our children and menfolk like pies, and at our house custard goes well, and fits the bill, for young and old.
I have a pie recipe from my mother's file, and I'd like to share it with all of you. You may like it as well as we do.

BROWN SUGAR CUSTARD

3 cups brown sugar
3 eggs
1/2 cup melted oleo (or butter)
Beat eggs until well mixed, but not foamy. Add brown sugar and melted butter, mix well. Pour into pastry shell (unbaked) and bake until set at oven temperature of 325. I try the knife method to test custard, insert knife blade in center and if it comes out clean, it is ready to come out of oven. Hope you like this.

I'm also using a Raisin Cream Pie recipe that has long been a favorite at holiday time with our family. It is quite rich and really is best served mid afternoon with coffee as it might be too much after a meal. But as you like it, its yours to eat. Also, Snow Balls from an aunt of mine.

RAISIN CREAM PIE

3 eggs 2 T. oleo, melted
1 t. each, cinnamon, nutmeg and cloves 1-1/2 cups seedless raisins
2-1/2 T. Lemon juice 1/2 cup chopped pecans
1 recipe plain pie pastry
Beat eggs until thick and fluffy. Add sugar, cinnamon, nutmeg, cloves, lemon juice and melted butter. Blend well. Fold in raisins and chopped pecans. Pour into 8 or 9 inch pastry lined pie plate. Garnish with pecan halves and bake 90 to 35 min. in 350 deg. oven. Serve with dessert topping if desired. But it is nice as is. The proof of the pudding is in the eating.

Anyone who can make a tender, flaky pie crust, with a filling such as the above recipe, really has something to brag about. Don't guess when you want a good pie.

SNOW BALLS

2-3/4 cups crushed vanilla wafers
1 cup powdered sugar
1/4 cup frozen orange juice
1 cup finely chopped pecans
1/4 cup melted butter

Mix all together well and roll into balls size of walnuts and then roll in the following icing.

2 cups powdered sugar
2 T. orange concentrate
2 T. butter

Dip the balls in this and then roll in finely shredded coconut. I store these in a coffee can or well sealed plastic container. They keep well. These are easy and sure nice for company dropping in or that bridge party.

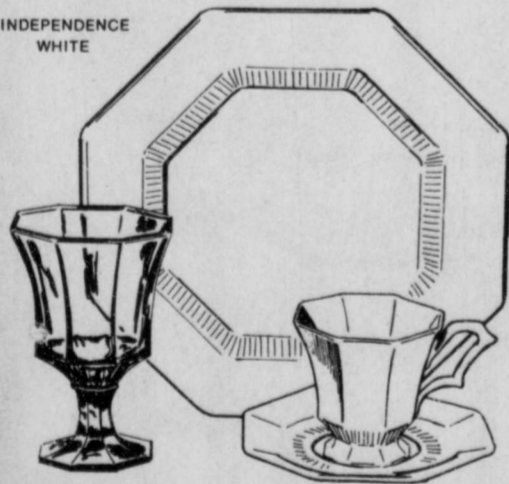

The Mayor of Rotan and Sweetwater signed Proclamations, displays were featured in the City-County Library in Sweetwater, and exhibits were placed in several business houses. Culminating the week's observance, Charles Girggs, Sweetwater attorney, spoke to the group on "Your Rights Under the Constitution".

The speaker stated that our Constitution is rather a simple document setting forth a broad general platform. Under the Constitution all power resides in the people and only with the consent of the people can there be any limitations on rights. Any change in the Constitution can only be made through the people. It is a document without peer-unique in all the world. It does not tell what we can do, but what we cannot do.

The first seven points in the Constitution give the plan of government, selection of officials, and what they can do. These items did not define the limita-

tions of government. The first 10 Amendments, known as The Bill of Rights, are patterned loosely after the Magna Charta. These amendments tell what government cannot do. Our Constitution doesn't create anything. It is based on the assumption that you are born with freedom, simply states what restraints cannot be imposed by government.

During the brief business session the Chapter Regent, Mrs. A. C. Forgy, presided. The group recited the Lord's Prayer in unison and repeated the Pledge to the Flag. The message from the President General, Mrs. Donald Spicer, was read by Mrs. Hubert P. Barton. Mrs. Kirby Kinsey gave the American's Creed.

On the first series of downs, Rotan was forced to kick on 4th and 9 after Summers and Novelle Kennedy picked up about a yard each and Duke lost 3

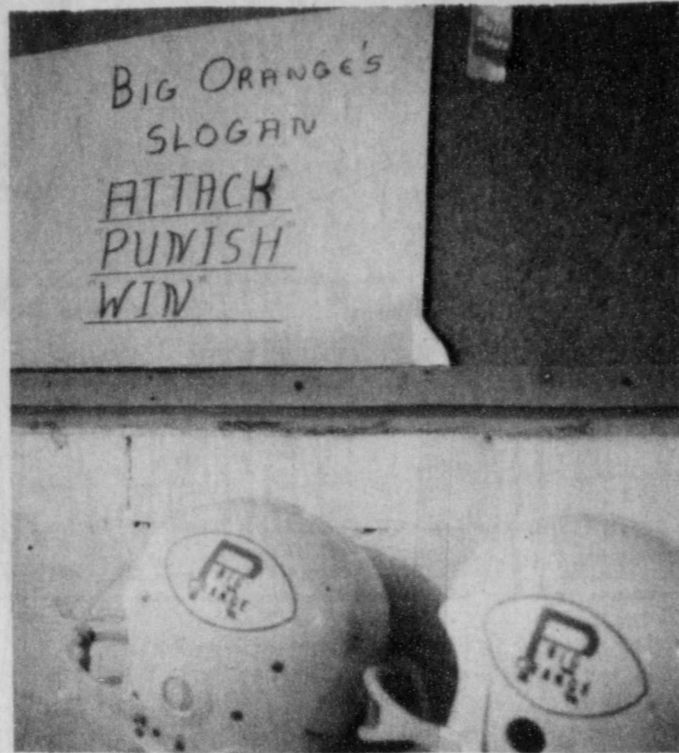
yards. Rotan got the ball back after holding Coahoma and forcing a 4th down punt, but lost it two plays later on an interception.

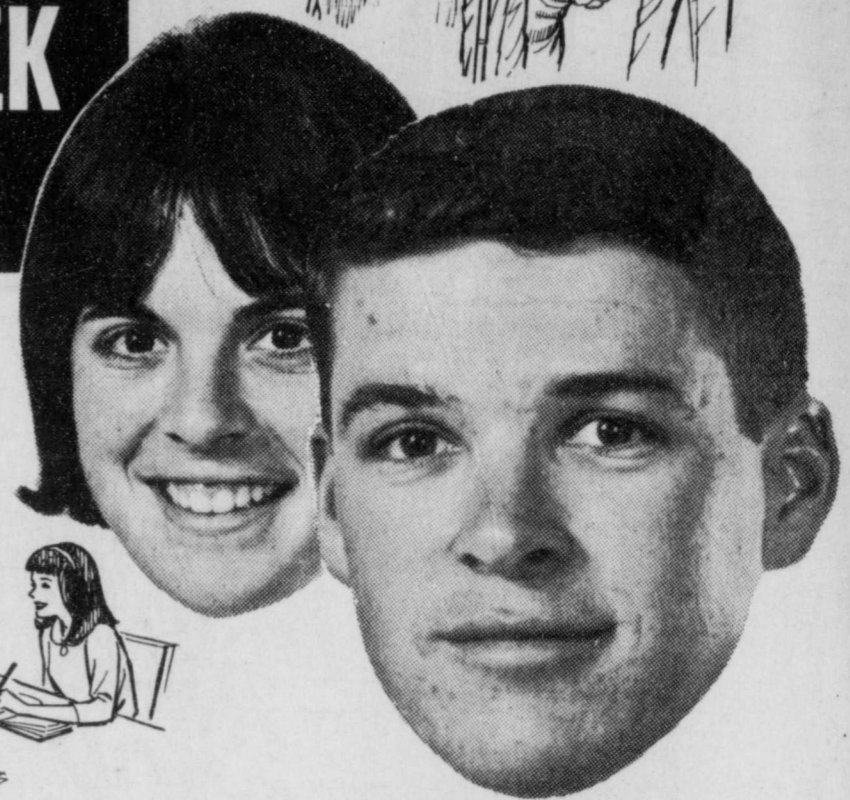

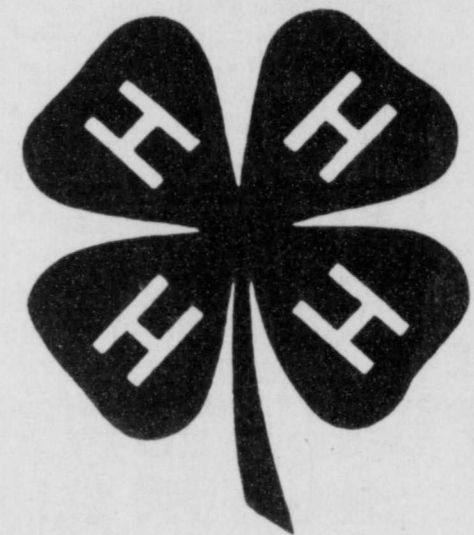

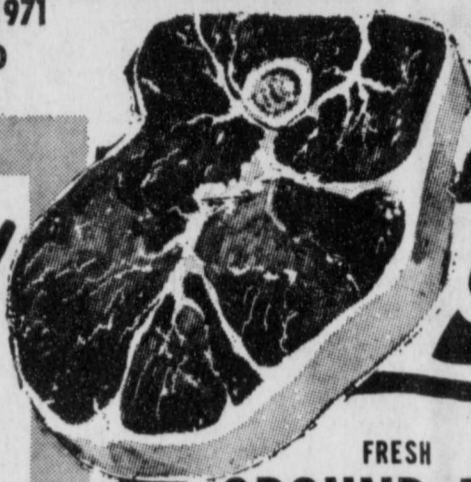
