# OIL COMPANIES VOICE APPROVAL TO NEW COURT HOUSE CONSTRUCTION

The members of the Fisher County Commissioners Court met with representatives of Pritchett and Abbott (evaluation engineers) and the major oil companies last Monday afternoon to ascertain the economic feasibility of continuing with plans for a new Fisher County Court House.

Although the commissioners needed no official approval from anybody to continue with plans to approve a new court house, they wanted to meet with representatives from the major oil companies to hear their feelings on the new court house.

A total of fourteen attended the meeting. There were three representatives from Pritchett and Abbott and three representatives of oil companies in attendance.

Bill Fields represented Texas and Pacific Oil Company; Sid Danner was in attendance representing General Crude Oil Co., and Jerry Krupka was Continental Oil Company's representative at the meeting.

Judge Ralph Ammons opened the meeting by introducing each of those in attendance and stating the purpose of the meeting. In his opening remarks the Fisher County Judge remarked that since the oil companies were the largest tax paying body in the county that he felt it was a gesture of courtesy to inform them of the feasibility study and bring them up to date on the estimated cost of the project. Judge Ammons remarked that he felt that there was "no doubt in anyone's mind that we (Fisher County) needed some changes in the court house layout".

He explained the "preferred plan" to those in attendance by quickly explaining the architects plans on completely removing the old court house and rebuilding a new one. The cost estimate being between \$350,000 and \$370,000.

Jerry Krupka wanted to know if this included the cost of removing the old court house. Thurman Terry replied that the cost of removal was included in the estimated figure.

To briefly sum up the meeting it must be stated that all three of the oil companies in attendance plus Mr. Wilson representing Pritchett and Abbott seemed in general agreement that if a new structure was going to be built that now was the time to do it.

## Roby City Council Approves \$85,321 Yearly Budget

The Roby City Council met for their regular monthly meeting on October 18 and approved a proposed budget of \$85,321 for fiscal year 1971-72.

Commissioner Jimmy Price made the motion that was seconded by Jimmy Hayes to accept the proposed budget. 1971-72 wages and salaries for the city of Roby was set at \$22,755. Supplies which include utilities, insurance, office supplies, water purchases were listed at \$4,300, and capital outlay which includes water line warrants, water and sewer bonds, seal coating streets, and swimming pool payments amounted to \$16,266 in the 1971-72 proposed budget.

Roby Mayor Cecil King reported to the commissioners that the City of Roby had received its second quarter sales tax check from the state of Texas in the amount of \$2,311.29. This check brought the total received under the sales tax program to \$14,951.80 since its beginning.

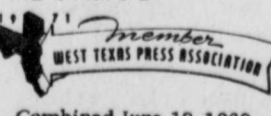

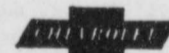

# Accent on Health

J.E. PEAVY, M.D., Commissioner of Health

Back in 1915, the Texas Health Department became the instrument for enforcement of the McNealus Anti-Pollution Act. That act was designed to "preserve the purity of our water supplies." Today Texas has more sewage treatment plants than any other state and ranks at the top in total number of public drinking water supplies.

Drinking water supplies serving communities, common carriers food processing plants and parks are subject to thorough inspection of health officials. Plans for new systems as well as improvements and expansion of existing systems are reviewed for health hazards and compliance with Health Department rules and regulations. Water utility operators are examined by the Health Department and, where qualified, are issued a certificate of competency.

"The quantity and quality of drinking water in Texas is in excellent condition. At least for the moment," says C. K. Foster, Director of Sanitary Engineering Division of the Texas Health Department. "It's in much better condition now than 10 to 15 years ago, due to expansion and extension of facilities, and public awareness."

In Texas every community with a population of 10,000 or more now has an approved public water supply system, as do many smaller communities.

Travelers may have noticed that some communities have a sign posted at their city limits announcing that their municipal water supply has been approved by the State Health Department. This sign indicates that the water supply does more than meet the minimum requirements of a public water supply and State Health Department regulations.

Today there are some 450 public water supplies across the state that have been approved by the State Health Department and certified as meeting high environmental health protection standards. Health officials say these systems serve approximately 90 percent of the population of Texas. They have achieved what amounts to a blue-ribbon award for health protection and excellence. These 450 systems, while serving most of the population, represent only a small portion of the approximately 3,000 public water systems in Texas. The remainder are generally in accordance with the minimum standards set by the State Health Department.

Stuart has been very active in the overall 4-H Program of Fisher County and is very deserving of the Gold Star Award according to Spencer.

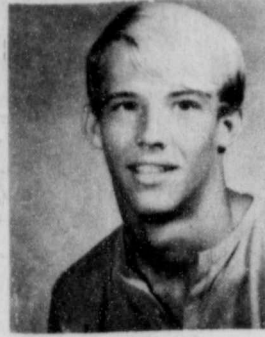

## COUNTY AGENT NEWS

A constant forage supply is always a big problem for livestock producers even in areas of adequate rainfall. It often becomes extremely difficult in the drier areas. A year-round forage supply may be accomplished in a number of ways. These would include the use of temporary summer annuals, temporary winter annuals, silage, hay or other types of pastures. However, the uncertainties of climatic conditions, the cost of establishment each year and numerous management problems can cause a shortage of forage or loss of a crop completely.

A way to combat these uncertainties is through the use of improved perennial species. The improved grasses adapted to this area could include Coastal, Lovegrass, Kleingrass and TAM Wintergreen Harding grass. Since these grasses are permanently established, they make use of available moisture, start growth earlier and produce forage while being established.

The most ideal situation would be to have a three-grass system utilizing Coastal, Lovegrass and TAM Wintergreen Hardinggrass. Coastal would be used during the summer months. Lovegrass in spring and fall, and the Hardinggrass used in the winter months. Kleingrass could be substituted for Lovegrass in this system except in extreme north west Texas. Kleingrass breaks dormancy about 10-14 days later than Lovegrass and does have cold damage from late freezes in that area.

Various two-grass systems could also be used efficiently. These would include Kleingrass-TAM Wintergreen, Coastal-TAM Wintergreen or Coastal-Lovegrass. The Coastal-Lovegrass system would possibly be more effective in south than north Texas since Lovegrass will furnish green forage about one out of three winters as far north as Stephenville.

Another use of any of these improved grasses would be to supplement native pastures during periods of stress or low production. Maintaining a pasture of the species which would fit into your system when most likely needed might keep one from selling livestock at a time when prices are low. Research indicates that maintaining improved pastures at a level of 15 percent of native range area will allow one to double the stocking rate.

The average stocking rate of one animal unit/20 acres in the Rolling Plains area could be greatly enhanced by utilizing 1 or more of these improved grass species. The annual carrying capacity could be increased to 1 AU/5 acres even in the Rolling Plains area if one of the above mentioned systems is properly utilized. With a little supplemental irrigation one AU/2 or 3 acres could possibly be accomplished.

Farmers and ranchers are encouraged to spray their cattle for lice in the fall instead of waiting until they are noticeably infested.

Treating cattle for lice now is effective because of mild weather, shorter hair on cattle and a small lice population. The low population found now is the source of this winter's population.

Louse control should not be put off until cattle are infested. By winter the cattle have suffered greatly, and a heavy population of lice is more difficult to control than a light one.

The key point in effective lice control is to make thorough applications. If one animal or even a part of an animal is not treated, the lice could be a source of reinfection for the herd.

Dipping is the most thorough way to treat cattle, but sprays are effective if applied with special attention to the brisket and flanks. The entire body should be wet to the skin. High water pressure and a coarse stream is best for penetrating the hair. Spray at close range and treat only a few cattle at a time.

Information on the insecticides recommended for louse control is available at the County Extension office.

Before buying insecticide for spraying cattle, read the label on the container completely. Pay particular attention to warnings and restrictions listed on the label and check on waiting periods, especially is some treated cattle may go to slaughter.

Some 65,000 Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire during the last half of November or December. The year-end survey on sheep and goats will be made in late December.

This roundup survey of agricultural crop production, livestock numbers and cash receipts from farming and ranching is made annually by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. The Texas Department of Agriculture and the Statistical Reporting Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, are joined together to provide a continuing program of information on Texas Agriculture.

In the last of the third quarter, the Blue Babes were hasty and made a touchdown. Zana Anderson ran the yardage for the only touchdown.

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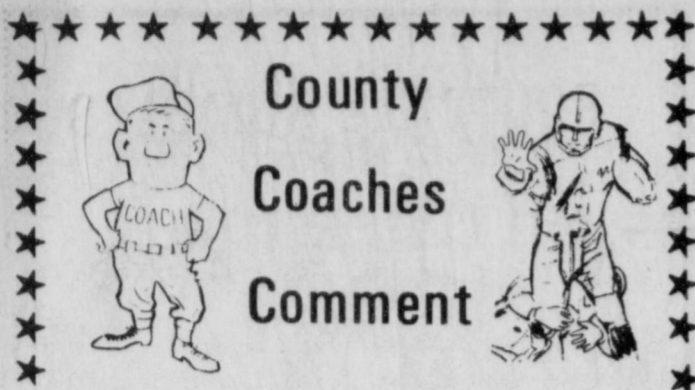
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**County Coaches Comment**

**As It Looks From Here**

By Congressman Omar Burlison

The AFL-CIO has for years taken a pre-eminent and consistent anti-communist position. The Union's President, George Meany, has long been known for opposition to policies of cold war weakness and has been foremost with warnings against Communist incursions.

Just recently the AFL-CIO has produced an excellent document entitled "Who is the Imperialist?" This publication puts together a fact-laden study of trends, incidents and policies in the cold war since the epoch of World War II. It answers with clarity the charges of the Marxists and the New Left that the United States is an imperialistic Nation, with designs to subjugate other countries to her will.

The AFL-CIO pamphlet cites chapter and verse in a remarkable sequence of events to show that it is the Soviet Union and Red China who are the imperialists in today's world. Both have pursued a course of global expansion while the Free World has steadily reduced its perimeters.

Set forth in detail is the historical record, giving names, places and dates of direct aggression and how the Communists have created the largest slave empire in modern times.

The Union's study describes with accuracy how the Communists powers have annexed near 825,000 square miles of territory, involving at least 25 million people in eleven Nations. In addition they have gained virtual control over another thirteen satellite countries with about a million square miles and more than 146 million inhabitants. Adding up the attainment by aggression, not counting Russia and Red China themselves, comes to an imperialistic empire of almost two million square miles, inside of which live 172 million human beings.

Communism has grown to a gigantic force which controls all or parts of at least twenty countries, approximately sixteen million square miles and over a billion people. To this can be added those people of Cambodia, Laos and Vietnam under Communist domination, the extent of which is difficult to estimate.

While the communists have been running up their score of domination over Nations who had little or no chance to resist, the free Nations have granted independence to just about all their colonial holdings. The AFL-CIO lists 68 states which achieved self-determination between the end of World War II and the present, comprising more than 13 million square miles of the Earth's surface and the independence of near one and a quarter billion people.

So, who is the imperialist, the AFL-CIO asks. The preparation makes it perfectly clear and documents its findings with hard historical facts.

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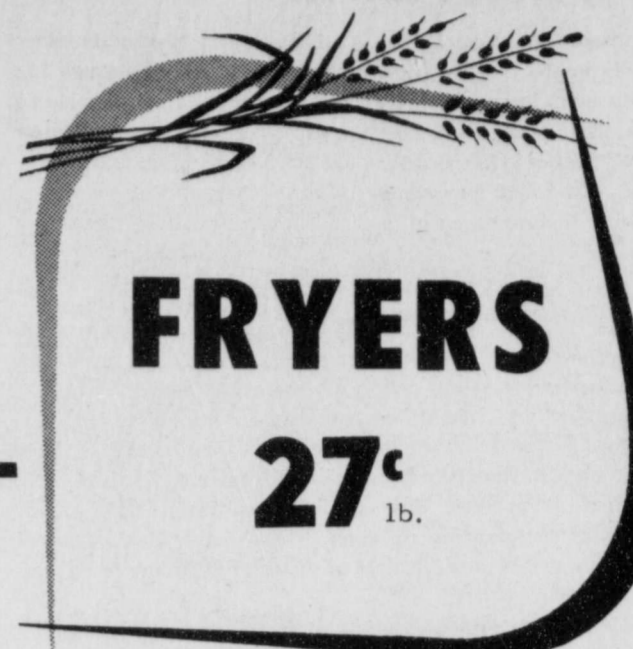

### "BUDGET MEATS THAT MEN WILL EAT"

It is no problem to cook a good economical meat dish; the problem arises only when you try to get people to eat it. I mean, of course, men. Children, poor dears, can be bullied into finishing what ever is left on their plates, or enough at least to ward off starvation. Women are so birdable a woman living alone can subsist on almost anything edible and a woman friend, for the pleasure of your company, will cheerfully share yesterday's warmed over tuna casserole. But, men--now they are something else---but, before I'm accused of being a latter-day suffragette, I hasten to point out that the critical husband adds spice to life and cooking, even the fussy ones. Have you ever had this question asked about a dish you prepared with care, "What is this?" or an absenting money should be a gentle hint to scratch this recipe from your files.

Yes, for a recipe to have a place in your files "of good things to prepare" this is a criterion for measuring its place, if a second helping is asked for, keep the recipe.

Let us consider some ways of using the meat that your market frequently puts on sale. I myself have spent many embarrassing number of hours in my life just standing around indecisively in super markets, peering into meat displays and wondering how to use the specials. Here are a few recipes that attempt to solve this particular problem. They are family approved.

#### "Chuck Roast In Foil"

2-1/2 to 4 lb. (7 bond) Chuck Roast  
1 pkg. (1-1/4 oz.) Onion Soup Mix  
Put meat on a large piece of foil and spread onion soup mix on top. Pad any sharp piece of bone with extra foil, then wrap meat with double fold, so that no steam can escape.

Put in a shallow roasting pan. Bake smaller roasts for 3 hours, larger roasts for 3-1/2 hours, both in slow ovens (300 deg.) Makes 3 to 5 servings, depending on size of roast. This is really good.

#### "Beef Pizzaiola"

When this is in the oven, everyone in the family will tell you he is getting very hungry.

- 1 Chuck Steak (about 2 pounds)
- unseasoned meat tenderizer
- 1 can tomatoes
- 1/2 teaspoon oregano
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 t. minced parsley
- 1 T. minced onion
- 1/4 t. salt and sprinkling of black pepper
- 2 T. Vegetable oil
- 1/2 lb. Mozzarella cheese
- 1 T. grated Parmesan Cheese

1. Tenderize meat as suggested by the manufacturer, using unseasoned tenderizer.

2. Cut meat into serving pieces, then reassemble into original shape in shallow oblong baking dish. Try to use a dish that is a good fit for the meat.

3. Drain off half the juice from the tomatoes; break up the tomatoes with a fork. Reserve the drained juice.

4. To tomatoes, add oregano, parsley, garlic, minced onion, salt and pepper. Mix and pour over meat with 2 tablespoons of vegetable oil dribbled over all.

5. Bake in moderate oven (350 deg.) uncovered, for about 1-1/2 hours. Look at the meat occasionally and add some of the reserved tomato juice, if bottom of dish is getting dry, in order to prevent charring. (Charring is also apt to occur if the dish is too large for amount of meat.)

6. Top with slices of mozzarella cheese. Sprinkle parmesan cheese over this and bake for 15 minutes longer or until cheese is golden and meat is tender. For children you may wish to omit cheese from pieces they are to be served.

#### "Pork Steaks with Capers" (or Red Currant Jelly)

- 4 Pork Shoulder Steaks      Salt & Pepper
- 1/4 cup flour                      1/4 cup water
- 2 T. Oleo                              2 T. capers, drained

1. Trim fat from steaks very well. Dredge with flour.
2. Heat butter in skillet and brown meat over medium heat.
3. Sprinkle steaks with salt and pepper.
4. Add water, cover, reduce heat and cook very slowly for about 35 minutes.
5. Add capers, cover and cook 10 minutes longer or until meat is tender. Serves 4.

Variation: Omit capers and when meat is tender, remove chops and spread one side with 2 tablespoons mashed red jelly, a pinch of ginger and a grating of orange rind and put under broiler for 3 minutes to glaze. Turn and spread other side with same and broil another 3 minutes.

I do so hope these will help to prepare some enjoyable meals for your family.

Here's a fast dessert for lunch for the kids.

#### "Quick Fudge Brownies"

350 deg. oven (Pan, 13x9x2)

- 1 pkg. brownie mix (1 pound 6 oz.)
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts

Prepare mix as directed, replace water in directions with sour cream. Spread in pan, top with nuts. Bake at 350 deg. Cool and cut. Wrap in foil for picnic or next day.
