Terraces do their best when they are properly laid out and constructed to a standard design. But the older they get, the smaller they become and finally end up not very effective. Jack stated that each terrace is a structure of it's own. designed to carry a certain amount or hold a given amount of water. Thus. each terrace requires maintenance if it is to remain in a condition that will work properly. There are three important

things to remember in terrace maintenance. They are, height of terraces. fills, and end blocks. The height of a terrace should be maintained so as to equal planned original height. If the height is not maintained. the terrace soon is plowed down and loses its ability to function properly. When this occurs, Jack continued, water runs over the top of the terraces causing severe erosion and very little water is held on the land. When a terrace breaks there is an immediate need for a fill to be made. So to speak." One break leads to another".





Every motor vehicle, trailer, semitrailer and pole trailer shall be equipped with electric turn signal lamps, except that passenger cars and trucks less than 80 inches in width, manufactured or assembled prior to model year 1960, need not be equipped with electric turn signal lamps, unless the body or load of the vehicle or combination of vehicles extends to the side more than 24 inches from the center of the top of the steering wheel post, or the rear limit of the body or load exceeds more than 14 feet from the center of the top of the steering wheel post.

After January 1, 1972, every ous, truck, truck-tractor, trailer, seinth after or pole traile. eight, width or thiry (30) feet or more in overall length shall be equipped with hazard warning lamps. The lamps used to display such warning to the front shall be mounted at the same level and as widely spaced laterally as practicable, and shall display simultaneously flashing white or amber lights, or any shade of color between white and amber. The lamps used to display such warning to the rear shall be mounted at the same level and as widely spaced laterally as practicable, and shall show simultaneously flashing amber or red lights, or any shade of color between amber and red. (The use of a flasher switch causing the turn signal lamps to flash simultaneously may be used to comply with this section.)
