

Don't Cut Christmas Tree... Use Live One

Consider using a living Christ- or box, or cover the rug or floor mas tree this year. Since everyone seems to be more ecology minded these days, what would be more fitting than a tree that could be used in the home for the holiday season and then moved to the yard or patio as a permanent fixture.

While the traditional Christmas tree is usually a conifer of some type, many broadleafed plants also make very attractive Christmas decorations, contends Everett Janne, landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The female Yaupon holly makes a very attractive Christmastree with its bright red berries and small dark-green leaves. Regardless of the type of plant you select, be sure it is adapted for the area or is suited for interior landscaping.

For South Texas plants that may be used a living Christmas trees include the Podocarpus, Aleppo pine and Norfolk Island many years to come, adds Janne. pine. Suggestions for Central Texas include the Deodar cedar. Arizona cypress, juniper, Podocarpus and Yaupon holly as well as many other holly varieties. If kept indoors, the Norfolk Island pine is very useful.

In North Texas the Colorado blue spruce, Scotch pine, Norway pine and a great variety of junipers make beautiful living Christmas trees, according to Janne. Some very interesting decorative effects can be achieved by using plants that are a little out of the ordinary in regard to shape rather than the typically conical shape usually associated with the Christmas

Schedule your plans to the tree doesn't remain in the house more than two weeks, advises the horticulturist. Place it where it isn't in the air stream of a heater or air vent. A room temperature of 65 deg. at night will help keep the tree fresh.

Be sure to place the root ball or container in a leak-proof tub





Finding the right gift for a friend or a member of the family is part of the joy of Christmas. When you are able to make a gift for someone special with your own hands or in your kitchen, it bears a special something and carries a lot of love also. Lets take a try at a few nice things to do in your kitchen and hunt up some special containers, attractive jars, cans. and boxes that make a "gift in a gift". Canning jars are fine for small cookies.

I have a beautiful divinity candy recipe that I want to share with you, and some "Date Balls".

"DATE BALLS"

1 cup Sugar 3/4 cup flour 1/2 t. Salt

1 cup walnut or pecan pieces 2 well beaten eggs

1 cup Dates, chopped (This is a recipe of LaNelle Boone, a gift giving mother) Mix all dry ingredients first, add dates and nuts, beat eggs well and stir into mixture. Fold into oblong pyrex dish approx. 9 x 13 inches, lined with foil and bake in 350 deg. oven until crusty (about 25 minutes). Let cool long enough to be able to work with hands, remove from pan and mix well into a big "glob", this part is a bit difficult, you just have to plunge in and mix. Pull off small quantities, rull into balls, and roll in powdered sugar.

> 2 large wooden spoonfuls of white Karo

4 cups sugar 2 cups hot water 2 t. vinegar

Stir until ingredients are dissolved on high burner. This takes only a few minutes. Put lid on sauce pan and let come to a boil. Take lid off and continue to let boil, on high burner or flame, until a long thin thring can be pulled off and will float. Beat 4 egg whites until foamy and slightly stiff. Add the hot mixture, slowly, beating at full speed. Continue to beat for quite a while until mixture stands up well. Just before stopping, add 3 t. vanilla and a dash of salt. Add four cups of chopped pecans (less if you must). Mix together then drop on waxed paper.



Many ranchers throughout the Rolling Plains area run cow-calf type operations on native range land. Since there are no reported trace mineral deficiencies in our area of the state, a free choice bone-meal and salt supplement (phosphorus and salt) will generally take care of the mineral requirements. The beef cow has the ability to synthesize most of the amino acids and many of the vitamins. As a result, the cow-calf operator is basically concerned with supplying three nutrient requirements: Portein, energy (carbohydrates) and vitamin A for as little cost as practicable.

Let's assume that our average operator properly stocks his range and that forage, either cured or green, is in adequate supply. This being the case, we can generally assume that the cows will consume enough forage to meet their energy requirements.

Vitamin A is usually in adequate supply on native ranges with the possible exception of years with a severely dry fall and winter. If this situation arises there are cheap sources of vitamin A available from injectable forms.

Protein supply is a different problem and varies tremendously from ranch to ranch. The warm season grasses such as buffalo grass, sideoats grama, big and little bluestern and many others follow a definite pattern as to protein content. Digestible protein in these species starts off rather high in the spring (8-9%) drops to about 5% in midseason, and by October falls to between one and two per cent. On the other hand. Texas winter grass, Japanese brome, rescue grass, and other cool season grasses and forbs are highin digestible protein in the fall and winter and on into the spring (6-15%) depending on moisture conditions.

We have seen what some of the forages can provide. The first reply might well be: so what? What does the cow need or re-

Nutritionally, the cow's requirements will vary with body size, calving date and the desired weaning weight of the calf. In order to calculate an example let us assume that the cow weighs 1000 lbs., that she will drop her calf on either Nov. or February 1, and that we want the calf to weigh 500 pounds at weaning. In addition, we can specify that the cow is consuming primarily dry grass or is eating enough Texas wintergrass to make up half her forage intake.

The differences in requirements by calving date are readily apparent.

The cow with the fall calf is under much greater stress with regard to forage supply than the cow that drops her calf in February. The availability of winter growing grasses determines. to a great extent, the type of supplemental feeding program that is required. Operators in wintergrass areas that desire to produce calves in the fall must be prepared to feed heavily in the dry years and possibly to a limited extent even in good
