Final show figures were 130 head of swine, 82 lambs, and 37 steers and heifers that were judged. Joe Wise, Crosby County Agent, judged the show.

The swine show was won by Tommy Whitfield of Rotan. He

is a 4-H member. The grand champion barrow was a Duroc bred by Jerry Jeffrey of Sylvester. The Reserve Champion barrow, also a Duroc, was shown by David Gaona of Roby, a Roby Boys 4-H Club member. The pig was bred by Garland Worth of Roscoe.

Brad and Britt Stuart, both 4-H members, had a good day showing lambs. They showed the Champion and Reserve Finewool

Southdown and other Medium Wool lambs. The Finewool Crossbred Division was won by Gary and James Park. Gary was showing under the 4-H banner while James belongs to Roby FFA.

The Heifer show was won by Shiela Jeffrey of Sylvester. The Champion, an Angus was bred by Ray Boothe of Sweetwater. The Reserve Champion heifer was shown by Mark Guelker.

Both Mark and Shiela are 4-H members.

The Grand Champion steer was a heavyweight Angus shown by James Jeffrey. The steer was bred by Jeffrey Brothers. The Reserve Champion steer was a middle weight Herford shown by Mark Guelker of Roby.

Rotan School Trustees Discuss Football Fieldhouse Financing

The school board members of the Rotan Independent School District met for their first regular meeting of 1972, last Monday evening with all members present.

If first meetings are any indication of what is to come in 1972, the residents of the Rotan Independent School District will not be short-changed by board members. The seven members delved into questions ranging from the possibility of construction of a new football fieldhouse to honoring a request by the Superintendent, K.C. McCasland that his contract not be extended.

The meeting opened at 7:00 p. m. with the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting. Bobby Gruben made a motion that was seconded by Dwight Nowlin to pay the bills listed. The motion passed.

Jerry W. Smith, a C.P.A. from Hamlin, was present at Monday's meeting to present the school's financial statement and audit report for the school year ending August 31, 1971. A complete summary of the cash receipts and disbursements can be found on page 5 of this paper.

Dr. Jerry Marshall made a motion that was seconded by Dick Edwards to approve the budget as presented by the school's auditor.

Superintendent McCasland gave the board members a report on the school enrollment for the last reporting period. Primary enrollment was listed at 280, Junior High at 249, and High School at 214, for a total enrollment of 743.

Dwight Nowlin and Bobby Gruben, respectively, made and seconded a motion to proceed with landscape plan #1 at a cost of \$224.37. This is the school's memorial landscape fund.

Alta B. Hinson appeared before the board, representing the old PTA organization, with a

suggestion for board members to consider. She informed those present that several interested parents and old PTA members were desirous of seeing that the 7th grade boys basketball teams are equipped with basketball suits. She proposed to give the school approximately \$100.40 still in the PTA fund so that the uniforms could be purchased.

Dr. Jerry Marshall suggested that the board get the opinion of the coaches and principal involved before making a decision. After approximately 30 minutes of discussion, Dick Edwards made a motion to accept the money from the PTA fund and furnish the 7th grade boys with basketball uniforms.

Dwight Nowlin seconded the motion. The vote was five members voting for the proposed motion and one abstaining. The next item of business was presented by Charlie Joe Helms. He expressed a desire to see the board give consideration to constructing a new football fieldhouse. Board members discussed the possibility of selling personal bonds to interested citizens or using the interest money derived from the CD's on deposit at the First National bank to construct the new facility.

Helms indicated that he did not want to see the fieldhouse constructed if it was going to place the school finances in a pinch, but would like for the board members to give serious thought to the idea of financing before the February meeting.

Superintendent McCasland failed to be optimistic about the financial future of the Rotan Independent School District with respect to paying for a new fieldhouse. He cited the possibility of decreased ADA forcing the school to foot the bill for additional teacher salaries next year and decreases

in the money available for spending next year as two prime reasons.

The final item of business on the agenda dealt with personnel. Superintendent K.C. McCasland, who has been at the helm of the local school for the past 12 years, asked that the board not extend his contract for one year as has been the custom in the past several years. McCasland has been working on a three-year contract; the principals and athletic director on two year contracts and teachers on a one year contract. If McCasland does not ask for an extension in the future, he will work out the remaining time on his present contract that will expire in July of 1974.

The session ended with a question by Bobby Smith concerning parents assisting with the girls

basketball program and a question by Bobby Gruben concerning the proper procedure to follow on obtaining answers to questions asked by board personnel.

The next regular Rotan Independent School Board meeting will be on February 14.

Stanley Nowlin Announces For Comm. Pre. #3

Stanley Nowlin, who resides in Fisher County Precinct #3, has authorized this newspaper to announce his intention to seek the job of Commissioner, Precinct #3.

Nowlin filed his intention to run for that office with the Fisher County Democratic Chairman on January 10th, and remarked that, "I would like an opportunity to represent and serve the people of Precinct 3.

Roby School Board Hires Tax Collector

The Roby Independent School Board met in regular session last Monday evening to transact routine business, but wound up hiring two new personnel, according to Ray Pruitt, Roby School Superintendent.

Mrs. John Kiker was hired by the board to replace Merry Lou Fuller as the school tax assessor-collector. She will assume

her new duties on February 1st.

Francis Morgan was hired to replace the ailing Homer Rucker as a driver on the school bus route.

Superintendent Ray Pruitt presented a report to the board members on his recent trip to Austin, to attend the Administrators Conference.

12,431 Cotton Bales Ginned In The County

The cotton has been coming in all over the area to the gins. Everyone is hoping for pretty weather so they can finish the stripping.

The Rotan Gin has ginned a total of 4488 bales as of last Monday; Farmers Gin of Rotan had ginned 1650 bales as of last Monday.

The Farmers Union Coop gin at Roby had ginned 4032 bales and the E. C. Parker Gin a total of 15 bales as of Monday.

Planters Gin at Longworth had a total of 661 bales. Sylvester Co-op Gin had 700 bales. Royston Gin had 166 bales and the Hobbs Gin had a total of 1585 bales.

COMMISSIONERS APPROVE BY 4-1 VOTE NEXT PHASE IN NEW COURT HOUSE CONSTRUCTION

The Fisher County Commissioners officially voted to employ the Lovett & Sellers Architectural firm in San Angelo, pay them a fee of 7-1/2% of the construction cost, and continue forward building a new Fisher County Court House. This action was taken in the regular monthly Commissioners Court meeting held last Monday, Jan. 10th.

Thurman Terry of precinct #4 made the motion to accept

the 7-1/2% fee and continue with plans to construct the new courthouse. After a very long discussion, E. J. (Junior) Kiker, commissioner of precinct #2, seconded the motion. The voting was as follows: voting for were Terry, Kiker, A. J. (Blackie) Ford and Judge Harmon. Voting against, Wayne Porter, precinct #3.

Max Lovett, representing Lovett & Sellers Architects, indicated at an earlier meeting of

the court, that his fee was figured in the estimated cost of construction. He was originally desirous of an 8% fee, but a telephone call by Thurman Terry to Lovett during the court meeting on Monday revealed that he would consent to accept the job for the 7-1/2% fee.

The petition that was filed with the Court Clerk John Ashley by the "Court House Steering Committee" was the topic of discussion at great length last

Monday. The petition as originally filed, contained some 1,013 names. During the months of December and January, Ashley and his deputies diligently screened the names to ascertain if the signers were registered voters of Fisher County.

They showed each commissioner a list of properly registered voters from their precinct that had signed the petition.

There were approximately 105 petition signers on Blackie

Ford's list from precinct #1: 108 from Junior Kiker's precinct #2; 392 from Wayne Porter's precinct #3 and 43 from Thurman Terry's precinct #4. There were 720 names on the list shown the commissioners. The remaining number were either unqualified, illegible, duplicates or stricken for some other reason. The list presented to the commissioners by Ashley was not the final tally, but did group the petition signers that

were registered into precincts.

The Commissioners called County Attorney Rudy Hamric into the meeting Monday to answer some questions from the commissioners concerning the petition and certificates of obligation.

One court member asked Hamric if he could say how they (the court) stood on the petition that was filed.

Hamric replied that "if you were to issue time warrants or

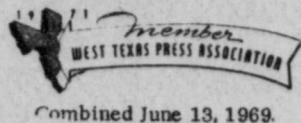
bonds this petition would be mandatory to call an election," he further remarked that in his opinion, "the petition is only a request if you go certificates of obligation".

Hamric reported to the court that he had been in contact with the bond Attorney's office and the Attorney General's office and was informed that the petition has no bearing on certificates of deposit. Other action conducted by the

commissioners Monday, included opening bids on a new car for the Sheriff's Department. Ford and M Chevrolet was awarded the bid on a 1972 Chevrolet V-8, 350, 255 H.P., with air conditioner, power steering, power brakes, power windows, automatic transmission and radio. The department is trading in a 1970 automobile and is to pay a difference of \$1,975.00. The only other bid was from Rotan Motor Company for \$2,100.

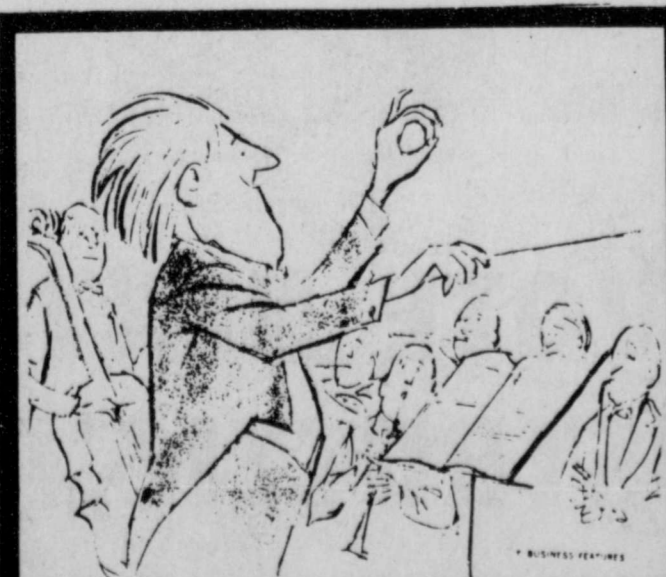

Tax Booklets On Hand At Roby & Rotan P.O.

A booklet that gives information on how to fill out Federal tax returns will be sold at Roby and Rotan Postal Service facilities. Postmasters Lynn Randolph and Robert Phillips announced.

"Your Federal Income Tax" was written by the Internal Revenue Service and contains many examples to illustrate how the tax law applies to actual situations. A special feature of the booklet is the sample, filled-in return, Form 1040, keyed to pages where explanations can be found for each entry on the return.

The 160-page booklet will sell for 75 cents a copy. Another popular IRS publication, "Tax Guide for Small Businesses" will also be sold for 75 cents a copy at the local offices. This publication answers many

questions businessmen have about Federal income, excise and employment taxes and also contains a 1972 tax calendar with due dates for various tax information returns and payments.

FISHER COUNTY RECIPES The Elf's Corner

To those of you who love to try new recipes, begin now to try one new recipe each month—surprise your family.

I hope you are interested in (Cookbooks) Books of good taste. If you are in search of good cook books, may I suggest a few that really will be used.

The first one I like and think all working cooks and the young housewives who like to entertain sometime, will appreciate is "Fondue, Chafing Dish and Casserole Cookery" by Margaret Deeds Murphy. The Murphy book boasts a splendid format with large, well spaced type that makes it easy reading for the working cook, so there is little danger of making errors in the measurements of ingredients. This is a splendid and highly recommended book and may be ordered if interested, from the Hawthorne Books in New York for about \$6.00.

The three utensils compliment each other in the preparation of handsomely presented and delicious meals and it is only necessary to know the specific function of each, to entertain in a memorable fashion (chafing dish, fondue and casserole).

Then there is Marilyn Cohen's book, "After All". It is devoted entirely to the weight watchers denouncement—the dessert. The variety of recipes is vast and in this there is included historical information which is rather fascinating reading.

Now if you are a wine cook, there are several recommended wine cookbooks on the market, and a few I think are usable for most homes, I'll list, and the address where they can be bought and price. California Wine Advisory Board, 717 Market Street, San Francisco, Calif. 94103; Epicurean Recipes of California Winemakers. \$3.50 and Favorite Recipes of California Winemakers. \$2.00.

I think wine cooking when one gathers confidence, and gets the feel of this new ingredient, will be no more confusing than a recipe that says "salt to taste". Do try this way of cooking—you will find it delicious.

Here is a "Cheddar Cheese Fondue"
1/4 cup butter or oleo 1 can (12 oz.) Beer
1/4 cup flour 1-1/2 t. Worcestershire sauce
1 t. Ac'cent 2 cups (1/2 lb.) Shredded sharp Cheddar Cheese
1/2 t. Salt
1/4 t. Dry Mustard
Melt butter in saucepan. Blend in flour, Ac'cent, salt and dry mustard. Gradually stir in beer, add Worcestershire sauce. Cook, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens and come to a boil. Add cheese, cook stirring constantly until melted. Keep warm in fondue dish. Serve with chunks of toasted melba toast. Yields about 2 cups dip. This is a good fondue for casual entertaining.

This is a yearfull of special delights for those of us who like food—

This time of year we find Pumpkin to blend in well with our meals. So lets try a

"Pumpkin Cheese Pie"
"sweet pastry" 2/3 c. butter or oleo
2 cups sifted flour 2 T. rum or rum extract
1 t. baking powder 4 T. water
1/2 t. sugar 1 T. sugar

Filling:
1/8 t. salt 1 lb. cottage cheese (sieved)
2/3 cup sugar 1-1/2 cups mashed, cooked or canned pumpkin
3 t. pumpkin pie spice
2 eggs slightly beaten

Pastry: Sift together flour, baking power, salt and the 1 table- spoon sugar. Cut in butter until mixture is in fine, even crumbs. Add rum and water and work into a soft dough. Turn on lightly floured surface and knead gently for 1/2 minute. Divide dough in half, roll half of dough out about 1/4 in. thick and line a 9 inch pie plate or pan, leaving about 1 inch overhang. Roll out other half of dough about 1/4 inch thick and cut into half inch strips to form lattice top.

Filling: Sift dry ingredients together and stir into beaten eggs. Blend in cheese and pumpkin and pour into prepared pie pan. Criss cross lattice strips over top. Roll bottom crust up and over ends of strips and flute deeply. Bake in hot oven 450 deg., for 10 minutes; reduce heat to 325 deg. and bake 45 minutes longer. Cool in oven.

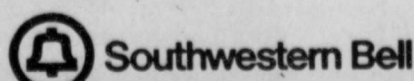

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

The Odessa Show was as tough as ever this year, but Fisher County had a little better luck. Stuart Carey placed 24th in the light heavy class, Mark Guelker placed 1st in the light heavy class. Many nice comments were passed on the Fisher County cattle. Four Herford Heifers were also carried to the show. Mark Guelker placed 3rd, Stuart Carey 6th, Ricky Morton 11th and Jimmy Morton 15th, all in the Senior Heifer class. The Odessa Show is billed as the world's largest herford show. Stock show time has arrived again for another season. Fisher County has some outstanding animals to be shown this year. The schedule from now until March is: Sweetwater, Abilene, Amarillo, Ft. Worth, El Paso, San Antonio, Houston, and San Angelo.

Several important dates are approaching for farmers and ranchers who are on a calendar tax year which includes most individuals in the Rolling Plains. These dates are listed as reminders:

January 31: Farmers and ranchers must file Form 943 showing the social security taxes on wages paid to hired labor during 1971. A payment of any tax due must be made at this time. (If timely deposits of social security tax were made during the year, then you have until February 10 to file Form 943.) Copies B and C of Form W-2 should be given to each employee listed on Form 943. Copy A of Form W-2 is to be sent with Form 943 to the Internal Revenue Office, February 10. Employers who made timely deposits of social security taxes on wages paid to hired labor must file Form 943 and pay remaining social security tax due. March 1: If a declaration of estimated tax was not filed by January 17, the 1971 income tax is due. March 1: All farm businesses must report payments of rents and interest amounting to \$600 or more to any one taxpayer other than a corporation. This is to be reported on Form 1096, and Form 1099, which are information returns.

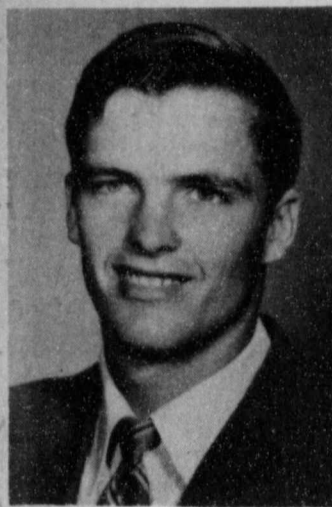
