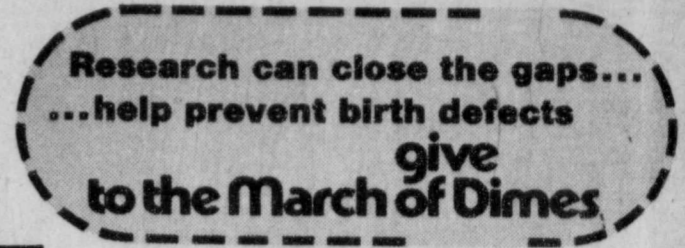

### Bales Ginned

A total of 17,567 bales of cotton had been ginned in this area as of last Monday morning.

The Rotan Gin had a total of 5674 bales; Farmers Gin, 2175; Farmers Union Co-op Gin at Roby had 4616 bales and the Parker Gin at Roby, 800 bales, and Planters Gin at Longworth had ginned 833 bales.

The Sylvester Gin had ginned 1,000 bales; Robyston Gin, 268 bales and Hobbs Gin, 2201 bales.

### J.A. Robinson Gets Bronze Star In Army

Army Spec. 5 J. A. Robinson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley J. Robinson, Rotan, recently received the Bronze Star Medal in Vietnam.

He was presented the Bronze Star Medal for distinguishing himself through meritorious service in connection with military operations against hostile forces in Vietnam. The medal, adopted in 1944, recognizes outstanding achievement.

Spec. Robinson received the award while assigned as squad leader with the 10th Transportation Company.

He entered the army in July 1966 and was last stationed at Ft. Hood, Texas.

The 24-year-old soldier is a 1966 graduate of Rotan High School. His wife, Norma, lives at 206 Lee St. in Rotan.

### County Students On Deans List

Randall Upshaw of Roby and Ernest Kiker of Rotan, students in the College Agricultural Sciences at Texas Tech University qualified for the dean's honor list for the fall semester, according to Dean Anson R. Bertrand.

To qualify for the honor list, a student must be enrolled in 12 semester hours of courses, excluding pass-fail courses, and have at least a 3.0 grade average. Texas Tech uses a 4.0 point grading system.

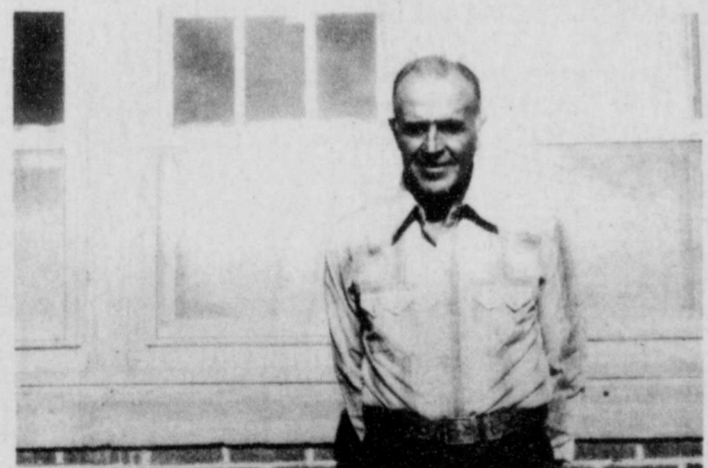
or because of his accomplishments in applying conservation practices on the land he owns and operates in the Sylvester and Newman communities in Southeastern Fisher County. His selection as the outstanding conservation farmer in the District qualifies him to be entered in the Texas Conservation Awards Program sponsored by the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce.

Scott's farming operation consists of 616 acres of cropland, 1368 acres of rangeland, and 78 acres of miscellaneous land—a total of 2063 acres. He is carrying out a sound conservation program that is controlling erosion and improving the soil. In applying his conservation plan, Scott's major accomplishments include 112,717 feet of parallel terraces, 629 acres of brush control and deferred grazing, 1369 acres of rangeland properly grazed, and 616 acres of cropland that has been improved with a conservation cropping system and proper residue management. There are approximately 50,000 feet of parallel terraces presently under construction to be completed in 1972.

The Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) was instrumental in helping Scott carry out many of the conservation practices, Scott commented. "The Great Plains Conservation Program is a good program to assist the farmers in carrying out a conservation plan. The two practices that have helped me the most, Parallel Terraces and Brush Control, are included in this program."

Scott's farming operation is geared mostly for raising livestock. He normally runs approximately 80 animal units of cattle on the cropland and rangeland. He tries to grow enough forage sorghum to graze the cattle on the cropland in the summer months. This allows the rangeland to rest (or be deferred) during the time grasses are growing and producing seed. A look at the grass on his rangeland shows that these rest periods are very beneficial. Scott stated, "I usually have grass when others are feeding. People seem to think that I am wasting grass, but I do not like to abuse it."

A feeder pig operation has recently been started which will further diversify the Scott farming operation. Scott and Callan George formed a partnership to develop a sow-feeder pig operation. Armed with a tentative permit from the Texas Water Quality Board they began construction on feeder barns. One barn is in operation now and others will soon be completed. Scott reported, "We have drawn plans and submitted them to the Texas Water Quality Board. Members of the Board have visited with us and have taken pictures of our operation. They've been pleased with our progress." Scott and George plan to dispose of the waste by collecting the manure in pits and pump it onto bedded land. The manure will then be covered up by rebedding. Terraces on the land will prevent the waste material from escaping into streams or ponds.

### PROCLAMATION "3.76 in '76 Week"

WHEREAS, the Texas agricultural industry, in all of its phases, continues to be our most important industry, and

WHEREAS, agriculture continues to have great growth potential in our county with the rewards from such growth accruing to the benefit of all citizens, and

WHEREAS, there is an urgent need for an active crusade to increase the public's knowledge, acceptance, and appreciation for the highly significant contribution which agriculture makes to the economy of our county and to the level of living enjoyed by its citizens, and

WHEREAS, it is recognized that all citizens of this county have a vital stake and a legitimate self-interest in the general well-being of the farmers and ranchers who provide the great abundance and variety of food and fiber of highest quality which we all enjoy, and

WHEREAS, "3.76 in '76" is a well-conceived program designed by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, with the endorsement and active support of agricultural agencies, organizations, and individual leaders, to help the agricultural industry achieve its full potential through an intensification of efforts by producers, agri-businesses, and professional agriculturists to bring about an increase in income to Texas farmers and ranchers of \$1 billion by the end of crop year 1976, and

## County Farm Income Should Exceed 11 Million By 1976

Cash income to farmers and ranchers in Fisher County should be more than \$11 million by the end of 1976, according to Richard Spencer, Fisher County Agricultural Agent.

This will be an increase of

more than \$2 million from 1968-69 figures, with beef cattle contributing a large part of the gain. The projections are based on studies of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and are part of the "3.76 in '76"

program, a state-wide project to increase Texas agricultural cash receipts by more than \$1 billion.

Total cash receipts from all agricultural enterprises in Fisher County are presently about 9.5 million, says Spencer. The most important ones are cotton, beef, and grain sorghum. They are expected to account for about 65% of the projected 1976 totals.

The county will be aided in its production efforts by the Rolling Plains Economic Program. Extension specialists will hold conferences in the Fisher County area on January 31 to discuss improved production of beef and cotton.

These projections are based on estimates from the County Program Building Committee after separate predictions were made by Extension economists. The figures were published for each county, Extension district and economic area in Texas.

"Fisher County producers will have access to production information and techniques that can help spell success for the Texas goal of \$3.76 billion in 1976," says Spencer.

### Seventy Local Animals In Fort Worth Show

A total of 70 animals from the local area will be entered in the 76th annual Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show scheduled Jan. 28 through Feb. 6 in Fort Worth.

The Rotan FFA Chapter will enter 18 barrows; Roby FFA Chapter will have 12 lambs and eight barrows; and Fisher County 4H Club will enter 13 steers, three heifers, three lambs and 13 barrows.

"Based on entry cards I have seen thus far, our 1972 Stock Show will be one of the best yet," said stock show president-manager W. R. Watt. "There are high-caliber entries in every category."

Last year, livestock entries totaled 11,240. Premiums plus entry fees this year will reach over \$250,000.

The Stock Show Rodeo promises to be an added treat for visitors, Watt noted. We are pleased to have Judy Lynn back again this year," he said. "Her show during the 1971 Rodeo was so well received that we had many requests to bring her back. She will premier an all-new show for rodeo fans in 1972."

Other rodeo attractions will include the Shultz Comedy Revue, the daring Wild Horse Race and the Ranch Girls Invitational Barrel Race.

Cowboys will be seeking a share in the \$86,000 purse as they contest in 5 major events.

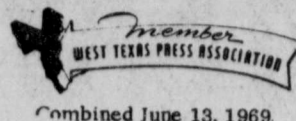

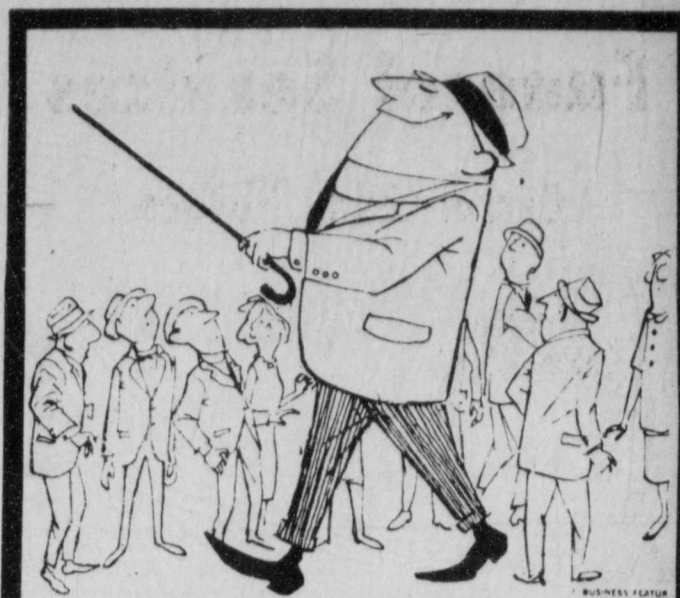

**Savings Bond Sales Report**

Sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds for the first eleven months of 1971 totaled \$38,638 in Fisher County. Of this amount \$1,450 were purchased during the month of November, according to Mr. R. L. Springer, Chairman of the Fisher County Savings Bonds Committee.

During November, Texans purchased \$16,769,888 in Savings Bonds. This represents 12.3 percent increase over the same period last year. Cumulative sales for eleven months of 1971 amounted to \$184,622,944 which is 101 percent of the states goal of \$181.9 million.

Nationally, Savings Bond sales during November totaled \$457 million - 22.6 percent above November 1970. Sales for the first eleven months amounted to \$5,038 million - 17.7 percent above a year earlier.

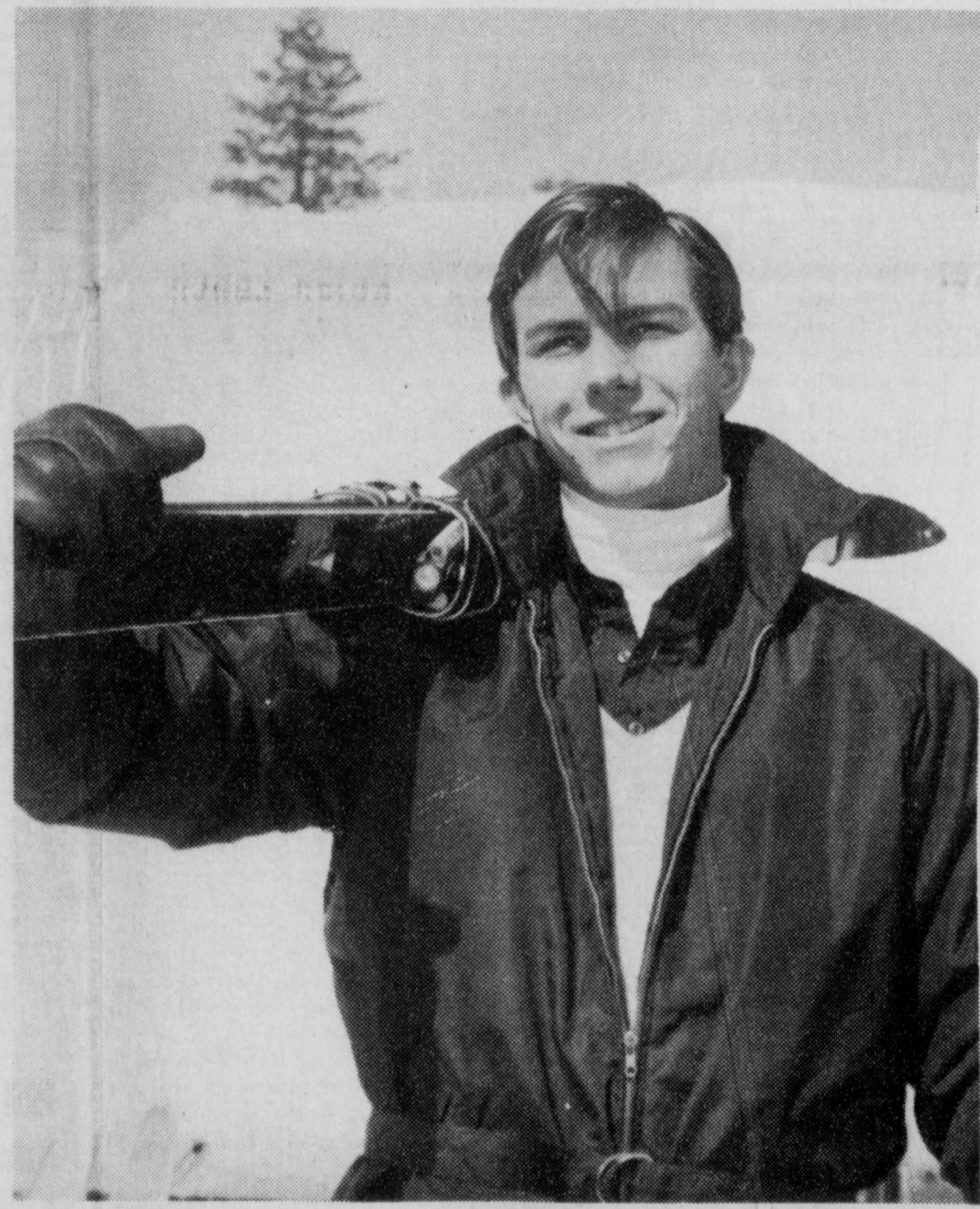

More than 2,300 telephones were in service in Rotan and Roby as of December 1, a healthy increase of 5.8 percent during 1971. Bud McCasland, manager of Southwestern Bell, said today.

Rotan's telephone increase accounted for 3.8 of the increase and Roby showed a 2 per cent increase.

"Telephone growth is considered a good indicator of overall economic growth," McCasland said. "The addition of 61 phones in Rotan and 15 in Roby last year shows that Fisher County's two largest communities are on the grow."

McCasland said Rotan residents are using their phones more too. "In November, 5,917 calls were dialed here on an average business day. That's a 14.2 per cent increase over November, 1970.

Roby residents dialed 2,000 calls on an average business day.

Looking to the future, McCasland said local telephone projects scheduled here this year include installation of dial equipment to provide 100 new phone numbers for future growth. Expanded Area Service, providing toll-free calling between Roby and Rotan, was initiated this year. Buried cable to serve the rural area to the east of Roby will be installed this year. One-Plus Dialing for customer dialing of station to station long distance calls came to Roby and

Rotan last year.

"Growth and expansion are likely to continue for the city's communications systems," McCasland said. "Telephone engineers predict that Rotan will have 1,870 telephones in service by the end of 1975, compared to Roby's 900 phones".

He added that a record \$150 million construction budget has been set for Southwestern Bell's San Antonio Area, of which Rotan and Roby are a part. The 1972 budget includes expenses for central office equipment, buildings and additional plant facilities, such as telephone cable, in an area covering approximately the western two-thirds of Texas.

## Highway Dept. Holds Meeting

The Texas Highway Department held a Pre-Construction meeting at the Fisher County Courthouse, Roby recently to permit county and state law enforcement organizations and other interested personnel to discuss the problems that might arise during the construction of FM 3205 from FM 611 North of Hobbs, 4.1 miles north, a distance of 4.07 miles. This work began January 5 and is scheduled to be completed within an allotted time of 110 working days. The full cost of this highway work will be approximately \$120,000.00.

# Ag. Secretary Butz For Farmer Bargaining Power

Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz in his first public address since being confirmed to the American Farm Bureau Federation's meeting in Chicago, defined what he stood for in the following eleven points:

"1. First, I am for farmers. It may seem unnecessary for me to say that. But not everybody is for farmers. I am, and I want you and everybody else to know it.

"2. I am for farmers getting a fair economic return, both on their labor-- and no one works harder-- and a fair return on their investment-- and agriculture is the biggest business in the nation. A fair return on farm labor and investment means higher farm prices and net returns. And I'm for that. And I think that consumers are in favor of farmers having a fair return too.

"3. I am for farm products being able to move to market at harvest time when the crop is ready. And I'm against farmers losing millions of dollars as they have during the dock strikes and the work stoppage at the elevators here in Chicago. I'm against that kind of disregard for farmers, for consumers and for our overseas markets.

"4. I am for small farmers and young farmers having a chance to grow and dream and have those dreams come true. I'm not in favor of perpetual poverty. That means that small farmers and young farmers must have a chance to grow into an economic unit that keeps up with the times-- so that they can live like other people. So that they can live like the people who are shedding such big tears while espousing a kind of economics that would leave the farmers of the 1970's and 1980's to the farm size of the 1930's and 1940's. And anybody with any barnyard horse sense knows better.

"5. I am for farm women having conveniences and decent things in their homes that they can be proud of and enjoy. That takes more farm income, and more opportunities for off-farm work for those who want it, so that farm women can have those conveniences. That among the farm women I know, is the kind of women's liberation that they are for.

"6. I am for farmers having more bargaining power so that they can have more say over their prices and terms of sale so that they-- the farmers-- remain in control of farming. I stated 3 weeks ago before the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Forestry that I stand solidly behind the right of farmers and of farmer cooperatives to bargain with handlers and processors, just as surely as we have given that right to labor and to other groups. We obviously need legislation to implement that right. The American Farm Bureau Federation, along with other interested groups is strongly backing the Sisk Bill. This is one of a number of bargaining bills before the Congress.

"7. I am for farmers having strong volunteer farm organizations that develop their policies in a democratic process, after study and discussion, from the local communities on up. And I'm for preserving the freedom of farmers to do that.

"8. I am for farm cooperatives that enable farmers to work together to market their products, to have electricity and telephones, and credit. And I'm for farmers running and owning these organizations.

"9. I am for rural development and economic growth in the country-side so that farmers and rural towns people can enjoy schools, health care, housing and community services that are on a par with larger cities. I'm for the kind of strong local, private economic activity that will generate the growth and the vitality that will make this possible.

"10. I am for reasonable farm labor legislation. Labor requirements are seasonal and unique for much of agriculture. Assurances must be maintained that such labor will be available when and where it is needed. Otherwise, highly perishable food will never be harvested.

"11. I am for controlling inflation in the country. Inflation takes its toll on many fronts, but to where more strikingly than in the area of farm costs. ## FISHER COUNTY RECIPES The Elf's Corner

This week I went snooping in our meat departments and found pork roast was a good buy, so even being such a saving for our food budget-it must be prepared well if it is to really be a good buy-for there isn't a food I know that can be so 'blah' as pork roast without good seasoning.

I think I have a good answer to this. A simple and delicious "Hawaiian Pork Roast" can be made by marinating a 4 to 5 pound loin pork roast with a combination of pineapple juice, and various condiments. This can be made hours before meal and reheated in foil, even outdoors on a grill, if desired.

#### "Hawaiian Pork Roast"

- 4 to 5 lb. pork loin roast  
"Hawaiian Barbecue Sauce"  
1/2 cup Pineapple juice 1/2 cup ketchup  
1/2 cup Bottled Barbecue Sauce 1 T. Worcestershire sauce  
1 clove Garlic, mashed  
2 t. hot Mustard 1 t. Salt  
(As an alternate sauce, you add 1/4 cup all purpose Soy Sauce and 2 T. light molasses).

Slash fat on pork roast, making diamond shaped cuts. This allows barbecue sauce to penetrate. Prepare barbecue sauce of choice by combining all ingredients and mixing well. Pour barbecue sauce over roast cover and place in refrigerator 5 hours or over night (to save time, roast may be marinated for about 2 hours at room temperature without much loss of sauce penetration).

Remove roast from marinade, reserving marinade. Place roast in foil lined roasting pan. Roast in preheated 350 deg. oven for about 30 minutes per pound, or until done. As meat roasts use half the reserved marinade to baste the roast about every 20 minutes, throughout the cooking time.

Just before serving heat remaining marinade and serve with roast. To serve, slice roast between each rib, giving each person a generous serving.

This is a suggestion I like - serve a beautiful fruit salad and a colorful vegetable casserole with this roast, and believe me, a more appetizing meal could not be made.

If you are one of those persons who doesn't know beans about beans, you're part of the great silent majority. Beans have an important place in history, and it isn't Boston.

Beans have a higher protein content and I understand that next to cereals they help to abate the hunger of the world. And, treated well, beans are delicious, but please don't abuse beans. Don't over cook them. Here is a Green Bean recipe that is nice.

#### "GREEN BEAN SUPREME"

- 2 cups (1 lb. can or 10 oz. package) cooked and drained Green Beans  
2 T. Butter or Oleo  
1 medium stalk celery, sliced  
1/4 cup slivered almonds  
1 t. Salt and dash of pepper

In medium saucepan, saute celery and almonds in butter or oleo over medium heat about 10 minutes, or until celery is tender and almonds are lightly browned. Add beans, salt and pepper. Toss lightly heat through. Top with mushroom caps sauted in butter. (This is nice with the pork roast).

Now we need a lush dessert to help this meal along, how about a Caramel Custard?

#### "Caramel Custard"

- 10 T. Sugar 2 cups Milk  
3 Eggs 1/4 t. Salt  
2 Egg Yolks 1 t. Vanilla

Melt 6 tablespoons of the sugar in small saucepan over medium heat, stirring constantly until a caramel colored syrup is formed. Pour syrup into buttered pyrex deep pie pan. Beat remaining 4 tablespoons sugar, eggs, egg yolks, milk, salt and vanilla together in large bowl. Pour custard mixture in deep pie pan, set on a rack in big shallow pan and fill with hot water to 3/4 inch from top of pie pan. Bake in 300 deg. oven for 1-1/4 hours or until metal knife comes out clean. Cool, then chill. (Cherries, red maraschino cherries, drained and halved, may be added to this custard before baking, if you care for cherries).

I didn't start out to give a complete menu but it ended this way, only for the bread and that can be your choice. As you see I start out and never know when to stop as food becomes music to me, when I start cooking or planning a menu, forgive me. Until later, . . . .
