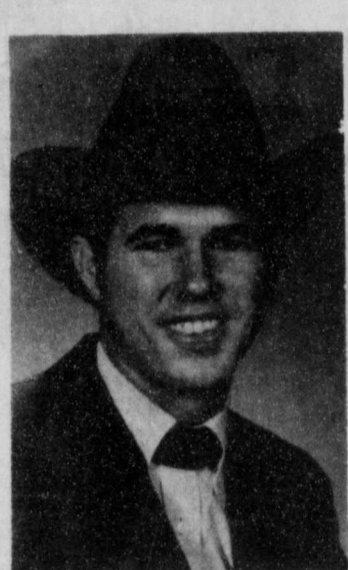
Hobbs Places At Track Meet

Texas State Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon will be a guest at the noon meeting of the Roby Lions Club and will visit in Rotan on Thursday, Mar. 9th.

Hightower is a candidate for re-election to the State Senate from the district which includes Fisher County.

The Vernon native is in his eighth year of service in the senate. He also served one term in the Texas House of Representatives and was District Attorney of the 46th Judicial District 7 years prior to his election to the senate.

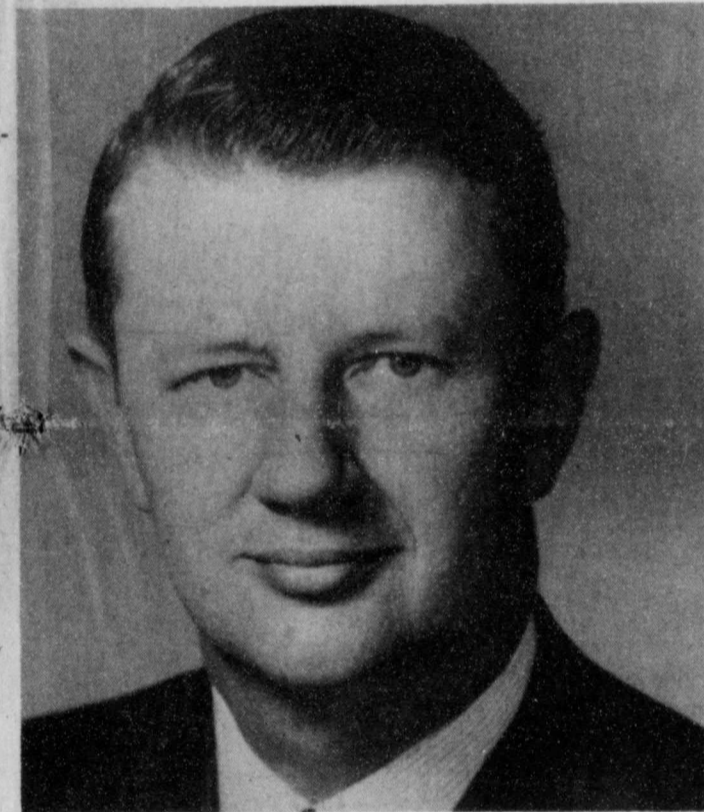

County 4-Hers Show Winners In Houston

Dale Wilfong, 16 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Wilfong of Rotan, showed the Reserve Champion Angus Steer at the Houston Livestock Show March 1st. The steer, 1054 pound heavy weight was bred by J. H. Strain of Haskell. The steer came from the Half Moon Ranch owned by Strain in Fisher County. Ed Wilfong is the Half Moon Ranch Foreman. The steer sold for \$2 per pound.

Other steers placing from Fisher County were Fonda Jeffrey, 2nd in the lightweight short-horn class, Jana Jeffrey, 15th in the light Charolais; James Jeffrey 6th in the middle Angus class; David Posey 15th in the light

Angus class; and Audrey Carey 12th in the light Angus class. These steers sold for 51 to 57¢ per pound.

In the Heifer division, Mark Guelker placed his Hereford 8th in the senior class and 20th in the winter class. The senior heifer was also shown in the scramble class and placed 4th. Sheila Jeffrey placed her Angus heifer 5th in the Summer Yearling class.

Brad Stuart placed 4th in the lightweight Hampshire lamb class. This was the class the Grand Champion lamb was from. Brad's lamb sold for \$1.50 per pound. Britt Stuart placed 8th in the light Southdown class while Brad placed 32nd. These lambs sold for 75 and 40 cents a pound.

James Kemp was the only county 4-H member to place in the barrow show. James placed 7th in the middleweight cross bred class. His barrow sold for 40 cents a pound.

Fisher County can be proud of these results at the Houston Show. The show gets tougher each year because the money is there.

Fisher County Leaps Ahead On Bond Sales

According to Mr. R. L. Springer, Chairman of the Fisher County Savings Bonds Committee, the 1972 Savings Bond goal for the County is \$50,000. January sales of E and H United States Savings Bonds totaled \$15,624 for 31 per cent of the sales goal.

The 1972 sales goal for Texas is \$202.3 million. During the month sales were \$19,365,593 compared to January 1971 sales of \$17,375,765—an increase of 11.4 percent.

The Department of the Treasury announced that during January there were new purchases of Series E and H Bonds amounting to \$521 million, 21.3 percent above January a year ago. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Bonds totaling \$28 million were reported for January—39 percent above the \$20 million exchanged in January 1971.

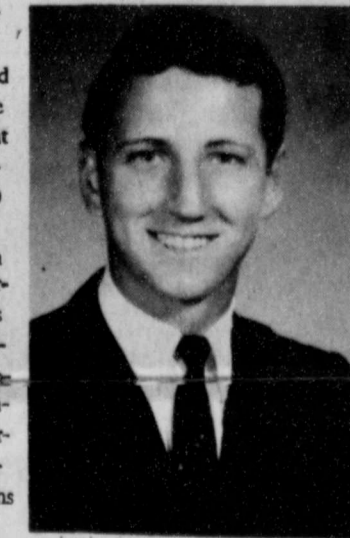

Harlem Jokers Basketball Squad In Rotan March 14

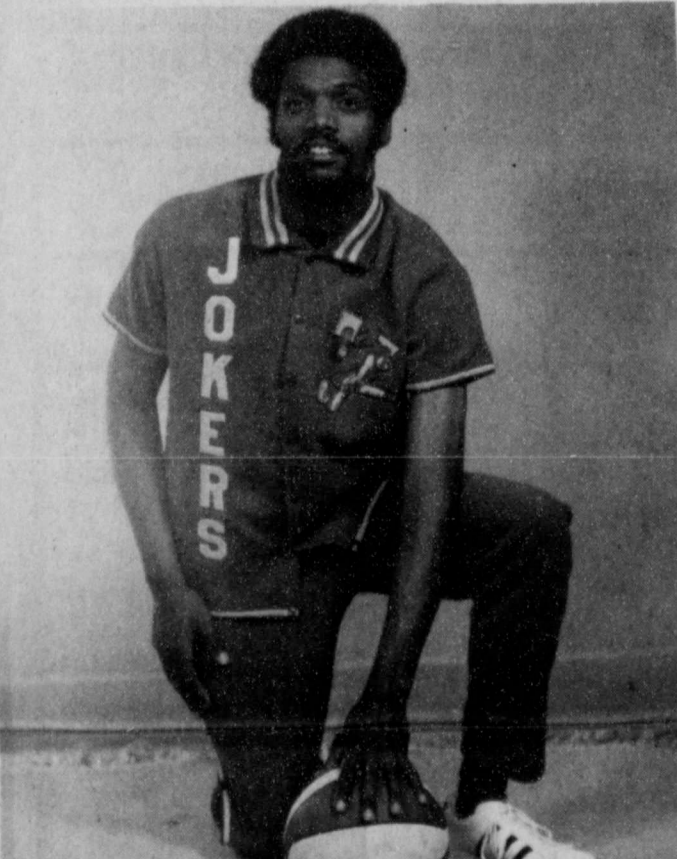
The Harlem Jokers are coming to Rotan Tuesday, March 14, at 8:00 p. m.

"Early Childhood Program" For Tri-County Area Launched In Rotan School

The Rotan Primary School has started a new program this year, one that will interest any parent that has a child three to five years of age. It is the "Early Childhood Program" and is a tri-county educational co-op program. The teachers are Mrs. Jo Ann Reed and Mrs. Ann Jacobs of Merkel. Purpose of the program is to make the world of school easier for the child, and to locate any difficulties the child might have.

Before a child is admitted to the program, he is given a battery of tests to determine his individual needs. From these tests an education plan is written for the individual child. If he has a physical problem, a physical examination is required. The parents meet with the teachers, principals, the supervisor of the program, a diagnostician, and the school counselor. This group studies each child, calls the parents, and then admits the child to the group. When the child arrives at the school and how long he stays depends on the individual child.

The Kindergarten students having trouble in some area, go to the school 45 minutes each day. The five year old children, not old enough in September to attend kindergarten, attend the classes five days a week for one and one-half hours per day. Their program is set up much like the kindergarten program, they learn the numbers, color, trace and do art work, and participate in physical activities such as jumping, skipping, etc. The teacher reads short stories aloud and as the children learn to sit still and listen the stories get longer.

Another group of two students, attend on alternate days for one and one-half hours for 2 days, and both get individual attention.

All visitors are welcome at anytime, this program will be of special interest to parents who have a child that will be three years old by September.

Also, a speech therapist, Mrs. Mary Beth Vanderslice of Stamford, is a part of the program. She is at the school on Tuesday and Thursday mornings to help the children pronounce their words better.

The three-year-old child attends two days a week for one and one-half hours, on Tuesday and Thursday. They learn to draw and tell about the picture they drew, they paint, play dolls and dress up. The Peabody Language Kit is used and records are used for listening for sounds.

The four year olds attend on Monday and Wednesday at 1:00 and 2:30.

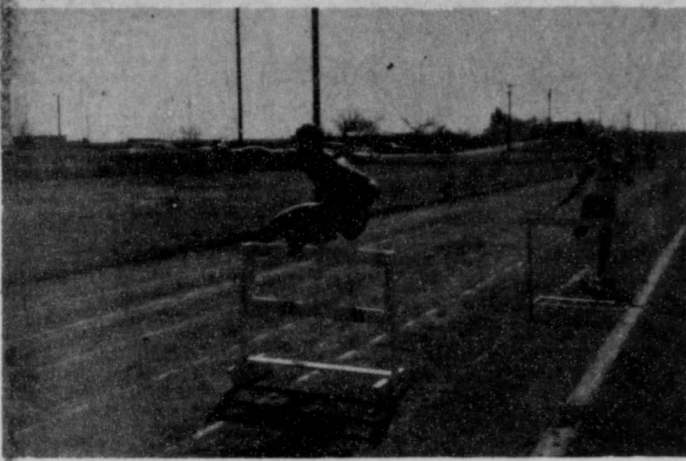

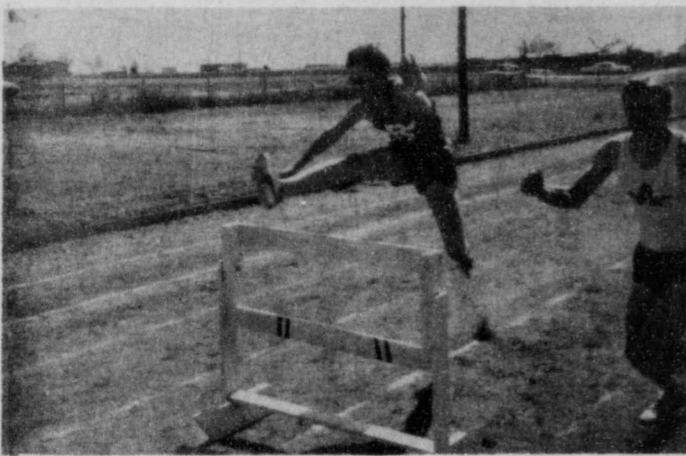

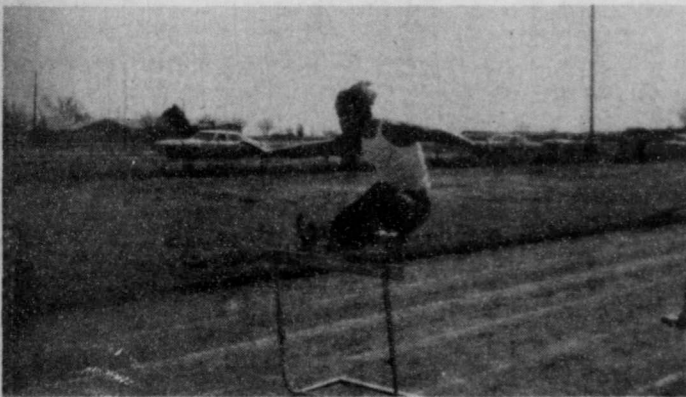
GRACEFUL: Mike Cade glides over hurdle in the Double Mountain Relays.

DAR Interested In Education Promotion

Promotion of education has been a prime objective of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, since its inception in 1890. This is clearly set forth in both the Society's Bylaws and the Act of Incorporation.

The NSDAR has been active in the youth education field for the past 60 years. They have 2 school that are fully owned by the organization, Tamasee, a boarding school in South Carolina, and Kate Duncan Smith, a day school in Alabama.

Tamasee is located in the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains in the extreme north west corner of South Carolina, near the village of Tamasee. The school opened in 1919. The enrollment is made up of needy children and youth. The older students help with the farming, shop and other duties at the school.

The Kate Duncan Smith school on Gunter Mountain near the village of Grant, Alabama, was opened in 1924. This is a thickly settled area almost completely cut off from the rest of the world. The people exist under very primitive conditions being

isolated kept them from modern methods of living. Most of the children were deprived of an education.

The NSDAR also has a keen interest in the first Americans, the Indians. They help support two schools for Indians, Bacone College at Bacone, Okla., with 481 students from 40 different tribes and 25 states, and St. Mary's School for Indian Girls at Springfield, South Dakota with 83 enrolled. These schools depend almost entirely on contributions. They do not receive State or Federal aid.

The DAR also provides many College and nursing scholarships to Indian students in other schools.

The unique quality typifying all DAR education programs is that they are all entirely volunteer. These programs emphasize leadership, service, dependability, and patriotism. These young people are chosen for different awards by some one other than the DAR. The awards are bond, medal, certificate or other prizes. The purpose is to inspire American ideals and principles in youth.

In 1913, the DAR founded the Americanization School in Washington, D. C. This school is now incorporated in the school system in District of Columbia. The school is for immigrants

seeking naturalization. In cooperation with the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service, the DAR publishes and distributes, free, hundreds of thousands copies of "DAR Manual for Citizenship", and participates in Naturalization Ceremonies throughout the nation.

Daring from 1958, DAR has awarded outstanding naturalized citizens an Americanism Medal for demonstrating outstanding ability to follow naturalization in trustworthiness, service, leadership and patriotism.

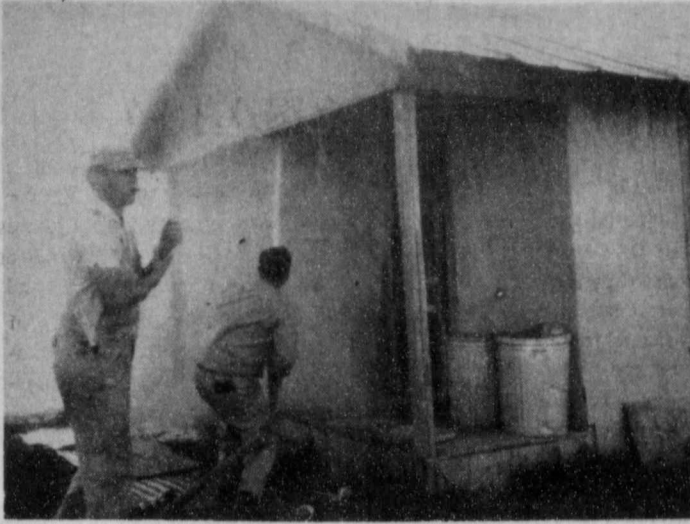

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Fertilizer phosphorus can be obtained from a number of different materials and much has been said concerning superior qualities of specific carriers. No factual evidence from research substantiates these claims. While the phosphorus carriers differ chemically and in their phosphorus concentrations, we stand pat in our thinking that the farmer should purchase on the "available P2O5" guarantee with his final decision depending on price, convenience and accuracy of application.

None of the available phosphorus moves more than perhaps one and a half inches from the point of application. This applies to normal superphosphate right on up through the more recently developed polyphosphates.

The form that the phosphorus takes after application is determined by the soil—not the material applied. Good carry-over can be depended on in West Texas soils.

Severe confinement of the breeding herd can cause failure of gilts and sows to show estrus and ovulate and may delay puberty in gilts until they are 9-12 months of age or older. The severity of anestrus (failure to exhibit heat) may vary with the

herd, but occasionally as high as 80 percent of the herd at 10 months of age will fail to show estrus when in confinement.

Research has shown that the number of gilts per group, the severity or closeness of confinement, and the absence of a boar all contribute to the anestrus condition. For example, gilts housed in groups of ten or more have remained in anestrus. When similar gilts were divided into groups of five each, in pens with half the floor space anestrus did not occur. Anestrus can usually be prevented by breaking the groups into smaller separate sub groups, providing more area per female and by introducing males into the group.

Aphids are very interesting insects. In many species no males have ever been found. The females give birth to living young in most instances, at times they lay eggs. A single aphid, if none of its offspring died, could produce 1,560,000,000,000,000,000,000,000 individuals in a single season.

Aphids are called "plant lice" and there are hundreds of species which range greatly in size, shape, and color. Aphids are responsible for transmitting many plant diseases.

TIPS By Alice K. Ballenger County Home Demonstration AGENT

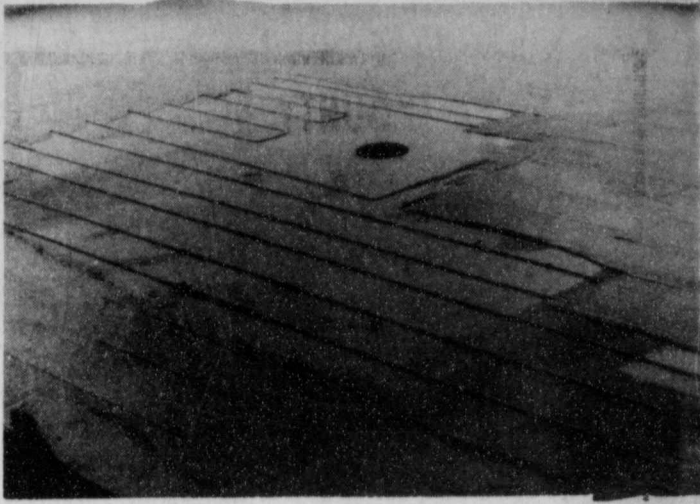
Make way for the childproof wall! If you are planning to panel a wall that must withstand a lot of abuse, then look for a wood paneling with a finish that can really take it. "That's one with conversion varnish!" said Mrs. Alice Ballenger, Extension county home demonstration agent.

This varnish forms the most durable finish available for wood paneling. It's been treated at a temperature between 120 and 160 degrees Fahrenheit. With this treatment it's not affected by paint removers or common household cleaners used in cleaning walls.

"When shopping for paneling, to find out whether or not it has the conversion varnish finish,"

ask the salesman, "the agent said. Most wood paneling on the market does have this type of finish, but he can assure you whether or not your choice does. Lacquer, acrylic and polyurethane are other commonly used finishes. Most fine furniture has a lacquer finish and needs protection from small children and their crayons. Acrylic and polyurethane finishes take more hard use than lacquers. But a conversion varnish is still more durable.

"So ask about the finish before you make your final choice on wood paneling. If it's for a room that really has to take it, the one with the conversion varnish is your best choice," the agent said.



Radiant Cable Heat...

Radiant cable heat may, in time, replace conventional heating systems in and around Fisher County.

Larry Dennis recently installed this electric heating system in his new home in Roby. Larry plans to install this type of system and used his new home as a starting place.

The new radiant cable heat operates from a series of wires stapled to the ceiling of the house. It operates like an electric blanket, converting electricity directly to heat. Each room has a separate thermostat for individual heat control.

You do not have to install pipes, chimneys, tanks, ducts, motors, fans, pumps, boilers, valves, filters, etc. with radiant heat. You can add more heat capability without having to allow for additional capacity in the original home design. Moreover, fuel storage problems are eliminated with radiant heat.

The wires radiate heat to the floor and objects in the room. Therefore, there are no drafts. There is no warm air to rise since the air is not heated like ordinary heating systems. The air is not in motion with radiant heat; therefore, it is dust free. There are no toxic gases or other hazards of combustion with clean radiant heat. Humidity problems are not created.

with this type of heat. Because the air is not heated it is not dried out and the oxygen is not consumed.

The wires are covered with a special type of mud called Radex. The base coat is applied the first day. A second coat is applied the second day and the finish coat follows. Several types of finish can be obtained, including the smooth sand finish, swirled texture, fine texture, and the most commonly used aggregate acoustical texture.

This type heating can be used in a new home or older home being remodeled.

Notice is hereby given that Atmospherics Incorporated of 4881 East Dakota, Fresno, Calif. 93727, who hold License #2 of the State of Texas, intends to engage in an operation to change by artificial methods the natural development of atmospheric cloud forms for and on behalf of the Colorado River Municipal Water District located at P. O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas, 79720, and will conduct the program of weather modification designed to increase precipitation by means of the aerial application of silver iodide and other artificial nuclei as follows:

1. The area over, or in which equipment may be operated shall include the counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Dawson, Borden, Scurry, Fisher, Martin, Mitchell, Martin, Nolan, Glasscock, Sterling and Coke.

2. The target area, within which the precipitation is intended to be enhanced can be described as follows:

The boundary may be described by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, Texas, and running along Highway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamesa, thence north-northeast on Highway 87 to the north border of Dawson County, thence east along the north border of Dawson, Borden, and Scurry Counties to Highway 84, thence southeast along Highway 94 to Roscoe, in Nolan County, thence south-southeast to Maryneal, thence southwest to Silver in Coke County, thence south-southwest to Highway 87 at a point approximately 13 miles northwest of Sterling City, thence northwesterly along Highway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.

3. The equipment, materials and methods to be used in conducting the operation within this area of approximately 3500 sq. miles include a 3cm radar system, cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide ice nuclei, hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation of clouds or weather systems.

4. The program will be operational during the period from April 15, 1972 through October 15, 1972.

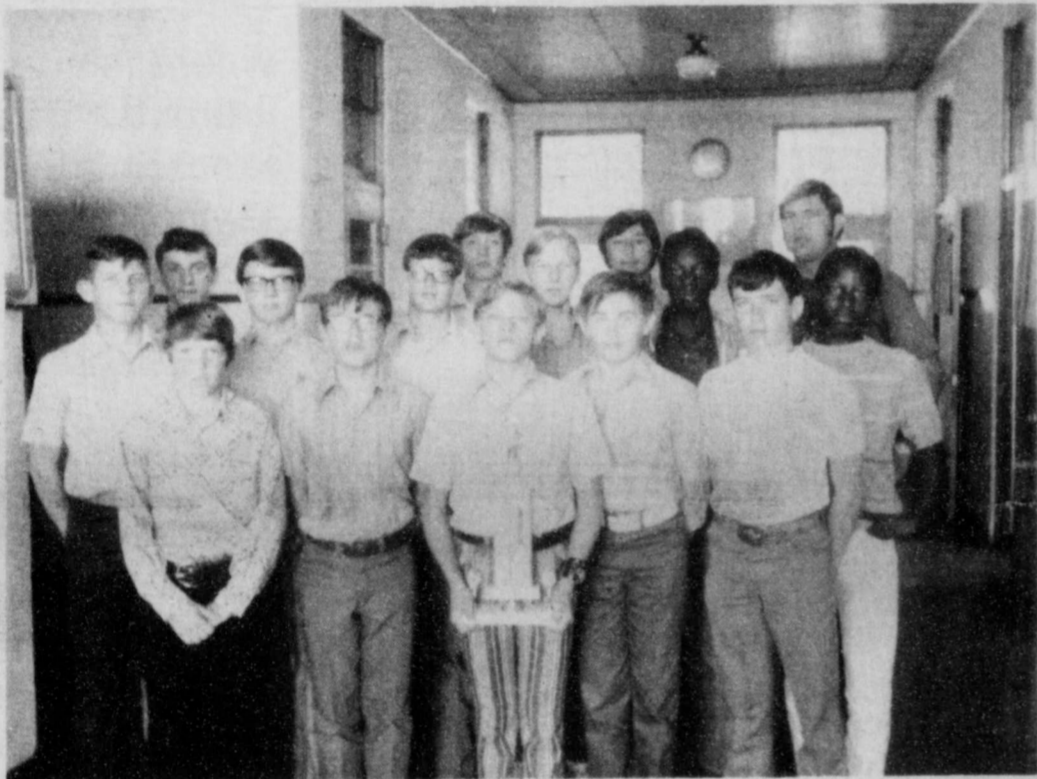
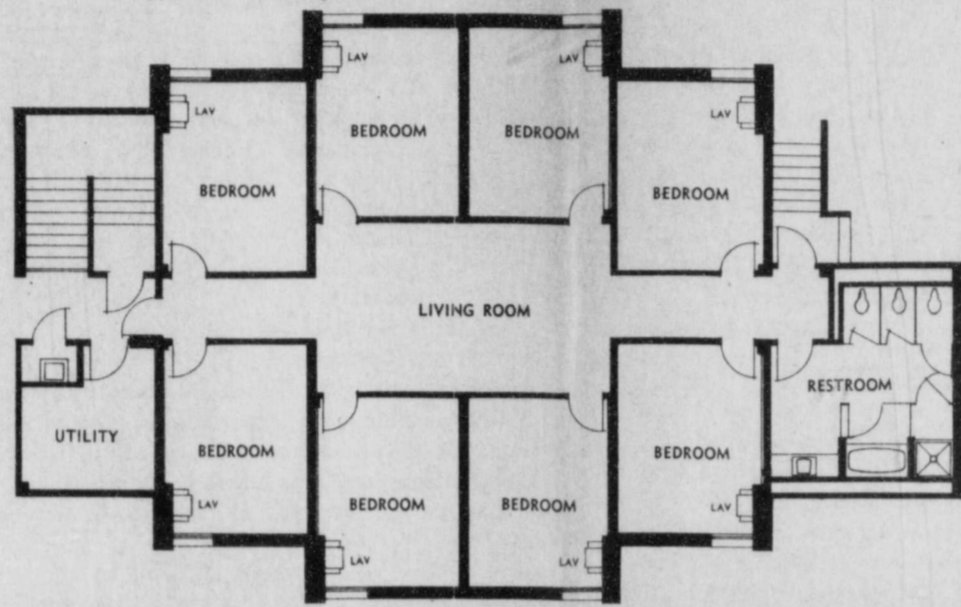

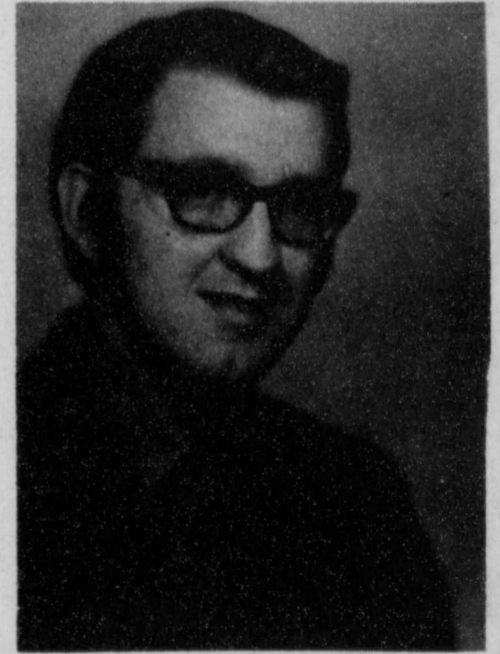
