Roby School Board Names Jerry Hoodenpyle As Head

The Roby Independent School Board met last Monday evening for their re-organization and regular business session.

To start the election of officers for the 1972-73 year, board member Jack McClure made a motion to elect all three officers (Kyle Moore, President, Ben Neeper, Vice President, and Hub Bennett, Secretary) back to their positions by acclamation. The motion was seconded, but before a vote was taken President Kyle Moore declined to accept the job of board president for another term. He cited the increasing time that had to be devoted to the job as a prime factor in declining the appointment.

Kyle Moore, who was presiding over the meeting, called for the nomination for the position of Board President. Jerry Hoodenpyle nominated Ben Neeper for the post. Neeper in turn nominated Hoodenpyle and a vote was called for.

Jerry Hoodenpyle polled the most votes and will thus serve as the new Roby School Board President.

Ben Neeper was re-elected as vice president and Hub Bennett

was put back in as the secretary-treasurer.

Rex Hall made a motion, seconded by Archie Rivers to approve the minutes of the March meeting.

After some discussion, Ben Neeper moved to pay the bills for last month. The motion passed.

The board canvassed the election results submitted by the Election Judge and after a motion and second by Rex Hall and Kyle Moore, voted to accept the results as presented. Of 138 total voters, Kyle Moore received 75 votes, Archie Rivers 79, W. C. Matthews, 65 and Howard Faught, 65.

School Board members held a discussion on a pick-up truck for the agriculture department, but put off a decision until the May meeting.

The board also discussed at length the school band leader and a school dress code, but put off decisions in both areas until a later meeting.

In final action, the board voted to continue with the present policy of allowing only students and sponsors to make the annual

Senior Trip. Hoodenpyle entertained the motion that was seconded by Ben Neeper.

The meeting adjourned at 10:00 p. m., on a motion by Ben Neeper. The next regular Roby School Board meeting will be held on May 13th.

Dick Edwards Elected New Rotan School Board Chief

Dick Edwards of Rotan received the nod of his constituents last Monday night to fill the head chair on the Rotan Independent School Board.

Edwards, who has been a member of the board for the past 12 years, had previously served as board vice-president.

The April re-organization session of the Rotan School Board promptly got underway at 8 p.m. with the reading of the March minutes by Secretary Jerry Marshall. Bobby Smith made a motion that was seconded by Charlie Joe Helms to approve the minutes as read.

The second item of business was to canvass the votes of the recently held election. Election Judge Bernice Hargrove was in attendance at the meeting and distributed the proper papers to be signed by board members. Dwight Nowlin made a motion, seconded by Bobby Gruben to accept the election judge's figures. The official vote breakdown went on record with Dr. Jerry Marshall polling 180 votes, Alan Houston receiving 211 and Alta B. Hinson capturing 108 votes. School Board President, Clay Fowler signed the Judge's election report and left the

meeting, turning it over to the vice president, Dick Edwards.

The next item of business was the election of officers for the 1972-73 year. Dwight Nowlin nominated Dick Edwards for Board President. Dr. Jerry Marshall seconded the motion, and Edwards was elected by acclamation.

Dr. Jerry Marshall nominated Dwight Nowlin for board vice-president and his nomination received a second by Bobby Smith.

Charlie Joe Helms injected a motion to nominate Dr. Jerry Marshall for board secretary. His motion was seconded by Bobby Gruben.

The final spot on the board of title-holders went to Bobby Gruben. He was nominated by Bobby Smith, received a second by Dwight Nowlin, to fill the spot of assistant board secretary.

The meeting progressed to the point of approving all bills and reviewing the financial report. Dr. Jerry Marshall made a motion to pay the bills and received a second from Bobby Gruben.

Board member Bobby Smith entertained a motion to give former Board President Clay

Fowler a vote of thanks for 12 years of unselfish service to the Rotan Independent School Board. Bobby Gruben seconded the motion.

School Superintendent K. C. McCasland reported the school total enrollment at 720. The break-down included 267 students in primary, 238 in junior high and 215 in high school.

In the next item of business, K. C. McCasland recommended that the board vote to approve a one-year extension on the school insurance policy. The policy, written by the Rotan Insurance Agency, carries a total premium of \$6,549.00.

Bobby Gruben made a motion, seconded by Alan Houston, to set June 20, 1972 as the date of the public equalization board meeting. It has been customary in years past for the board to hear real estate matters in the morning and oil matters in the afternoon. The meeting will be held in the school cafeteria.

In the next item of school board business Superintendent K. C. McCasland recommended that the board hire Jackie Hancock for the full 1972-73 school year subject to assignment. Bobby Smith made the motion to accept McCasland's recommendation and received a second from board member Charlie Joe Helms.

The remaining items of business all received considerable discussion, but no official action by the board. They discussed the disposition of the Shelley property on Beauregard Street. Most board members seemed in agreement on selling the house, but a decision was put off until the next meeting. Board members also discussed delinquent taxes, the condition of the football field, and the possibility of installing some new speakers at the football field for next season.

COMMISSIONERS MEET FOR APRIL COURT MEETING

The Fisher County Commissioners met last Monday morning for a rather long regular monthly meeting, but one that saw several important items of business transacted.

Thurman Terry made a mo-

tion, seconded by A. J. Ford, to approve a resolution by Percy Hardiman allowing Texas Counties to use additional money derived from decreased ad valorem taxes by the state with in their own counties. By ap-

proving the resolution, the commissioners are asking the Governor to bring this matter before a special session of the Legislature.

Commissioners Terry and Ford made and seconded a motion

respectively, to purchase six acres (more or less) at Capitola from the Hobbs Independent School District for a total price of \$60,000. It is expected that a building will be constructed on the 6 acre site in

order for residents of that area to have a voting place.

The commissioners voted to approve the bid submitted by Southwest Portland Cement Co. for a model 1800 International upon the approval of Commis-

sioner A. J. Ford.

Commissioner Kiker made a motion to accept the bid of C. H. Christian to construct a bridge on the Clear Fork as previously advertised. The bid was for \$3,900,00.

Fisher County Commissioners voted to join the Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association and sent \$100,00 in dues to the organization. Commissioner Thurman Terry made

the motion that was seconded by E. J. Kiker. In another motion they voted to join the Texas Association of Counties and pay dues to that organization in the amount of \$200,00.

18 Year Olds Must Still Register

Col. Melvin N. Glantz, State Director of Selective Service for Texas, has reminded young men of their requirement under Federal Law to register with Selective Service.

Some young men may believe that because future military manpower requirements may be met by volunteers that the requirement to register is past; however, the Law does require registration by all native born young men and all residents within 90 days of their 18th birthday. Legal registration may be completed 30 days before or 30 days after the young man reaches age 18.

If a young man fails to register with Selective Service, he is subject to a fine or imprisonment or both under provisions of the Military Selective Service Act.

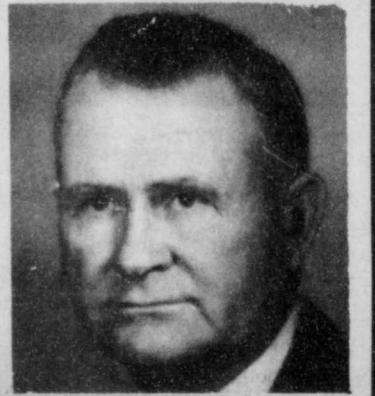
